



MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL Resignation of Kieran O'Leary

Kieran, owing to work and family commitments, has decided to resign from the Parish Council. The Council appreciates his contribution to the community and work of the Council. As a result of Kieran's resignation, there will be a vacancy on the Parish Council to be filled. If you are interested in the life of your village, the local environment, traffic, recreational facilities, planning, housing, and want to make an active difference to your community, then please volunteer to join the Council and help make the local decisions that affect us all. If you would like more details, please contact the Clerk whose details are below.

The Willows - Flooding

The Parish Council was concerned to hear at the end of January of flooding in the roadway in The Willows, due to water bubbling out of a manhole in the street. A road closed sign was lent to residents whilst they sorted the issues with their properties. The Willows is a new housing development, and there are current proposals to erect a further 90 dwellings on the land adjacent. The Clerk contacted the planning officer and drainage engineer at the District Council as well as the County and District Councillors. The drainage engineer has reviewed his comments on the application for 90 dwellings and has now lodged an objection, and Thames Water has been reconsulted in the light of the inadequacy of the sewerage system. In regards specifically to The Willows, the local councillors have involved the Head of the Planning Department, planning enforcement, and have contacted the local MP David Johnston who has put pressure on Thames Water.

Garden Waste Collection

The Vale of White Horse District Council has now restored the garden waste collection service, which had previously been suspended.

Census Day Sunday 21st March 2021

Census day is nearly here. The Office for National Statistics (ONS) is responsible for planning and running the once in a decade survey 2021, which will provide a picture of all the people and households in England and Wales. This time it should be easier for many to take part in the Census. For the first time, the census will be digital. You should receive an access code in due course. The public will only have to go online and enter the code into a secure website and then complete the questionnaire form. There is an online help area, and support offered by telephone, webchats, emails, social media and text messages. In addition there will be Census Support Centres set up, and paper forms will be available on request. Look out for further information nearer the time and visit www.census.gov.uk and read the article on page 15 of this issue.

Annual Meeting of Electors

The Annual meeting of electors usually takes place in May. However, owing to the Government restrictions on face to face meetings, no meeting was held last year. The Parish Council is waiting for guidance on the holding of the meeting this year.

Planning applications considered by the **Parish Council**

P21/V0124/HH Demolition of single storey side extensions, removal of rear roof at first floor. Proposed single storey side extension and two storey side and rear extensions at 11 North Street. The Council requested that materials be sympathetic with the conservation area.

P21/V123/HH Part demolition of existing attached garage and replacement with new side and rear extension at 9 Tower Close. The Council commented on the loss of permeable ground.

P21/V0189/HH Porch to front at Sheepstead Folly. The Council had no objections

MW.005/21 Details pursuant to water monitoring data at Upwood Quarry off A338. The Council requested that exceedances continue to be monitored

R3.003/21 Erection of fencing and installation of ground mounted kitchen air handling equipment at the primary school. Council had no objections, but required that public access to the defibrillator be maintained.

In addition to considering the local planning applications, the Council was represented at a District Council planning committee meeting by Michael Hoath, who spoke against an application for 660 houses + 70 extra care homes close to Kingston Bagpuize. There was great concern regarding the traffic implications through Marcham, and its air quality, together with the impact on the Frilford cross roads. This application was refused by the planning committee.

Please pick up your dog's poo – for the sake of your health, and my sanity!

COVID 19 - VACCINATION

The Government's target for covid vaccinations was to have all over 70s vaccinated by mid-February. The next priority group is those aged between 65 – 70. Vaccinations are being carried out by local GPs, some pharmacies and at larger vaccination centres such as the Kassam Stadium. Those eligible may receive a letter from the NHS and / or be contacted by their GP surgery. You can choose where to be vaccinated, but the second follow up vaccination will need to be carried out at the same place. If you are over 70 and have missed your vaccination for some reason, not heard from your GP surgery, need help with sorting the appointment arrangements, or transport, then please telephone 01235 422600, or email **communitysupport@southandvale. gov.uk** in the first instance. The Marcham helpers group, set up last year, continues to support those who need assistance and your query can be referred to them if appropriate.





Have you received your Census letter?

Census day is on Sunday 21st March, and you will be receiving letters with a unique online code explaining how you can complete your survey.



If you don't get one in the next couple of weeks, please get in touch with the national census contact centre. You can also request a paper questionnaire if you'd prefer to complete your census that way. The contact centre can also provide guidance and help for those who need it.

Additionally, local census support centres will be open while the census is happening. Staff will offer help for people who are not confident online, or who do not have a computer, or need help completing on paper.

The census, run by the Office for National Statistics, is a oncein-a-decade survey that gives us the most accurate estimate of all the people and households in England and Wales. It has been carried out every ten years since 1801, with the exception of 1941.

