Christmas Tree Recycling

For those of you who have real Christmas trees, and are signed up to the District Council's garden waste service, your trees, when you no longer need them, can be put out next to the brown bin provided they are less than 6 ft or 1.8m. They need to be cut into sections if taller than this. If you do not have a brown garden waste bin, then your real Christmas tree can be placed by the Salvation Army Textile bank in Howard Cornish Road (opposite Duffield Place). All Christmas trees will need to be by the textile bank by the end of the day on Tuesday 19th January, 2021. Trees left after this date will not be collected. Also there is to be a Christmas tree collection from Millets Farm on Sunday 10th January, so this is another opportunity for local residents to recycle their tree. Trees need to be dropped off at Millets by the end of Saturday 9th January, 2021.

At the time of writing what the Government restrictions owing to Covid 19 will be in January, are not known, so please adhere to whatever is in force at the time.

Parishioner of the Year

The Council is again considering the possibility of an award for 2020, to be presented at the annual meeting of electors should one be able to be held in Spring next year. The Award recognises the efforts of local people who at any time, have significantly contributed to life within the parish. Previous nominations have been carried forward, however the Council would invite anyone, who wishes to put forward a new suggestion, to submit a short statement of not more than 200 words, as to whom he/she wishes to nominate, and the reasons why the person should receive the award. All nominations to be emailed to the Clerk at the email address below.

Grant Applications

Applications for grants were considered at the November meeting of the Parish Council. The Council awards grants, subject to certain conditions, where there is benefit for the residents of Marcham. The Council was pleased to be able to support the following organisations:

Be Free Carers Centre – £150 towards running costs

South and Vale Citizens Advice Bureau - £1000 towards running costs

Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal - £120

Marcham Colts Football Club - £300 towards the purchase of shelters

Marcham Pre School - £765 towards the purchase of equipment (see page 15)

Marcham Thirsty Cafe - £200 towards the purchase of equipment

Marcham Community Group - £6800 towards soundproofing within the hall, and outside maintenance including fencing

Christmas Tree – Village Green

It has been suggested to the Parish Council that there should be a Christmas tree on the village green, and this was discussed at the November meeting. The Parish Council was supportive of the idea of trying to bring seasonal cheer to the village and to raise spirits during the period of the pandemic. 2 parish councillors have been asked to investigate the possibilities, so watch this space.

Primary School Admission September 2021

If you are a parent or carer of a child born between 1st September 2016 and 31st August 2017 (inclusive) then you need to apply for a primary school place. You still have to apply even if your child already attends a nursery attached to the school. For further information and to apply online go to

The closing date for applications is 15th January, 2021. If you do not have immediate internet access, then you can access the internet at many of the County Council's libraries when they are open, or telephone the schools' admissions team on 0345 241 2487 for further information.

Harding Way – Public Open Space

The tarmac path in the public open space on the south side of Harding Way has not long been laid by the developer, but does not appear to be in a very good condition. The Council is monitoring its state and condition, but is considering removing it and returning the area to grass. There is a public sewer which runs under the area, so in any event, it will likely be dug up in due course when the new development to the north by Mactaggart Mickel gets underway.

Planning Applications considered by the Council

P20/V2702/HH Roof extension to form additional habitable space at Trinafour, Abingdon Rd. The Council had no objections.

Also considered was a licensing application for the Happy Plaice fish/chip van to continue trading from its usual weekly place in Orchard Way. The Parish Council had no objections.

Lecture Report Salt Production, Distribution and Use in Prehistoric and Roman Britain

Dr Janice Kinory

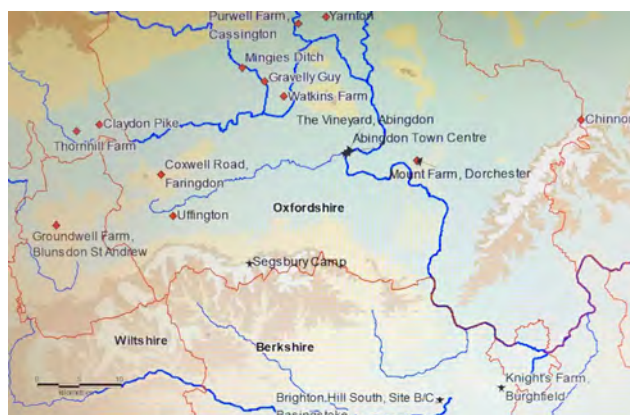
(School of Archaeology, University of Oxford)

