



MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS **SGN Networks**

At the last Parish Council meeting, representatives from the gas network company SGN gave a presentation about their proposals to replace the main gas supply pipes all along the A415 from the A34 to the village. Unfortunately this does mean that when the work commences next year in late winter, there will be two way traffic lights controlling the traffic. The new pipe will be 50% larger than the existing one, so will be able to serve a larger number of houses, not necessarily in Marcham, but further afield such as in Kingston Bagpuize. SGN has plans for a leaflet drop around households, and an exhibition drop-in session, where further information can be obtained. They will also be setting up, in due course, a webpage with facts about the projects. The Parish Council had concerns regarding the effect on air quality around the bends, caused by queues of traffic caught by the traffic lights. SGN took away with them this point, and were liaising with the County Council to discuss the matter.

Parishioner of the Year Award - Marcham The Parish Council is again inviting nominations for the Parishioner of the Year Award. This is to recognise the efforts of local people from anywhere within the parish who have contributed to local community life. Marcham Parish covers the wide area from the A420 in the north to the River Ock in the South and from the A338 in the West across to and including most of Gozzards Ford in the East. The Council gives the award to anyone who, at any time, has significantly contributed to life within the parish. Should there not be any appropriate nominations, then the award need not be made. The certificate is presented at the annual meeting for electors each year. Would anyone who wishes to submit a nomination please contact the clerk, whose details appear opposite, sending a short statement of not more than 200 words, as to whom he/she wishes to nominate and the reasons why the person should receive the award.

High Sheriff Awards

- Coaching or volunteering in Youth Sport and Youth Leadership organisations.
- Youth projects associated with the Arts and Education.
- Mental health work in the community.

P18/V2546/LB P18/V2545/FUL and Conversion of existing listed barn to new 3 bed detached dwelling at The White House, 12 Frilford Road. Council had no objections.

P2473/O Erection of 114 dwellings with public open space, landscaping and sustainable drainage system, on land north of Longfields with vehicular access points from Leas Lane.

Council objected to the application various grounds, including the accumulative effect of more housing for Marcham, particularly on traffic and air quality. The site was not in the District Council's Local Plan, and its location was too far away from the centre of the village. **Date of Next Council Meeting:**

MARCHAM SOCIETY REPORT

On 13 November our speaker was Mike Hoath. Inspired by the work done by Elizabeth Whitehouse to discover more about the men behind the names, he has made a study of each man who served in the First World War. By showing photographs of the men and telling us about their lives, Mike brought the characters sharply into focus.

From Marcham, Garford and Frilford 200 men went to war and 42 died - at 21% this was higher than the national average of 10-12%. Some were regular soldiers who were serving in India before war was declared, but most were local farmworkers such as Edward Charles Carter, who was the first to die in 1914.

There were eight losses in 1915. 1916 was the worst year of the War with 16 deaths, including the first of two Smewing brothers, Joseph. Frank West died in June 1916, a civilian lost in the sinking of H.M.S. Hampshire. July 1916 was a particularly grim month with six men from the District killed at the Somme, five of whom have no known grave. During 1917 ten men died and in 1918 another seven, including two more brothers, Charles and Harry Edmonds, and the second Smewing brother, Arthur. Noting examples of the contribution of women, Lucy Anson was matron of a military hospital and Temperance Dyer was an auxiliary nurse.

The talk concluded by pointing out that, for some, the War did not finish in 1918. In the District, the War left men disabled, left widows and left children without fathers. The last person who had lost their father did not die until 2004 – the War cast a long shadow.

MARCHAM PRE-SCHOOL

Following Bonfire Night and local firework displays the children were bubbling with news of fireworks, bangs, crackles and whizzes! This was obviously the perfect time to explore this experience at pre-school (after all,



how can we explore something BEFORE it's happened?). With memories fresh in their minds we talked about the night sky, as we painted our whiteboard BLACK, using our gross motor skills and shoulder muscles to stretch up and across (fabulous exercise for early writing development). We then explored the colours seen, the noises made and the patterns created across the sky... this led to flicking and 'throwing' paint into the 'sky'! There was a fantastic firework finale with lots of the children 'exploding' across the board and a discussion on where to stand safely!!! ... ED VAIZEY WRITES...

A number of new measures were announced in the budget last month. One I know will be very popular is £420m to fix potholes in England. A £28.8 billion National Roads Fund, paid for by road tax, is also being set up, the largest ever of its kind. Overall this Budget marked a turning point in public finances. Since 2009-2010 the deficit has fallen by four-fifths, from 9.9% to 1.9%.



On average, spending on public services will grow 1.2% above inflation a year from next year until 2023-24. This is all brilliant news and I am very pleased that our efforts to combat the deficit over the last eight years are showing results.

Once again UTC Oxfordshire in Didcot is proving itself a trailblazer for secondary schools in the UK. Last month they officially opened a state-of-the-art cryogenics laboratory, in what's believed to be a first for a UK school. Ahead of the first set of projects in November, students will visit the world-facilities of the Science and Technology Facilities Council – based at Harwell Campus – to find out more about the benefits of and uses for cryogenics.

Congratulations to all those involved in organising the excellent Wantage Literary Festival last month. From talks on history, politics and sport to comedy and gardening tips the festival was by all accounts a great success. I was very pleased to host Sir Oliver Letwin MP for a wide ranging evening covering British politics from Thatcher to May. Thank you to all who came and asked questions.