Now is the time to make your mark on history!

It takes just 10 minutes per person to take part and your census response will help inform where millions of pounds of public funding is spent on services like transport, education and health – on cycle routes, schools and dental surgeries. Information from the census is also important in helping lots of other people and organisations do their work.

Charities and voluntary organisations often use it as evidence to get funding. It helps businesses to understand their customers and, for example, decide where to open new shops. Plus,

those doing research, like university students and people looking into

their family history, use census data. It provides important information on population diversity, allowing organisations to know whether they are meeting their responsibilities and triggering action where necessary.

There are new questions this year


The questionnaire includes questions about your sex, age, work, health, education, household size and ethnicity. And, for the first time, there will be a question asking people whether they have served in the armed forces, as well as voluntary questions for those aged 16 and over on sexual orientation and gender identity.

Keeping you and your information safe


All personal records will be locked away for 100 years, kept safe for future generations. Statistics are only compiled based on anonymised data. Personal information is not shared with any organisation and is never sold.

Operating in line with the Government's latest Covid-19 guidance, field officers will be deployed across the country to contact those who have not responded. They will offer help and advice to those who need it. They will also remind people that their census response is a legal requirement.

THAMES VALLEY

Room To Disagree

I've heard it discussed in the media over the last few weeks, about whether people should be wildlife gardeners or traditional gardeners, when we are facing a climate and ecological emergency, and widespread social injustice. What do you



think? Take some time to fully consider which one people should be, and which you consider yourself to be. Peel away the layers of views and assumptions, like those of an onion, and find the truth within.

My conclusion, we can be, and should be allowed to be, anything we want. There's no real hard and fast rules here, we're all probably a little bit of both, even though we may not always be consciously aware of it, or even acknowledge it. These are just titles, labels, categories, that we shroud ourselves, and others, in. It's ok to be a traditional gardener. It's just as ok to be a wildlife gardener. It's also ok to do a little of both.

After our shared experience of Covid 19, and its pandemic, most of us are just a little bit more appreciative of our gardens, our parks, our green spaces, which are local to us. Just get out there, enjoy it, don't worry about if you, or others, are wildlife gardeners or traditional gardeners, or anything else. Just see the value in how anyone chooses to garden, how they choose to do this and that, how they choose to live life.

I've written many times that the gardening trade, which I don't work in so much these days, is undervalued, compared with other trades. Often I'd quote for work and people would be shocked at the costs, when they could go down the road, and find a teenager, a pensioner or a local chap, who would all work for spare change. Though clearly happy to pay a plumber or a builder a reasonable fee and expect a good salary themselves, it is a different matter when it comes to pay for the house and garden they own, and are custodians of.

I often said to past gardening clients, who claimed I was too expensive, that I need a good salary myself to be able to own a house, just like theirs. Thankfully my work these days is more in the media, but spare a thought for all those struggling gardeners out there. Be kind, be polite to each other.

So, when deliberating how gardeners should be, allow them space to be traditional gardeners, or wildlife gardeners, if they wish. There's always room to disagree, for differing perspectives, another point of view. Allow gardeners to be expensive or cheap. Just respect them and appreciate them. The truth is often in the middle ground, although that can seem beige and mediocre at times.

Gardeners will of course enable you to enjoy your garden, the parks, and the green spaces that you have and will come to enjoy more due to the pandemic. We're all in this together, whether we're traditional or wildlife gardeners. Have you decided? Which one are you?

POLICE NEWS

Electric Scooter advice



We have received several reports in relation to the use of

E-scooters in the area. We would like to take this opportunity to clarify the law and rules surrounding the use of E-scooters:

- E-scooters are classed as a motor vehicle and so the use of them falls under the Road Traffic Act 1988.
- As private E-scooters cannot be insured, taxed or registered, as motor vehicles need to be, they can only be used on private land, with the permission of the landowner.
- Rental E-scooters as part of the government trials can be used on public roads but not on pavements. However, there are currently no government trials taking place in the Abingdon area.

Therefore, the use of an E-scooter is currently illegal unless it is being ridden on private land. Following the reports the team have received, PCSO Jamie Horner has written a warning letter to one rider and PCSO Clare Atkins has been carrying out enquiries, following a separate complaint.

Anti-social behaviour (ASB) and Lockdown Breaches

On Tuesday 2nd February, the neighbourhood team responded to several reports of young people gathering in the town centre, being anti-social, fighting and breaching the current COVID restrictions. A number of young people were stopped and checked. Follow-up work is being completed, including the review of CCTV. All persons identified will receive a home visit and be spoken to about their conduct, and their parents/guardians reminded of the restrictions in place. If there are further breaches, the parents/legal guardians will be issued with COVID 19 Fixed Penalty Notices.

