Local Council Elections - 2nd May, 2019 Candidates Anyone wishing to stand as a candidate in the local elections has until 4.00 p.m. on Wednesday 3rd April to submit a nomination form to the Vale of White Horse District Council. The forms need to be returned by hand, and not posted. It is advisable to make an appointment in advance, before you visit the offices, by telephoning 01235 422528. The forms can be obtained via the Electoral Commission's website https://www.electoralcommission. org.uk . Assistance can be obtained from the Vale of White Horse District Council's elections office or from the Parish Clerk.

Voter registration To vote on 2 May, residents need to be registered by Friday 12 April. Anyone who isn't registered at their current address should visitgov.uk/registerto-vote to ensure they are eligible to vote.

Polling cards Those who registered to vote by 8 March 2019 should receive their poll card by Monday 8 April – anyone who doesn't receive it by this date should call the Elections team on 01235 422528 to make sure they are registered. Anybody who registers to vote between 9 March and the cut-off date of 12 April should receive their poll cards during the week commencing Monday 15 April.

Postal votes If someone wishes to vote by post, the Elections team must receive their application by 5pm on Monday 15 April – application forms are available at whitehorsedc.gov.uk/elections.

Everybody who applies for a postal vote should receive their ballot pack by Friday 26 April – if it doesn't arrive by this date postal voters should contact the Elections team on 01235 422528 to request a replacement.

New Play Facilities

It is recognised that the play equipment which is in the Anson Field is a few years old, and perhaps some of the items have seen better days. During the planning of the new community hall, a priority order needed to be established, so it was not prudent to focus on the play facilities first. Now things with the hall are much more advanced, the Parish Council has set up a working party to look into play provision within the parish, to assess the open spaces and to see what might be needed by way of play equipment and to investigate what might be possible. The working party, whilst including members of the Council, may also include members of the public and/or stakeholders who have a particular link to or an interest in play provision. So if you are interested in joining, or would like further information then please contact the Clerk by the end of April.

building the new community facilities, has agreed to be the guest speaker and will be providing an update on what is happening in the Anson Field.

Planning applications

The Council has considered the following applications:

P19/V0400/HH Construction of tennis court at Pinetops, Woodside. The Council had no objections provided there was adequate drainage and there would be no water run off problems.

P19/V0464/HH Demolish side garage and build new single storey extension to front and rear, with double side extension and single storey to rear at 21 Fettiplace Road. The Council objected as the building works created more bedrooms and there was a requirement for more on site car parking, the buildings were overshadowing the adjacent property and were dominant on a side window. As there was a sloping front garden, there would be the potential for water run off from the front extension. The Council also requested a condition to ensure that the extension was ancillary to the main dwelling, and not for business use.

R3.0008/19 s.73 Application to continue the development of the retention of a temporary portakabin classroom building at Marcham Primary School. The council had no objections.

Report from GARD - March-April 2019 Affinity Water publish their plan for consultation - partnership on reservoir with Thames Water is 'preferred option'



Affinity Water published their revised draft Water Resources Management Plan 2019-2024 (known as rdWRMP19) on 1st March. The consultation on this plan runs until 26th April.

As expected, Affinity confirm that their 'preferred plan' is to partner Thames Water in constructing the 'mega-reservoir' next to our villages. They would take an approximately 1/3 share, and the plan proposes to start in 2025, and have the reservoir ready by 2037-8.

Affinity have no better case for needing the water from this reservoir than Thames Water have. By their own admission, they have other possible sources of supply (water transfers to their Hertfordshire customers either from the Anglian Water network, or from Severn-Trent Water via the Grand Union canal from the River Trent). These water sources would be available earlier than the reservoir. Affinity have chosen to prefer the reservoir first, for the same cynical reasons as Thames: to build up a huge water surplus in the 2040s and 2050s that they can sell-on by 'transfer' to other water companies in the South-east. The analysis by GARD shows that the requirements of Affinity can be met by very simple and cheap schemes and improving leakage (sounds familiar?), until at least the 2060s.

GARD will be responding to Affinity, and making a very strong objection. CPRE Oxon have already come out against this and we hope to co-ordinate our response with local organisations. We urge all residents to make a strong response objecting to this and re-iterating our call for a Public Inquiry before this plan is accepted. You can find out about the plan at https://stakeholder.affinitywater.co.uk/waterresources.aspx Affinity have said they are keen to engage with our local concerns and hear them, but so far they have only invited GARD along to the Stakeholders' meeting on 11th April. We hope to press for greater Oxfordshire organisations participation.

We should make sure the Oxfordshire voice is heard by this Hertfordshire water company. The local individual objections to Thames Water's plan made up one third of all individual responses sent in. We must try and dominate the Affinity consultation in the same way. Please copy your responses to me at gard.chair@gmail.com, and to local County and District councillors and to our MP, Ed Vaizey.

Ofwat slam Thames Water and Affinity Water business plans put them 'in the slow lane' for approval.

