The Council's grant policy too can also be found there. Details of where to send the application are on the form. The deadline for submissions is 15th October, 2021. Applications received after that date, or not on the application form, will not be considered.

#### **Move Together**

Have you been shielding owing to the Covid 19 pandemic? Has your physical or mental health and wellbeing been negatively impacted by Covid 19? Move Together is new for Oxfordshire and is here to support you to move more, to help improve your physical health, mental health and wellbeing. The programme can offer support, advice and guidance tailored to what you need in the way you need it. #### **Garden Waste Update**

At the time of writing, the suspension of the garden waste collection is still continuing. It is rare that the District Council has to activate the business continuity plan, but it is intended to protect other kerbside waste collection from significant disruption. The District Council offers apologies to the garden waste customers. They are continuing to monitor the situation with Biffa, but unfortunately, at the moment, there has been no significant change to the driver shortage situation.

#### Council tax checks on single person households

If you currently claim the single person household discount on your council tax, you should receive a letter from the District Council to check that there is still just one person living in the property, and that you are paying the correct amount of council tax. Anyone who thinks they are eligible to receive the Council Tax reduction and

# Planning Applications considered by the

P21/V1806/HH Front and side extensions and alterations to garage at 5 Hyde Copse. The Council had concerns regarding the loss of on site parking.

P21/V0564/FUL Widening access into Manor Farm field, off A415. Council wanted a restriction imposed that if permission were given, it would be used for agricultural purposes only. Concerns were raised regarding access onto the busy A415 and the material proposed for the road

P21/V1238/FUL Single storey extension to The Nursery, 1 Barrow Close, and increase in the number of children accommodated. Council expressed concern regarding access to the site off Morland Road given the number of pedestrian movements, and increased parking needs.

P21/V1846/O Erection of semi-detached dwelling at 19 Mill Road. The Council commented that there had been flooding in the vicinity in the past. It wanted assurances from the County Council that it was content for 3 properties to share the same driveway. and wished to see parking and amenity space indicated.

P21/V1928/HH Conversion of garage to habitable accommodation and erection of conservatory at 22 Gozzards Ford. The Council wished materials to be compatible with the listed structure, and wished to know where the replacement parking following the conversion was to be located. It would not wish to see the accommodation become an independent residential unit.

P21/V0965/FUL Steel framed external storage unit at Oxford Instruments, A338. The Council had no objections provided the District Council's environment and tree officers were happy that there was no adverse impact.

There is a Covid Vaccine Passport scam email going around that purports to be from the NHS and informs recipients that they can apply for their "Digital Coronavirus Passports"

Clicking on the link within the email, takes you to a convincing but fake NHS website that asks for personal and payment details *for an admin fee.* When one website is taken down, it is likely that similar emails/websites will appear.

Vaccination status is obtained FREE through the NHS App, website or by calling the NHS on 119 and they will **NEVER** ask for your PIN or payment details.

District Council

Dear residents

The parish council has reported to us that there is a growing dog fouling issue across our districts.

Although there are many benefits that come with owning a dog (especially during lockdown), there are also responsibilities which include cleaning up after your dog. Please be aware that it is an offence to not clean up after your dog or leave used dog waste bags anywhere other than in an appropriate bin. Under the Dog Fouling of Land Act 1996, allowing your dog to foul can result in an on-the-spot fixed penalty notice of £50 and incorrect disposal of dog waste bags e.g. not putting them in the bin can result in an £80 fixed penalty notice. If fines are not paid, cases can be escalated to court resulting in fines of up to £1,000.

There are some council owned litter bins within your parish. These can be used for both litter and dog waste bags – you do not need to find a specialist dog waste bin. You can also put dog waste bags in your black general waste wheelie bin so if you cannot find a bin or bins are full, please take it home.

We know that most residents take a lot of pride in their local area and we encourage everybody to take extra steps in keeping your parish clean and tidy.

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## INDEPENDENT DIABETES TRUST



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The past months have been difficult for all of us but for people with diabetes and other long-term conditions, it has been especially difficult. It has also been an anxious time for people with diabetes for several reasons, for example because they have been unable to have their routine health checks. This can result in difficulty sleeping.

Many of us have the odd restless night and although it may leave us feeling tired and irritable the next day, it does not have the negative impact that long-term disturbed or poor quality sleep has on our health. Most of us need between 7 and 9 hours sleep per night and getting more or less than these amounts can cause of a range of health problems, some of which are more serious than others. They can include sleep apnoea, heart disease, obesity, stress and depression.

The InDependent Diabetes Trust has published a new booklet, 'Diabetes – The Importance of Sleep', which discusses the benefits of improving the quality of sleep, how to get more sleep and also change their habits to try to make longer term improvements. The booklet also discusses Restless Leg Syndrome, a common disorder that can affect anyone and causes people to want to move their legs, again this can lead to long sleepless nights.

#### DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT WHY IT IS IMPORTANT THAT MARCHAM MAKES A NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

When I first became the District Councillor for Marcham in 2013, I was struck at how vulnerable it was to developers putting in Planning applications on possible sites in the village, as it did not have any legal powers to say where it wanted any development to happen. But at that time your Parish Council was very involved with another development ... your new village hall ... which needed much guidance and expertise to help it along a very rocky path. Now that development has been completed and we have a spanking new hall on Anson Field, the Parish Council is looking at developing a Neighbourhood Plan, which is a right it was afforded through the Localism Act of 2011.

A **Neighbourhood Plan** will give Marcham direct powers to develop a shared vision for its neighbourhood and help shape the development and growth of the local area. It will not stop development in the village, but instead of developers or land owners deciding where houses should be built, Marcham village can have a major say in where it wants new homes, shops and offices to be built, and in what those new buildings should look like and what infrastructure should be provided. It provides a powerful set of tools for the local people to plan for the types of development to meet their community's needs and where the ambition of the neighbourhood is aligned with the strategic needs and priorities of the wider local area.

I think it is even more important for Marcham to have a neighbourhood plan now, as it looks as if the government may be reducing the say of local people in the forthcoming planning white paper. A Neighbourhood Plan will be the main way local people can be heard and in the long run this is recognized in the work that is going on in the OxPlan 2050, the future plan for Oxfordshire.

The Local Council is very keen to assist villages and towns to make their own Neighbourhood Plan ... all that is needed is the willingness of locals to volunteer to help shape and make a plan. # WEEKLY TIPS ON REDUCING YOUR PERSONAL CARBON FOOTPRINT FOR THIS MONTH

I wonder how many of you have been following this **Friends of the Earth** advice? Personally, I have to make a real effort to remember, but the more of us who try to remember, then the smaller will be our carbon footprint. Imagine how big the reduction would be if everybody joined in! This month we are focusing on clothes and how we shop for and wash our clothes.

Keep for longer How long we wear our clothes for has reduced drastically (36%) whereas clothing production has doubled. This "fast fashion" – buying cheaper clothes more regularly – results in many clothes being thrown away within a year. Inevitably, this puts pressure on resources, pollutes the environment, creates waste and increases global carbon emissions. By spending a bit more on clothes that will last (as Coco Chanel once said, 'Fashion goes out of fashion, style never does'), your clothing use increases and your clothing purchases decrease, helping to reduce your carbon footprint whilst saving money in the long run.

Recycle or Give to Charity If you have some clothing which you think still has some life left in them but they do not fit you any longer or you have fallen out of love with them, then take them to a charity shop. But if your clothing is spoilt or unusable, then parcel it up in a bag and leave it out on top of the recycling bin for the council to pass on for rags. None of your clothes should go to landfill via the black bin.

Washing and Drying our Clothes accounts for 120 million tonnes of CO<sub>2</sub> each year! So, try to avoid Plastic Micro Fibres. As you ensure that any new (or second-hand) clothes that you buy are built to last, consider the material that the clothes are made out of. Polyester, acrylic and nylon clothing shed plastic micro fibres during each wash which then pollute the ocean. Buying clothes made from natural material such as wool and linen, that do not pollute and will eventually biograde, can help reduce your environmental impact.

Wash Smart In the UK we have improved at washing at lower temperatures, but further savings can be made, by ensuring to wash certain clothes (such as jeans and jumpers) less often, and putting more garments into each wash. If you can hang dry as much as possible. By turning the washer down from 40 to 30 degrees and hang drying rather than tumble drying, can bring the emissions per wash down from 2.4kg CO<sub>2</sub>e to 0.6kg CO<sub>2</sub>e\*.

\*The convention is to express a carbon footprint in terms of carbon dioxide equivalent or CO<sub>2</sub>e.

That's it for now.

#### **COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT**

Some reflections on watching villages grow.

One of the major concerns of those who sat down to begin the Drayton Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) nearly 10 years ago now, was the need for the village to be more interconnected as this would generate a better sense of community. For decades village planning had been obsessed with all homes being immediately connected to the main highways. This led to endless ribbon developments with people living far apart from one another. The villages of Drayton, Sutton Courtenay and Appleford have all suffered. The Drayton NDP has ensured that each of the three main new developments is well connected within and also the main highways. There are now a range of interesting circular walks all round the village.

The new developments in Sutton Courtenay are less well connected to each other and the distances some have to walk to get to village services are a challenge, particularly to the elderly. The concerns of residents at one end of the village are often very different from those at the other end. Appleford has the same issues but being a much smaller village, generating a feeling of community is less of a challenge.

**Marcham** is rather different and, in planning terms is far more compact. Whilst like all families, Marcham is not above disagreeing with itself, it is not surprising that Marcham generally has a strong village community feeling. However, even here there have been issues within some of the new developments over some residents resisting planned connecting roads and paths.

