It would be appreciated if contact can be limited to essential matters for the time being.

There is a now a vacancy on the Parish Council. Anyone interested in joining the Council is invited to contact the Clerk whose details are below. The Council meets 11 times in the year and has a wide range of powers relating to local matters. So if you are interested in making decisions about the area in which you live and supporting the community, and would like further information about the role then please contact the Clerk.

Grants

The Parish Council considers any requests for grants at its November meeting. Grant requests are considered usually just once a year. Therefore, if there is any worthy and needy organisation where Marcham residents benefit which is considering applying to the Parish Council for a grant, then please use the application form available in the Publications section on the Council's website www.marchamparishcouncil.gov.uk, and enclose a copy of your organisation's accounts. The deadline for submissions is 15th October 2020.

15 Bus Service

The 15 bus service between Abingdon and Witney will be operated by Pulhams Coaches from 1 September. This replaces Stagecoach who were the previous operator. All services will now call at Millets Farm.

Planning Applications

The Council has considered the following applications:

P20/V1480/MPO, 70 Howard Cornish Road, Marcham. Modification of a section 52 agreement in connection with application P89/V0804/FUL to remove clause 2 which prevents the property from being leased to a registered provider. The Council made comments regarding noise control and reinstating the agreement at such a time that the proposed use ceases.

P20/V1388/O, outline planning permission for a residential development of up to 90 dwellings on land off Packhorse Lane on the south east edge of Marcham. The Council objected, citing access onto the A415 which was considered to be dangerous, the adverse affect on the nearby Air Quality Management Area and that there is insufficient capacity in Marcham Primary School which would result in

village children needing to be transported to other schools.

Abingdon Heritage Weekend 19 - 20 September 2020

European Heritage Days were set up in 1991 – the principle was to throw open the doors to historic monuments and buildings, in particular those normally closed to the public, in order to raise appreciation of Europe's rich and diverse cultural assets and the need to care for them. Heritage Days are now held annually in September in 50 European states.



Abingdon's first big Heritage Open Day was in 2003 and since 2007 they have been run by

volunteers, mainly from the Friends of Abingdon Civic Society and the Abingdon Area Archaeological and Historical Society. During the early years Abingdon Heritage Open Days (HODs) mainly involved giving people the opportunity to see inside buildings not normally open to the public – in some cases private householders bravely opened up their homes to visitors. Since then the event has expanded to include heritage-themed guided walks, andoften an exhibition, usually running for a full week. In some years we have had a mini-festival with family activities as well as the regular elements.

This year's event will of necessity be rather different. Plans include:

- Short Videos of aspects of Abingdon's heritage Video tours of properties which would otherwise be open
- Live-streamed events from the County Hall Museum Information in windows of historic properties

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
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RUBY - 100 NOT OUT!

Ruby was born on 4 August 1920 in Thornton Heath, Surrey, moving to Iver, Bucks, when she was 5. She had a 1.5 mile walk to the fearful Miss Bright's school with older sister, Mabel unless the milkman came along and gave them a lift in his horse drawn milk float. In 1938 Ruby started nurse training, in St Giles Hospital, Camberwell but, when the hospital was bombed, it was evacuated to an ex-army base in Kent and her training ceased. She married Albert Russell in 1941 (when nurses were not allowed to be married). As a war time bride, coupons had to be saved for the white velvet for her wedding gown, and for cake ingredients but, without icing sugar, her wedding cake was covered with a cardboard replica. All coastal resorts were closed, so their honeymoon was spent in the Surrey countryside. Ruby and Albert were married for 72 years before Albert died (aged 95), 18 months after they moved into Sweetbriar - following 27 years in Benson.

Ruby and Albert had four children, Ruth, David, Heather and Philip, moving to North Somerset in 1952. Ruby was "mum" to so many children and adults, over the years, always ready to welcome anyone who needed love and somewhere to call home.

Ruby still loves knitting and has raised hundreds of pounds, in the past few years, making toys for charity. She enjoys crosswords, and Scrabble every week with her friends in Sweetbriar (before lockdown). She's felt very much at home in Marcham, over the past 9 years, making so many new friends in the village and All Saints Church. She can't quite believe she's reached 100 – and neither can anyone who knows her! If you ask Ruby the secret of her long, happy life, apart from a healthy diet, she can't tell you why she's lived so long; but her happiness comes from her absolute trust in Jesus, knowing that, whatever happens, God wants the best for her and will always be with her. So she doesn't worry and never feels alone.

