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MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS Council budget 2014/15

The Parish Council has carefully considered its budget for 2014/2015 looking in detail at its income and expenditure. This year, the Council has also had to take into account the Government's changes to the Council tax benefit scheme. The Vale of White Horse District Council determines and administers its own council tax reduction scheme, which has an effect on the parish element of the council tax. The Vale of White Horse District Council will provide a grant to the parish of £1404, and the remaining parish council tax element will be £36,596. This equates to approximately £52.82 per year for a property on Band D council tax or approximately £1 per week.

Parishioner of the Year Award

Thank you to all of you who have taken the time and trouble to write to the Council to put forward nominations for the Parishioner of the Year Award. The Council has a working party that is now considering all the nominations in order to prepare a shortlist for the Council to consider in due course. Should there be anyone who has forgotten to submit their nomination their please contact the clerk immediately.

Community Governance Review – Parish Boundary Changes

The Vale of White Horse District Council is proposing to put the whole of Cothill into the parish of St. Helen Without. The suggestion is to change the parish boundary to relocate those properties currently within Marcham parish into St. Helen Without. This includes some properties in Blackhorse Lane as well as Cothill School, its playing fields and the nearby kindergarten in Cothill Road. The District Council will be carrying out consultation with affected residents in due course. Slight changes are also envisaged to the parish boundary where the A338 joins the A420. The proposed new boundary line at that location follows the line of the road.

Planning Applications

The following planning applications have been considered by the Council:

P13/V2601/HH Erection of detached garage with storage area over at 6 The Gap. The Council had no objections

P113/V2565 Demolition of existing garage and erection of 6 dwellings with associated parking Marcham Service Station, North Street. The Council recognised that this was a brownfield site, but objected to the particular proposal put forward. It had concerns about the specific location of the dwellings immediately abutting the road, inadequate onsite parking, and the impact on the junction of the North Street and the A415. It asked for various changes to the drawings to be made.

Recent flooding in the locality has provided further evidence that mass development of the type currently under consideration is less than acceptable. And the reasons for this fundamentally flawed approach are as illustrated below.

I and a number of others attended the planning committee meeting on 24 June 2013 at the Vale of White Horse, and during proceedings our Marcham Community Led Plan was summarised for consideration. This spoke against the proposed mass development at here at Marcham. However during the meeting we were told that this document carried no weight at all and was casually cast aside. Subsequently permission was granted for development at Kings Field at Marcham leading to the conviction that councils are under political pressure from government to build houses. Previously we have been encouraged to get involved with community activities in order that we express our views through our Local Parish Council and Community Led Plan. Both of these speak against the destructive influence of mass development in our village. But informed opinion is compelled to reason that this approach carries little weight when government policy applies. On the one hand the government is offering its support for preservation of green belt land but on the other placing political pressure on local authorities to follow this policy of mass development.

I and a large number of people attended the meeting with Ed Vaizey and the Planning Minister at Wantage on the 20th September 2013. Everybody who spoke voiced their opposition to the governments program covering mass development in Oxfordshire. I was in complete agreement that the local infrastructure is incapable of supporting the number of houses being proposed. I did not have the opportunity to speak but had this occurred would have offered the following reasons.

There is ample evidence over lack of schooling capacity yet this to a large extent is conveniently ignored by local and national government.

The roads are riddled with potholes and generally unfit for purpose while further development and car usage will only add to this misery. Additionally it should also not escape our attention that the A34 constitutes an unmitigated disaster where accidents are concerned, as these occur on a regular basis and are conditioned by the excessive volume of traffic. Basically the road was never designed to cope with this amount of activity. However it illustrates all too clearly that housing development

of the type proposed will only serve to exacerbate an already dangerous situation. I have documentary evidence from Thames Water expressing severe reservations regarding our existing systems ability to deal with water disposal. Much of this conditioned by the fact that during last year the system failed causing sewage to flood into the street here at Marcham. This is a matter of public health and must not be ignored. In a development as reported on BBC teletext 10/1/14 councils in future will be able to bill owners of new properties for the maintenance of flood prevention measures. This is because builders have consistently refused to install flood prevention measures as part of housing development and presumably on the basis that these are too expensive.

