





This last month has been full of - Nativity rehearsals, songs, dancing, and discussions as the children have decided which part they would like to take in the official performance. Glitter and decorations





We will keep people in Marcham updated regularly on progress and will be happy to answer any questions you may have about this project. We wish everyone a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.





COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Last month I promised that I would devote this article to the most contentious issue facing Oxfordshire – the proposed Oxford to Cambridge Expressway.

It is common knowledge that as a consequence of all the housing we have built and are due to build (assuming we have the bricks and bricklayers to carry out the work), we are excruciatingly short of the infrastructure that should come with those houses. There is now an undeniably serious backlog of roads, rail, bus and cycling provision.

Until recently, appeals to Government for money to address this backlog have fallen on deaf ears. The newly signed "Growth Deal" is offering £150m but the estimated shortfall in what is needed is many times this. Many of us feel that, as a result, the backlog is going to grow. However we feel about the Expressway, there is no denying that if/when it is built, we will have even more houses with no certainty that the road will be able to generate enough money to address the backlog, and every likelihood that it will simply increase the problem further.

There are now a number of protest organisations across the County – each objecting to the road being built through their patch. Many local councillors are members of such protest groups and this presents a problem for Council Leaders and how they should handle the issue. So far, the Growth Board (the body responsible for producing a unified County response) is sending out some very confused signals on whether or not it welcomes the Expressway.

If Oxfordshire is to make its voice heard, it needs to speak with one voice and find that voice quickly. It seems to me that the holding position that most would sign up to is that Oxfordshire residents need to understand the justification for the proposal via a full consultation and, given the present infrastructure backlog, the congestion on the A34, the A420 and many other roads, at present they are far from convinced.

As with the Reservoir, this fight will go on for some time – it is certainly far too important to be rushed.

With all the present uncertainties in Westminster, and the consequent uncertainties over how local government is to be funded, it can be hard to remain positive. Like everyone, I am determined to enjoy my family this Christmas – I hope you will enjoy yours. Let's hope that 2019 will bring some pleasant surprises and solutions to problems where 2018 failed.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

The proposed Reservoir

The Thames Water(TW) proposed Reservoir is a "planning" issue and therefore a District *and* County issue.

I can hear you say "Here we go again". For at least the fourth time since 1990, TW are back with a proposal to build Europe's largest above-ground reservoir right on Marcham's doorstep. Only a few years ago, a similar proposal was dismissed, after a lengthy and very costly enquiry, on the grounds that the case for *need* had not been made. So, what's changed now? Certainly not any of the following TW predictions and statements:

- there will be wonderful opportunities for yachtsmen, anglers and naturalists.
- future water shortages caused by increasing population and global warming.
- a juicy asset would appear on the Thames Water balance sheet, paid for by you and me, its customers.
- there is the prospect of another lengthy, costly pubic enquiry, again paid for by TW's customers, if planning is denied.

Those against also argue:

- what is the scientific evidence of need for such an enormous reservoir?
- such a huge reservoir would need massive bunds, at least2/3 the height of a pylon, to enclose the water.
- major construction disruption for years
- over a million visitors a year will come to the Reservoir necessitating more infrastructure, including more roads and carparks.
- TW need to repair the enormous number of leaks before considering a reservoir.
- there are alternative ways of supplying more water

OK – so what *has* changed?

As a result of all the extra housing in the south of England, demands for water are increasing. Interestingly, TW do not deny that none of the water is destined for Oxfordshire. Instead, this time TW is arguing that the reservoir will fulfil the needs of other surrounding areas in the South East, as well as London. Not surprisingly, the other Water companies in those areas are supporting TW, as they see one huge reservoir as a solution to their problems.

Now TW has brought forward the planned delivery of the Reservoir, and there is the possibility that the Minister (Michael Gove) could be tempted to make a decision without another public enquiry. Clearly this has stirred up much anger and resentment with cries of "Where is the public voice?" Questions by MPs Ed Vaizey and Layla Moran are being asked in the House. They, together with County and District Council and GARD (The Group of scientists against the Reservoir Development) are calling for a public enquiry. It is hoped that, despite its cost, the Minister will be persuaded to conclude that a public enquiry is the only option. Something more to look forward to in 2019!

Priority 3 - Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) We are pleased to report a big decrease in anti-social behaviour in town following a joint effort between the Abingdon Neighbourhood Team, the Fire and Rescue Service, the mounted section and our colleagues on the Emergency Response Team. Please continue to make us aware of any young people that are causing disruption for you, your family or your business in town.

Offenders brought to Justice Jason Tampin, 37, of No Fixed Abode was charged and remanded to court for Burglary following

an incident in Abingdon Town Centre whereby he stole a handbag. He has also been issued with a Criminal Behaviour Order in relation to repeated anti-social behaviour. The conditions of this prohibit Tampin from drinking in a public place, entering Abingdon Town Centre, setting fire to anything in a public place and not to cause harassment, alarm, distress, nuisance or annoyance.

A 17 year old male from London was arrested following a Courier Fraud in Sutton Courtenay. A female had taken money out of four bank accounts after receiving false information over the phone that the 'police fraud squad' needed her to do so as the 'notes were fake'. A swift response by police resulted in the arrest. Enquiries are ongoing.

What else have we been up to? The team ran a Test Purchasing Operation on 17th October in local pubs. Seven pubs and five offlicences were tested in their response to sales to under 18s with on the spot fines issued to the three premises that failed.

PCSO Miles Miller attended a Careers Fair for the year 8 students of John Mason School where he was part of a 'Human Library'!

PCSO Adi Wright has taken on an additional role as a Lesbian and Gay Liaison Officer. Adi can be consulted regarding crimes and incidents where an involved person's gender or sexual orientation may have been a contributing factor or may impact on the aftercare required. Adi can be contacted by members of the public regarding any LGBT+ issues that may not require police involvement but to assist in connecting with third party agencies.

Colour At A Colourless Time

It's not all doom and gloom, not even in winter. Indeed, though the colour variety outside may be reduced at this time of year, our gardens still have an immense amount of colour shade. As I always say, if we choose to look.



On a windy day, a bramble patch offers up subtle silvers and red. The underside of leaves often look silvery, and the stems offer up various shades of dark red.

There are a huge range of viburnum plants for winter colour. Look out for evergreen varieties like V. tinus and V. burkwoodii. Viburnum *x bodnantense* 'Dawn' is also brilliant with strongly scented pink flowers. Witch hazel is grown for the wiry flowers it bears along the branches. Hamamelis x intermedia 'Diane' has red flowers, 'Jelena' is coppery coloured and 'Pallida' is best for yellow.

Daphne is a shrub with intensely fragrant flowers in winter and early spring. Look for D. odora and D. bholua and grow near gates and doorways.

Sarcococca or Sweet box is well-named. Its intense fragrance can be detected from across the garden. It produces tiny perfumed creamy flowers in winter followed by shiny black berries.

Plants with berries on in winter offer colour, with extra flashes of colour when feeding birds arrive to gorge on them.

Even if you don't want to venture out into your garden or local area in the winter cold, just sit in your window with a warm drink and take the time to notice the colour that's still visible in the natural world. It can take a few minutes to focus the mind to start to notice these subtleties, but it's time well spent.
