MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS Parish Council Elections

On 2nd May there will be elections for the Parish Council. Anyone who is over 18, a British Citizen and who is either on the electoral roll for the parish, or occupies land or property within the parish, works in the parish, or lives within 3 miles of its boundary can stand as a candidate. As part of the local council you will have responsibility for running local services, deciding on how much to raise through the council tax, influencing and shaping the long term development policy for the parish, and as part of the planning process, comment on planning applications in the parish.

If you wish to improve the quality of life and the environment in the local area and help deliver local projects then consider standing as a candidate for the Parish Council. The main meetings are just once a month, in the evenings, except August when there is no meeting.

The village is a busy place at the moment, planning for new community facilities, and closely monitoring developments such as the Dalton Barracks site and the Oxford-Cambridge Expressway, so if you wish to be part of these exciting times, then for further information on standing as a candidate for the Council, as well as the nomination pack, go to the Electoral Commission's website. https://www.electoralcommission.org. uk. If you have difficulties with this site then contact the elections office at the Vale of White Horse District Council at elections@southandvale.gov.uk, or the Parish Clerk may be able to help with general information too.

The deadline for the return of the nomination form to the District Council at 135 Milton Park is 4.00 p.m. on Wednesday 3rd April. All nominations have to be submitted by hand to the District Council's offices. Post, electronic means and fax are not acceptable. It is advisable to make an appointment in advance before you visit the offices, by telephoning 01235 422528.

Annual Meeting of Electors

The Annual Meeting of Electors will take place on Wednesday 15th May at 7.30 p.m. at Marcham Primary School. All electors of the parish are entitled to attend and ask questions or raise issues affecting the parish. The Council is currently arranging the event, and in the meantime, please put a note of the date in your diaries.

Electricity Power Cuts

The Council has made enquiries of Scottish Southern Electric regarding the fairly frequent but short-lived power cuts that have been experienced in recent weeks. The response is that there is an automatic shut-off when something hits the overhead cables, and an engineer has to go out and see if there is a problem which requires a permanent solution. Sometimes, the loss of power can be the result of heavy winds

blowing things, such as tree branches, onto the line. Sometimes faults are found elsewhere. Scottish Southern always do their best to ensure that the power is off for as little time as possible. If you are dependent on electricity for home medical care, have a chronic illness, or short term medical condition, are disabled, have special communication needs e.g. if you are blind, or deaf, have children under 5 or are over 60 years old, then you can register for the Priority Service. Telephone 0800 294 3259 to register.

A415 – trench line

The Council has contacted Southern Gas Networks regarding the poorly filled trench left across the A415 just East of the entrance to the village. A deep gap had been left, and this was causing problems for motorists and particularly damage to vehicle tyres.

More than Three Men in a Boat – the rise and fall of pleasure boating on the Thames Simon Wenham

By European standards the river Thames is seemingly insignificant. At only 215 miles (346km) from source to mouth, it is not only dwarfed by the major waterways of the continent, but it is not even the longest river in the United Kingdom. Nevertheless, its location has ensured that it has held unparalleled importance to the country, and we have always liked 'messing about in boats' on it!

MARCHAM SOCIETY REPORT, 12 February 2019 Cotswold Barns, Tim Jordan

During the 1970s, Tim Jordan converted a barn in Eynsham into a house. This began a keen interest in Cotswold barns, which from the Middle Ages were used for the threshing and storage of grain. With the aid of excellent pictures, Tim showed the great variety of barn design and construction, from the small and simple to some on the Badminton estate, which sport turrets and crenellations.

"Cotswold" stone is oolitic limestone, which can vary in colour from grey in Wiltshire to gold near to Banbury. The roof slates (actually stone) can range in size from about 2 feet for the lowest to around 6 inches at the apex; they all have individual names. There was a large main door with a smaller one opposite for unladen carts to exit. "Arrow-slit" windows allowed ventilation without letting rain in. Some large barns had a room over the entrance for a "granger" to watch over the contents.

Over the centuries, grain storage gave way to housing of animals and farm machinery. From the early 1900s, Dutch barns began to appear and many stone barns fell into disrepair. However, since the 1980s many have been saved by being converted into homes.







COTHILL NATIONAL NATURE RESERVE

Cothill National Nature Reserve has had an exciting and busy winter period, with the local volunteer group, external volunteer groups and local contractors, working hard to maintain this internationally important Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI). So, in way of an update, visitors to the area may have noticed extensive tree work, particularly on The Ruskin Reserve portion of the Nature Reserve.

Along the western edge of the Ruskin Reserve, old hazel stools have been coppiced. Coppicing involves cutting tree and scrub branches back to the main stump (called the coppice stool), which has a number of benefits to nature conservation. These include, extending the life of the tree by promoting vigorous re-growth and preventing the build-up of deadwood, as well as creating open light areas: more light and heat can reach the woodland floor, encouraging ground flora growth, which in turn is beneficial for pollinators.