It was a great pleasure to open the new headquarters of Oxford Immunotec this month. Based in Milton Park and set up here as a start up in 2004, the company is now worth \$450m and is helping fight TB. I was also pleased to visit EMS Physio in Grove and see the progress on Grove Business Park..

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Neighbourhood Plans (NP) are the province of District Councils. However, County Councils become heavily involved over roads, schools and other infrastructure. I have been asked to write an article on NP to clarify the pros and cons, so the Expressway will have to wait until next month. I was heavily involved as a District Councillor in Drayton's NP from the outset and watched its progress, its achievements and its mistakes (as the first such plan in the Vale there were plenty of those).

More than 5 years ago, Drayton residents attended a public meeting and saw maps of Drayton between 1720 and 2010 as evidence of inexorable growth. "Can we/should we stop such growth?" they were asked. Most thought we could not and should not and, after some persuasion, accepted that Neigbourhood Plans were not about stopping growth. So what is the point of them? For many years, where houses were built was wholly the concern of distant planning "experts" with an overarching strategic view, who had little understanding or knowledge of any one village or town. Local people were not trusted to be part of the decision making process as "they never want more houses". NPs were an attempt to build local knowledge of how a community functions into the decision-making process. This, it was hoped would take some of

the acrimony out of the planning process. The Drayton NP strapline was "Our chance to plan our future". So what has it achieved? By sitting down with VWHDC and OCC Planners, with landowners, developers and residents, everyone began to see that there were some potential gains for all. The planning system would run more smoothly – less anger and frustration and, if done properly, it could result in better connected communities with decent infrastructure, and decent housing.

Drayton would get decent sports facilities, an improved village hall, a purpose built pre-school, and road improvements. Drayton would change from a village that everyone drove through (and no-one noticed) into a place that people wanted to live and feel part of one community. £2m+ of infrastructure was negotiated with landowners and developers. The appearance of the new houses would complement the old. And looking forward, the Drayton NP would run until 2031 with opportunities for new speculative development being drastically reduced because local people would have already decided where development should take place.

Of course, it has not all run smoothly. It took some time to convince Drayton residents that for the first time they had some power. Even now, there is some resistance from the authorities to being asked to give up some of their power and make room for local knowledge. In the current nationwide building frenzy, there is no doubt that some developer/builders have ignored planning conditions and been remarkably disinterested in the feelings of new residents. Some houses have been poorly built. A few last-minute, very cheeky but small additional housing developments have been allowed. (mistakenly in my view). However, the overwhelming aims and aspirations of the Drayton NP have been, or are being achieved.

And what does the Drayton experience have to do with Marcham? Marcham has naturally been pre-occupied in recent years with the Anson Field project, the new Village Hall and Sports facilities, but meanwhile it has been subject to endless speculative development over recent years. I have no doubt the village itself could have planned things better had it had a say via a Neighbourhood Plan. Marcham's problem is that it is surrounded by developable land in all directions. For the life of the emerging Local Plan (up to 2031), the likely development has now been determined. However, I have no doubt that after 2031, Marcham will once again be under great pressure to grow. A Neighbourhood Plan will not stop the growth, but it will give residents the opportunity to have a say in how it develops at the same time as capturing a maximum amount of infrastructure money in the process..

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Is Oxfordshire beginning to get very tired of all that is being thrown at it? Should we demand more consultation in major decisions?

The letter from residents of Garsington calling for support for their petition is published on page 19. It might be argued that with the very real possibility that an Expressway might be built through the middle of their patch they are bound to be unhappy, but it has little interest for the rest of us. However, there are issues here which will affect every Oxfordshire resident for years to come. There may be some uncertainty over the housing figures (how many of those in Local Plans have already been built, for example?), but that Oxfordshire is being asked to build an inordinate number of extra houses in a very short time cannot be denied.

The Growth Board is a strikingly opaque group comprising Council Leaders and business representatives. They themselves are aware of this, and, after two years of public agitating, have finally agreed





to have a Scrutiny Committee (involving elected politicians of all parties). Provided that the committee is given full access to the minutes of all meetings and to the decision-making process, this will be a much-needed improvement. So far, decisions have been made behind closed doors by a Board of people – many of whom are not elected. There has been little or no consultation with the public while major decisions are being made. The Garsington petition is the tip of the iceberg. Oxfordshire residents are increasingly concerned by what is being planned for them via the Expressway, the Growth Deal, the Reservoir and so on. Some very thin and inadequate justifications have been given for all these decisions. Oxfordshire residents are reasonably asking such questions as:

Why do we need to build even more houses and encourage an even faster rate of economic growth in an area which is already thriving? Surely other parts of the country need the houses and jobs more than we do.

Why are we so obsessed with roads? There is plenty of evidence to show that building more roads simply generates more traffic congestion. Why not spend the money on better public transport – particularly rail – and better facilities to encourage cycling and walking.

How will the owners of the 1m homes along the whole of the Expressway, who are needed to pay for the Expressway, access it? Remember, an Expressway is a road deliberately designed to allow minimum access points along it.

Why are Oxfordshire residents not trusted with all the information? You cannot expect intelligent people (Oxfordshire is not short of them) simply to accept all this, when you have not made the case for need – need for an Expressway, need for thousands more houses, need for a Reservoir.

All of us need to be calling for more openness and more transparency. I would encourage all Marcham residents to read and consider signing the Garsington petition.