Criminal Damage

PCSO Rich Osborn has been following up reports of criminal damage in Marcham, by completing house to house and CCTV enquiries. Damage was caused to several vehicles in the village on the evening of Friday 15th January. Despite the associated social media attention in relation to the incidents, we believe there may be some victims who have not officially reported damage to the police. Investigations are ongoing at this time, however if you have any information about the incidents, please get in contact.

Safety advice

Cyclists and runners should ensure they are visible when exercising in and around the villages. Bright or reflective clothing is recommended, along with front and rear lights for cyclists.

When exercising dogs, please ensure they are kept under control, especially around other dogs, people and livestock.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT ELECTRIC VEHICLES AND THEIR CHARGERS

You will all be aware that science has concluded that what comes out of petrol cars (particulates and NoX gases) is the source of many serious illnesses. We need to clean up the air we breathe! So, the travelling public is being urged either to use public transport or to drive Electric vehicles (EVs) which emit a fraction of what petrol cars emit. The target is that by 2030 only EVs, and no petrol cars, will be sold. As a result, councils are trying to help the public by introducing electric chargers in easy reach for car owners.

Unfortunately, councils are struggling to persuade the big developers to put electric chargers into new developments. To build the old way is what these developers want to do as they make more money this way. But we are in a Climate Emergency so we must persuade developers to make the norm to put in electric chargers for all new houses, as well as to build sustainable houses with heat source pumps instead of gas boilers and with solar panels/tiles on the roofs to generate renewable energy. We must persuade the government to move faster to encourage developers to take this Climate Emergency more seriously so that we don't have to retrofit houses that are actually being built *as I write*.

What is the Vale Council doing?

Following a public consultation, the Vale of White Horse District Council's Cabinet have approved several changes to parking arrangements to help reduce vehicle emissions.

Last November almost 200 people commented in a consultation on proposed changes to the parking arrangements. At their meeting, on Friday 5 February, the council's Cabinet considered the results, and approved that the following measures will now be included in the district's new parking policy:

1) Reducing vehicle emissions

In Abingdon, lorries will no longer be able to park in Rye Farm car park, and specific spaces will be allocated for a coach and campervans in Hales Meadow car park. This popular move to free up more spaces in Rye Farm for smaller vehicles should encourage people visiting from the A415 to park here on edge of town rather than joining the traffic in the town centre, so helping to reduce congestion and improve air quality.

2) Encouraging electric vehicle use

The Vale is currently working with Oxfordshire County Council with a view to introduce electric vehicle charging bays in some district council car parks. If this happens then, under the new policy, parking enforcement officers will have new powers to fine motorists who park non-electric vehicles in electric charging bays, or who leave an electric vehicle parked in a charging bay when it's not charging.

Oxfordshire EV Infrastructure Strategy(OEVIS)

Recently, I have been put on the Member Steering group of the OEVIS and have been looking at 17 new policies which have been designed to encourage the public to move to EVs. They aim to make it easy for owners to charge their electric cars wherever they are and whatever the type of charging they need.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT YOUNG PEOPLE

There was an elderly gent on Any Answers last weekend whose opinions really worried me. Now that he had been vaccinated, he thought that he should be able to spend his pension on going back to the world travel he had been used to. Forgetting the problem of the impact his travelling would have on global warming, most people I know of my generation agree that, whilst we bask in the confidence that vaccination has given us, it is increasingly important that we spare a thought for our young people. Of course, it is right that vaccination has, so far, been focused on the most vulnerable, and that far more elderly people than young people have been hospitalised and died from Covid. But when society looks back at this period, I have no doubt that it will be the long term impact of Covid on younger people that will concern them most.

Young families with small children have been particularly badly affected. Trying to cope with home working, home schooling and lockdown have been a major challenge for them all. The stress on family life has affected almost every family to some extent. The potential long term damage of missed education is still not understood. Children are remarkably resilient, but we do not know what the long term damage to children's mental health will be. Confused and inconsistent announcements from the Department of Education have added to the stress felt by children and their parents. The impact of the A level fiasco on secondary age children has certainly not helped the confidence of young people, many of whom are not certain what their qualifications are worth. The stress on University and college students has been just as severe. Trying to manage accommodation lockdown, online learning, and how to pay fees are making many feel that further education is simply not worth it. Others choose to stick at it if only to wait for job prospects to improve.

Away from University and college, young people face excess competition for too few jobs. The rising unemployment in young people is very worrying. There is the potential for a 'lost generation' - potentially less wealthy and less healthy than their parents and grandparents, growing up with the threat of global warming and further pandemics. It would be very easy to become utterly depressed. What can we do about it? Much depends on national government, but there are things we can do locally and there are things that are already being done. This is not the first time I have written about the Damascus Youth Project which serves the villages of Drayton, Appleford, Milton, Sutton Courtenay and Steventon. With professionally qualified youth workers and funded by all the Parishes, young people in our area have a support system denied to many in Oxfordshire. This work has continued throughout the pandemic. Supporting, encouraging and believing in the power of young people to improve society, the work of Damascus has been noticed both locally and nationally.

