Parish Council Vacancy

Following a resignation from the Council, there is a vacancy to be filled for a short while until the next formal elections in May 2023. The Parish Council invites applications from members of the public interested in being coopted onto the Council. A good opportunity to see what Councils get up to, before deciding if a full term of office is for you.

Grass Cutting

It is that time of year when we are all out cutting grass and managing our gardens. The Council would remind you that the Vale of White Horse District Council provides a successful recycling and waste collection service for all its residents in the district. In addition the recycling centre at Drayton is open all week from 8.00 a.m. - 5.00 p.m. on all days other than a Thursday when it is open even longer until 8.00 p.m. Please do not fly tip grass and garden waste on highway verges, private land, paths, in the Arboretum and Anson playing field, as such action interferes with the enjoyment of these areas and can result in composting grass odours which in turn are a nuisance to those who live nearby.

Vale of White Horse District Council – Car Parking Charges

From Monday 4th April, the Vale of White Horse District Council introduced changes to the car parking in town centres to make them more sustainable to manage. Free parking is still available, but is now reduced to one hour a day. New fees apply if you want to stay for more than one hour. Other fees have increased by 40p. New and renewed parking permits are now only valid for the specific car park for which they are issued, and they are no longer transferable. Where previously on offer, free parking remains available on Sundays.

A338 road closure

The County Council has received a request for a temporary road closure to apply to the section of the A338 at Hanney whilst puffin crossing works are carried out. This means that the A338 through Hanney is planned to be closed from 16th May up to and including 20th May, 2022. This is a 24 hour road closure. Access will be maintained for emergency services, and those frontages within the closure area. The diversion route is via the Hanney - Steventon Road.

20 mph limits in Marcham

The Parish Council has applied, with the support of Cllr. Richard Webber the County Councillor, for the County Council to consider Howard Cornish Road, and the section of the A415 which runs through the built up area of the village, for a reduction in speed limit to

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20 mph. The first is a residential area, route to school, village hall and private nursery. It has more than one bend, and restricted vision for motorists. The second is an air quality management area, and now that there are quite a few new houses on the southern side, is used more and more for residents to cross to access the village facilities.

In order to obtain local views on the proposal, please contact your local parish councillor or the clerk should you have any comment to make or particularly have any objection to the proposals.

Planning Applications considered by the Parish Council

P22/V0770/HH Single storey infill extension linking house to garage at 7 Anson Close. The Council had no objections, but did query whether an outbuilding forward of the building line needed formal permission.

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



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

plants in the troughs, trays and pots with seeds to grow. Along with the stories of the hungry caterpillar these activities enriched the children's knowledge and understanding of bugs and insects. The months moved onto Easter and Easter egg printing, songs and hot cross buns to eat. Little chocolate nests and colouring and paintings completed the month of springtime for the toddlers and babies.

Teal Room The children in Teal were very busy enjoying a new layout of the room with a wonderful new set up of the home area. A small comfy chair and wonderful wooden kitchen allowed the children to really embrace their role-playing creativeness. Dolls, pots and pans along with food were all used to create everyday life, this was also taken to the next level by the Teal room who extended the play into working roles, recreating being builders with hard hats, high-vis jackets and they built and mixed sand into paste and created a brick wall along with going around the Teal Room pretending to repair things. All these combined created not only social skills but good manners too. The Teal Room also created Easter cards and activities with games of Easter egg hunts around the garden and singing Easter songs and hopping bunny races. The story of The Last Supper was discussed and crosses and understanding of the Easter religion was held in discussion with the children - a full and fun packed month.

Green Room The Green Room have been busy exploring growing things. An area was designated as a planting station and children could take turns and spend time planting watering and exploring the seeds and plants available. Books about plants and growing gave the children a visual insight into the natural environment and activities reflected this through the month. The growing was not only left to plants but to the children as well, but each child was measured to see who was the tallest, feet and hand sizes too, along with growing from a baby to an adult. Update from Marcham Village Shop In July this year Marcham Village Shop will celebrate



10 years

as a community-owned and volunteer-run Shop and Post Office. This has been mainly due to the help of willing volunteers and paid staff, which has enabled the shop to remain open, even during the height of the Covid19 lockdowns.

Sadly, given the growth in population of Marcham, our turnover has gradually declined over the years, but our running costs have increased. In the same token, our volunteer pool has shrunk and new volunteers have not been forthcoming. If this continues, it will have a major impact on our opening hours.