Along the southern edge of the Ruskin Reserve, careful, selective felling has taken place. This felling work will allow rare invertebrates and flora, which depend on the fen being warm, open and sunny, to thrive. In addition, this felling work has created lots of deadwood habitat piles on site, which have extensive benefits for invertebrates associated with deadwood.

With spring round the corner, we are all very excited to see how our hard work on the Reserve this winter will impact the flora diversity on display in the warmer months ahead.

ED VAIZEY WRITES...

Highways England and the Secretary of State for Transport have been examining options for the location of the new **Oxford-Cambridge Expressway**, and have narrowed it down to one broad corridor. Within this, there are up to one



hundred specific routes the road could take. Highways England will be engaging with communities and local organisations along the corridor throughout 2019 and 2020 before announcing their preferred route in Autumn 2020. There is also an opportunity here to include the A420 in the plans, which would take the route to the West of Oxford and add connectivity to Swindon, a considerable bonus. I also hope that this road can help relieve pressure on the A34, which is not currently fit for purpose and badly needs better infrastructure to support it.

I've no doubt that like me many of you were shocked and surprised to see an article in the 6th February edition of the Herald titled 'Oxfordshire physiotherapy private contract fiasco exposed in full.' I have been trying for some time to lead efforts to coordinate between the different health care managers and providers, hosting roundtable meetings and leading discussions on how to move forward in providing the correct services that residents require. Therefore I'll continue to lobby hard locally and in Parliament for better healthcare. I am meeting Ministers in the Department of Health and Social Care to discuss these important issues and will continue to engage locally as well.

Constituency Visits It was a great pleasure to plant a tree as part of the Woodlands Trust Commonwealth Canopy Project at the Sylva Foundation and receive a tour of their fantastic establishment. I've also met recently with a delegation from local parish councils to discuss improvements to the A420, and attended a working session of 'Didcot First' at Milton Park to hear updates about the local economy, businesses and community actions.

Last month, I asked people to respond to my dilemma of how I should react to being asked to keep quiet on briefings that I had received on the impact of a No Deal Brexit on Oxfordshire.. Secondly, on March 1st. there is now to be a briefing of all 63 County Councillors at OCC on the impact of Brexit on our County. Thirdly, the data is changing almost daily. I very much hope that the future will be a little clearer by the time I have to write my next article – but I am far from confident.

On a much more cheerful note, I want to congratulate the village of Marcham for its determination, its resilience and its patience – all of which I am confident are about to be rewarded through the delivery of the long awaited Anson Field project. For a village that has had no community centre for many years, it is remarkable how strong the sense of community is in Marcham. New residents have commented again and again how welcoming people are, and how much goes on in the village. Thanks to the enormous hard work of a group of residents with very different interests and skills, but with the common desire to get the best for the village, residents, new and old, will very soon be able to celebrate the building of brand new facilities in the heart of the village including

- 1. One of the best Community Halls in the area
- 2. Modern, well-equipped sporting facilities in the heart of the village
- 3. A modern, purpose-built Nursery School building
- 4. And an Anson Trust with a secure financial foundation able to perform the function for which the Anson Sisters set it up providing grants for village activities.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Climate Emergency Motion

"The unprecedented rate of global warming is melting the polar ice caps, raising sea levels and undermining food and water security for many of the world's peoples. Action has been too slow, because economics has trumped physics. Now emergency action is the only rational response."

A few weeks ago, Richard and I went to Oxford Town Hall to hear speakers from around the globe speaking passionately about climate change and how it has become very urgent that we all take more action. We now know that the Paris Agreement of 2016, with its target to limit the increase in global temperatures to 1.5° Celsius, is not ambitious enough. We need to get it down to zero, and ideally even better, if we are to avoid the disasters already mentioned. And we only have 12 years before it becomes too late! It is up to our local councils to put in policies and strategies which will encourage businesses, institutions, organisations, ordinary people as well as councils themselves to change habits to make a real difference to their personal carbon footprint and, hopefully, to encourage more councils and the government to take positive actions. Armed with plenty of information, I enthusiastically discussed with my colleagues the idea of putting forward a motion at full council, urging the Vale to sign up to the Climate Emergency, and on 13th February this motion was passed almost unanimously. So, what has been agreed? In brief, the Vale Council has pledged the following:

- 1) To join other councils in declaring a Climate Emergency;
- 2) To seek confirmation of the Government's intention to work with local government on climate change strategies;
- 3) To update policies and strategies to reduce our impact wherever possible ... this will include amending templates to include environmental impact;
- 4) To look at cost and availability of suitable training for members and officers to promote carbon neutral policies;
- 5) To work positively with partners across the district, county and wider to deliver carbon reductions;
- 6) To bring to council a progress report on the council's Climate Change Strategy and Carbon Management Plan in Autumn 2019, with information about how to adopt an early carbon neutral target in the Vale.

