MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL Annual Meeting of Electors

The Annual meeting of electors currently is scheduled to take place on Tuesday 17th May, 7.30 p.m. in the new village hall. The guest speaker this year is Mr. Ricardo Rios, a planning policy officer, from the Vale of White Horse District Council who will outline ways that communities can influence the planning of the area in which they live and work. The talk should provide a very interesting introduction to Neighbourhood Planning, as communities can have direct power to develop a shared vision for their area. There is more housing proposed for sites near Kingston Bagpuize and at Dalton Barracks, plus long standing topics such as a by-pass for Marcham and Thames Water's reservoir at the south of the parish. So it is very timely to think about what happens in the parish and the immediate area beyond it.

Tanya Rosenfeld - Resignation

The Council was sorry to hear of the resignation from the Council of Tanya Rosenfeld. The Chairman has thanked Tanya for her valued contribution to the Council and village. Her efforts on behalf of the community were much appreciated.

Casual Vacancy

Following Tanya's decision to step down from the Parish Council, there is a now a vacancy to be filled. Whilst the Council is currently waiting to hear whether a formal parish election is required or not to fill the seat, it is inviting anyone interested in joining the Council to contact the Parish Clerk whose details are below, for further information about the role. Anyone appointed would serve until May 2023 when the next Parish Council elections are due to take place. So this is an opportunity for one year to learn more about what goes on in the area and to contribute to the community.

Oxfordshire County Council - Highways

A reminder that Parish Councillor James Plumb acts as the County Council's trained "highway super user" who can raise direct works orders for fixing potholes and kerbing issues on unclassified roads of less than 30 mph, provided the issue meets certain criteria. The alternative way of reporting those matters, and other highway issues, is via "fix my street" www.fixmystreet.com

Planning applications

P/22/V0252 2 storey front extension and single storey rear extension at 29 Kings Avenue. The Council had no objections P22/V0159/LB Repair and restoration works to lean-to roof including rainwater goods at 44 North Street. The Council had no objections P22/V0246/FUL Erection of open fronted steel frame portal building with walls and roof clad in steel box profile sheeting. Land adjacent to White Hart Wood, Blackgate Lane.

The Council expressed concerns regarding the access along a narrow byway, possible damage to trees and old dry stone walls, the size of the building and impact on the public footpath, and access off the highway.

P22/V0348/FUL, P22/V0351/LB, P22/V0352/HH and P22/V0353/LB Conversion of barn to new 3 bed dwelling and formation of new access drive with erection of 2 bay open port garage at 12 Frilford Road. Council had no objections provided the applications were the same as previously approved.

MW.0014/22 S. 73 application for the continuation of development without complying with condition 1 on MW.0119/15 for the extraction and processing of soft building sand to enable amendments to the sequencing of working in field 2 at Hills Aggregates Quarry. The Council expressed concern regarding the impact on the Site of Special Scientific Interest and the Cothill nature reserves.



Bess of Hardwick is one of the most fascinating women of the sixteenth century. Four times married, she survived scandal and disgrace, and, through ambition and ability, climbed the social ladder to become England's premier countess and, arguably, the second richest woman in the kingdom. She was by turns a builder, a dynast and an intriguer. A friend of Elizabeth I, sometime gaoler to Mary, Queen of Scots, and grandmother to a potential queen, Bess moved deftly in and out of the pages of Elizabethan history. This lecture tells Bess's story: the story of a woman who simply did not know her place!

Plant sales helped to brighten up this area of our garden – nearly all the plants came from these sales.





Did you know that it is estimated that 70% of all food that is thrown away in the UK comes from ordinary households?

Did you know that it is estimated that an average family of four could save £720 a year by NOT putting food into our black bags? What a waste of money, let alone the damage the carbon from wasted food is doing to the atmosphere.



and about during the Food Waste Action Week (7th - 11th March) giving some practical advice to residents.

Love Food Hate Waste offer some excellent tips to help us, which can be achieved from our own kitchens:

- Make a list! Buy only what you need and then eat what you buy.
- Use or freeze leftovers cooked too much for tonight's dinner?
 It could be lunch tomorrow (or in a month's time if you use your freezer).
- Turn your fridge down keep it to 5 degrees or lower to keep your food fresher for longer.
- Freeze what you won't eat you can freeze items up to and including their use by date.
- Talking of which Keep an eye on date labels the main one to look out for is use by as this refers to safety issue. You should not eat food past use by date. This is not the same as best before which refers to quality and sell by which is a note for retailers.
 Two more points which could help reduce food wastage are:
- If you have food waste you cannot use such as fruit and vegetable peelings, tea bags and coffee grounds then you could try home composting and use it to improve the soil in your garden.
- If you have in-date excess food that you cannot use, then you could donate it to a local community fridge or food bank.

