

Council Tax 2017

The Parish Council has carefully considered its budget for 2017/2018 looking in detail at its income and expenditure. The Parish Council has resolved that it requires funding of £49,500 for the next financial year. The Vale of White Horse District Council will provide a grant to the parish of £370, as part of the council tax reduction scheme, and the remaining parish council tax element will be £49130.

Parishioner of the Year Award

Thank you to all of you who have taken the time and trouble to write to the Council to put forward nominations for the Parishioner of the Year Award. The Council has a working party that is now considering all the nominations in order to prepare a shortlist for the Council to consider in due course.

Bridleway 17 - Bridge Closure at end of Mill Road over river Ock

A closure order has been made to enable bridge reconstruction which is yet to be commenced. The effect of the order is to temporarily prohibit persons and vehicles using the bridge that spans the river Ock south of Marcham Mill. The closure order has been made until 21st January 2020. Please see the letter from Oxfordshire County Council on page 5.

Marcham Garden Competition 2017

The Council will again be running the Best Kept Garden Competition in 2017. No entry forms will be required and judges will assess gardens from the roadside without the need for entering properties. Please bear the competition in mind when planning your gardens and planting your seeds.

Sheepstead Road - street lights

The Council is pleased to note that the County Council, after several months, has now managed to replace the two broken street lights in Sheepstead Road. These will improve the safety of those walking the area when it is dark.

Oxfordshire County Council - Unitary **Authority Bid**

The County Council is proposing to abolish all six councils (county and district) and to replace them with a single new unitary council for the whole of Oxfordshire. "A Fresh Start for Oxfordshire" has just been published, and the County Council would like to hear views on what is proposed, so that it can consider points made before submitting a final bid to central government for a decision.

P16/V3224/FUL Erection of 49 dwellings with associated means of access, car parking, footpath links, amenity space and landscaping off Sheepstead Road. Council supported the development, but commented on various aspects of the proposals.

P16/V3147/FUL Replacement dwelling, swimming pool and garage building at Studland House, Woodside. Council had no objections but commented on traffic during construction and the protection of trees.

Dear Editor

Marcham Mill Bridge

I am writing as Countryside Access Team Leader with Oxfordshire County Council to update residents on the position with Marcham Mill Bridge which carries Public Bridleway Marcham 17 over the River Ock. As you are no doubt aware, the Bridleway has been closed over the bridge for quite some time due to failure of the bridge deck and the significant risk to public safety that this presents. The closure recently came up for renewal, and in the interests of economy we applied to extend this until 2020. Purely for the reason that it is much more efficient to seek a three year closure than to reapply if a 2017 opening is not possible. I assure you however, that we are working hard behind the scenes to ensure that the route is reopened well before 2020.

Negotiations with a range of interested parties towards a mutually agreeable solution are ongoing. These are primarily centred on the exact nature of the repair and ensuring legitimate users can be accommodated within the conservation constraints of the bridge's status as a listed structure. I am unfortunately not yet in a position to offer a firm timescale for the repair and reopening, but will endeavour to keep you updated as and when a definitive plan of action is agreed.

For the time being, the temporary barriers remain in place to ensure public safety. I encourage all residents to continue to observe these, and not risk trying to access the bridge by any means to avoid the genuine risk of accident and injury that would result. I fully appreciate the frustration that the continued delay will cause to those who have been waiting so long for access across the river to reopen. Please rest assured that we are taking all possible steps to make this happen as soon as we possibly can, whilst ensuring safety and making the best use of public funds.

Cats and Antifreeze

During January we lost our beautiful 10-year-old cat Lulu. She died from ingesting a toxin - likely anti-freeze - and we found her in agony and unable to move. The vets were unable to save her but she was medicated before she died from a cardiac arrest due to kidney failure, so at least her suffering wasn't prolonged.

A week later our 9 month old kitten Bertie became ill from the same thing. Luckily the vets were able to save her with 5 days' worth of fluids and antibiotics to treat infected ulcers due to her kidney failure. She's now home and recovering and we are keeping her inside for the foreseeable future. Unfortunately another cat from our road Tower Close died the week after Lulu from anti-freeze poisoning and Pudsey's family were as devastated at her loss as we were.

As I write a 4th cat from Orchard Way (Loki) is still missing. This whole episode has scared our children, caused sleepless nights and meant we no longer feel it's safe to let it cat out during the cold weather. The

LETTERS & MVS problem is that either someone has spilt/

thrown away anti-freeze or someone's car has leaked it. And cats don't know it's toxic so unfortunately it's fairly common.

PLEASE, PLEASE be careful when topping up anti-freeze, windscreen washer and using de-icer. I'm hoping this was an accident and that no one is evil enough to do this on purpose. If you have a cat and see any signs of illness (off food, sick, crying, depressed, smelly) please get them to the vets immediately. I wouldn't wish this on anyone else.







