

MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS Annual Council Meeting

At the annual council meeting held on 9th May, Miss Ruth Mander was elected Chairman for the forthcoming year and Mrs. Sandra Hill as Vice-Chairman. Various appointments to outside committees and internal working parties were made. The councillors will serve in these roles for one year until the first meeting of the new council. Elections are taking place next year, so a new Council will be formed.

Grass Verges

The Parish Council, a few weeks ago, reported the length of the grass verge at the junction of the A415 and Howard Cornish Road to the County Council, and requested that it be cut. The length of the grass causes vision difficulties for motorists joining the main road. The County Council cuts the verges only twice in the season, but it is very much hoped that, as in previous years, a third cut will be done.

Litter Pick /Litter Bins

The Parish Council arranged a litter pick on Saturday 12th May. This was aimed at clearing all litter dropped in the village, but happened to coincide with The Great Plastic Pick Up Weekend. The Council would thank those that volunteered and took part, as giving an hour or two of their time has made a real difference. Several sacks of litter were collected. The Council too, in view of comments about dog faeces not being picked up, has considered additional litter bins, where both litter and dog faeces can be deposited. It is first contacting the Vale of White Horse District Council to encourage that authority to fund the emptying of additional bins, if the Parish Council were to purchase them, and will consider the response from the Vale of White Horse District Council in due course.

Office on all night to aid security. Other street light problems reported to the Parish Council are those which are not coming on at all and those which have suffered damage by being hit. Unfortunately the County Council has no term contractor, and has to arrange each repair on a piecemeal basis, prioritising as appropriate. The County Council does appreciate the concerns with lighting outage, and are doing what they can to ensure that repairs and replacements are carried out as soon as is reasonably practicable.




MARCHAM CRICKET CLUB

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT Deal or No Deal

There has been much talk of "The Growth Deal" – Government's Deal with Oxfordshire County Council in which Oxfordshire will get £215m towards infrastructure and affordable housing in exchange for undertaking to build 100,000 homes by 2031. More than a quarter have already been built and 5 out of 6 District Councils have already signed up to build the rest in their Local Plans. So this is just extra money we didn't know we were getting, isn't it? At last we can get some infrastructure before the housing goes up. True, it is predicted we need around £1.5b of infrastructure by 2031 but there are several other pots of money that could well raise another £0.6b, and Government says that the £215m is only a downpayment. So it's a pretty good deal, isn't it?

Well, not everyone thinks so. The problem is that under the new NPPF (National Planning Policy Framework) Oxfordshire's target should be around 65,000 new homes by 2031 – not 100,000. The District Council's Local Plans were formed on the old NPPF figures. Although many tried to challenge them at the time on the grounds that extra housing numbers for economic growth were wildly exaggerated, we were not allowed to do so. So the government offer of £215m in return for building 35,000 more homes than their own figures say we need to, may not be quite the offer it first seemed. Have our Council Leaders sold us short? Given the dependence of Government on Growth in Oxfordshire, should we not have asked for far more?

It seems a number of things could derail the Growth Deal.

Government has demanded as part of their offer that all Local Plans are in place within a year. Recent developments in South Oxfordshire make that highly unlikely. Council Leaders are hoping that Government will give SODC more time.

It is not clear where the Deal would be if the "downpayment" turns out to be all there is. Could the District Council claim that they are no longer obliged to deliver the extra housing?

What if there is a change of Government? 2031 is a long way away. As a result of Council pressure, a new combined Scrutiny Committee with representatives from all Councils is being set up to scrutinize the Growth Deal and its progress. This is a most welcome development as too much has been discussed and decided behind closed doors. At last we should find out how the Deal was agreed, why it was signed and most importantly what the "get out" clauses say should happen if either side defaults.

This month, my report will be slightly different as I am writing a little bit on several Vale issues rather than on a single subject.

Fun and Music in the Park

This will be in addition to the 4 disabled toilets already there.

The other event on the Abbey Meadows that might interest you this Summer is the opening of the open-air swimming pool on 16th June.

What to do with your used cooking oil

The Vale are going to set up a new scheme whereby you can dispose of your used cooking oil by putting it into a plastic bottle, no bigger than a litre capacity, and then placing it into your green food caddy for Biffa to collect. Notice that they stipulate a plastic bottle and not glass.

The LPP2 examination

The Vale's Local Plan Part 2 is about to undergo a thorough examination by Planning Inspector David Reed, BSc, Dip TD, MRTPI which starts on Tuesday, 3rd July at 10.00 in the Advanced Skills Centre of Abingdon and Witney College, Wootton Road, Abingdon. The actual sessions will run from 10-1 and then 2-5 with mini breaks midmorning and mid-afternoon. The examination will run from the 3-6 May and 24-27 May, and then it will change its venue to The Beacon in Wantage for 4-7 September. If you are interested to witness how an examination works then do go along to watch. If, on the other hand, you, as an individual or as a representative of a group, wish to speak then you need to confirm this in writing to the Vale by 5.00 on Tuesday 12th June.







MarchamCentre — archaeology in progress!

Ahead of any building work starting on the site of the new community hall and nursery, the archaeology explorations started in April with the removal of topsoil, exposing the layer below plough depth for investigation. The Oxford Archaeology unit has been has been carrying out investigation digs during May.

