Dog Fouling

Discussion took place at the last Parish Council meeting regarding dog fouling in the village, and what could be done to ensure that there are sufficient waste bins, and to encourage dog walkers to clear up after their dogs. The Parish Council is undertaking an audit of bins to see whether any more should be provided. In recent years national guidance on the disposal of dog waste has changed and it is no longer necessary to separate dog waste from other types of household waste. For this reason, dedicated dog waste bins are no longer required and waste, provided it is adequately wrapped, can be disposed of in any available litter bin or your black household bin. Please do not put it in your brown garden waste bin. The Council would remind dog owners that there is a legal duty to clean up after your dog and you can face fines and prosecutions if you do not. Please carry a poop scoop and bag with you when out walking.

Council Tax Payers who pay by standing order

The bank details have changed for the Vale of White Horse District Council. This means changes for some council tax payers and business rate payers. A new sort code has been issued which is 20-01-25. The bank account number remains the same. Those residents that pay by standing order are requested to update their payment details with their bank, otherwise payments may not get through. Those that pay by direct debit are not affected, as the new sort code will be amended as part of the direct debit service. DOG FOULING

The Vale takes dog fouling very seriously as dog mess is not only unpleasant but it spreads diseases, which can cause illness and even blindness. Under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 a person who is in charge of a dog must clean up after it when it fouls any footpath, highway, verge or other open space to which the public have access. It is therefore a crime to allow a dog to foul in any public area without clearing it up. Those that fail to do so could face a fixed penalty notice of £50 or prosecution.

Here some tips to avoid a fine:

- never let your dog walk far from you as this makes it difficult to see when they foul
- always carry a bag when walking your dog so you can clean up. If you do not have a bag ask another dog walker if they have a spare bag
- encourage your dog to stay on the perimeters of fields or pitches to prevent any fouling causing harm to other people
- don't allow your dog to roam on its own as it could be taken away as a stray - collar and ID tag as well as microchipping are now required by law.

If you see a dog owner allowing their dog to foul and not picking it up, take details of anything that might help us identify them and contact Environmental Protection:

BROADBAND BLUES

I have been using standard (not fibre) broadband in Marcham for many years. During the past 3-5 years I have noticed that the speed I receive has slowly diminished.

So I spoke to my Internet Service Provider who asked me for details and advised I should carry out speed tests using ''speedcheck/btwholesale'.

This test showed that during weekdays (9am to 4pm) I receive between the specified 2 - 8 Mb/s. Evenings and weekends I rarely receive 2Mb/s and have experienced speeds as low as 120Kb/s.

After discussing this with my provider I was informed that in order to exclude my internal equipment they would need to call out an 'Openreach' engineer which they would do if I agreed to pay a fee of up to $\pounds 170$. This I refused to do.

Subsequently I discovered how to isolate my equipment and do the speed tests directly to the incoming line and experienced the same low readings. As far as I am concerned this proves my equipment is not contributing to the problem.

My conclusion is that during the high usage periods; evening and weekends; because of the load on the exchange, the service is depleted to an unacceptable level. To further prove this I have tested at 6am on Sunday morning and received very high speeds well in excess of the specified 8Mb/s. I have even managed to use my smart TV to experience iPlayer, Netflix and other such services but only at low usage times.

This further proves that my internal equipment is capable of handling the speeds that should be provided.

I wonder if many villagers experience the same diminishing service as myself. *JOHN WOODS*

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REPRESENTATIVES' REPORTS

ED VAIZEY WRITES...

After over 80 hours of debate and over 500 amendments and new clauses, the European Union Withdrawal Bill is now through the House of Commons and has passed the first stage in the House of Lords.

I submitted an amendment to the bill requiring Ministers to publish a plan on our future relationship with Euratom, the European nuclear energy authority. I was very pleased that my

amendment had the most signatures of all amendments submitted and that as a result the government have agreed to publish a plan with quarterly updates.

Earlier this month I attended a meeting in Parliament on rail in Oxfordshire. It was a useful gathering of all the key stakeholders – Great Western, Chiltern, Network Rail, local councils and MPs.

First, the good news. We have a fantastic station in Didcot which provides excellent links to London, Swindon and Oxford. Didcot Parkway has gone from strength to strength over the last few years. A station revamp, completed in 2014, made the station safer for users and a bigger taxi rank, bus stop and cycle rack were just some of the improvements. Work on the station shows no sign of slowing down with an enclosed cycle rack in the works and the construction of a new multi-storey car park. Electrification of the line out of London has now almost reached Didcot, cutting journey times on the fastest trains to 39 minutes. Great Western Railway's new, electric Intercity Express trains are being rolled out and will increase capacity by over 24% (648 vs 522 seats), something that any commuter to London will tell you is sorely needed. The driver training programme for the new trains has also been accelerated.