CHALLENGES IN PORT DESIGN (AND WAYS TO SOLVE IT) BY JANE SMALLMAN

The Society was fortunate to have Jane Smallman, ex Managing Director of HR Wallingford, to present to us in January. She is the President of Institute of Marine Engineering Science and Technology (IMarEST), Chair of Centre for Environment, Fisheries and Aquaculture Science (Cefas) and a visiting Professor at the University of Edinburgh. Some may wonder why the landlocked village of Marcham would invite someone to talk about port design. The connection is that Jane has lived in the area for many years and the Society has regularly asked luminaries who live in the village or close by to give us the benefit of their experiences.

Jane gave a fascinating talk of all the problems associated with port design and the challenges of each type. She showed three classes of port and used the examples of Felixstowe and Peterhead in the UK as examples of an estuary port and a coastal port respectively, and then lastly Dahej in India which is an exposed jetty design out into deep water. She showed, through the help of on-screen animations the various problems and solutions when designing ports, and the computer model simulations as well as physical models that are needed to show the water and wave flows. Whilst this subject needs a complete grasp of the mathematics and physics of water movement to fully understand it, Jane was very successful in making the subject easily accessible for a general audience. There followed a large number of relevant questions that Jane answered clearly and it was an indication of the audiences' appreciation just how many questions were asked of the presenter. Our thanks to Jane for taking the time to enlighten us.

ED VAIZEY WRITES...

2017 has arrived with quite a full in-tray for me as your local MP. Issues such as the congestion on the A34, the continued campaign to re-open Grove station, my campaign to secure better fertility treatment for people in Oxfordshire, and the need to secure continued investment in science and technology post-Brexit will take centre stage.



The early months of this year will see us take the formal step to begin leaving the European Union, an issue that will dominate the agenda in the House of Commons.

One of the issues I am most contacted about is local health services, and I share many of the concerns my constituents have raised about the ongoing review, known as the Sustainability and Transformation Plan. I am very unhappy with how the process is being undertaken, and the constant delays to publishing anything meaningful is having a severe impact on local services. Prior to Christmas two GP practices failed in a bid to secure funding to expand their premises to cater from growing populations.

This situation is becoming very urgent, and I will be meeting local NHS chiefs early in the New Year to try and get from them a clear timeline for the STP, so that we can all have a say in how our health services are developed. I am also seeking meetings with health ministers to discuss the failed capital bids for GP surgeries so I can understand why they were turned down so we can have greater success in the future.

In January I will be also co-hosting a debate in Parliament on the provision of IVF treatment. This is an area that I have campaigned on for some time, and I am frequently contacted by constituents who are having difficulty funding fertility treatment. I fear that this area is seen as a treatment that local health services can easily cut and reduce. I will be making Ministers aware of my concerns, and hope they take some action to further protect this important service. January also saw my first public meeting on Brexit, held at the Beacon in Wantage at 18:30 on Friday 20th January. I will be holding a second meeting from 19:00 on Friday 3rd February at Didcot Civic Hall. I am looking forward to meeting many of you at these events and hearing your views on Brexit.

Unitary Government – time for Oxfordshire residents to decide. It was confirmed by both sets of the expensively-commissioned experts that Oxfordshire's Local Government is badly in need of improvement and that Unitary Governmet in some form is the obvious way forward. The estimated savings from forming a single Unitary Council (replacing the present County and 5 District Councils) amount to more than £20m every year. When the issue is explained to residents, almost all I have spoken to respond "Surely. It's a no-brainer. So why are we not getting on with it?"

There seem to me to be two types of argument that are raised against a single oxfordshire Unitary solution. The first type all boil down to Councils and councillors desperately arguing for self preservation. The second group of objections is more worthy of an answer.

With large councils comes a reduction in democratic accountability. But how many of us know our District or County Councillor? How many of us even know what the different councils do? I certainly didn't before I got directly involved. At present there are 63 County Councillors. The experts reckon there would be 120 Unitary Councillors in a one Oxfordshire Unitary Council. In other words, each councillor would be responsible for half the number of people. Councils would no longer be able to pass the buck between

each other. There would be one council responsible for all local services, one council to make the big necessary decisions and one council to blame if things go wrong. In my view, that would give local government more not less democratic accountability.

Every day we delay in going Unitary wastes public money – that is the money that you and I pay in our Council Tax. $\pounds 20$ million of savings every year is the equivalent of $\pounds 60,000$ every day – the equivalent of what it takes to fill many potholes and to support a Children's Centre or two of the bus services we are about to lose. Can we really afford to delay further? As someone who has spent the past four years facing the dreadful choices that austerity has offered, I have to ask - is the prevarication any longer morally justifiable?

