Respect and loathing became one and within two months Van Gogh was on a path to the confines of a hospital cell in which his final and most memorable paintings were made.

Remembrance Sunday - Road Closure A415 Frilford Road, Church Street, New Road

A Road Closure Order for the section of Frilford Road between Church Street and North Street, Church Street itself and New Road has been obtained from 11.00 a.m. -12.30 p.m. on 10th November, although access is being maintained for emergency vehicles.

This is to allow the parade from the Church, after the Church service, to the War Memorial in Frilford Road, in order to lay wreaths. Please note that the diversion will be along North Street to St. Peter's cross roads, then left to the junction with the A338, and left again to the Frilford Service Station.

As I type this report for our editor, construction workers are erecting fencing in preparation for the work of building two new, much-needed classrooms for our village school. The cost of building the structure is covered by government Parent Teach funding, but the cost of fitting it out with the



furniture and equipment needed to actually EDUCATE children in the building is not.

So the school faces an enormous challenge of finding the funds to buy desks and chairs, whiteboards, computers, and all manner of items to turn the shell of a building into a living, breathing place of education. We on the Parent-Teacher Association stand ready to help.

However ...

The building work comes at a time when the school PTA is weaker than I can ever remember it. We have fewer people now working to raise funds for the school than at any time since I joined the team five years ago. I have made a plea for volunteers in the school newsletter. I have made a plea for volunteers on the village Facebook pages. I now make the same plea in the village magazine. If we aren't able to attract more parents to assist with the PTA's work, we won't have the numbers to organise and run fundraising events to equip the new classrooms. We will do our best, but our best may not be good enough.

Please help.

If we can, we aim to run three events between now and Christmas. The first, on Friday 15 November, is our School Disco for children attending the school - KS1: 6.00-6.50pm; KS2: 7.00-8.00pm. £3 per child, which includes refreshments.

Last year we staged a family magic show in the run-up to Christmas, and it proved very popular, so we'll be doing the same again this year. The show will take place from 5.30pm on Friday 29 November. Tickets will be £5 and will be on sale shortly. Watch this space.

And then, between 6 and 8pm on Friday 6 December, we'll hold one of our biggest annual fundraisers: The Marcham School Christmas Fair. Loads of fun for all the family, and we'll be giving out more details next month.

So put those dates in on your family calendar: 15 November; 29 November; 6 December. Fun for all the family.

In order for these events to be a success and raise significant sums of money for the school, we REALLY DO NEED new members to come and help us. Without a larger PTA team, the events will raise less money than they should. I hope you can help ...

The Marcham Senior Citizens Club, due to lack of members and personal circumstances, was closed on 30 November 2018. Despite considerable effort by the committee, no increased interest was forthcoming within Marcham village.

A preliminary closing meeting was held on 31 January 2019 to discuss the disposal of Club assets. At this meeting it was decided, as a token of appreciation for their support over many years, to give donations to Age UK and Sobell House.

This meeting then decided that the residue of monies should be held in the bank for a period of 12 months (until 31 January 2020), to enable the rejuvenation of the Senior Citizens Club by any interested villagers.

MOLDOVAN GALA EVENING

Ninety guests, including the Her Excellency the Ambassador of the Republic of Moldova, our local County and District Councillors, and Vice-Chair of Marcham Parish Council, celebrated the tenth birthday of the Marcham Moldova Lifeline at a 'Moldovan Gala Evening' in the village on 28 September.

After canapés and a sit-down dinner at All Saints' Church, cooked and served by volunteers of all ages, the guests heard how people in Marcham first learnt about the needs of this poorest country in Europe. When a drought afflicted Moldova in 2006, a Harvest collection was sent out from Marcham which helped two Moldovan villages get back on their feet again. It was after a group from our village went out to see the results of this that the Marcham Moldova Lifeline (MML) was born. In the ten years since then, through the generosity and fund-raising of local people, MML has been able to give emergency assistance and support small-scale development projects, particularly in remote villages where the needs are greatest.