Today, the availability of salt is not usually something we think too much about as the supermarket (or preferably the village shop) will help us out if our stocks run low: in contrast, our Neolithic ancestors had to hunt and source meat for their health needs of 1 to 2 gm of salt per day. We learned this surprising fact during the interesting and informative talk in October which was given to the Marcham Society by Dr Janice Kinory, School of Archaeology, University of Oxford and to whom we are most grateful. Not all questions could be answered though due to the passage of time and a lack of evidence: e.g. was salt used for ritual purposes, dowries possibly?

We heard that salt was used in butter making during the Iron Age and milk production too. In Roman times it would have been used to cure meat (a great invention) and in animal farming practices.

Salt Making

Before the introduction of money, a Roman soldier would have been paid partly in salt, a very valuable commodity which was produced on an industrial scale with the use of slaves and prisoners. Interestingly, the word ‘salary’ is derived from the word salt.

In the British Isles salt production could not be carried out all year. We heard that it tended to flourish along the shoreline and tidal creeks, e.g. in Teeside, Cheshire and Lincolnshire. Droitwich was an important area too. Tribal groups tended to cluster around areas of high salt production. Further afield, salt mining in Germany was even in existence as long ago as the Bronze Age.

With regard to the drying methods in salt production, one important way was through the use of clay pots, known as “briquetage”. These were produced in shades of grey or orange but few complete examples remain today. Interestingly, small finds of briquetage have been discovered in Abingdon.

Was salt produced in Marcham? Its sea celery bed and salt spring lie not far from the site of the Roman temple (situated to the west of Marcham) which Janice Kinory helped to excavate. If so, perhaps the salt was given as a ritual offering at the temple? Geo-physical and further archaeological investigations might be able to shed further light on this theory.

Finally, sea salt is 2.6% sodium chloride and contains five other types of salt which makes it taste bitter. By the way, an interesting thought for the shopping basket: pink salt is made up of tiny crustaceans that were caught in the drying process!

**Oxfordshire County Council
Marcham Mill 'Rushey' Bridge
Update on the continued closure**

Many of you will be aware of the continued closure of the old stone bridge at Marcham Mill over the river Ock which forms part of Bridleway 17 and a link into the network of routes beyond. As we head into another winter with the route still closed the Parish Council have requested an update for the local community on the current situation.

As many of you are aware this is a private bridge owned by the landowner; Oxfordshire County Council as Highway Authority is only responsible for the public bridleway which crosses it. Clearly you cannot have one without the other and after a significant delay the council is in discussion with the landowner's representative about how we move the project forward to repair the bridge and reopen the public right of way.

Matters are progressing well and we had been working towards implementing a permanent repair this summer, however due to complications, of which the current Covid-19 pandemic has not helped matters, progress has slowed and we are now looking to proceed next summer as the work needs to be undertaken when water levels are low.

In the meantime some remedial repairs have been undertaken to safeguard vulnerable parts of the structure to prevent further deterioration this winter including potential partial collapse.

A temporary bridge for pedestrians was investigated during lockdown with a design & costings prepared, however in the end there wasn't agreement to proceed. In the meantime the bridge must remain closed on public safety grounds. The Parish Council will be kept informed as matters progress.

We understand the frustration the continued closure is causing, for which we apologise, however please note this matter remains a priority to address and the project is progressing.