As was widely reported in the press, Ofwat, the water regulator, has issued a damaging report on several water companies' business plans and said they are not fit for purpose. Foremost amongst these are Thames Water and Affinity, who have not received approval to proceed. This affects the prospects of the reservoir being approved. Whilst it is not, in itself, something that would lead to the reservoir plans being taken off the agenda, it is a setback, and GARD, and local political groups, should push hard to take advantage of this. Part of Ofwat's criticism is that they do not believe that these two companies have sound enough finances to take on the huge debts of building a huge reservoir project (or any other grand scheme, it seems).

Also, Ofwat have announced that the companies will be given the ability to raise large sums of money (in some cases over £100M) from customers' bills in order to carry out a proper study of the strategic water resource options for the South-east. This includes proper comparisons of reservoirs, water transfers from the west, and desalination plants. Whilst GARD has been pressing for many years that such proper studies should be done (Thames Water have been trying to avoid this ever since losing the 2010 Public Inquiry), we are concerned that the amount of money raised should not be a burden to consumers, should

be efficiently and appropriately spent, and should be subject to proper public scrutiny at the end. We are not clear that this is the case, and we have a meeting with Ofwat in London on 3rd April, where we will be asking many questions. We will keep everyone informed.





MARCHAM & DISTRICT NEWS

ED VAIZEY WRITES...

This month I have met with Ministers in Westminster to discuss two important local issues: Health care and rail links. I met with Andrew Jones the Rail Minister, alongside his officials and Network Rail and Great Western. The



Minister and I led discussions focussing on improvements along the Great Western Railway line, the potential for reopening Grove Station as part of a strategic project to develop commuter stations between Oxford and Bristol, and improved connectivity between Heathrow Airport and stations to the west, so one might travel direct to Heathrow from Reading for example rather than having to go into London and then back out to Heathrow. I will be looking at the East West Rail scheme and the Cotswold Line Promotion Group for inspiration in how to build a business case for improvements to commuter services between Oxford and Bristol and hope that colleagues in Parliament with stations along that route might join me.

I also met with Health Minister Caroline Dinenage. Alongside colleagues from Oxfordshire County Council, Oxfordshire Clinical Commissing Group, Oxford Health and Vale of White Horse District Council the Minister and I led discussions on how we could improve Primary Care provision in the constituency. We discussed the ongoing situation in Wantage as well as our plans to develop new health hubs, both at an improved Health Centre in Wantage and plans for a new health hub in Didcot

In the constituency I have met with a number of residents and local businesses this month, including meeting with GPs in Wantage, The Thames Valley Police Commissioner and Deputy Commissioner, Residents of Alfredston Place in Wantage who are receiving poor service from their managing agent, and a visit to the Environmental Education Centre in Sutton Courtenay hosted by the Berks, Bucks & Oxon Wildlife Trust. I was also delighted to join local charity Mission Motorsport at Royal Hospital Chelsea to celebrate the launch of their new initiative Mission Automotive..

COUNCILLORS' REPORT

We have decided to combine forces for this month's articles on an issue that we think is very important for everyone in Marcham and has nothing to do with Brexit or local elections! It is the Thames Water (TW) proposal for a massive, four square miles, aboveground reservoir stretching between Steventon, Drayton, East Hanney and Marcham.

It will be the biggest above ground reservoir in the whole of Europe, and this site has partly been chosen because it is a huge flat area, a third of which is in the flood plain, and has suitable clay soil to keep the water from permeating down. Unlike many other reservoirs, it will not nestle comfortably into a valley and create a beautiful lake with natural hills around it. Instead, huge bunds will have to be built around the area and be at least as high as an electric pylon, to hold the water in. Furthermore, much of the work traffic for this project will access the site via the Marcham/ A34 interchange, already a very busy road. Over a million people are predicted to visit the site each year to access the reservoir and its facilities, which means suitable roads, parking spaces etc will have to be factored into an area already very crowded. Clearly, Marcham will be greatly affected by both the building process of the reservoir and its use afterwards.

This proposal is the third such proposal since 1990. The last two were turned down by planning inspectors. TW are now arguing that

the water is needed to supply much of the South East of England, but it will supply little, if any water, to Oxfordshire.

There are 3 parts to the 2018-19 argument.

The first concerns the Science. Is a Reservoir really needed at all? Should TW be accelerating the repair programme of their numerous broken water pipes which are leaking several Olympic size swimming pools each day. The last TW proposal in 2007 was turned down emphatically at a contentious court hearing because the case for need had not been met. So the question is would water transfer or desalination be a cheaper solution to water need? In the end, it is the scientists who must provide an answer - not just TW's own scientists, but also the well-funded and top level scientists from GARD (Group against the Reservoir).

The second concerns the Law – in particular, the planning process which has to answer the questions "Is this the best place for a Reservoir? and "What are the implications for traffic and the environment?"

There is, however, a third issue which is often overlooked and unappreciated. It is the Politics surrounding the whole proposal. And it is the politics which worry us almost more than anything. The way that the legal process works at present is that TW first approaches the regulator OFWAT with its proposal. There is every reason for TW to want a reservoir – they will own it and it will sit on their balance sheet giving them a major capital asset against which they can borrow. It will be paid for by TW ratepayers, as will the cost of all public consultation (glossy brochures etc). At the 2007 TW proposal, OFWAT allowed TW to raise £45m from ratepayers – about half of which was used to pay for legal fees to fight TW's case. When it came to a full legal enquiry, Councils trying to fight the proposal had to club together to raise enough funds to pay for legal representation. They managed to raise less than £1m, which was collected through Oxfordshire residents' council tax.