One of the highlights of the Gala Evening was the presence of a number of friends from Moldova in their beautiful traditional dress. They described how the funds raised in Marcham have been effectively put to work in a variety of projects, like giving much-needed training in sign language to members of the deaf community; giving further professional training to teachers in some village schools, and up-to-date equipment for their students. Alicia



Davies, who had just returned from a working trip to Moldova with her Dad, Paul, described their visit to a new community launderette financed by MML, and to a school that had received professional assistance with help from Marcham: it was inspiring to see the difference this had made, she said.

Proceeds from the Gala Evening had been designated to help equip a Community Kitchen in a remote Moldovan village that provides Meals on Wheels to the elderly and disabled, and meals for needy children. Thanks to generous donations for the Gala Auction and fantastic local sponsorship of some of the food for the dinner, final funds raised from the Evening came to over £3100. This amazing result will enable MML not only to support the Community Kitchen, but also to supply winter food parcels to at least 100 Moldovan households who are officially identified as being in acute need.

The Moldovan Ambassador, Ms Angela Ponomariov, later observed that the Marcham-Moldova partnership was a 'truly impressive' example of how 'with small steps everybody can help to change someone's life for the better'. 






GMaDW raised over £5,100 — a massive thank-you!

As a result of your generous donations, we have raised **£5,103** over the weekend for furniture and fittings in our new hall. 

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Full Council: Local Plan Decision

On Wednesday 9th October, the Vale held its full council and took the big decision to adopt LPP2. It was a very difficult decision for us Lib Dems, as the new administrators in the Vale, to take, because for 8 years we have been against this plan, largely because it is based on unsubstantiated house numbers from Oxford City to meet their unmet needs, it has allowed building to happen in areas we would not have chosen without the necessary infrastructure to support it and it has removed places out of the Green Belt which we think should stay in. But after seeking much legal advice and looking at all the options, we came to the conclusion that to withdraw or not adopt the LPP2 we would lose the protection of our 5 year land supply within a year, which in turn would leave the whole of the Vale at the mercy of speculative developers. You would have seen houses springing up all over the place as the Vale would have few legal reasons to stop them. So, reluctantly we adopted LPP2.

Now that the decision has been taken, we can look forward to the future and our next Local Plan 2050. Already we are rewriting our Corporate Plan, putting in strategies which we feel are more relevant. Beneath these will be the policies of the different portfolios and we would very much like to hear from you, the public, with any policy ideas which you want to champion, please do contact me.

Motions

Four motions were passed at full council.

1) You may be aware that in Oxfordshire there are many non-UK EU nationals who are our husbands, wives, parents, friends and colleagues and who play an integral part in our thriving district. In 2016, they were promised again and again that "there will be no change for EU citizens already lawfully resident in the UK and will be treated no less favourably as they are at present." BUT, after three years of living in limbo, their homes and livelihoods are yet again being threatened by further uncertainty brought about by a possible no deal Brexit and the real confusion of the European Settlement Scheme (EUSS).

As a result, Council agreed that officers would be asked for more information on what can be done locally to mitigate adverse impacts on the right of non-UK EU nationals and for the leader to write to the Home Secretary to ask for clarification on the EUSS:

- a) To provide a clear deadline for application to the EUSS in case of a no deal exit from EU.
- b) To provide physical proof of settled status that can be used to access services
- c) To confirm that there will be no changes to the rights of settled non-UK EU citizens that they currently have by ratifying the Immigration Bill as primary legislation before the exit day.

2) This motion was all about rerouting traffic along minor roads when the A34 is closed for works. It focussed on Wantage and Charlton Ward and how the residents' lives have been blighted by rerouted traffic shaking their houses throughout the night. Residents in Marcham are only too aware of how such closures on the A34 often result in traffic blighting the lives of those on Packhorse Lane, Abingdon Road and Frilford Road, when Marcham is used as a rat run to get to the A420 when it used to be the preferred route to use during any A34 closure. It was agreed that the Scrutiny Committee would consider inviting relevant parties, such as Highways England, Thames Valley Police, Kier Group plc and Wantage Diversion Group to attend to hear the dreadful impact on residents with rerouting traffic.