The Post Office and Shop provide all the things you would expect, including some extras such as dry-cleaning, gifts and cards. We are the sole retailer of Marcham honey, we sell preserves from Hanney, eggs from Fyfield, beer from Abingdon, flour from Wantage and the last of the wine from the Bothy vineyard. And, as a commercially viable organisation, we have made donations in the past, which have included helping to fit out the new Marcham Centre and providing the Marcham Colt Football kit.

We sincerely believe that the village shop is a vital resource for the community, particularly for those residents who are not so mobile. So, we would like to ask all residents to support the shop in its long-term survival by:

• Using the shop (use it or lose it);

• Become a volunteer (only 2 hours per week).

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT UKRANIAIN UPDATE

I know that many of you are keen to host Ukraniain refugees and have signed up to do so on the government scheme Homes for Ukrainian refugees which the Vale is supporting collectively with other councils across Oxfordshire. Indeed, I was approached about an idea of asking the WI if they would consider housing a large number of Ukrainian refugees in Denman College in Marcham, but, unfortunately, as it is up for sale their legal team have



advised against this idea. However, the latest information is that the government has published a welcome pack for arriving refugees to signpost people to the help that is available, including advice about accessing universal credit and job support. The councils' joint team will be supplementing this with local information as well as providing clear signposts to help and support online.

The county council's website **www.oxfordshire.gov.uk**/ **ukrainesupport** is being used as the central host for this information. Sponsor information has been published on this site along with local information for Ukrainian guests. South and Vale's website will signpost people to these pages. A useful link published by the government is a set of frequently asked questions for sponsors and individuals applying to the scheme.

All councils are progressing the scheme by making first contact phone calls to hosts, distributing letters to them explaining next steps and initiating the accommodation and safeguarding checks required...on average it takes an officer a day to complete 4 host offers, so many officers have had to be diverted onto this scheme.

NEW OFFICE BASE

As you may know, The Vale has to vacate its offices in Milton this summer and will be moving to a "bridging location" in Abbey House, Abingdon, until a medium-term location can be found. The Vale will occupy the ground floor of Abbey House which is not used by the County Council

HOUSEHOLD SUPPORT FUND

The government has announced a further £500m to support households struggling to afford essentials, though the Vale is still awaiting guidance on how this will work, including detail on how much can be allocated and the timescales.

In the meantime, the Vale is in discussion with voluntary sector partners and the county council to prepare for the re-launch of the scheme which is now closed in both districts.

I hope you enjoyed the Easter break and are all keeping well.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT CARS

As a member of two Councils, each with a top priority of doing what they can to address climate change, I am amazed at how much of my casework revolves around the problems of cars. Parking, neighbourhood disputes, potholes, traffic speeds and congestion – at the heart of all these issues is the motor car. Now I am as guilty as anyone. I own two cars. One is a much loved old Citroen Saxo – high mileage in its early years – reliable



and cheap to run in spite of high road tax due to its relatively high emissions. I know it is coming to the end of its days but it will be sad to say goodbye after 20 years of reliable service. The other 18 MADNews is online: one is a 9 year old Seat – with, at one stage, what seemed like low emissions, low road tax and more mpg than the Saxo. However, like so many of us, I am wrestling with the guilt that in the interests of a healthier world, I should be reducing to one electric car and finding a way of financing it.

My generation has never known a world without cars. The US grid layout of cities is down to the motor car. Our own cities and towns were built for the horse and cart. Adapting them for the motor car has been a problem for more than a century. I was recently shown two photographs of New York streets – the first in 1908 (only horses and carts in sight) – the second in 1913 (nothing but cars). The change was both dramatic and complete within 5 years. Major changes in transport can happen in a very short time. Are we now on the verge of such a dramatic change?

We all expect to own at least one car and to drive between 5000 and 15000 miles a year. Cars require roads and there is a common acceptance that as more and more cars appear, we need more and more roads to accommodate them.

INDUCED DEMAND

Since 1913, the evidence has been growing that building more roads itself generates more traffic. In our congested little island, this has now become a problem we ignore at our peril. More roads - more cars - more roads - in a never ending cycle. There is also mounting evidence that, if a new road is built, the temptation to use our cars (rather than walking or cycling or using public transport) increases with induced demand. As all our roads become ever more congested, many are now arguing that we need to break this cycle and that road building is not the solution. Our resources might be better spent on maintaining our present system and repurposing our roads to positively encourage alternatives to car transport whilst actively discouraging the use of the car. I am always being charged with being anti-car. Guilty as charged. If I am sitting in a traffic queue whilst regular buses in a dedicated bus lane are overtaking me, am I more likely to choose bus travel? If there is a safe, dedicated footpath and cycle way, will I choose to walk or cycle? At present, too many bus timetables are disrupted by car traffic. If my bus is held up in car and other traffic, I am much more likely to travel by car. Many young people in London choose not to own a car because public transport is quicker, easier and journey times more reliable. Discouraging single occupancy, congestion charging, toll roads will have to be considered alongside measures to make public transport and active travel more attractive for everyone.