However you feel on this issue, I very much hope that all residents of Appleford, Milton, Sutton Courtenay, Drayton, Marcham and Shippon will join me on entering their views on the OCC website where a consultation is about to begin - **consultations.oxfordshire. gov.uk**. It is about time that ratepayers rather than councils or councillors should be allowed their say.

DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT Action on Air Quality

It is some time since I last wrote about Marcham's AQMA (Air Quality Management Area) in Packhorse Lane, which includes the entrance and exit roads to the Lane. As you know, in 2013 a breakdown of the emissions (nitrogen oxide and nitric oxide) suggested that the traffic through the lane could be divided as follows: 84% cars with 46% emissions; 13% LDVs with 18% emissions; 3% HGVs with 31% emissions; less than 1% buses with 5% emissions. As you can see the biggest pollutants are the HGVs and we all suspect that the figure of 3% is way below what it should be now. This is what we want to find out.

County Council have no resources to carry out another survey in this present tight economical climate, as it is a very expensive action. So this is where you can come in. The County Council are very happy for us, that is you and me, to do our own survey under their guidance, which they can then use to help make decisions, hopefully to ban HGVs on the A415 through Marcham and to redirect them. This is our main target! To achieve this, we will need volunteers to man certain points on the road over a day, which will start quite early and stretch late into the evening, when we know quite a lot of traffic passes through.

In addition to counting traffic travelling through Packhorse Lane, we would like to do the same for HGVs that turn into Faringdon Road from Abingdon and the A34. We have long argued that this road, which runs through open rural countryside with a few single or groups of houses set well back from the road, is much more suitable to take these big lorries, as the pollutants they generate have space to dissipate quickly into the air before doing any lasting harm. Packhorse Lane, on the other hand, is a narrow lane built for the horse and cart and with tightly-packed houses close to the road it makes the perfect "canyon" setting to hold onto these evil pollutants much longer. However, the main argument against redirecting HGVs along Faringdon Road is that it is a B road and it would be very expensive to upgrade to an A road. But we know that in the past it was an A road and it already has to cope with heavy army vehicles going to Dalton Barracks - we need to find out how many HGVs are already using this road.

It has been very frustrating to know that we have an AQMA in Marcham and yet nothing is being done about it, apart from paper work! More and more evidence is showing that NOX gases, along with its probably more dangerous partner-in-crime, particulate matter (PM), is a "silent killer", so at last here is an opportunity to do something practical that might make a difference. If you feel that you would like to help and could spare an odd hour or two please contact Richard or me. We would like to set up a working party in February to discuss our tactics and then to set up a date for the actual survey.

HOME EXTENSIONS AND THINGS TO DO

ARE YOU INTENDING TO EXTEND YOUR HOME OR DO ALTERATIONS? IF SO, DON'T FORGET THE PARTY WALL ETC. ACT 1996 – BUT WHAT IS IT?

Without stating the obvious, but I will, it is an Act that came into effect in England and Wales in 1996. Although actually it's been around in London since 1939, known as The London Building Act 1939, but its origins lay right back in 1666.

Those of us who remember our history lessons will realize that this is the date of the Great Fire of London, after which it was decided that never again would fire be allowed to spread so easily between buildings across party walls and narrow streets.

The Party Wall etc. Act 1996 (The Act) introduced a procedure for resolving disputes between owners of neighbouring properties, arising as a result of one owner's intention to carry out works which would affect the party wall, involve the construction of a party wall or boundary wall at or adjacent to the line of junction between the two properties or excavation within certain distances of a neighbour's structure and to a depth lower than its foundations. Needless to say there are always aspects of The Act which contain procedural details, many of which I could not really cover in this brief article, but my objective is to remind building owners of their legal responsibility when wishing to undertake works to the party wall, boundary walls, extensions, loft conversions and any excavations which are in close proximity to neighbour's structures and that means within 3m and under certain situations within 6m. The Act also cannot be implemented retrospectively, i.e. after the work has commenced or been completed.

The Act gives notice to the adjoining owner(s) by the building owner of proposed works, which also includes various periods of time before intended the intended works can commence.

In the event of the adjoining owner(s) not responding to the notice within 14 days, or not agreeing to the works, then the adjoining owner(s) are in dispute and both parties have to appoint surveyors, this results in a Party Wall Award being produced.

Also part of The Act's procedure usually involves undertaking a schedule of condition (soc) and if work has commenced this survey can be affected by the works.

Whilst The Act has no bearing on any planning or building control consents, its important to remember that any approved drawing which includes details that encroaches onto adjoining owners property or air space does not mean that you can implement it, and if you follow The Acts' process it still will not give you the automatic right to do it.

The golden rule is always discuss things with your adjoining neighbour(s) before doing anything, it may not remove your duties and responsibilities as required by The Act, but it tends to make projects progress a lot easier.

Dear Friends,

I hope this New Year has begun well for you. January was, for me, playing 'catch me if you can' – it was a very busy start to the year, and I am hoping February will be less hectic!