The proposed development behind us in Kings Field will necessitate the removal of a number of mature trees which act as a flood barrier. Additionally these are home to numerous species of wild life leading to the conclusion that this state sponsored vandalism is completely unacceptable. We experienced flooding in our gardens last year and have photographs to prove it. Yet planning approval made by the Vale has been systematically ignored this.

Last year NPower expressed concerns over future electrical generating capacity and the problem of keeping the lights on. We have recently lost a great of capacity due to the closure at Didcot which now poses the question "How this extra demand can be satisfied?".

Another matter that does not receive sufficient attention is that of mass immigration which undoubtedly has a significant bearing on the housing supply and that of services generally.

Finally it is less than clear to me given the thousands of houses proposed in Oxfordshire where all the jobs are going to come from. However it appears transparently clear that the main beneficiaries from this course of action are not the local communities but financial interests of land owners and developers.

DON'T BE A VICTIM OF A SCAM

There have been a few incidents in the local area of fraud involving a telephone scam and we wanted to make you aware of how this scam is being operated to provide with the knowledge to not fall victim to this.

The Scam operates as follows.

- A fraudster 'cold calls' the victim on their landline and claims to be from a bank or the police where they claim they have identified a discrepancy on one of the victim's accounts.
- To gain the victim's trust they will ask the victim to call them back straight away, but unknown to the victim they have not disconnected the call and when the victim dials the real number they are still connected to the fraudster. The fraudster will then ask for the victim's bank account details, PIN numbers and / or sometimes cash.
- Finally, the fraudster sends an innocent taxi driver or courier to the victim's house to collect the items. The fraudster will then use the card to withdraw cash, make purchases in stores or online.
- The victims tend to be elderly
- The courier tends to be a local innocent taxi driver.
- Fraudsters have claimed to be from the fraud department of a bank, or a retail store
- Fraudsters claim to be police officers, cite recent arrests and need the victim's details / cards as evidence.
- Fraudsters claim their bank is involved and ask the victim to move their money to 'safe accounts'.
- The victim is asked to dial their PIN into their touch-tone phone during the call.
- The call received by the victim appears to come from an 0845... or similar number.
- The fraudster has set up a password with the victim.

THE POLICE OR BANK WILL NEVER ASK FOR YOUR PIN OR BANKCARD

If you receive a call that and asked you to call back your bank or the Police either use another phone so to eliminate the possibility of a scammer still being on the line when you do this or if you can actually visit your bank or police station in person because they will be able to deal with any genuine problems on a national basis.

The MCG committee is not surprised that membership numbers have fallen. Why would anyone bother to join? Nothing seems to be happening after two years of talk about schemes that were supposed to provide the village with its much-needed new leisure facilities. None of the talk has produced a viable plan.

We believe interest will revive once there is a clear outcome. In the mean time, MCG has been working with other members of the Community Facilities Group (CFG) which brings together most village organisations (including the Anson Trust and the Parish Council) and extends an open invitation to those that are not yet members. It is difficult to report work in progress on business plans and make it interesting and exciting, but the CFG is working on detailed plans for what is sees as the only two likely outcomes:

• new facilities are built along the lines of the recent Taylor Wimpey proposal

or

• this latest plan falls through as well. As a consequence, the Anson Trust would be unable to use more of its endowment to continue operating its current facilities, and the community in some form would have to step in to keep them running.

In both cases, the proposal is that local leisure facilities would be run by a community organisation that would be accountable to everyone living in Marcham.

So why are we bothering?

We are bothering because the MCG committee, together with other members of the CFG, believes that preparing for both of these eventualities is necessary, and the preparation has to be done now.

ED VAIZEY WRITES...

Like many others, I am working on improving my fitness at the moment, so I was very pleased to learn that the Government is making changes to make life easier for our local sports clubs. The taxman had received lots of complaints that the rules for these clubs were unclear and caused confusion, so there will be a new set of simple rules. I very much



hope that the changes - which include tax benefits and allowing clubs to generate more income - will make life easier for all our local sports clubs and so help them to encourage all of us not just to take sport up as a new year resolution, but to stick with it all year.

