MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL Future Road Closures

North Street

The Parish Council has learned that Southern Gas Networks will be undertaking gas main reinforcement work at the Southern end of North Street for approximately one month between 7th October, 2019 and 8th November, 2019. The road closure will operate 24 hours a day. Access will be maintained for properties which are only accessible from the closed section of road, and for emergency services. Unfortunately the S8 and 15 bus services will not be able to serve the village during this time and will travel along the A415. Stagecoach is currently assessing whether there is need for additional temporary bus stops along the main road during this period.

A415

Following completion of the North Street works, Skanska, on behalf of the County Council will be undertaking overnight resurfacing works in the A415, between 8.00 p.m. - 6.00 a.m. This is planned for 8th November 2019 to 10th November 2019. So the A415 will be closed overnight for these two nights. The evening and night buses between 8.00 p.m. – 6.00 a.m. Oxford to Wantage, will serve Howard Cornish Road, then Sheepstead Road, Faringdon Road past the Dog House Public House, then southwards along the A338 towards Wantage. The reverse route will be taken from Wantage to Oxford. It is anticipated that the A415 should be re-opened at 6.00a.m. on Sunday 10th November. However, see below:

A415/Church Street/New Road

As Sunday 10th November, 2019 is Remembrance Sunday, a further Road Closure will apply to the A415, Church Street and New Road to allow the parade to the War Memorial following the service in Church. The timings are currently being finalized but will be approximately between 10.45 a.m. to 12.15p.m. The diversion during this period will be North Street, Sheepstead Road, Faringdon Road and A338.

The Council's grant policy too can also be found there. Details of where to send the application are on the form.

The deadline for submissions is 15th October, 2019. Applications received after that date or not on the application form will not be considered.



ABINGDON HERITAGE FESTIVAL

Abingdon Heritage Festival this year will be celebrating and exploring an event that took place 100 years ago in this town; an event that has left an enduring mark because it was filmed. Like many towns, to mark the end of the First World War, Abingdon staged a Homecoming Parade, a "Carnival of Affection" for the returning troops and a ceremony of remembrance for the "Glorious Dead". The events of that day, 4th August 1919, included a parade around the town centre, the Mayor's address in the Market Place, a marchpast and laying of wreaths at the temporary memorial and a lunch at the Corn Exchange for all the men. Thousands turned out and were caught in the camera's sweep, giving us a fascinating source of information about the people of the town at that time.



The film remains in good condition for us to study today, and this September it will become the centrepiece of a Heritage Festival which seeks to recreate some of the events of the day, to understand and learn more about the times that those people were living through, and to expand on the themes that the film raises.

The former Superdrug shop in Bury Street will contain a temporary interpretation, explaining the film, highlighting key points that are worth looking at in detail and delving into the background of what we are seeing. This exhibition will start a whole week before the main festival weekend, opening on Saturday 14th September and daily through the following week.

On Saturday 21st September Abingdon Market Place will be the setting for a small recreation of the events of 100 years ago and a chance to enjoy costumes, songs, food and customs from the era. The Homecoming Film itself will be available to view in the Guildhall and the Museum. The Festival also includes Heritage Open Doors properties, as well as walks and talks on the 1919 theme with a local history twist.

MARCHAM CRICKET CLUB NEWS

Two months has passed since the last up date, so a lot to cram in!

First Team – Have won two, tied one and lost four over the past two months. The two wins were on the `home` soil of Clifton. Batting first against Brill we scored 201 runs for 9 wickets, with youngsters



Archie McLintock and Freddy Selby-Lowndes scoring 49 and 31 respectively. Ethan Davie's spin of 5 wickets for 44 and Mike Palmer's 3 for 26 reduced the visitors to 135 all out, and maximum points of 30 were therefore achieved.

The other win saw Broughton and New Newington set a good target of 205 runs for 6 wickets, with Stuart Armstrong's spin continuing to work its magic taking 5 wickets for 37 runs. We replied with 208 for the loss of just five wickets, with Ethan Davie top scoring with 75 not out, sharing in an unbroken sixth wicket partnership with Tom (Belly) Mooring who scored 40 not out. Stuart Armstrong having previously completed a satisfactory day, scoring 32.

The unusual result of a tie continued the good `home` form. In an exciting match, with no facility for an extra over in a tie position, Ethan Davie excelled in scoring 72 after his bowling return of 6 wickets for 39 runs in dismissing Kidlington for 170 runs. A brave attempt for a quick single by Andy (Buckers) Buckland failed on the last ball, leaving us with a tied score of 170 for 9 wickets.

