Christmas Tree Recycling

For those of you who have real Christmas trees, and are signed up to the District Council's garden waste service, your trees, when you no longer need them, can be put out next to the brown bin provided they are less than 6 ft or 1.8m. They need to be cut into sections if taller than this. If you are not part of the garden waste scheme, and do not have a brown bin, then your real Christmas tree can be taken to the Drayton Recycling Centre, to Millets Farm or placed on the hardstanding by the Salvation Army Textile bank in Howard Cornish Road (opposite Duffield Place). Trees will be collected from Millets Farm on Sunday 9th January, 2022 and from the hardstanding next to the Textile bank on Thursday 20th January. Trees will need to be left, at the latest, the day before collection. Predictions are that it will be a cold and possibly snowy winter, so keep an eye on the District Council's website / social media for any collection updates.

Please also remember to observe the Government's Covid 19 regulations in force at the time when in public areas.

Parishioner of the Year

The Council is again considering the possibility of an award for 2021, to be presented at the annual meeting of electors should one be able to be held in Spring next year. The Award recognises the efforts of local people who at any time have significantly contributed to life within the parish. Previous nominations have been carried forward, however the Council would invite anyone who wishes to put forward a new suggestion, to submit a short statement of not more than 200 words, as to whom he/she wishes to nominate, and the reasons why the person should receive the award. All nominations to be emailed to the Clerk at the email address below. The Council, owing to Covid 19, was unable to give an award for the past 2 years, and the names of those previously nominated will be carried forward and considered this year along with any new nominations.

Grant Applications

Applications for grants were considered at the November meeting of the Parish Council. The Council awards grants, subject to certain conditions, where there is benefit for the residents of Marcham. The Council was pleased to be able to support the following organisations:

Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal - £120 South and Vale Citizens Advice Bureau -£1000 towards running costs

Other applications Marcham from Community Group and Be Free Young Carers were deferred to a future meeting, to allow for additional information to be sought.

Christmas Tree - Village Green

To bring seasonal cheer to the village and to raise spirits during the period of the continued pandemic, the Council is again planning to site a Christmas tree on the village green. It has also been investigating the possibility of planting a bare-rooted one for future years, so that it can grow gradually and be left in situ.

GigaClear - cabinets

A large cabinet to serve the proposed new ultra fast broadband has been sited at the junction of Parkside and New Road. This location is in the conservation area and close to a listed structure. The Parish Council has asked the Vale of White Horse District Council to investigate.

Primary School Admission September 2022 – Is your child 3 or 4 years old?

If you are a parent or carer of a child born between 1st September 2017 and 31st August 2018 (inclusive) then you need to apply for a primary school place. You still have to apply even if your child already attends a nursery attached to the school. For further information and to apply online to https://www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/ primary admissions The closing date for applications is 15th January, 2022. If you do not have immediate internet access, then you can access the internet at many of the County Council's libraries when they are open.

Oxfordshire County Council - Road Closure North Street - Advanced notice

It is likely that the section of North Street A415 The Crown public house to the vehicle access into Sweetbriar will be closed between 10th January 2022 to 14th January 2022 to allow for replacement gas main. A bus diversion will be in operation.

Thames Water - New Reservoir

Thames Water is still active in proposing a new reservoir south of Marcham. The Council has written to Rapid (Regulators' Alliance for Progressing Infrastructure Development) to maintain the Council's view that the need for the reservoir has not been justified, and that alternative measures such as river transfer should continue to be fully explored.





A good way to create strong, memorable passwords is by using three random words. But remember, don't use words that can be guessed (like your pet's name). You can include numbers and symbols if you need to. For example, "RedPantsTree4!"

2: Saving passwords in your browser

Saving your password in your browser means letting your web browser (such as Chrome, Safari or Edge) remember your password for you.

This can help:

- make sure you do not lose or forget your passwords
- protect you against some cyber crime, such as fake websites It is safer than using weak passwords, or using the same password in more than one place.

3: Email account passwords

If a hacker gets into your email account, they could:

- reset your other online account passwords
- access personal information you have saved about yourself or your business

Your email password should be strong and different from all your other passwords. This will make it harder to crack or guess.

We asked Katherine Johnson and Marion Belcher about their last 25 years serving the community at Marcham Primary School.

When did you start at Marcham school (and in what role?)

Katherine: I started teaching at Marcham in September 1995 in the reception and year 1 class. At that time, I was a class teacher but became a Governor during my first year and also 'Senior Teacher' at the end of my first year.

Marion: My son Seb was at the school when I joined for a couple of months as a helper (or Teaching Assistant) in the Morland Class in November 1996. In January 1997, my daughter Alex joined as a 'Rising Five' and I moved across to my role as a Lunchtime Supervisor.

What is your fondest memory from the last 25 years?

Katherine: That is a difficult one – but I think my fondest memories are 3 musical occasions (apart from all the in-school concerts, shows and carol services). The school was part of a massed Oxfordshire choir at the Schools' Proms at the Royal Albert Hall on 2 occasions. They were both fantastic occasions and the children we took were amazing, sang beautifully and enjoyed the whole atmosphere. I was very proud of them. The other was a similar occasion in Birmingham Symphony Hall to celebrate a big anniversary of the Oxfordshire County Music Service.

