# MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

#### **Annual Council Meeting**

At the annual council meeting held on 8th May, Mr David Walton was elected Chairman for the forthcoming year and Miss Ruth Mander as Vice-Chairman. Various appointments to outside committees and internal working parties were made. The councillors will serve in these roles for one year until the annual meeting of the Council in 2020.

#### Annual Meeting of Electors – 15th May, 2019 – New Community Facilities

The annual meeting of electors took place on 15th May in Marcham Primary School. Reports were given by the Parish Council on its activities over the last year, with an explanation of the difference between the Annual Council meeting and the Annual Assembly of Electors where there can be some confusion. Reports were read from the County and District Councillors, and Marcham Primary School with a slide presentation showing the children enjoying the many activities in which they had participated. The guest speaker this year was Chris Brotherton who provided an update report and showed slides on the progress of the construction of new facilities within the Anson Field. There were various questions put to Chris which were duly answered.

#### **Grass Cutting**

As in previous years, the County Council, owing to its budget restraints, is restricting the number of times the grass verges alongside the roads are cut. The Parish Council is keeping a close eye on the sight lines when leaving Howard Cornish Road and joining the A415, as in previous years these had effectively disappeared owing to the length of the grass. The Parish Council will ask the County Council to ensure that this is kept at an acceptable height so that the junction does not become dangerous.

The Parish Council has taken on the two large public open space areas within Harding Way, and is now responsible for cutting these. The smaller areas of grass are still maintained by the Management Company, so residents in this area may see two contractors and grass cutting being undertaken at different times.

#### **Planning applications**

The Parish Council has considered the following applications:

P19/V0841/HH Single storey rear extension and reconfigure the ground floor of the property to increase the living area. New external door on the side of the property, at 7 Anson Close. The Parish Council had no objections.

### MARCHAM CRICKET CLUB NEWS

The season is now well underway, though both first and second teams have had mixed fortunes to date. The firsts have won one and lost two games narrowly; whilst the seconds have won one and lost one. Details are as follows:

**First Team** 4 May – On a cold, miserable afternoon, we lost the opening game at Risinghurst. A result affected by rain and therefore a reduced over match saw Risinghurst post 183 for 9, which was

Risinghurst post 183 for 9, which was later reduced slightly to a total of 177. Stuart Armstrong was the main wicket taker with his usual spin trickery, taking 3 wickets for 37 runs. He then top scored with 52 runs, supported by young Ethan Davie with 41. However, the team just failed to reach the adjusted target, scoring a total of 169 for 7, thus losing by eight runs.

11 May – The first match at our adopted home of Clifton Hampden saw a comfortable victory. Combe were the visitors and scored 143, being largely confused by the guile and spin of Ethan Davie, who took 7 wickets for only 19 runs. He then, with 39 not out, together with some typical clubbing (with the bat and not a glass!) of Tom Mooring's 54 not out saw us home, losing just three wickets. An encouraging first game at Clifton, including an excellent tea by Lucy and Tristan, and a bit of after match refreshment at our new `home`s` clubhouse to celebrate.

18 May – Once again a game affected by rain at Kidlington, when we scored 152 all out, with Stuart Armstrong scoring 37. The reduction in overs of the run chase for Kidlington meant our adjusted score being reduced to 137. Kidlington comfortably knocked these runs off for the loss of five wickets.

**Second Team** 11 May – A quirk in the fixture list means this match was the first of five continuous `home` matches to be played at the `seconds` adopted home of Freeland. Unfortunately it was a typical first rusty match of the season, with us being all out for just 90 runs, with `tail ender` Andy Chalmers scoring 28 not out. Visitors Sunningwell were 13 for 3, before they settled and comfortably scored the runs required for the loss of just 4 wickets. At least the weather was fine, and the wedding taking place at the same venue enabled its guests to enjoy some typical village cricket, albeit attributed mainly by the visiting team! For our part, we still enjoyed a typical cricket tea in our adopted local pub, `The Oxfordshire Yeoman`, which has already welcomed us as if we were its own village team.

18 May – A better result than the previous week, beating Faringdon seconds, who had previously won their first two matches of the season. Faringdon batted first, scoring 150 all out. The pick of some tight bowling was Adam Grady, who took three wickets for 25 runs. We were doing well in reply, when a certain Marcham player, at the score of 125 runs for three wickets, said `we are cruising this`. The very next ball a wicket fell, which started a run of six wickets falling for 20 runs. At 145 for 9, `tail enders` Deepak Patel and Gary Butler somehow managed to score the remaining six runs for victory. The real contributors though were new player, Charlie Mason, who opened the batting, top scoring with 36; Steve Hill with 35; and a big hitting 34 from Adam Grady. So a welcome celebratory drink at `The Yeoman` was enjoyed by all!