Two other motions were passed. One on encouraging council to work with other Oxfordshire authorities, regional colleagues and the Government to deliver growth, where it is sustainable, and to provide housing that meets residents' needs. Strategies and plans to achieve this should be based on fourteen pertinent positions (see VWHDC website). The other motion was asking that the Oxfordshire Pensions Committee should recognise the Climate Emergency by investing in a passive low carbon fund now that one is available and generates similar returns to the wider investment market.

It was a busy evening, and now that the big decision has been taken and motions passed enthusiastically, we can look forward to an exciting future in the Vale. Please remember to contact me with any policy ideas you may have.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

This has been an eventful month for Oxfordshire's Councils. There is much concern that the actions of one council could affect others. At its recent Council Meeting, after much anguish, VWHDC finally agreed to adopt its Local Plan. The good news is that, for the moment at least, the area should be protected from speculative planning applications which have plagued us for some years. The downside is that all Oxfordshire Councils are working towards plans with greatly increased housing numbers. Though not as bad as some, VWHDC is already slipping behind its target allocation and this could see the return of speculative planning within a very few years.

Did I say "all" Oxfordshire Councils? The problems of South Oxfordshire's Local Plan have been in the news on many occasions over recent years. They have been unable to agree where their housing allocations should go. Indeed, the argument has seen the disintegration of one administration and culminated in May of this year in the installation of a new one. The SODC Local Plan was always well behind the Vale's and, in the short term, they are under less threat from speculative planning. In order to make adjustments to their Local Plan, last week their Cabinet was about to ask the Council to withdraw their plan. A simple enough decision you would have thought - but nothing in planning is ever simple.

Many months ago, Oxfordshire Councils collectively signed up to a "Growth Deal" with Government where, in return for £250m, the Councils would together deliver 100,000 new homes by 2031. In addition, OCC made a successful "HIF" (Housing Infrastructure Fund) bid for a further £150m needed to pay for a link road and river crossing from Didcot. OCC argued that this was needed if the roads supplying the many thousands of houses proposed for Valley Park, Didcot were to be built. The problem was that the VWHDC local plan depended on the successful delivery of those houses and that this government money was contingent on all Local Plans being in place.

So, (in the hope that you are still with me!) it seemed that the nonadoption of the SODC Plan could well upset the whole VWHDC Plan. Or alternatively that Government would have to agree to a different source of funding to pay for the new link road and bridge. Last week SODC received an email from the Housing Minister, Robert Jenrick MP, *ordering that SODC must not discuss its Local Plan until he had made a decision*. This notice went to all Oxfordshire Councils and the press and it raises many questions. Here are a few:

- 1. Is the Housing Minister using the right Act of Parliament to justify his decision?
- 2. Is the VWHDC Plan now in place or not?
- 3. Given how essential it is to Government that Didcot should grow, could the money not be found from some other source?

MP'S REPORT

Locally there have been two major successes in the past few weeks (I write at the beginning of October.) As the population of the local area increases so does demand for essential services. Key among these is the demand for excellent schools. Oxfordshire County Council (OCC)



predicts that primary schools across the county will require an extra 25,000 places by 2031.

I was therefore dismayed earlier this year to hear that schools across Oxfordshire were having trouble expanding their facilities, in particular classroom space, to meet the increase in demand. Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) had asked the Department for Education (DfE) for permission to expand their classrooms and they were refused, on the basis that the sacrifice of playing field space at the schools would be too great.

I was asked to intervene by parents and staff of schools in my constituency. I visited one of the schools myself, Marcham Primary, and after a successful intervention by MPs across Oxfordshire I was delighted to receive news last week that the applications for expansion across the county have been approved.

A further cause for celebration is that NHS England have confirmed that not only will PET-Scan services at the Churchill be protected and remain in the hands of Oxford University Hospitals (there were fears earlier this year that they may be lost to a private operator) new scanning services will be provided at other Hospitals serving the constituency, including the Great Western in Swindon following intervention by Oxfordshire MPs.

Once again these issues go to show what can be achieved if communities, local councils, MPs and Government work together to achieve the best outcomes.