LOCAL ISSUES AND POSSIBLE SOLUTIONS

The proposed new HIF Rd designed to alleviate traffic congestion, reduce environmental damage and provide for further growth in our area, is being argued over as I write. It may be that we have to have this road to address immediate and past problems however, conversations and studies over longer term planning are likely to move us all away from new road building as a solution. Our money would be better spent on bus and rail, cycle and pedestrian lanes and so on. Is it just possible that this road might be the last built in Oxfordshire? Because if we want our children to enjoy a healthier, happier world, my generation may well have to accept that car ownership was a privilege we once had bit it can no longer be treated as a right.

MP'S REPORT

Since I last wrote, I have given two speeches on two very different topics, but they have one thing in common. The first was about rape conviction rates in this country. I talked about the fact they're too low and shared cases from constituents anonymously to highlight how the system doesn't work well enough for the victims. I shared stats I'd been given about public attitudes to rape that a constituent

had given me and I stressed the need to educate boys about the right way to treat girls so they grow up to be men who behave in the right way towards women.

The second speech was about the lack of GP practices for the number of houses we've had built. Yes, I know, a regular theme I talk about, but I've joined forces with colleagues who have similar issues in their constituencies to maximise our campaigning efforts. I set out in detail the

level of housebuilding we've had, the fact that years and years have passed without additional, promised GP practices being built and I talked about what I thought should happen, including infrastructure going in first and setting a maximum number of patients per GP or practice (surprisingly, there isn't one at present).

What the two very different topics have in common - apart from being longstanding issues - is that no one organisation is responsible for solving the problem. Both are of course significantly affected by what Governments do (or don't do). But the failure to see enough rape prosecutions is also partly about what the police, the CPS and judges do, as well as about societal attitudes, which affect jury decisions. And on GP practices, it's partly to do with the actions of housebuilders and developers, councils, the Clinical Commissioning Group and national NHS bodies. People understandably look to Government to solve problems, but authority in this country tends to be well dispersed – and for good reasons - so, unfortunately, no one lever being pulled in Westminster will quickly solve them.

My Climate Summit this year will be on the 27th June, 9am – 1.30pm via Zoom, with Alok Sharma as the keynote speaker. One topic I know I want to cover is energy policy. We're having an important debate at the moment about our use of oil and gas, the cost of living and what role, if any, there is for things like onshore wind and nuclear power. As with the issues above, there isn't a simple answer. Sign up on my website www.david-johnston.org.uk to take part.

Alongside my usual surgery appointments and visits to schools, businesses, charities, etc, I had a fantastic visit to 11 EOD & Search Regiment in Didcot. They work tirelessly to keep us all safe and almost nothing they do will ever make it into the papers, but we should be very proud to have them in the constituency.

BASIC GUIDELINES FOR HOSTING UKRAINIAN REFUGEES

citizens Oxfordshire advice South & Vale

If you are one of those who have generously offered to host Ukrainian refugees, you need to know what is involved.

The government hasn't yet released complete details of how the "Homes for Ukraine" scheme will work, but as of the time of writing (mid-April 2022) the following guidelines apply:

First, you can volunteer for someone from the Ukraine to come to the UK and live with you. If you know of specific Ukrainians whom you wish to host, those people can apply to come to the UK. If you don't know of any particular people you want to host, you can sign up to be matched with one or more people. In either case, your local council will pay £350 per month per sponsor or property.

You must be able to provide the right kind of accommodation: it can be a spare room or an empty property, but it must be safe, suitable and large enough. The local council will visit you to make sure that the living space is appropriate. In addition, safety checks will be carried out on both hosts and guests, including police and criminal records checks.

Before you apply for the scheme, do check with your mortgage provider and/or your home insurance company, if applicable, to ensure that they have no objections.

You must be willing to let the refugee(s) stay with you, or in your separate accommodation, for at least six months - the longer the better. You may not charge them rent. Your guests will have the right to work and study, claim benefits, use the NHS, go to school and attend free English classes.

Citizens Advice can help with claims for benefits and other necessities. Our website at www.citizensadvice.org.uk has relevant information which is constantly updated as new rules are publicized. You can also telephone the Citizens Advice Oxfordshire South and Vale Advice line on 0808 278 7907.