There is more to do, though. It has been a long-standing ambition of mine to open a station near Wantage. There has been progress on this front recently. I have linked with other MPs to propose an East-West line which could include new stations in Wantage, Corsham and Royal Wootton Bassett. This would be an extension to the planned link between Cambridge and Oxford and would help link Bristol, Swindon and Oxford. There are obstacles to be overcome in the development of this proposal. The line between Didcot and Oxford particularly is almost at full capacity and we will need to think carefully about how to move forward with this. It will still take many years to make happen, not least as we will have to build extra track.

This month I have received 318 items of correspondence (emails and letters) from constituents. Subjects raised with me included the NHS, fireworks and post-Brexit trade.

With regard to fireworks, they are only sold for home use during the traditional firework periods of Bonfire Night, New Year's Eve, Chinese New Year and Diwali. Suppliers who wish to sell fireworks outside the traditional periods must comply with stringent conditions before being granted a licence by their local licensing authority. This means the availability and use of fireworks outside the traditional periods has been greatly reduced. The government also has strict regulations on the level of noise they can produce.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT THE GROWTH DEAL.

I am not an accountant. I never wanted to be an accountant. I find it hard to get my head around figures in excess of a hundred thousand. So when people talk in millions, let alone billions, I tend to delete the last zeros in my mind in order to try to get my head around the figures. So, for the benefit of all like-minded spirits, I will endeavour to



explain my understanding of "The Growth Deal", how it may affect Oxfordshire residents, and what it may cost.

Many of us have been arguing for some time now that we cannot accept any more housing without more infrastructure –roads, schools, hospitals and so on. You may see figures above £5billion for the estimated cost of bringing our infrastructure into line with our present housing growth.

Point 1 seems to be that much of that infrastructure will come from sources already in place - s106 planning contributions and other government sources.

Point 2 is that the true figure of what extra money is needed (to bring our infrastructure up to scratch) is a more modest, but still eyewatering $\pounds 1.5$ billion.

Point 3 Under the Growth Deal with Government, Oxfordshire Councils will be expected to deliver (as per their Local Plans – almost all in place) 100,000 houses by 2031, meanwhile Government will provide £215 million over the next 5 years as "a downpayment." – i.e. about 1/5 of what is needed.

Accountants will spot that the £215million will be appearing within the first five years of the delivery plan. i.e. for the first time in years there will be some of the much-needed infrastructure well before the houses appear. Furthermore, some of the hard-pressed OCC transport budget will be released to carry out much needed repairs to our roads and pavements. All good news.

But. (There is always a but). The whole deal is based on the assumption that more money will be forthcoming (more than £1billion if my sums are right) if infrastructure is ever going to catch up and match housing growth.

So there are risks to all this. Here are a few I can see:

- 1. What if we cannot build houses at the right rate?
- 2. What if the Government fails to come up with the rest of the money?
- 3. What if there are changes of Government between now and 2031?
- 4. Are there enough opt out/break clauses in the agreement if either side defaults?
- 5. Will the arrival of new infrastructure simply herald a Government demand for yet more houses?
- 6. Is it absolutely clear that the Growth Deal has nothing, but nothing to do with the Oxford Cambridge Expressway and its predicted 1 million houses, and that neither is conditional on the other?

The Oxfordshire Growth Deal has been signed with almost indecent haste and no consultation with Oxfordshire residents. We must all hope that all these risks have been taken into account and covered.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Please forgive this brief report....Flu has laid me low for about three weeks.

"Changing Places" or "Space for Change" toilet facilities at Abbey Meadows, Abingdon

You may remember that some months ago I wrote about the need for toilets, which include facilities for disabled children and families, to replace the old ones near the children's playground in Abbey Meadows. The question was whether to build brand new facilities, to compliment the new playground and the new open-air swimming pool, or just to refurbish the old facilities.

Naomi Richardson has championed this cause, urging the Vale to make the most of this opportunity to put in the **right** sort of toilets to cater for all needs, including for disabled children and adults. She feels that "Changing Places" facilities with radar key access would allow enough disabled toilets with the necessary space and facilities for disabled children and their families to use safely. The "Space for Change" facilities, on the other hand, would reduce the number of toilets from 6 (as there are at the moment) to 4 only, with limited disabled facilities.