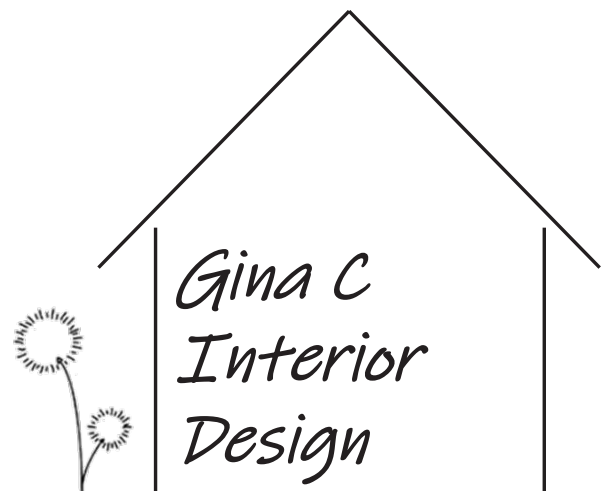

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT**WASTE IN THE VALE**

As we have a climate Emergency facing us, it is even more important that we recycle as much as we can and turn non-recyclable waste into energy. So, this month, I thought I would write about the waste we generate in the Vale and employ Biffa to control. So what should we do with our waste? What goes in what bin? Where does it end up? How has COVID affected our collections?

Garden Waste Your garden waste can be recycled fortnightly in your brown bin (supplied by the council for £49 a year) and in exceptional cases, where a resident can't store a brown bin, it can be recycled in bio degradable sacks, which are supplied by the council (£49 for 50 sacks... a year's worth). An officer has to check the site to see if it is really unsuitable for a brown bin. Then all the garden waste is recycled outside using Open Window process and then sold on to farmers. Please note that you can recycle your Christmas tree if it is 6 foot or under - see page 3 for collection details.

Food Caddy Wasted food can be put into a caddy using a couple of sheets of paper to line it, or a compostable liner, or plastic bag. Cooking oil too can re-cycled in a 1 litre plastic bottle which needs to be put into the caddy.

An Anaerobic Digestion facility in Wallingford is where this food is turned into power (methane gas) enough to power 4,800 homes. It takes 85 days for the food to break down, emitting gas in the process, when it is finally sold on to farmers as a nutrient rich fertiliser.

Green Bin Waste All your recyclable rubbish is put into this bin... that is plastic, paper and cardboard, glass (separate lids from bottles), metals (aerosols, clean foil, food tins and cans, steel and aluminium cans, metal lids). There are exceptions in all these categories which are listed under the Black Bin Waste paragraph

All this waste is taken to a material recovery facility in London (Edmonton) where it is separated, processed and sold on to companies. **It is vital that this waste is NOT contaminated by a misplaced article**, like a dirty nappy or food, as it means that that whole collection will have to be thrown away into the non-recyclable collection. Roughly 9% of this waste in the Vale is contaminated, and although this is less than in many districts, it would be so good to reduce this even more.

Black Bin Waste This is the bin where non-recyclable waste goes, and I thought it would be useful to list what should go in here:

Plastic:	black bags, cling film or film from tops of food trays hard plastics eg coat hangers, children's toys plastic wrappers for sweets, crisps, biscuits polystyrene pouches for pet and baby food dirty nappies and sanitary products
Paper and cardboard:	kitchen roll, tissues and toilet paper
Glass:	window panes glass cookware eg Pyrex spectacle lenses broken drinks glasses
Metal:	coat hangers picture wire kitchen knives pots and pans

All this waste goes to Ardley near Bicester, where it is burned and generates enough electricity to power over 60,000 homes across Oxfordshire. This District is proud of the fact that none of it goes to landfill.

Small electrical items Like an electric iron, should be placed in a carrier bag and put next to the black bin.

Textiles Old sheets or duvet covers (not duvets), should be placed in a carrier bag and put by the green bin.

Batteries should be put in a bag on top of the green bin.

Bulky waste such as old mattresses, TVs, washing machines, can be placed outside your house and collected by the council. It costs £40 to collect up to 3 items and a further £8 for any more items.

Missed bins If by the end of your collection day your bin(s) hasn't been collected, you should report it to the council online or on 03000 610610 and it will be collected.

I hope you have found this a useful update on how waste is dealt with in the Vale and if you would like more detail then go to the VWHDC website: www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk > **rubbish**.