The defeats were against Wantage, who scored 194, leaving us 11 runs short with 183 for 6, despite excellent not outs of Neil Patel (83) and Ethan Davie (73), and bowling of 4 for 57 by Stuart Armstrong and 4 for 66 by Davie; against Risinghurst after we crumbled to 77 all out, the home side won for the loss of 5 wickets, despite the efforts of youngster Ollie Armstrong, who took 3 wickets for 38; against Combe who, despite Tristan Barratt's 59 and Mike Palmer's 54, made easy work of knocking off the 174 target we set for the loss of no wickets!; and against Radley, who set a massive 253 runs for 5 wickets on a lightning outfield at Radley School, which we replied with 182 for 8, with second team skipper Chris Webb scoring his highest of the season with 41. Pity he cannot replicate it in the seconds!

Second Team – The seconds have struggled in recent weeks, winning just one match and losing four. However the win was extra enjoyable, as it was against old rivals Sunningwell. For once we made a decent score, with Steve Hill scoring 61 not out in a total of 158 for 5. Andy (Snake) Chalmers then skittled the hosts with bowling of 5 wickets for 19 runs, dismissing them for a total of 69.

Though Charlie Mason scored 34 and Andy Chalmers 30, our total of 105 was never going to defeat Kilkenny, despite Andy Chalmers` good day continuing by taking 3 wickets for 19 runs as the visitors reached the target for the loss of 6 wickets. Other defeats included a very strong Chinnor team scoring 187, with Deepak Patel taking 5 wickets for 32 runs and Andy Chalmers 3 for 38, with us replying with 97 all out; an equally strong Wootton side amassing 174 for 8, despite Gary Butler's 4 for 21, and then with an excellent pace attack dismissed us for just 60; and finally the return match with Kilkenny who scored a very high 193 for 5 in the reduced 36 overs, which we replied with 95 for 8 thanks to `Mr Extra`s` top scoring with 26! 



MarchamCentre—further rapid progress!

Your new village hall building has come along rapidly in the last two months. The walls and roof structure are complete, external brickwork has been laid, and doors and windows fitted. The roof insulation is in place and most of the roof tiling has been done. Underfloor heating pipes are being installed as this edition goes to print. Although the August rain resulted in a little delay, the project is still close to schedule for the target completion next Spring. Work has also just begun on the Institute site to protect the frontage during the building project there. Demolition work will start behind the main building, which will remain in place.



We push on with fund-raising to provide your new MarchamCentre with the equipment we need to operate the facilities fully. We need to find about £30,000 for basic equipment when it opens. Since July, we have raised just over £1000 so far from Sponsor-a-Brick (run by the shop volunteers) with further to go – have you been to the Shop to make your donation yet? DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

What has been happening in Council?

Times at the Vale are busy and challenging.

On Wednesday, 17th July, the Vale held its first meeting with the new council of 31 Lib Dem councillors, 6 Conservative councillors and 1 Green councillor, and all the feedback we have been getting on it has been very positive. For example: "This the first time we feel we are being listened to for years"

Several motions were passed including one on the Local Plan Part 2 (LPP2) which was proposed by Councillor Debby Hallett and seconded by me. It asked the Leader of the Council to send a letter to the Minister of Housing, Communities and Local Government asking him "to explain to us how the Local Plan Part 2 (LPP2) can be considered sound and legal when the housing figures used are based solely on a working assumption of Oxford's unmet needs, the Plan Allocates the housing development in the Green Belt in clear contravention of paragraph 137 of the NPPF (the legal document on which all planning is based) and the Plan removes Dalton Barracks and Shippon from the Green Belt without the exceptional circumstances the regulations (NPPF) require."

Remember that the main purpose of this inherited LPP2 is to satisfy Oxford city's unmet housing needs, whose figures are very questionable and possibly overestimated by as much as 40%. Is it reasonable to ask us to agree to a plan that could be faulty? In fact, we feel that the whole examination procedures are deficient and is a case of "the cart being put before the horse". We should have a clear evidenced housing target before being asked to help Oxford with its unmet needs. So, we are asking the Council to write to the 2 local MPs and to the Minister asking him to relook at the issues we have raised and to give us advice (and the necessary time) on how we can adjust the LPP2 once Oxford's unmet need is established. We need this help and advice as we know that if we don't adopt the Plan we are at severe risk of speculative developers, and the bonanza of house building which happened under the Conservatives when they delayed adopting the Local Plan they inherited 8 years ago.