A BIG THANK YOU to Rosemary Siebert & the Sweetbriar Committee and Residents who made her Big Day so special with a garden party, and a beautiful cake decorated by Liz Mason; and all the friends who dropped in to see her during the day or sent greetings (over 100 cards) including Ruth Mander who brought a beautiful bouquet on behalf of the Parish Council. You all made her feel very loved and valued.


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Here's some very good news for the Village..... Marcham Centre Hall will begin to open from Monday 14th September

We have given £500 to The Thirsty Café to help them start up. We have also given £500 to Sofea, a charity which re-distributes surplus food from supermarkets.



The race is on to encourage over-75s to claim the Pension Credit and free TV Licences they are due



As the curtain fell on the free TV licence scheme for over-75s, the Government Pension Credit take-up figures show that around 3,500 older people in Oxfordshire are still failing to get the Pension Credit they are due. Pension Credit is a welfare benefit for people who are over state pension age on a low income.

Without the award of Pension Credit Guarantee Credit, they will not be able to get a free TV licence either, which will leave people on already low incomes struggling to find an extra £150 this year and every year.

Age UK Oxfordshire is therefore calling on everyone aged over 75 to see without delay if they are eligible for Pension Credit, if they haven't already done so.

To check if you are eligible and to apply for Pension Credit, you will need to find the following:

- ► National Insurance number
- ► Bank account details
- ► Information about your income, savings and investments
- Information about your pensions (if you have any)
- Details of any housing costs (mortgage, interest, service charges)
- ► The same details for your partner (if they live with you)

If you can get online - the Age UK benefits calculator is easy to use: https://benefitscheck.ageuk.org.uk/

If you already think you are eligible – you can apply online here **www.gov.uk/pension-credit/how-to-claim** or call the Pension Credit claim line on **0800 99 1234**. If you are unsure and need someone to check on your behalf – call our Age UK Oxfordshire helpline on **0345 450 1276** (10am – 4pm, Mon – Fri) or the national Age UK Helpline on **0800 169 65 65** (8am – 7pm daily).

- Be prepared to give way to others where paths are narrow
- Leave farm and property gates as you find them

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- Protect the natural environment
- Leave no trace of your visit, take all your litter home
- Don't light fires or have BBQs
- Keep dogs under effective control, bag dog poo and take it home
- Enjoy Oxfordshire's villages and towns
- Know which facilities are open before you go on your walk. Look for the 'We're Good to Go' symbol on pubs and cafes.

Are you, like me, feeling strongly restless? This Covid-19 situation seems likely to go on for a long time and may effect a permanent change on our lives! Many of us have spent more time in our



gardens, or at least, being aware of the nature we can see from the window. There seems to have been a new found connection to nature on our very doorstep, judging by the messages I'm getting through anyway.

I've heard some people couldn't get out to buy their normal plants and seeds to grow this year. So, some gardeners have been doing less in their gardens, and witnessing nature responding.

Veg plots have been left to grow, and all types of flowers and unexpected plants have appeared, having germinated from the natural seed bank in the soil. Some sections of lawns have been left and allowed to stretch their legs and grow.

The result, more bees, more moths, more and better food chains. Whether we are aiming to get back to traditional gardening, developing a wildlife garden, or getting some sense of normality back in life, after initially adapting to Covid-19. It can all seem so big, unachievable, out of reach. Its just incremental steps though, and about not getting caught up in expectations of how it should be, how it should be progressing.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Over the last few weeks the Government has published its very radical White Paper on Planning which is going to affect everyone of us in the future. I thought I would try to summarise the main points: The Planning White Paper ('Planning for the Future') was published on 6th August. It proposes a complete replacement of the current planning system that was established in 1947 and it has been published for consultation, with an end date of 29th October. You are urged to put your opinions forward*.

It starts from the assumption that the current system is unfit for purpose and stands as a significant block on the development that the country needs, and, in particular, that it is responsible for the current housing crisis. The motivation for the overhaulis therefore to remove barriers to development.