VISITING THE DIG ON ANSON FIELD

For six weeks the Archaeologists from Oxford Archaeology have been excavating on Anson Field in the area where there are to be new houses and a car park built for the long awaited Community Centre – this is officially called the 'Mitigation Area' where all remains from the past will be destroyed once the developers begin their construction.

As they draw to the end of their rescue project, noting and evaluating any archaeological features, an invitation was issued to the Marcham Society members and the Volunteers from the 'Trendles Project' to visit the site to see what has been found.

John Boothroyd, the Project Manager, and Rachael Daniel, the Site Supervisor, received our two groups and carefully led us onto the site, warning us of the hazards of ancient pits and postholes. These postholes delineated the outline of three Iron Age round houses, each with their front porch orientated towards the South East – to catch the rising sun at breakfast time! Slightly apart, four postholes in a rectangle represented the grain store, a pantry on stilts that raised the food supply above ground level and out of the reach of rodents.

Large deeper pits had been dug in ancient times for rubbish and also for grain storage. John explained how the pits would have been sealed at ground level and the grain itself would have formed a hermetic seal where it touched the moist earth inside,

allowing the majority of the autumn crop to be perfectly stored through the winter months.

The round houses would have perhaps formed a small rural community but other remains of their every day lives had been lost through later ploughing and agricultural activities on the land. There was some bone evidence however which might eventually give us an idea of their diet and the few sherds of typical hand made Iron Age pottery. These included the base of a colander – or was it a 'cheese press', John suggested.

Rachael explained that they had found two human burials – a young boy and a little child. With modern DNA testing these remains might tell us something of their ethnic origins. She also showed us one prize discovery, saved to the end – a blue glass bead from one of the pits, perhaps part of a necklace – it could well have come from a treasured ornament that had been traded from some distance. Once the experts had studied it in detail, she said, we may be able to give it a more definite origin.

The Dig is now finishing. However once the excavation is over there is much more work to be done interpreting the finds. John assured us that the official report to be produced by Oxford Archaeology will eventually be available online for the public to study.

'You said, we did' - speeding

After receiving complaints about speeding in the White Cross area I carried out a Speed Indication Radar (SIR) survey on 12 April in the afternoon and stood well into the 30mph zone by the second bus stop. The results were that out of 297 vehicles that went past 184 were going over 35mph. The highest speed picked up was 57 mph. This information has been passed to the Inspector and the Traffic Management Team in Bicester. I would like to carry more of these surveys out along this road, however it's finding a safe place to set up. If you could offer me your driveway to use please let me know! I can pass all the information gathered onto the Traffic Management Team and we should see the enforcement van along the road. If you are interested in setting up a community Speed Watch I can help with this so please contact me.

Keep your home safe and secure!

- keep front and back doors locked, even when you're at home
- install a burglar alarm with a visible alarm box
- fit a door chain and spyhole for extra security
- keep all valuables and keys out of sight and out of reach of doors and windows
- · store high value items in a hidden safe
- mark your belongings and register them for free with Immobilise
- fit energy efficient security lighting
- don't leave spare keys in obvious places such as under doormats or plant pots
- keep items that could be used to break into your property such as ladders, tools and wheelie bins stored safely away
- lock side gates to prevent easy access to the rear of the property
- · check fencing regularly to keep it in good repair
- use pea shingle on driveways or under windows, as it crunches loudly when stepped on
- trim overgrown hedges and plants to remove hiding places and improve surveillance
- use a timer switch to make your house look occupied, even when it isn't
- consider joining or forming a Neighbourhood Watch scheme

Please don't leave it to someone else. Most people can give blood. If you are generally in good health, age 17 to 65 (if it's your first time) and weigh at least 7st 12lb you can donate. You can give blood every 16 weeks, and it only takes a few minutes.



Dear Friends,

What a joy to have some warmer weather and sunshine!!

June really is the beginning of summer – whatever the weather!

Life is constantly changing, with all kinds of twists and turns, some expected, others a bit of a surprise! A month ago I wasn't expecting to be told that I needed urgent treatment for cancer, and would need at least 6 weeks to rest and recover from a long operation! So, for me, June this year is going to be very different!

So how do I reconcile these happenings with my trust in God and His love? Three thoughts:

First, as a Christian, I believe that Jesus has revealed to us the heart of God – as a heart of the deepest love, and a love that is willing to give, and go on giving, not counting the cost – even the cost of Jesus' death on the cross.

Second: that our faith in God does not mean that we are somehow immune from the suffering and illnesses that are part of our natural human existence. Indeed, Jesus warns us that, if we follow Him, we will experience suffering – as we follow in the path of His suffering. So, as a Christian, I am as prone to these illnesses as anyone else.

Third: However, it does not mean that God abandons us, or that our illnesses are some kind of punishment. Jesus clearly stated that He came to this world not to condemn it, but to rescue it. He promises to be with us always, even in the darkest and most testing times of life, and that I / we can know His presence, strength and peace at all times. As Psalm 23 states, our Good Shepherd is with us, therefore we need fear no evil, even in the darkest of life's valleys.

I trust that your June is a full and happy one, and whatever life throws across your path, that you know, as I do, that God is love, and that in Jesus He is constantly present, and that we can trust Him – always.