In between visits to the gym, my mailbag for the past month has included issues such as care in the NHS, the forthcoming Scottish independence referendum, and Save the Children's No Child Born to Die campaign, which focuses on reducing newborn mortalities in developing countries. As this shows, my Constituents continue to be concerned about a very wide range of issues, but the largest number of messages I've had by far has been about the planned electrification of the main railway line through the constituency. Although the idea of electrification has been welcomed, there are some very serious concerns about the consequences of doing the work which may occur, because it involves work to a lot of bridges, many of which date back to the time of Brunel. The biggest outcry came with the proposed closure of the A338 at Grove, as well as the continuing impact on the community around Fulscot Bridge. I'll continue to do all that I can to ensure that the needs of Constituents are protected as far as they possibly can be as this process goes on.

I also received a number of emails and letters from members of the farming community about the issue of changes to farm subsidies. Basically, it was about the balance between funding for measures that enhance the environment compared with those which directly support farming – some things do both of course. Having written to the Environment Secretary expressing my constituents' concerns, I was pleased that following an extensive consultation with farmers, environmental groups and others, Ministers listened to these concerns and decided on a less drastic change, with the intention of reviewing this in 2016. This will benefit farmers who take great care of our environment.

COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

Transport to School As I write, we are about to hear the result of the consultation on the Transport to School proposals. We all hope that reason will prevail, and that a sensible, consistent policy is arrived at that allows Drayton parents to chose their children's secondary school in Abingdon without penalty. Recent figures suggest that the amount the County will save if it takes a more draconian approach is very small.

Some good news Area Stewardship Fund In March, work will begin on weed clearance of the kerbs throughout the village. This is being paid for by the Area Stewardship Fund. Regrettably, budgetary pressures at OCC mean that this will be the last year of this fund. However, some of the fund is being used to give Marcham a spanking new white entrance gate at the Abingdon Road entrance to the village. It is hoped that this will not only set

the tone as people arrive in the village, but will act as a marker for planners and landowners - that this is the edge of the village and we would not wish to see Marcham get any closer to Abingdon! Some of the fund is also being used on a kerbside weedkilling programme, beginning in March. The work will mainly concern the cycle lane between Abingdon and Marcham and the main roads through the village.

Community Grants There is a small pot, available for this year only, with a closing date for applications of Mid February, for any voluntary community organisation needing a grant of £100-£500. Please contact me directly if you are interested.

Pedestrian crossing - Packhorse Lane. I am delighted that the Partish Council is endeavouring to secure s106 money from planning developments to change the pedestrian crossing lighting into a much more noticeable, bright LED light. This should make all pedestrians safer – particularly from westbound traffic emerging from the S bend.

HGVs diversions, Garden Cities, Reservoirs, Airports and Marcham By-passes may seem fantasyland at present, but there is no doubt that the land south of Marcham will be developed into something in the next 50 years. If it happens, we need to be prepared for it, and to have agreed what is the best outcome for Marcham residents. The sooner the discussion begins, the better.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR REPORT

Where is planning going in Marcham? Having taken part in a Meeting with Pye Homes to discuss the potential development of Willow Farm for housing, I came away feeling despondent about the rate of applications in Marcham. The village's natural circular layout seems to lend itself to more and more building on its outskirts. When will it stop? When will the Vale take cumulative effect into account instead of looking at each application in isolation? I can't help feeling that converting your excellent Community Led Plan into a Neighbourhood Plan would give more gravitas to your wishes, as the next Local Plan, due to be completed in 2015, is bound by law to pay serious attention to a Neighbourhood Plan's demands. So you would have more control of where you want the buildings to go instead of the developers. Similarly, you would have more control of where roads from developments would exit. For example, at the moment, the Willow Farm development is going to build its exit/entry road onto Packhorse Lane, which means that two roads enter this very busy lane very close together. What silly planning! And yet little can be done unless the two developers agree to make the two developments use one exit / entry road. But a Neighbourhood Plan would have already dictated how the village was to expand, including its road system! Your Community-Led Plan takes you 2/3 of the way towards a full Neighbourhood Plan and Marcham already has more people ready to give their time than other villages. Or is a Garden City the answer, as it can take much of the housing needed in the Vale and maybe even give Marcham it's much needed by-pass!



Hearing from God

On occasion, I have heard on the news of murderers claiming to have heard voices in their head telling them to kill. Even sometimes they have claimed that God told them to do it. It often troubles me to hear this. But leaving aside the obviously insane, deranged, or those suffering maybe from Schizophrenia does God <u>really</u> talk to us?