The White Paper is based around the following three pillars:

- Pillar One Planning for Development
- Pillar Two Planning for Beautiful and Sustainable Places

• Pillar Three – Planning for Infrastructure and Connected Places At its heart, it proposes a form of zoning system, whereby the use of all land is defined at the plan-making stage, which means that the planning application process is substantially reduced. Zoning systems exist in many other countries, including most European countries, but the current proposals do not seem to be based on any existing systems from elsewhere

Local Plans would be fundamentally changed, to become first and foremost map-based, using a standard national template and software, dividing all land in their area into three categories: 'growth', 'renewal' and 'protection'.

Land for 'Growth' will be where the major development would happen.

Land for 'Renewal' will be suitable for development, which would cover existing urban areas, and include infill, town centre development etc.

Land for 'Protection' will be land where more stringent controls apply, either defined nationally or locally.eg Areas of Outstanding Beauty, Green Belt etc.

Local Plans will be expected to take 30 months to produce instead of the 5 years it takes now.

There will be faster decision-making through new technological solutions (e.g. more automated validation, machine-readable documents)

A National Model Design Code will be published in autumn 2020, accompanied by a revised Manual for Streets.

There will be a fast-track process for developments which comply with design codes in areas for 'growth' and 'renewal' in the Local Plan. There will also be awidening of permitted development rights to allow "popular and replicable" forms of development, according to a pattern book, in 'Renewal' areas.

There is continued commitment to various elements of the Environment Bill, including biodiversity net gain, as well as a national expectation on trees, and the continued push for the Future Homes standard and development to be net zero carbon by 2050.

The CIL and S106 agreements will be abolished, and replaced with a new Consolidated Infrastructure Levy.

Alongside this document is another paper which focuses on:

- A revised standard methodology for calculating housing need; the Vale appears to be expected to have the biggest contingent of houses in Oxfordshire because of the growth expected in Science.
- The introduction of 'First Homes' whereby first time buyers will be able to buy a home with a minimum of 30% discount
- An increased threshold for requiring affordable housing. So instead of a threshold of 10 units before a developer has to put in affordable houses, it has been increased to 40 to 50 units.

Although the government has said that this will be reviewed in 18 months, their history suggests that this will be rolled forward and become permanent.

So, there are good and bad points in this paper, depending on your viewpoint, but there is no doubt that Planning needed to be shaken up. Generally, the main themes are as follows:

1) There is a very significant level of deregulation, trying to remove barriers to development and create much greater certainty within the planning process.

2) There is also a very significant centralisation of powers on government.

Removal of opportunities for democratic oversight and local consultation, which for many developments will only take place as part of a slimmed down local plan process. The roles of Planning Applications Committees would inevitably be substantially reduced.
 The proposed procedures are in many cases highly dependent on as-yet-untested technological solutions.

5) There would need to be significant investment in design skills. Much of the day-to-day work of planning sections may change from general policy and development management to drawing up strong design codes, and skills would need to improve in these areas.

Two points are worth noting. First, for every proposal, the White Paper sets out alternative options, which are usually watered-down versions of the proposal. No change is rarely an option. Second, the timetable for introducing changes is not set out in detail, but the government have stated that they would like to see the new generation of local plans in place by the end of this parliament, which would require legislation to be in place by the beginning of 2022 at the latest.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

The local news on Covid in Oxfordshire continues to be mostly encouraging. There has been a spike in figures in part of Oxford City - almost certainly he result of partying by under 30s. This is reflected across the Country with an increase in under30s cases. The message from the Director of Public Health is clear. Covid is far from over for any of us and if we are to avoid a second spike this winter, we need to maintain social distancing, wear masks when required and to follow Government advice as it is published. The problem of A level and GCSE grades is firmly in the headlines as I write. Add in the issues around the reopening of schools for the new academic year, and it is clear that Education is going to dominate the news for some time. Allowing all predicted A level grades to stand rather than relying on a hastily drawn up algorithm looks like the only fair way to treat thousands of youngsters. Using algorithm moderated GCSE grades is also going to produce outcomes riddled with unfairness. It is likely that Schools will have to make judgements on who should take which A levels based on their own estimates of pupils' capabilities.

Now that the HIF (Housing Infrastructure Fund) has been signed off guaranteeing enough money to pay for the new roads around Didcot and the new bridge over the Thames, people are beginning to be concerned about some of the consequences. Will this mean yet more houses? How will the road system in our area in Abingdon, around Culham Bridge and at the Frilford crossroads cope?