Marion: Gosh, I have loads! I have many happy memories because I went to the school and so did both of my children. I guess that is my fondest memory - the years I worked in the school while my children went there and seeing them every day.

What has changed about Marcham School over the last 25 years?

Are People Still Interested in Gardens?

I was asked only last week, having been writing these pieces since 1998, and only missing one deadline (when my mother passed), "Are people still interested in doing anything with their



gardens, apart from putting down decking, that often becomes a slippery death trap when damp, or putting down hard standing for off-road parking?".

In my experience, few people don't appreciate the great outdoors, but the numbers are growing that could be considered in various ways, to be disconnected from it. Giving rise at times, I notice, to a lack of imagination with what to grow, or even fears that gardening is hard. I've seen inexperienced gardeners take on new gardens, with huge bouts of vigour, and experiencing success and disappointment in equal measure; whilst experienced gardeners would be happy with the ratio of 50% success and 50% perceived failure. When starting out though, even the slightest amount of disappointment, or perceived failure, can make gardening newbies give up, and down tools.

It's always worth pushing through and persisting during this initial apprenticeship. Go on, have a second go, a third, or even, dare I say it, a fourth go. As many goes as needed is my approach, and instead of seeing barriers, start to see opportunity, everywhere.

So, no, I don't think people are disinterested in gardens and gardening. They just need encouragement and clearly defined pathways, to what is perceived as successful gardening, and the inevitable green fingers will soon arise. That encouragement I mention, in part, comes from us established, experienced gardeners

It's very often an underpaid and under valued profession, with many who work in it not believing they can charge good rates and earn a good living from it. Conversely, I've had many potential clients come my way who don't like paying gardeners good rates, and saving their money for the other trades. If you are starting out in gardening, though, and speak to an experienced gardener for advice, it'll soon be obvious they are worth their weight in Marigolds.



DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT WHAT ARE THE RULES AROUND BURNING WOOD?

The other day a load of logs, dried for 2 years, were dumped on our driveway ready to stack in the garage for our wood-burner. I imagine the same thing is happening up and down the UK, but the question is what are the rules around burning wood now?

There is nothing more enjoyable than to sit in front of a roaring wood fire, but now we know that burning wood, most particularly wet or green wood, produces air pollution. We are told that by 2016, home wood burning was the second-largest source of particle pollution emitted in London. By 2018, it was responsible for nearly half the emissions across Europe.

So, does that mean that we have to stop burning wood and throw away our wood burning fires?

Wood and coal is being phased out under a new law, which became law in May 2021. It states that wood that is sold for domestic use in volumes of 2 cubic metres or more, now must have a moisture content of less than 20%. So, this means that wood has to be air dried and stored under cover for at least a year, and better still for 2 years, to ensure that the moisture content is well below 20%. Kiln dried wood is even better as it gives out very little moisture.

So, at present, we can burn very dry wood in our wood burners but not green wood. We have to keep an eye on this for the future.

COUNCILLORS BACK EXPANSION OF OXFORD STATION AND OXFORD BROOKES ACCOMMODATION.

The planning committee of Oxford City Council has backed Network Rail's £69m plan to build a fifth platform and new entrance at Oxford Station, paving the way for Network Rail to bid for funding from the Department for Transport. Councillors approved a prior approval application, meaning full planning permission will still be needed. Councillors also approved Oxford Brookes University's plans to demolish and rebuild student housing at its Clive Booth Student Village in Headington - with the development expected to increase the number of students living at the site from around 640 now to around 1,200.

EPI-PENS COULD BE INSTALLED IN PUBLIC PLACES

A report from independent advisory body the Commission on Human Medicines has recommended that EpiPens and other adrenaline auto-injectors be placed in public places, such as restaurants, in the same way that defibrillators are increasingly being installed for public use, to help save the lives of people suffering from potentially deadly allergic reactions. The Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency is to send the proposal out for public consultation.

The next 4 weekly tips to fight the Climate Emergency

- 1) Clean Green recycling This is an area where many people can get confused and can inadvertently contaminate a whole load of waste. Here is a quick list of what should not be recycled but commonly is: oven glassware and wine glasses, greasy pizza boxes, coffee cups, used kitchen rolls and tissues, nappies (!!), plastic bags, soft plastic packaging (thin plastic packaging for fruit and veg snacks etc), cling film and crisp packets. If you are unsure if a material can be recycled, then quickly check the label and if it doesn't say then don't recycle it, to prevent it from contaminating your load. Remember that other items such as textiles, electronics and food waste can be recycled through separate processes.
- 2) Rinse it Any residue food or drink left on the recycling is contamination. If there is sufficient contamination in a load then it will all be rejected. Simply rinse out your cans, bottles and containers before putting them in the recycling to remove this residue. It doesn't take long and it will help to ensure you recycle as efficiently as possible, reduce your carbon impact and save the