Another motion which was passed was on the Oxford Cambridge Expressway. We pointed out the lack of public consultation or clarity on whether an Expresssway is the best way to connect Oxford and Cambridge; the high risk of going against our Climate Emergency motion by increasing carbon emissions and damaging the bio diversity and countryside during the road building; and the vast amount of evidence showing that building big roads merely attracts more traffic and clutters the surrounding roads in the long run. We asked that Council should write to the local MPs and the Minister of Transport, pointing out our opposition and asking that instead the £3-7 billion should be put towards completing and enhancing phase three of the East-West Rail link and to local governments to enhance cycle infrastructure and public transport. Now we wait to see the response!

Extra news Residents of Leas Lane and their neighbours will be pleased to hear that the application for 114 houses on the field near them has been turned down, even before it reached the Planning Committee.

Polling Station If you feel that the choice of our temporary Polling Station, the Baptist Hall on Packhorse Lane, (the new hall will be used in the future) was not suitable last May, especially for older and disabled voters, can you let your Parish Council know as soon as possible, as the Council is prepared to look again. COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

In the current atmosphere, it is very difficult to understand what might happen next. Almost everyone has their very own prediction of how things will turn out. Most of the predictions range between gloomy and utter despair. In order to cheer ourselves up, some friends and I played a game of "determined optimism" where each of us had to come up with three good things which could happen in the next year and how they might be achieved. It is a game I recommend to everyone, but the problem is that we all wished the world to be in different places so it is by no means a guaranteed way of spreading peace and harmony.

At VWHDC, what to do with the Local Plan is occupying everyone's minds. Much will depend on the HIF grant (£250m) and whether or not this will be guaranteed if either SODC or VWHDC were to decide to withdraw their plans in order to modify them. For VWHDC, this is particularly critical as their Plan is dependent on the delivery of "Valley Park, Didcot". Without the HIF money, OCC cannot afford the road improvements needed to deliver it. OCC would then be compelled to object to the plan which might then fail. In which case, the whole Vale would be back to coping with speculative development all over the District.

No-one wants that and we are all waiting for some clarity from Government. Unfortunately for Oxfordshire, Government is rather preoccupied at present so maybe to keep calm and sane, I will continue to play the "determined optimism" game.

Liz Woolley - "It will do him more good than going to school": Child labour in nineteenth-century Oxfordshire.



THAMES VALLE

POLICE

In rural counties like Oxfordshire, child labour was as much a feature of everyday life in the

nineteenth century as in industrialised areas. This hour-long illustrated talk tells the story of our county's child workers, many of whom started work part-time at the age of six or seven and, until the compulsory school legislation of the 1870s, left education for good by the age of ten to become permanently employed in agriculture, in domestic service and in lace-making, gloving and in a host of other small-scale occupations. Children Heard and Seen is a charity that works to mitigate the effects of parental imprisonment children, young on people and their families.



We aim to provide quality services for children with a family member in prison. I am approaching you because we are desperately looking for volunteers to assist in the Marcham area with a number of families who require our support.

Some key facts surrounding the work of the charity include

- 1. A prison sentence separates 17,000 children a year from their mothers;
- 2. Children of prisoners are more likely to experience poverty, poor housing, social exclusion, poor physical health, aggressive behaviour. Children of prisoners are 3 times more at risk of committing Anti-Social Behaviour or delinquent behaviour;
- 3. 65% of boys with a convicted parent go on to offend themselves;
- 4.5% of children with a parent in prison are at risk of mental health problems including depression, anxiety, eating and sleeping disorders:
- 5. Parental imprisonment is associated with negative school experiences such as persistent truanting, bullying and failure to achieve in education;
- 6. Children of prisoners are also disproportionately represented among young offenders and the care population;
- 7. It is estimated that every £1 invested in supporting prisoners' families could save the taxpayer £11.

We would like to seek your assistance to publish a short article to recruit volunteers from the Marcham community area to spend some time per week with the children affected and their families in and around South Oxfordshire either in a one-to-one mentoring role or within groups.

Ours is a niche charity in a meaningful area within the criminal justice and social care sectors where we are desperately in need of assistance and support to further develop support for these children and families.