MARCHAM SOCIETY REPORT, 14 MAY 2019 Aspects of Hanney's History Part 1

For our final indoor meeting of 2018/19 we had a talk by Andy Robertson of the Hanney History Group.

There has been a settlement at Hanney for over 5,000 years. Archaeological surveys have uncovered items from the Iron and Bronze Ages, as well as the time of Roman occupation. In 2009 a metal detectorist found a Saxon brooch, which is now on display at the County Museum in Woodstock. Recent surveys following planning applications have yielded more finds. Expert opinion is divided as to whether the A338 is a Roman road.

The Saxons placed East Hanney within the Marcham Hundred and West Hanney within that of Wantage. Was that the start of the fabled feud between the two? The 12<sup>th</sup> century church in West Hanney had its tower removed and replaced in the early 1800s, as it was deemed unsafe. The church has a memorial to a woman who died at the age of 124!

Andy has agreed to return next year to tell us about the more recent history of the Hanneys. JF





### MarchamCentre—our new hall starts to appear!

Over the past few weeks, the shape of the new hall has started to appear next to the open field, the shuttering complete and concrete poured for the foundations. The new nursery walls and roof structure appeared quickly after concrete was poured there. It will not be long before the walls of the hall rise up too.



The new building will be completed by Thomas Homes, hopefully within a year from now. Once the new hall is ready to open, we will need a range of furniture and equipment, including, for example, tables, chairs, curtains/blinds, audio-visual equipment, communications and security equipment, pans, crockery and utensils, much as you need to furnish and equip a new house. We have compiled a full list of what will be needed. In total, the draft costed list of everything we need to make it operational for all expected activities comes to over £60,000, of which we need about £32,000 for items essential for when we open on Day 1.


These are facilities for the whole community and we are seeking your help. At this stage, MCG has nearly £23,000 in the bank, with £10,000 allocated for equipment. We are preparing grant applications to external bodies and we are fund-raising within the local community to close the gap, firstly for the essentials for Day 1 and then for other items in priority order after that. We have a fund-raising team working on it and we are looking for whatever help you are able to offer—membership subscriptions, donations (small and large), ideas for events or other fund-raisers and for your support at those events already in the pipeline.

We are close to finalising our budget and after we have done so, we will be contacting organisations in Marcham to discuss bookings, hire rates, and how we plan to run the facilities. We have drafted a weekly timetable so we can identify possible clashes and discuss how we can resolve them. #### ED VAIZEY WRITES...

The local elections saw the Conservatives lose our majority on both the Vale of White Horse District Council and South Oxfordshire District Council. I was very sad indeed to see so many hard working local councillors lose their seats, and new candidates who had been hoping to serve fail to achieve their goal.



The newly elected councillors will face similar challenges to those they are replacing, and there are no easy answers. I have always worked with politicians of all parties to get the answers we need locally, and will continue to lobby central government for the support that we need.

Many councillors who lost their seats will rightly blame Westminster. While local issues are very important, there is no doubt that voters use them to send a message to government. I will be taking the message of frustration felt on the doorstep of the campaign and at the ballot box back to Westminster: it is wrong that local politicians who have worked tirelessly for their local communities should bear the brunt of a Westminster failure.

I am working with the AEA Technology Pension Campaign to secure the pension rights of scheme members that may be otherwise lost because AEA Technology entered a pre-pack administration. #### **COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT**

Oxfordshire is a major contributor to the national exchequer. It is understandable, therefore, that Government wishes to capitalize on the County's economic success. This push for further rapid economic growth has been behind the proposals for the Expressway, the Reservoir and, via the "Growth Deal", the push for accelerated housing growth. For many, it has seemed a little desperate – a push for growth at all costs and impossible or irresponsible to challenge. But two things have happened to change the argument. The first and most important by far was the UN Report on climate change. The impact on Carbon output of major road building, reservoir building and quarrying has been little considered up to now. It is now under a sharp spotlight. Major infrastructure projects will have to justify themselves in terms of carbon output. Some may well fail that test.

The second recent occurrence was our own local elections in Oxfordshire. Until then, Government had had a reasonably free ride with Councils, mostly of the same political persuasion, being ready and willing to accept vast infrastructure projects and accelerated housing growth in return for the £215m offered by the Growth Deal. With two of Oxfordshire's Councils changing hands,that assumed willingness is cast into doubt. Many questions will be asked, not least challenging the figures (the SHMA figures) on which all this growth is predicated. Every decision of the Growth

Board (the Leaders of all Oxfordshire's councils) will have to be scrutinized very carefully. The way the Growth Board operates (with major decisions being made out of the pubic eye) is likely to have to change.

With a government under so much pressure on other fronts, it is at least likely that there will have to be a pause for reflection on the *"growth at all costs*" agenda.

### DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Thursday, 2nd May was an extraordinary day when I realised that so many of you had made the effort to come out to vote for me (71% of the voters) to be your District Councillor again. Even the poor choice of the Polling Station, the Baptist Church Hall on the busy "bends" of Packhorse Lane, had not deterred you .... I heard that one family had walked on the road around the bends and been confronted by an HGV in the process! Fortunately, they were not hurt. I felt very humbled and can only thank you all so much. I will do my very best to represent all of you again, whatever your political persuasion. You might like to know that now the Lib Dems have taken control of the Vale, I have been given the job of being the Cabinet member of Planning, so this is where the hard work starts!

What happens to your vote? For this month's article, I thought you might like to know what actually happens to your vote once you have posted it into the polling box.

At 10.00pm, when all the polling stations in the Vale and South Oxfordshire were closed, all the boxes were sealed and taken to the main hall in Whitehorse Tennis and Leisure Centre. The hall had tables and chairs arranged into two huge circles with all the staff on the inside and the potential councillors, their agents, other political figures and the press restricted to the outside. No one was allowed to cross into the circles! The boxes were placed inside the circles and grouped together in their correct wards. Then each ward was "verified", which means that all the votes in each ward were emptied onto the tables and counted to verify that the total number of votes in each ward, including postal votes, matched the total number of votes that the polling station staff had noted on their paperwork. All this was carefully watched by those on the outside of the circles to make sure that no mistakes were made, and it took a very long time to go through 76 wards.

Eventually, at about 3.00 am, the actual count began and again was carefully scrutinised by groups of people on the outside of the circle. This is very important as quite often they spot a mistake when a vote has been put into the wrong pile. The votes for each candidate were carefully counted into groups of 10 and placed into the relevant trays. You can quickly tell how the count for your ward is going by the size of your pile in your tray! Once all the votes had been counted, the supervising officer checked again and then called all the candidates and agents of one ward together to show them any spoilt votes and those that they were prepared to accept. I saw a smiley face on one and a drawing of a three -leaf clover on another being accepted instead of a cross. So long as the intention of the voter is clear then it is deemed acceptable.

You can imagine that to repeat this whole process for 76 wards takes a long time. My count was not complete until dawn and it felt very special when the Returning Officer, Margaret Mead, finally called out the results of my ward.

I find it very reassuring that our democratic system of voting and counting is so open and fair, and I look forward to working for Marcham and Shippon again.

Use garages where possible and install alarms and CCTV.

Due to the recent spate of shed breaks in Radley, the team ran an operation over the weekend of 27th and 28th April. This was followed up on Saturday 4th May by a mop up of locations that we were unable to get to. Residents of Sugworth Lane were issued with Smartwater (security marking kit) that was purchased with a grant from the Community Safety Partnership. As a result of this we are hoping this will become a Smartwater Street. Residents were also given crime prevention advice from the team at these events.

#### Priority 2 – Violence

Following a Thames Valley Police investigation, a man has been jailed for 14 years after being convicted of grievous bodily harm with intent. David Evans, aged 50, of Turberville Close, was sentenced on Tuesday (30/4) at Oxford Crown Court after being convicted of one count of Section 18 GBH with intent at the same court, following a five-day trial. It relates to an incident on 1 October last year in Bath Road, Abingdon, when Evans assaulted the victim, a 58-year-old man, leaving him with multiple fractures to his skull, facial area and a serious brain injury.

#### Priority 3 - Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB)

ASB was reported at a school in the Botley and Cumnor area when an unknown person was seen to padlock the main gate shut late one evening. The person's motivation is as yet unknown but is suspected to be some sort of attempted prank. Fortunately, school staff were notified and were able to facilitate the removal of the lock resulting in only minor inconvenience and disruption. We encourage residents to report any suspicious activity especially around schools.

After reports were circulating on social media of ASB occurring in the Abbey Meadows, the neighbourhood team increased their patrols in the vicinity. The reports appeared to relate to older children being abusive and riding their bicycles in the play park. During our patrols over the last month we have only come across several groups of young people, we have engaged with them and advised them of the complaints being made

There has been a small amount of ASB in Lady Place, Sutton Courtenay over the Easter holidays, where young people have been seen jumping over walls. Patrols have been increased.

It was also reported that there was some ASB outside Peachcroft shops, Abingdon. PCSO Selene Moguet has been visiting every shift to control the amount of people outside the shops and have since received no further reports.

We would encourage that if you suffer or witness any anti-social behaviour that you please do report it to us. We can then look at what actions we can take to deter and disrupt such behaviour.

#### Offender brought to justice

Following an investigation by Thames Valley Police a man has been given an adult restorative disposal following an incident of criminal damage. At around 1am on Sunday 24 March a man smashed a glass window of the Estate Agents on Bath Street. A 30-year-old man from Abingdon came forward and admitted to the offence. He was given an adult restorative disposal after paying for the victim's insurance excess.