For the first time, there was an acknowledgment in the recent budgets of all political parties that much more help was needed by young people than was currently on offer. We have moved on from the idea that youth work is simply about offering youth clubs everywhere. Valuable as they are, protecting and engaging with vulnerable young people is an activity requiring expertise. Trained experts, as offered by the Damascus Youth project, are the obvious way forward. It will, of course, require financing. Too much of Damascus's time is spent worrying about fund raising. Properly financed, they could reach far more young people.

So, well done Roxy, Rita and all of the Damascus team and thank you for all the work you do.

How can the rest of us help? Some of us could offer jobs and apprenticeships to young people. Having a job, any job, is an important part of building confidence and self esteem. If you have

a particular skill or position of influence, offer your services to Damascus who will always welcome it. All of us can help to make young people feel appreciated and that they are the future.

If this sounds like an angry rant, well it is. It is my generation that have created the mess. The least we can do is to stop worrying about our own, relatively fortunate selves and worry about the future of our young people.

MP'S REPORT

In the Armed Forces Bill Debate recently I was able to highlight our constituency's contribution to the country's efforts – not just in being home to institutions like the Defence Academy at Shrivenham and the 11 EOD and Search Regiment in Didcot – but in service by some of my predecessors, too. As most of you will know, when the seat was Abingdon the MP was Airey Neave, who had a proud record of service in World War 2; his predecessor was Ralph Glyn, who served in World War 1 and was awarded a military cross.

We were having the debate because since 1688,the consent of parliament has been required for the raising and keeping of a standing army. In modern times, this means that every 5 years parliament is asked to give consent to an Armed Forces Bill, without which there is no means to ensure service personnel obey orders. The Government used the Bill to do other things such as update the Service Justice System, extend the use of posthumous pardons for abolished sexual offences and further enshrine the Armed Forces Covenant in law. The latter means local authorities will have to have due regard to service in decisions they make about health, education and housing – and rightly so.

I take a particular interest in the armed forces as my dad served in the army for 18 years. The army has of course played a key role in our superb vaccination efforts – at the time of writing we have passed the Government's 15 million target, which is a remarkable achievement in such a short space of time. From volunteering several times I have seen first-hand the fantastic efforts of our medical staff and volunteers – and the relief local residents feel when they have their first jab.

I recently became one of the Conservative Environment Network's Net Zero Champions. What this means in practice is I will be campaigning for nature-based solutions to help tackle climate change, including stopping the sale of peat for use in horticulture, protecting and improving our blue carbon assets and undertaking a national capital audit. More on this in the future – and some other campaigns.

DON'T DESPAIR! CITIZENS ADVICE CAN HELP YOU WITH DEBT

When bills start piling up and multiplying, vague fears can turn into a paralysing panic for people experiencing money troubles. Turn to **Citizens Advice** (CA), which has eighty years of experience in pulling people back from precipices.



Start by assembling your bills and make an overall list, with relevant details like dates when payment is due. Sort the bills into priority debts (rent and mortgage arrears, Council Tax, gas and electricity, tax and National Insurance – and see www.citizensadvice.org/debt-and-money for a complete list) and non-priority debts (water rates – your supplier can't cut you off – credit card debts, unsecured

loans, hire purchases etc). Take the priority debts first and contact your creditors. Don't be afraid of this step. Many companies will be expecting you to get in touch, saying on the bill itself "We know that paying a bill can be difficult" or "Affected by Covid-19?" -and providing a telephone number or web link. Approach them with a constructive attitude, tell them you are actively tackling your debts, and perhaps ask them to suspend interest charges while you do so. They also might be amenable to letting you defer payment or pay smaller amounts over a longer time period. Ask about any special reductions – for example, the Warm Home Discount Scheme for electricity supplies (see www.gov.uk for more information).

If you need to compose a letter or email to a creditor, you could copy or adapt a template letter from the CA website. One especially useful letter asks creditors to give you more time.

If your circumstances have changed you might be able to claim benefits, or extra benefits. CA runs a Help to Claim programme (call **0800 144 8444**) and can guide you through all the stages. The Turn2us website at **turn2us.org.uk** will tell you what benefits you might be able to claim, and has details of grants available.

If you have an overdraft, talk to your bank. In the coronavirus age many banks are making concessions and charging no interest on overdrafts up to a certain amount. Contact your district council about a possible Council Tax reduction. And think creatively about ways of increasing your income. Could you rent out a spare room in your house, for instance?