At the Full Council meeting on Wednesday, 14th February, when the budget was discussed, the Abbey Meadows toilet facilities issue

was raised. It seems that the original cost of rebuilding the toilets has rocketed such that now only refurbishment is being considered in the Abbey Meadows. However, Councillor Mike Badcock, supported by Matthew Barber, said that the Vale and the Town Council are preparing to fund a Changing Places Facility near the Guildhall in the centre of Abingdon, where the footfall is heavier throughout the year, although the Abbey Meadows has a very heavy footfall in the summer. Despite these pledges, there is still some confusion among town and Vale councillors as to the reality of that announcement.... Meetings are ongoing and a planning application is likely to be put in soon, but whatever the outcome, at best I fear that disabled children and their families who are enjoying a day out on Abbey Meadows will have to trundle all the way to the centre of Abingdon if they need the superior facilities of a Changing Places toilet. Wouldn't it be better to bite the bullet and to have two Changing Places facilities? After all, I understand that there is a strong likelihood that the government will make it a legal requirement to upgrade all disabled toilet facilities in the future.



MarchamCentre plans—latest details

MCG is continuing to work within the auspices of the Community Facilities Steering Group to move forward with the project for new community facilities. We held a positive and constructive meeting on 8th February with the Anson Trust and with Marcham Parish Council, which resolved and agreed terms covering some remaining important points of principle in the facilities lease and the associated Service Cooperation Agreement. Legal drafts of these documents will now be prepared.

We held a useful meeting with Chris Brotherton (Thomas Homes) on 16th February and had the opportunity to review a more detailed version of the plans which have been prepared for the village hall building. Over the next 6-8 weeks, the plans will be fully specified to meet the anticipated needs of users and to enable full budgetary costings to be finalised. Specific points will be discussed through the forum of a working group,

drawn from the CFSG working group, the Parish Council Working Party and the MCG team, with Anson Trust and Thomas Homes.

This meeting also covered the arrangements for on-site working. As previously announced, the existing MSSSC building will be closed for regular use on **31st March 2018**. This is needed to allow use of the building by the archaeology team during weekdays. This work is scheduled to start on 2nd April and will involve extensive excavations within a fenced-off area of the site. Until these excavations are fully underway, we will not have a definite finish date for that work nor a start date for the main site work. We are planning on the basis of at least 3-4 months for archaeology work.

During that period of 3-4 months, the existing MSSSC building will remain in use by the archaeology team during weekdays. We are making special short-term arrangements for Marcham Cubs to use the building for their weekly evening meetings and for Marcham Cricket Club to use the building at weekends, which may extend to the end of the cricket season. In both cases, we have agreed with Chris Brotherton that these special arrangements are subject to four weeks' notice once we know when the archaeology is finished and construction will begin.

All organisations who have used the facilities are making arrangements for temporary re-location elsewhere. Marcham PCC has been able to extend the lease on the Baptist Hall buildings for a further two years for continued community use, thanks to the kind help of the Baptist Union Corporation. Anyone wishing to make a booking for the Baptist Hall should contact Tamsin Gilbert, email: <u>info@allsaintsmarcham.org</u>.

The Community Facilities Steering Group (CFSG) will continue to oversee the project and MCG will continue to keep everyone in Marcham updated regularly on the project and will be happy to try to answer any questions that people may have as this project moves forward.

Report from GARD - March 2018

Thames Water draft plan released for consultation – Reservoir still top priority 'in longer term' Recently (12th February), Thames Water released their

draft Water Resources Management Plan for 2019-2024



(dWRMP19). The public (and the regulator bodies such as the Environment Agency and OFWAT) now have about 12 weeks (until 29th April) to submit comments. Thames Water then have a further period to respond to all the comments, and release a revised draft for the Government to approve. We are likely to reach the revised draft stage in the Autumn.

We have only had a few days to look at this plan (the documents run to over 2000 pages!), but we can see already that:

- pressure from consumers, regulators (OFWAT) and stakeholder organisations such as GARD has forced Thames Water to aim for more ambitious reduction of leakage and better water efficiency as their first measures, but they are still not aiming for the ambitious targets that, for instance, Southern Water are already reaching;
- pressure from GARD, CPRE and local organisations has forced Thames Water to defer the proposal to build the mega-reservoir in our local fields until the 2035-2045 period;
- instead, as a first measure, Thames Water propose to set up an 'indirect re-use' water scheme, where treated London wastewater is diverted from its normal discharge into the Thames Estuary, and piped upstream to the Thames above Teddington Weir, from where it can be extracted to fill the London storage reservoirs. This scheme is proposed for the 2030 timeframe. It is interesting that this scheme, rubbished by Thames Water at the Public Inquiry in 2010, was first put forward by GARD's consultants in 2008, and is now Thames Water's 'go-to' scheme. Proof of GARD's influence in these matters.