I hope these tips are useful and maybe you might have others which could help us. Do let me know so that I can spread the word.

CLIMATE ACTION FUND


Here is a really exciting opportunity for any group, young or old, which is interested to 'do its bit' to help tackle climate change. The Vale of White Horse is setting up a new grant of £50,000 to help voluntary groups with their projects, and they can access anything from £250 to £5,000 per project. The basic rules are:

- Projects must take place within Vale of White Horse district for the benefit of Vale residents.
- You can apply for revenue costs or capital items.
- We can fund up to 100 per cent of the total cost of a project (budget permitting).
- The project must complete within 12 months of the award decision
- Any unallocated budgets at the end of the financial year will return to the council's general reserves.
- The scheme will be open for one round.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

As I write the Thames Water/Water Resources South East consultation on (amongst other things) the proposed 4 square mile, 30m high reservoir is about to close. Thanks largely to the efforts of GARD (Group against Reservoir Development) there have been hundreds of responses from individuals, organised meetings and presentations in all the villages immediately affected + questions and a debate in the House of Commons. It is



rare to find such unanimity of feeling from well informed residents, Councils and MPs against a major infrastructure proposal. This will be the third attempt by Thames Water to get this proposal through. Each time it has cost the public purse millions. At least this time around the arguments against are better funded and well organised. The "gated" process for decision making may go on for many months more, but hopefully the final decision will finally remove the threat of Europe's largest above ground reservoir supplying water to London and Southern Water being built in Oxfordshire.

The proposed new road (HIF Rd) between Didcot, the Thames and the Golden Balls roundabout, is the other major hot topic for local Councils of all levels. Decision time is almost upon us and there is still some disagreement about the best way ahead. Originally conceived more than 10 years ago as a means of alleviating the traffic congestion - present and future - generated by so much housing development around Didcot and the surrounding area, there have been many changes and events which have made many doubt the original assumptions. Changes in population forecasts, the arrival of new Local Plans, changes in Council administrations, increasing awareness of the Climate Emergency, Covid and (yes) Brexit have created a very different world. Are roads and new road-building the best solution in a world fighting climate change? Urgent discussion of alternatives - better bus services, more focus on Active travel, possible Light Rail lines – are all being considered. Everyone wants to find a 21st century solution that fixes the problem for the foreseeable future and one that is flexible enough to cope with rapidly changing demands.

On the plus side, and just at the moment there is a distinct lack of plus sides, our local science and technology and its development continues to be the envy of most of the country. Advances at Harwell and Culham and MEPC continue to make world news while Milton Park is leading the way on local traffic initiatives.

With a Ukrainian son-in-law, I am painfully aware of how events in Ukraine are on everyone's mind. It is extraordinary how it has brought the West together and how local people are accepting that the world economy will take a hit, but that is nothing to what Ukraine, its residents and its President are coping with. While we wait for Government to get a workable system together, people wishing to offer help and accommodation are encouraged to contact VWHDC who have a growing list of those interested.

And, together with all the above, Councils and Councillors are working hard to address all their regular issues – parking, roads and highways, environmental health, housing and *never forget dog poo. RICHARD WEBBER* Cllr OCC SC & Marcham Division.

MP'S REPORT

I am writing this at home, having caught Covid. I am pretty sure I had it right at the start of the pandemic, in early 2020, but it was before the testing regime we developed so I can't know for sure. This time, I've definitely had the 2 lines, confirmed by a PCR. It isn't pleasant but I've had all 3 jabs and so I mostly have symptoms of a head cold and fatigue.



I have a partner but being at home alone all day makes me think of 2 things: firstly, how hard it must be to be on your own all the time. If you can, please volunteer for organisations like the Didcot Good Neighbour Scheme, through which I see a widower each week. The second thing I'm reminded of is what a vital job all the various community groups did during

the pandemic to support their neighbours.