This is a big step for our council to take, and they join other councils like Bristol City, South Cambridgeshire, Manchester, all of whom have pledged to work towards zero carbon emissions.

You may wonder how we can make any difference to this vast global problem. But remember from little acorns grow great, big oak trees! If everybody makes a concerted effort to reduce carbon emissions, it will start to make a real difference, not least by setting an example to others. We can take such actions as changing our cars to electric ones; make sure our new buildings are carbon neutral; choose products which are sourced locally or close to Britain to avoid distant travel; walk, cycle or take the bus whenever possible and so on

We hold the future of our children, grandchildren, great grandchildren in our hands. We do have a climate emergency and it is scary. As a 15 year old girl said,

"I want you to feel the fear I feel every day. And then I want you

to act as you would in a crisis. I want you to act as if your house is on fire. Because it is."





Priority 1 - Burglary We are currently working with members of the Community Action Group and Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinators in an attempt to make more and more areas Smartwater streets and villages. Work is ongoing in South Hinksey, Botley, Cumnor, Radley and Kennington.

There was a burglary in North Hinksey Lane overnight between 29th and 30th January where entry has been gained by smashing a patio door. If you have any information and can help at all please call 101 and quote 43190031194.

A property in Hamels Lane, Boars Hill was broken into between 31st December and 2nd February. Entry was forced to the rear of the property and jewellery was taken. Smartwater and crime prevention was issued throughout the street as a result.

Priority 2 - Violence There was an instance of disorder outside the Blue Boar Public House on 19th January. Two males were arrested and released under investigation. The team are working closely with the town's Pubwatch in order to reduce instances of violence and ensure a safe environment for those drinking responsibly.

Priority 3 - Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) Two young men were interviewed in connection with criminal damage that had occurred on Friday 18th January in Queen St. The CCTV operator observed them being anti-social and PCSOs responded. Acceptable Behaviour Contracts will be issued alongside sanctions from the Youth Offending Team.

Abingdon NHPT, Oxford NHPT and the council are working to combat anti-social behaviour and street drinking in Botley. If you have information that may assist, please get in touch as we are working towards imposing Criminal Behaviour Orders for those responsible.

Offenders brought to Justice

- Lewis Felton, 29, of Deer Walk, Oxford has been convicted of burglary after targeting an address in Garford in an attempt to steal high value vehicles. Felton was remanded in custody by the court and he will have appeared at Oxford Crown Court on 19th February for sentencing.
- · A 38 year old male from Nottingham was arrested on suspicion of committing theft from a victim on Turner Road, Abingdon. The male has been bailed pending further investigation.

What else have we been up to?

- PCSO Blood and PC Barraclough attended the Abingdon Shopwatch and Pubwatch AGMs. These are excellent opportunities for us to work closely in partnership with licensed premises, shops and businesses in a bid to deter and disrupt criminal offences and anti-social behaviour.
- On Monday 4th February the team held a 'Day of Action' in Abingdon town centre in light of several purse/handbag thefts. The team were at the Monday Market handing out leaflets, purse bells and purse chains to members of the community. Banks and charity shops were also visited to highlight the issue. The day was aimed at raising awareness of such offences and trying to ensure people keep their belongings as safe as possible.
- A talk was carried out on Monday 4th February at Thameside Primary School for the reception class covering 'What the Police Do' and providing education for the children around the role of the Police.
- A presentation is planned for years 10 and 11 at the Unicorn School in Abingdon on Sexting and Child Sexual Exploitation.
- · A Licensing Operation took place in Abingdon on 26th January. The team worked with Pubwatch at local pubs and we staged a condition of entry period at the Punch Bowl and the Black Swan. People were swabbed on entry to look for traces of drugs.
- Drug swabbing has been carried out at licensed premises across the area's towns and villages and future operations will target those premises with high readings...

National Trust: Abingdon & District Association 2.30pm Tuesday March 19th, Trinity Church Hall

On Tuesday March 19 Trevor Rowley will talk about Oxfordshire Castles at 2.30pm in Trinity Church Hall, Conduit Road, Abingdon, OX14 1DB. Oxfordshire is not a county normally associated with medieval castles, however there are well over one hundred in the county. The



castles of Oxford and Wallingford are of particular importance and marked the first phase of the Norman Conquest of England. They were followed by castles such as Deddington which were involved in the redistribution of land from Saxon to Norman lords. In the twelfth century dozens of castles were built by the new Norman elite and evidence of these is to be found throughout the county. In the later Middle Ages many of these castles were abandoned, but a few survived into the era of the country house and are still occupied today. Trevor is a historian and archaeologist who has published extensively on Landscape history and the Normans. He is a wonderful speaker and this talk promises to be really interesting.