Public Meeting on the Thames Water plans

We are holding a series of Public Meeting on the Thames Water plan where we can explain why the Reservoir plan is a danger not only to this area, but is also a bad idea for the future water security of the South-East. The meetings will be in:

- Drayton Village Hall, Small Hall from 7.30pm on Wednesday 28th February (presentation from 8.00pm onwards);
- Steventon Village Hall, Millenium Room from 7.00pm on Monday 5th March (presentation from 7.30pm onwards);
- East Hanney War Memorial Hall Olde Hanney Room from 7.00pm on Tuesday 6th March (presentation from 7.30pm onwards)
- Please come along and hear the arguments and let us know your opinion

GARD's work during the consultation

The next few months are extremely important for the opposition to Thames Water's reservoir plans, so we urge everyone to look and comment on these (we will be giving information about how to do this). We are now sure that the reservoir occupies a key place in Thames Water's long-term plans. Even though it is now scheduled more than 15 years down the road, strong opposition at this stage is essential to get the idea ditched, or kicked so far down the road that it will essentially die as an option. We have succeeded so far, 'one more push' should do it.

GARD will:

- look through the proposals in detail, using our expert consultant's help;
- press for more action on Leakage and Water Efficiency (we already know from a brief look at the plans that Thames Water's proposals on these will be completely inadequate);
- work with CPRE to expose the faulty logic in Thames Water's predictions of the water shortage in the South East (this depends heavily on dubious population growth predictions);
- brief local Parish Councils and the Vale of the White Horse DC on our findings, and press them to put in opposing criticism on the reservoir plans;
- keep everyone informed through our website (www.abingdonreservoir. org) and Facebook pages, and lobby the local MPs;
- continue to lobby the Environment Agency and OFWAT about the fact that the reservoir will not be resilient against long droughts and is not environmentally the best solution;
- submit our final report to the consultation at the end of April.






MAPLEDURHAM AT WAR: 16 & 17 JUNE 2018

EXPOSURE TO NATURE

Time spent in gardens, parks and countryside and amongst wildlife itself can help most people's mental wellbeing, according to new research carried out by King's College London. J&L Gibbons who are landscape architects and art foundation Nomad Projects claim that if we experience an interaction with nature

it will improve a person's mental wellbeing. The research found "significant immediate" benefits associated with trees, the sky and birdsong. It's claimed the benefits lasted for several hours. Businesses and companies are starting to improve staff wellbeing via access to outdoor spaces and interactions with nature.

The research maybe suggests that nature could be especially beneficial to those individuals who are at risk of poor mental health. It's a low-cost activity and if aimed at in urban populations it could make quite some impact I feel.

This study shows the value of academic and non-academic researchers coming together to make tangible real-world benefits. The paper, entitled Urban Mind: Using Smartphone Technologies to Investigate the Impact of Nature on Mental Wellbeing in Real Time has been published in the journal BioScience.

I'm sure we could have all told them stepping out into our own gardens or local park has measurable and immeasurable benefits, but at least they are now listening.

Don't underestimate the impact on our minds and bodies from time we spend out there in the wildlife garden. Wildlife gardens give us so much in return for our care and time.

MARCHAM SOCIETY TALK 13TH FEBRUARY 2018

We were extremely grateful to Ben Jack for stepping in at virtually the last minute to talk to us about his experiences living in a remote area of the Philippines for a year in his role working with Coral Cay Conservation. Ben is a senior manager at Earthwatch, an Oxford based international environmental charity. Coral Cay works specifically to protect, manage and sustain coral reefs for the benefit of the whole ecosystem, including the local human population, who derive their livelihoods from the sea. As well as providing some beautiful underwater photography, Ben explained to us the idea of marine protection areas and how they, if properly managed, would provide sustainable food sources as well as protecting all the fish species that were living in the protected area.

He went on to describe the practical problems of overfishing leading to a downward spiral of more and more eco-unfriendly fishing which further depletes fish stocks. He also talked of the damage to coral and other sea organisms from intensive agriculture, which uses chemicals fertilizers that then move down into the rivers through runoff and into the sea causing damage to coral and fish alike.

Whilst the photography was colourful and beautiful his message was stark. The future of the world's oceans, to which we are all ultimately connected and dependent upon, is being damaged by these factors and the increasingly vast amount of plastic that finds its way into the sea. This together with climate change warming the oceans means that action needs to be taken to stop these trends. His final message was that by making simple changes to our personal habits we can all help.

In summary, eat less meat, travel less, especially by air, and use renewable energy supplies. His most controversial action would also be the most effective to combat the climate change crisis we are facing – have fewer children. For many of our audience that choice was not available to us, but our deepest thanks go to Ben for a colourful, entertaining talk, even if the main message was a warning.