You may or may not know that PMQs are predominately allocated by electronic ballot the week before they take place. Having been drawn for only 1 PMQ in my first 25 months, I was then drawn for a further 2 in just 3 weeks. The first I used to raise the lack of new GP surgeries we've had to support all the new houses that have been built. The second I used to raise the reservoir proposal, a shadow of uncertainty over the Steventon, Hanneys and Drayton area for over 2 decades now.

For all the yah boo politics PMQs has long been criticised for, it remains the best place to raise a local issue as it a rare occasion when the House of Commons is full, people outside parliament are watching on tv and it means the Prime Minister's office swings into action to help deal with the issues you're having.

It was very moving to be in the House of Commons for President Zelensky's address to MPs, as it has been to watch him and the Ukrainian people resist the brutal invasion Putin has launched of their country, with support from the UK and its allies. I know people have been frustrated by the pace at which refugees are being brought to the UK and I agree the system did not move fast enough at the outset. It is now moving much faster, and we have several generous strands for entry. It is important that we know we can put in the right support the refugees that we take – we still have Afghans in hotels in Oxfordshire because we don't have houses for them – and so we have to make sure we have the right health, education and pastoral support in place as soon as possible, which the Government is working hard on.

One final thing: Grove library is 50 years old this year and has a great collection of items from 1972 (or thereabouts) on display for a month!

- County and District Councils unanimously against the reservoir
- Newspaper articles in several local and county wide publications as well as BBC South East
- Volunteers and several residents' groups linked to GARD emerging across villages
- A huge response to the WRSE consultation from concerned residents

Thank you to everyone who responded to the consultation - there is no way that the water companies or regulators can ignore such a response. But it's a long game, with several more steps to go through before we get this monstrous mega-reservoir binned. We look forward to meeting you at future events, chatting to you while delivering leaflets and, most importantly, hearing from you about how YOU can help GARD make a difference.



- Scammers will pretend to be legitimate wellknown charities, creating their own charity names, and impersonating people impacted by the war in Ukraine.
- Scammers will be cold-calling, direct messaging and creating fake websites and pages on social media to raise funds. Avoid clicking on links or downloading attachments in unsolicited emails, texts or social media messages. They may attempt to lure you into unwittingly downloading malware onto your device or take you to a fake



- Do not donate via fundraising pages on platforms that do not verify the legitimacy of the fundraiser or that do not guarantee your money will be returned if the page is determined to be fraudulent.
- Be careful about crowdfunding requests as these may be fake and also come from scammers.
- Check the terms and conditions of funding platforms and ensure you are dealing with official organisations. If you are unsure, make your donation to an established charity instead.
- If you think you have paid money to a scammer, please contact your bank immediately.



Easter Hope

It is either true or it is not true, this Christian thing. It cannot be partly true, or true when we want it to be and not when it is inconvenient. And I guess Easter is where the rubber really hits the road. Did Jesus bodily rise again or not? What do you think? Because if he did not rise from death then everything he said and did hardly matters. Jesus becomes just another relatively important historical figure who had some interesting things to say and died tragically. He is not Saviour and Lord any longer. And as for any hope he might offer...? wishful thinking. Christianity stands or falls on the resurrection of Jesus. And the Bible itself is clear about that: "if Christ has not been raised your faith is futile" (1 Cor. 15:17). A former Prime Minister famously once said his faith was "like Magic FM in the Chilterns - tends to fade in and out" - an experience of faith shared by many, no doubt. But if that is our experience, where does the problem lie? Is it with the broadcaster (God) or the listener (us)? Surely it is with us. If God is real, and he has revealed himself in the Bible and in the person of Jesus as Christianity claims, then surely he has provided enough evidence for people to believe. So why don't more people believe? One way of answering that question would be... eyes need to be opened, hearts must be set on fire, and only God can do these things. True. But another way would be to say that many people have simply not given sufficient time to the claims of the Christian faith. Also true. Faith wavers because we waver. We live in troubling times. The last two years has been dominated by a pandemic that has caused so much pain. We have the twin crises of the cost of living and mental health surrounding us; and in late February a democratic European nation was invaded by Russia causing measureless suffering. The world cries out for hope. But where does hope lie? Many across the world will cling to Easter hope again this April, especially our brave Eastern Orthodox cousins in Ukraine. But perhaps for those of us whose faith tends to waver we might make this Easter a time to fully consider if Jesus really did rise again or not.