During these COVID times, the amount of waste generated has increased significantly as so many people are working from home. The council has continued to deliver all its services, except for Bulky waste, which might explain the increase in fly tipping. However there have been some successful prosecutions against fly tippers, which, hopefully, will deter others. If there is only one message to take from this, it is:

To help save our planet, please put the right waste into the right bins.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

COVID, LOCKDOWN, AND VACCINES With the news that a vaccine or vaccines may be closer than we thought, it is very tempting for us all to take our foot off the caution pedal, but there remain many immediate threats which have to be addressed before we can indulge in mass celebrations. Our own Oxfordshire data suggests that the problem has moved away from the behaviour of the young to the behaviour of older people. It is the tendency of them (or perhaps I should say "us") to want to get together with friends and family in our houses and gardens that seems to be the source of local spread of COVID-19. The second national lockdown gives us a window to get the figures under control. There are signs that the rate of increase is slowing, but we need it to flatten (or get the "r" number below 1). All of us our feeling anxious to see friends and family but if we are to get together at Christmas and/or as soon as possible in the new year, the health message is clear. We owe it to friends, family and each other to accept it.

INFORMATION OVERLOAD? In the meantime, the local community COVID groups continue to perform a vital function in looking after people of all ages, ensuring everyone is fed, has access to medicines and advice on where to go for specialist help. Given the hundreds of contact names and numbers and the detailed pages of instructions and guidelines from government and Councils, it would be easy to get lost in the plethora of well-meaning advice.

The simple message is that the local Community Group are the ones who can point us at any advice or help that may be needed.

ROADWORKS AND CONGESTION One of the predictable outcomes of the Drayton Neighbourhood Plan was that the ambitions to improve road safety in the village would wind up with a period of traffic bedlam and hold-ups while improvements are carried out. Anyone driving through the village recently will have been held up outside the development in the village centre. It was unfortunate that it has taken three attempts for the developer to get it to the correct design in the right place. However, the work is now done and the result is a "table" that should act as a traffic calming device. Given the ambition to have at least two similar tables elsewhere on Drayton's roads in the next two years, we probably need a year to recover from the frustration that roadworks cause, before the next table is constructed!

One consequence of all the development in and around Drayton, Marcham, Milton and Sutton Courtenay is that services have to be

upgraded – particularly water and sewage services – and this also involves temporary roadworks which can wreak havoc with local congestion and threaten local businesses already hard-pressed by COVID.

MP'S REPORT

I was pleased to hold my first adjournment debate, where a backbench MP can raise any issue and require a minister to respond, in the House of Commons recently. My subject was safety and littering on the A420 and the A34 and I laid out in detail the safety problems we know exist on both roads. In the last 6 years there have been 1057 accidents on the total stretch of the A420 and 2593 on the A34; these are just the ones that involved injury to people – it doesn't include the accidents involving vehicle damage alone. I also wanted to raise litter issues as I regularly receive complaints about that, too. I will now sit down with the relevant minister to discuss how to improve both matters on both roads.

I took the opportunity to get in yet another plug for my bid for Grove Station, which the ministers at the Department are very used to be raising! I was pleased to hear there should be a decision soon about whether we will get money to explore how it could reopen. You can watch the debate on my Facebook page. In other transport news, the Government has just given the County another £3 million for cycle paths and footpaths.

Like I'm sure most of you, I did not want to be in another lockdown now. As some of you will know, the Oxfordshire Conservative MPs had not supported the request of Council Leaders for us to go into Tier 2 in October as we felt it was premature and would have a detrimental effect on mental health, other health conditions and on our local businesses. The cases in Oxfordshire remain much lower than in other parts of the country and I hoping this will be the final lockdown and we can re-emerge into Tier 1, rather than Tier 2, but as always it will be the analysis of the Chief Medical Officer and Joint Biosecurity Centre that is crucial here.

The thoughts of all of us are of course on whether we will get to see our families in the way we like to at Christmas. I know the Prime Minister and the rest of the Government are keen that we will get to and I am hopeful this will be the case. The Government has set a window for university students to return home in time and is currently exploring what can safely be allowed. I think this may be my last message before it, so Merry Christmas when it arrives.

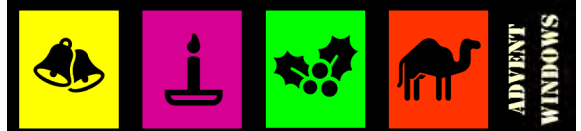