Call me bonkers if you like but I have heard God speak on a significant number of occasions. Very often but not always, it has been to do with guidance, as God has directed or shown what he has wanted me to dobut what does it mean to hear God speak to us?

Sometimes the way God has spoken has been particularly profound. Once, when Ruth and I lived in Norfolk, a woman came into my shop, took a deep breath and said "God wants to turn your life upside down, inside out and back to front", obedient to what she had believed God told her to deliver to me. Without realising, she had

spectacularly responded to what I had prayed a few years earlier, when in desperation and as a non-churchgoer, I had cried out to God that he would turn my life upside down, inside out and back to front. God responded in his timing and in such a way, that I could not deny that He was there, listening and caring for me, in my then rather desperate personal situation.

One afternoon the following year, with an hour to spare between appointments, I called in to see Ian, a Christian I hadn't seen for a while. He asked me how I was doing and my reply was that I urgently needed someone to fit curtains and blinds for me, as the chap I then employed regularly let me down. "You don't know anybody I suppose?" I asked Ian. That very morning a friend of his, had been in Ian's house talking of how he wanted to get back to doing what he was trained to do. Before moving to Norfolk, Graham had lived in London and while working in Harrods' soft furnishings department (yes – that Harrods!) he had been trained in the London College of Soft Furnishing........ God speaking again, in an amazing way.

God has spoken lots of other times to me, in many different ways - directly through the Bible; through remarkable coincidental circumstances; through other people but increasingly through what the Bible talks about as a still, small voice. But in our desire to follow God's will for our lives we can easily mishear and make a mistake. So in order not to take the wrong path, especially when making major decisions in life, we are called to test that what we think we have heard is correct and not just our own imagination or mere coincidence. We should seek confirmation, which will never be in conflict with God's general directions to us in The Bible.

Jesus described Himself on one occasion as the good shepherd, and said "My sheep listen to my voice; I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish" Jesus talked about His followers being like sheep but that is in no way a derogatory term. We might think we have life mapped out but we so often don't even know what is around the corner. By contrast, God stands outside of time, knows all your past, your present and what the future holds for you. He sees it all at once, from the creation of the world, into the present and at the end, when Jesus will return and judge us as individuals, taking those who have given their lives to Him to eternal life. He sees our past, present and future in an instant, where we often on our own don't have a clue!! So it makes massive sense to follow the voice of our creator who knows all things.

Just before the crucifixion, Jesus spoke to His disciples, saying "I will not leave you alone - I will send you another

counsellor" He was speaking of God's Spirit who would be with those who give their lives to Him. God by His Spirit does indeed speak to those who follow Him. He guides, encourages and teaches us and as we grow in relationship with Him, He helps us to recognise His voice and to follow Him on a journey, an adventure that is richly rewarding and never dull.

Dear Friends.

Water has been much on our minds and in the news over recent weeks, and our thoughts and prayers are with those who are suffering from recent flooding. Spare a thought, too, for our farming community, as flooded and waterlogged fields can take several years to recover, thus affecting crop yields significantly.

Water is essential for life. Without water life dies. It is an essential ingredient to our everyday lives, indeed to all life on our planet. It comes as no surprise, therefore, that water is also a feature of faith.

Water is one of the constant themes within the Christian faith. From significant events long ago recorded in the Old Testament, to the ministry of Jesus in the Gospels, to the outpouring of the Holy Spirit following Jesus's ascension, to the vision of the river of living water in the book of Revelation, water is a symbol of spiritual importance.

Significantly water is used in the New Testament as being symbolic of the Holy Spirit, and his ministry in the lives of Christian believers down the centuries. The Spirit is described as 'living water' given by God the Father, and given to empower Jesus's followers on a continuous basis. Indeed, the Holy Spirit continues to be given to Christians, to enable us to live an authentic life of faith, and to be effective in serving those around us as ambassadors for Christ himself.

As this year unfolds, may I encourage us to engage again with the truth of God the Holy Spirit. To know the Spirit's constant presence and enabling grace is a source of deep joy, and helps us draw close to the father heart of God, and to the Lord Jesus as Friend and Saviour.