- council money by reducing the need for unnecessary sorting. To save water, rinse them using the left-over water from your washing up. Make sure it dries before putting it in the recycling as water contaminates any paper/cardboard in there.
- 3) Consider what you eat Why not take the challenge and go vegetarian (or even vegan) for a week. Meat consumption contributes significantly to our global carbon footprint, and a recent study (https://www.nu3.com/c/food-carbon-footprint-index-2018/) found that in the UK switching to a non-animal diet can reduce your carbon footprint by 163.86 kg CO2e per year! Check out the National Vegetarian Week (nationalvegetarianweek.org/recipes/) website for a selection of recipe ideas to get you started.
- 4) Remember to use in season, local food To assist in reducing the impact of your food on the climate, you are advised to eat what is in season and locally grown. Avoiding air freighting and greenhouses when buying your food can reduce the footprint of your food by 10%, so that little extra thought into your food can go a long way.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Blah blah blah - Does it serve a purpose?

The numbers of relatively new arrivals to the Climate Emergency issue in recent weeks and years has been truly staggering. In the past week alone, I have been asked to sign up to several new local and regional pressure groups. They are all very unhappy with the rate of progress towards climate targets. It's not always clear how they propose we get there, but I am sympathetic with almost all of them.

That we still have not scrapped plans for a new Cumbrian coal mine or developing a new oil field off Shetland is very disappointing. Locally, trying to marry the carbon output of all our planned road building or the proposed Thames Water reservoir with our own local carbon targets is hard to justify. I am as frustrated and anxious as anyone.

Almost no one believes that COP26 has solved the problem. Most people are frustrated at the gaps in what has been agreed and wanted more from the event. But that surely is the point, COP was never an event it was part of a process. The Paris COP's main ambition of getting us down to a 1.5% temperature increase remains the target. COP26 was ever only the next step. The size of the step may disappoint many but what matters now is the size of the steps that still need to be taken to achieve the target and can we all agree to take them in time.

On the plus side, there are people in this country and around the world who have been working day in, day out to try to make COP 26 a success. Those efforts will continue. Meanwhile, the protests and the pressure will continue to build. You and I can continue to adapt our lifestyles – less flying, less meat eating, moving to EVs and the rest whilst calling on our Government (and our local councils) to strive harder.

Greta is right to be angry with Blah, blah, blah, but even Blah, blah, blah can play a part.

As long as it continues, the issue is in the headlines and the

pressure will be maintained. The pressure on the negotiators and representatives at COP26 has been relentless and has been an important part of the process. Those nations and organisations resisting making necessary changes are being increasingly exposed. Having spent the last 50 years not talking enough about a problem many knew was there, some Blah, blah, blah is welcome.

HIF1 Didcot Thames link road

The consultation period for the HIF1 Rd has been extended into 2022 giving people the chance to voice their opinions and suggestions. It is a massive proposal with different issues all along its length. The planning application is aimed to be heard by the OCC Planning Committee in late Spring 2022. Given that the applicant is OCC Highways, it will be important to maintain the independence of OCC's Planning system.

Thames Water Reservoir

Both County and Vale Councils have come out against this proposal at least/until the case for need has been proved and been thoroughly tested by independent scientific and hydrological experts. There is also a demand to see the methodology used by TW in calculating the carbon output of building and running the facility.

MP'S REPORT

I have no second job or outside earnings, so there are no allegations about me breaking the lobbying rules or using my parliamentary office for activities that earn me money on the side. But, while I'm not directly affected by the allegations being made at members of all parties, I want to defend my (still relatively new) profession. People who break the rules should be punished, but the vast majority of us have obeyed all the rules. No-one wins when MPs themselves push the line that we've got to be restrained from chasing outside money so that we focus on our constituencies; almost all of us have been focusing on our constituencies seven days a week. Talented people are already put off becoming MPs by the long hours, abuse, increasing personal risk and the association with the expenses scandal which most of us were not involved in – the tone of the current debate is making this worse.

I attended several activities to mark Remembrance Day this year, beginning with laying a poppy on a GWR train on its way to London on the 11th November. I also attended 2 very moving services in Wallingford and Didcot on Remembrance Sunday. Both services were, as ever, poignant. In the wake of Sir David Amess' murder, there was an increased police presence for me and other MPs around the country, which was a little unsettling, but they were excellent all day.

Some quick updates on a few local issues. I know people are concerned about the number of houses that will be agreed by council leaders as part of the Oxfordshire Plan 2050. I made clear when briefed by them that there is no appetite whatsoever for some of the large numbers being talked about given how many houses South and Vale have already had and the lack of infrastructure development alongside these. On the reservoir proposal, I have written supporting GARD's core arguments that Thames Water have failed to consult the local community properly and failed to demonstrate the need for it. On my Grove Station campaign, we unfortunately weren't successful in the latest round of funding – only 13/89 bids were – but we've received feedback and I will keep going until we are.

On the business break-ins in the Faringdon area, I have visited some of the businesses affected and taken up the issue with several people, including our Police and Crime Commissioner, who will visit soon with the head of the relevant crime taskforce. On the shortage of GP appointments and medical services relative to our

population, I am meeting Sajid Javid, Secretary of State for Health and Social Care, to discuss our needs and hope to hold a debate in parliament on this shortly.