The Drayton experience is that connecting roads and paths is the secret to generating functioning communities.

Covid has made it easier for all of us to hide from each other and to stop meeting and talking to one another. However, our village communities and their Covid Groups have done a magnificent job in minimising this damage. Indeed, our communities are probable better at caring for each other than ever before. As we come out of the pandemic, it would be tragic to slip back behind our front doors. There are very powerful economic reasons for encouraging working from home but not at the expense of community life.

#### Holiday news

. The long awaited "build out" on Drayton Rd, Sutton Courtenay has now been agreed and is funded. Various legalities have to

be gone through, but the project should be fully operational by spring next year.

- 2. The application for Mill Rd Bridge has been passed and work should begin shortly. This will restore the pedestrian path between Drayton and Marcham.
- 3. The repainting of all the white lines on the Milton interchange roundabout will be done in September.
- 4. Appleford continues to fight for an adjustment to the new HIF Road. We expect to be see the formal application very soon.
- 5. In common with many councils across the country, the national shortage of HGV drivers, together with the "pingdemic", has led to the temporary suspension of the Brown Bin service for the month of August in order to ensure there is no threat to other waste services. It is hoped to be able to reinstate the garden waste collection in early September. In the meantime, residents are asked to be patient and take their garden waste to the Drayton recycling depot where possible.

#### MP'S REPORT

I held a very productive pre-COP26 summit for Wantage and Didcot constituents this month. We had a great range of speakers, including the CEO of the independent Climate Change Committee. Interesting fact: the UK is currently 20 years ahead of the global average for cutting emissions, as well as cutting them faster than the other G20 countries. It won't surprise you that the way we build houses featured regularly.

I put the event on because tackling climate change is very important to me, very important to a significant number of constituents and we have a big opportunity to demonstrate leadership when the world's leaders come to Glasgow for the actual UN summit in November. It was also a great chance to showcase good local organisations like Greencore Construction, Westmill Wind and Solar and the Earth Trust. I am sending a summary of the concerns and ideas raised at the event to Alok Sharma, President of COP26, and will let everyone know how he responds.

As you might have seen, I held my debate in parliament on Royal Mail's performance recently, making clear again that I don't blame their workers for the problems. The following day I visited the Didcot Delivery Office. It's clear that Royal Mail HQ have taken the criticisms seriously and have worked to try and improve the service – many people have told me it has. But you should let me know if you continue to encounter problems.

My first '10 minute rule bill' will be on behalf of the AEAT Pension Campaign. This constituency has more of the AEAT Pensioners than any other constituency and they were all encouraged – via assurances that turned out to be false – to transfer to a pension scheme that has meant their pensions are now worth considerably less than they should be. It is a tale that sounds familiar, but a unique case in that it was advice from the Government's Actuary Department in the 1990s that was strengthened to encourage the transfer and, at the moment, the advice can't be investigated as the Ombudsman in question doesn't have the powers to. The Bill would enable the Ombudsman to investigate the advice given and was first introduced by Ed Vaizey not long before he stood down. It is a long and difficult route to pass a law this way, but I am full of admiration for the campaigners who have been dogged in seeking to right the wrong.

Recess is fast approaching. I will be back home in Didcot for most of it, albeit working, contrary to the suggestion MPs are on holiday! In addition to regular meetings, surgery appointments and visits, I'll be holding some roundtables on issues constituents have raised repeatedly with me (including on GP appointments) and trying to attend as many of the events that couldn't take place last

year as I can – let me know if you think there is a good one for me to attend near you.

#### ABINGDON RESERVOIR – LATEST NEWS FROM GARD

Despite restrictions, GARD has continued to monitor the activities of the water companies, engage with local and national stakeholders and provide informed and robust opposition to the proposed reservoir.

As a result of GARD and others' opposition, the regulators have required the water companies to undertake research to evaluate the reservoir and alternative strategies, before a final recommendation can be made. This is a 'gated process' which is when projects are phased, each phase marked by a 'gate' at which reports are provided to decision makers who then decide on next steps.

Gate One reports are now available for all options, but, most importantly, the reservoir (now being called 'South East Strategic Reservoir Option – SESRO), London Effluent Reuse and Severn – Thames Transfer. The reports are, in our view, flawed. Figures are quoted with almost no justification, there is no reference to key documents relating to embedded and operational carbon budgets, capital and operational costs, resilience claims and, most crucially, no reference to recent flooding studies. In all three reports, the proposal is to advance the projects to Gate Two. GARD has now submitted a detailed response to the Gate One reports. The reports, and our response, can be read here. http://www.abingdonreservoir.org.uk/downloads.html

GARD's response also expresses concerns that the documents were released in an opaque manner and without, as far as we know, any notification to local Oxfordshire organisations who have asked to be kept informed throughout the process. This all indicates that OFWAT and RAPID (the umbrella group that brings the regulators together) are not committed to a transparent process.