While water companies own assets that ratepayers pay for, and while legal fees on both sides are paid for by ratepayers and council tax payers, there is little disincentive for water companies to keep trying their luck every few years.

If we look across the channel to France, we understand that the state owns the assets, such as reservoirs, and private companies are employed by the state to run such assets. Is this not a better, fairer, more sensible system?

Both the Vale District Council and the Oxfordshire County Council have voted against this new proposal for a Reservoir, and now it is to be the subject of a public enquiry. So we watch with close interest.

Priority 1 – Burglary

We received reports of shed breaks in Whitecross and in Norreys Road, Cumnor. Many of the sheds broken into were away from the houses and access was gained via open fields at the rear of the properties. Please think about security. Opportunist thieves identify sheds and garages as easy pickings because they are usually fairly unprotected and lack basic security measures. The buildings often contain property that can be sold on or implements that can be used to force entry into the owner's home. Many people fall short on basic security of their sheds and garages. No thief wants to hang about longer than they have to, so delay the time it will take them to get their hands on your tools!

- Keep your shed/garage in good condition.
- Fit a closed shackle padlock to the door.
- Fittings should be bolted through the door and any screws concealed.
- It is easy to unscrew the ironmongery, steal contents and in some cases replace the screws to make it look as if the shed has not been tampered with.
- By using tamper proof screws or coach bolts, together with a good quality pad bar or hasp and staple and close shackled padlock, the shed owner will make it harder for the would-be thief.
- Bond any window glass in with mastic to prevent easy removal. Fit grilles or mesh to windows to slow down the thief.
- Ensure all equipment and tools are locked away when not in use.
- Install a shed/garage alarm.
- Post-code or mark all property such as lawnmowers, bikes, and tools using ultraviolet pens, forensic marking such as Selecta DNA, SmartWater or engravers.
- Install security lighting as a deterrent, and plants such as thorny shrubs to act as a barrier at potential access points.
- If building a shed, put it where it is most visible to you and neighbours.
- Ensure ladders are locked to a secure fixture in the shed or garage so they can't be used to reach top floor windows.
- Chain large items such as bicycles together, making it much more difficult for a thief to carry away.
- Fit a wire cage inside a shed where more expensive items can be locked away.

Priority 2 – Violence

During the month of February the neighbourhood team carried out licensing visits across Abingdon town and surrounding villages, during these visits the premises were all swabbed for traces of drugs. From these swabs we were able to see whether there were any signs of drug usage and if there is, then we work with the premises in a bid to disrupt and deter this.

Priority 3 – Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB)

We have received reports about motorbikes being ridden anti-socially around the Thrupp Lane area. We have increased our patrols of the area in order to deter this. We can issue section 59 warnings to anyone caught doing this. A section 59 is a warning to the owner of the motorbike OR the rider that if either are caught again the bike can be seized.

Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) warning letters are regularly being sent out to people involved in vehicle ASB in the town centre.

Offenders brought to Justice

Cherish Curtis aged 22 years-old from Southmoor, was arrested in connection to criminal damage to a vehicle in Park Road that occurred on Tuesday 5th February. The female has subsequently been charged and has a date to appear in court next month.

The Neighbourhood team supported an Immigration operation on the 15th February in Abingdon. Four arrests were made at China Court, Hadland Road.

Community engagement

Hi visibility patrols are continuing in Abingdon Town centre to deter shoplifting and purse thefts.

On the 13th March PCSOs Clare Atkins and Miles Miller talked to the nursery children at Long Furlong School around their topic of 'helping people'.

PCSO Blood attended 'Back to 35' a group for the over 50's and gave a

Dear Friends,

This month we celebrate the wonderful season of Easter, with the momentous event of the resurrection of Jesus Christ at the very heart of the celebration. Jesus' resurrection is the key to so much. But is it true?

St. Paul underlines this in his letter to the Christians in Corinth. He writes: 'If there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith. More than that, we are then found to be false witnesses about God, for we testified about God that He raised Christ from the dead. ... For if the dead are not raised, then Christ has not been raised either. And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins. Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ are lost. ... But Christ has indeed been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep.' [1 Corinthians 15: 13 - 20]

Paul encountered the risen Christ, as did so many of the disciples [over 500] who were alive at the time. The whole development and growth of the early Christian Church was founded on the truth of Jesus' resurrection, and the out-pouring of God's Spirit at Pentecost. Timid, fearful disciples were transformed by their encounter with the risen Jesus, and the truth, the reality of His resurrection, enabled them to tell others about the risen Lord, and so the Christian Church was brought into being.

Is it true? ... 'YES!!' And millions of people across the world, from all backgrounds and cultures, know this for themselves as they experience Jesus' Spirit in their day to day lives. And we, too, celebrate the truth and reality of living in the constant company of Christ each day. Easter is here, God is with us! He is risen, He is risen indeed! Rejoice!