The OCC Highways team (many of whom live in the area and

are well aware of the issues we all face) are committed to visiting every parish to explain their thinking and their traffic modelling to everyone. I very much hope that all interested residents will be able to attend the presentations. The timetable for the consultation will be announced very soon.

As the lockdown has progressed, the impact on the mental health of all of us is beginning to show itself. Anti social behaviour and domestic violence is on the increase. Unemployment is rising, the economy is badly damaged and all age groups are affected. It is all too easy to become very depressed. And yet, families have shown enormous resilience to it all, and local communities and Covid Groups have thrived and brought people of all types and all ages closer together than they have been since the last world war. I reckon people are being kinder and more caring towards each other than I ever remember. I wonder how history will treat this period. *RICHARD WEBBER* Cllr OCC SC & Marcham Division. SCAM WARNING

We have received reports of a scam circulating where residents are receiving phone calls from someone posing to be a police officer, advising recipients that there has been fraudulent activity at their bank and they believe their bank is using fake banks notes. The recipient is asked to withdraw money from their account and take it home. They then receive another phone call asking for the serial numbers on the bank notes when the caller confirms that the notes are fake and they will send a courier to come and pick them up.

The notes are not fake and the resident loses the money.

The police or other reputable organisations will never ask you to withdraw money or move money to a safe account, they will not ask you to reveal your banking PIN, password or send anyone to your house to collect cards or cash.

Challenge any question whereby you think the call could be fake, It is ok to reject, refuse or ignore any requires and hang up. Only criminal will try to rush or panic you. Do not share your information.

- Do not trust the caller ID displayed on the phone.
- Never share your PIN with anyone- not even by tapping it into the key pad on your phone.
- Your bank, the police and the tax office will never arrange to attend your home to collect cash, bank cards or ask for your PIN. They will also never ask you to withdraw or transfer money, or buy items.
- Speak to someone if you are unsure.
- Don't be pressured into making quick decisions- if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.
- Stop and think, take five minutes to consider what you are being told. Hang up if you think it is a scam.

Abingdon Reservoir – Latest News from GARD

It has been six months since our last update but despite the limitations of Covid lockdown and the cancellation of our AGM and planned meetings with water companies, regulators and local stakeholders, GARD officers have continued to mount vigorous opposition to the reservoir:

Officers have participated in virtual meetings with Thames Water's Water Resource Forum, the new managing director of RAPID (a group which brings OfWAT and other water regulators together) and representatives from both Water Resources East and Water Resources South-East. These meetings are all ensuring that we stay in touch with policy and development issues. GARD is most definitely seen by water professionals and the regulators as a well-informed group who have a significant role to play in monitoring and informing the research that has been required by the regulators before any decision on a reservoir can be made.

GARD's professional consultant has completed a detailed critique and concluded that the proposed reservoir would not be resilient to long droughts. We remain very worried that the reservoir plan is deeply flawed and that this limited approach to future needs could result in serious supply issues in a long period of drought. Elsewhere, we note that the Chalk Stream and Angler interest groups have come out in favour of an alternative, early deliverable scheme to remove the need for abstraction from the Chiltern streams. This scheme uses water transfers from existing Thames Water reservoirs, and would be available a decade earlier than even the earliest Abingdon reservoir date. Their scheme can be seen at https://www.dropbox.com/s/u4s4a8ef919lyim/ CHALKSTREAMS%20FIRST%20%28V3.5%29%2022.2.20%20 FINAL%20copy.pdf?dl=0 GARD believes that this scheme, similar to the one we suggested last year, would remove any need for the Abingdon Reservoir as a scheme to 'save' the Chalk Stream habitats.

The flood risk study that GARD has commissioned has been completed and shows that Thames Water's estimates of the necessary flood compensation volume have been underestimated by around 60 - 70%. This was well worth doing and will strengthen our position still further.

Sadly, our AGM has had to be postponed. The committee members have all indicated a willingness to continue in post. We plan to send out a full report to members of activities since the last AGM in Spring 2019 and we are also planning a virtual 'Meet the Officers' gathering in October, which will provide an opportunity for you to ask questions and join in discussion about GARD's future direction and activities.


