

REPRESENTATIVES' REPORTS

ED VAIZEY WRITES...

Obviously our thoughts have been dominated by the tragic events at Didcot Power Station late last month. I visited shortly after the accident and met the owners of the site, as well as the heroic emergency services. It has been a truly amazing operation in extraordinary difficult circumstances. My heart goes out to the families so cruelly affected. With the Easter weekend just around the



corner, I hope all of my constituents will have an enjoyable break, and hopefully not eat too much chocolate! There are a number of events being held across the constituency over that weekend, which I am sure will provide much fun for the family. Two notable mentions are the Cadbury Easter Egg Hunt at White Horse Hill on Saturday 26th between 11am and 2:30pm, and Easter Fun on the Farm at Earth Trust in Little Wittenham on Sunday 27th between 11am and 3pm. And of course the annual Easter Monday Point-to-Point race at Lockinge on Monday 28th March. The gates open at 12pm on Monday the 28th March, with the first race held at 2pm. Further information can be found at: https://www.pointtopoint.co.uk/events/3267.

It gave me great pleasure earlier this month launch superfast broadband for residents in Pusey and Gainfield. This was an unusual scheme as the village is not in the County's plans for superfast rollout. So BT set up a scheme to allow the community to make a financial contribution, supported by BT and the County. The local community raised £45,000 towards the installation of this box, which will now be able to provide the community with superfast broadband. Overall, superfast broadband has now reached 31,252 premises in the constituency.

My mailbag this month has been dominated with submissions or suggestions to the Chancellor of what to include, or what not to include, in this year's Budget. Suggestions such as abolishing VAT on sanitary products, cuts to alcohol and fuel duty, and preserving the tax reliefs for pension contributions have all been made. The latter issue proved to be the most contentious, as the Government recently conducted a consultation on whether there is a case for reforming pension tax relief. I took a number of the concerns raised with me to the Chancellor, and I note that the Chancellor has decided not to pursue these changes.

COUNTY COUNCILLORS' REPORT

Most people will be aware of the current spat going on between District and County Councils over how best to organize Oxfordshire Local Government. The "hostile takeover bid" announced by the District Councils was not discussed with the County Council. It is regrettable that a conversation which urgently needs to take place will now be conducted in an atmosphere of recrimination. There are also a number of false assumptions on which the District bid is based. Here are a few of the assumptions and why they are false.

April 2016

Assumption 1: **Oxfordshire residents can be ignored** There is a nasty feeling about that the District Unitary Proposals for Oxfordshire, apparently supported by some MPs and the PM, have been planned in secret and could be imposed on Oxfordshire residents whether they like it or not. It is one thing to attempt to cut out the County Council from the conversation (as a way of punishing them for daring to argue that George Osborne's cuts were hitting County Councils disproportionately), it is quite another to cut out Oxfordshire residents whom all elected representatives are there to serve.

Assumption 2: **Oxfordshire County Council is not run as well as the "smooth-running machine" that is the District Councils.** Thanks to the huge benefit of the New Homes Bonus – money gained on the back of all the new developments across the County (80% is paid....millions of pounds, to Districts) - District Councils have had their finances transformed. Meanwhile all County Councils have been trying to maintain their services (all of which are big ticket items – roads, social services etc) with their meagre 20%, while increasing numbers of children and adults fall into vulnerability. This is true of *all* Shire County Councils. It is not just Oxfordshire's problem.

Assumption 3: District Councils can take over the County Council.

The District hostile bid is a reaction to the County's suggestion that Unitary Government would save many millions of pounds. Districts should takeover the County rather than the other way round. This misses the point completely. Under the County's proposals, **ALL** County and District Councils would go and a brand new Unitary Council set up capturing a maximum amount of savings. No one is "taking over" anyone else.

Assumption 4: Oxfordshire residents want the Districts to run everything.

Wrong again. Oxfordshire residents don't mind who runs their council. What they want is the services they most care about delivered for the best possible value.

Assumption 5: The main discussion should centre around who holds the power.

Not so. This is an argument about finance. Unitary Government will yield savings. It is a question of how much saving each proposal will yield. As a result it is a question of how many and which services do Oxfordshire residents wish to preserve.

This is not an argument about who will hold power and Oxfordshire residents must have a big say in deciding the future of their County. *RICHARD WEBBER CLLR OCC*

DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT Kindness and tolerance can bite back

As a member of the Planning Committee, I thought a little known enforcement rule should be brought to your attention. It involves the use of land. There is the four year rule whereby if a person builds a house or domestic building on a piece of land and its authenticity is not challenged in four years, then it becomes his right to leave the building there. Recently, a case in Boars Hill came to our attention where a complete house was built without planning permission, and as nobody had brought this to the Vales' attention in four years, there was nothing that could be done about it.

Similarly, there is a ten year rule whereby if the use of a piece of public land is changed and is used in this way for ten years without challenge, then that person has the right to continue using that land and in time can claim it as his or hers. This is known as the Law of Adverse Possession. There is a case in Drayton where a large box trailer has been parked on a piece of unclaimed land for more than ten years, and now nobody can do anything about removing it, as

through kindness, tolerance or the wish not to interfere, it was not brought to the Vales' attention.

So, be warned! The lesson for all of us is to be observant. If you are aware of any similar cases, it is important to bring it to the authorities' attention immediately, even if it involves a neighbour or friend.

Nearly there!

Looking back over the last couple of years, we have come a very long way towards getting a new community hall with playing fields on the site we all want...the Anson field. There have been many sticky moments when the project floundered and could have failed, but the determination and good will of all those groups involved wanting it to succeed, meant that compromises were found and the project was steered back onto the straight and narrow again. Even now an enormous amount of work is going on behind the scenes to ensure success, not least by the CFSG, the PC, Chris Brotherton of Thomas Homes and the Anson Trust, aided by advice from the Vale. At last we have a projected date for the application to come in front of the Vale Planning Committee....18th May. As I have been so closely involved with the project, I have been advised to come off the committee for that hearing, but I will be given the opportunity to speak in favour of it for three minutes from the floor. With continued good will and determination, we could see the first bricks being laid in 2017.

A SPRING IN THE STEP OUT IN THE WILDLIFE GARDEN

If like me, the onset of Spring brings you new vigour and you want to know what new things you can add to your garden this year to bring in more wildlife. Look no further than the contents of your



wheelbarrow. Arrange log and twig piles comprised of old prunings from around your garden. Dead wood as I've said before doesn't have to be as thick as my thigh. These provide valuable hideaway places for wildlife, and by planting up with ferns, primroses, or other suitable plants it can becomes and interesting feature in itself. Slabs or stones will act as a suitable wildlife habitat, you'd be amazed what lurks under there. Newts often frequent these dark places.

It's always a good time to build a compost heap or a leaf mould bin, if you do not have these already. Children can be engaged for hours digging away in a compost heap, there's an entire world in miniature in there.

Bee homes are now widely available so why not invest in one or take inspiration and build your own with materials hanging around in your garden. Solitary bees use these more successfully than Bumble Bees but that's just my observation, it would be interesting to hear about your findings.

Bees often colonise these homes in spring, after hibernating over winter. The boxes can be left out over winter, or taken down and stored in a safe place to avoid bees being eaten by predators. Isn't that part of the joy of wildlife gardening though? Helping build the food chains.

Insects are gardeners' friends as often they are natural pest controllers, helping you keep natural balance in your garden during the coming season.

Try going with the flow this season and working with Mother Nature and not pulling against her, as we all have a tendency to do at times.
