MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL Annual Council Meeting

The annual meeting of the Council was held on 9th May and Michael Hoath was elected Chairman and Ruth Mander Vice-Chairman. The following working parties were established: A 'green' group dealing with footpaths and climate issues, a group to deal with the Anson Field matters and liaise in the first instance with Marcham Community Group, an allotment working party, play area working party, and administrative groups such as those reviewing policies and the effectiveness of the Council's internal audit.

Annual Parish Meeting

The Council was pleased to see so many people from the village attend the annual parish meeting, and to welcome **Ricardo Rios and Robyn Tobutt**, from the Vale of White Horse District Council, to talk on Neighbourhood Planning. A Neighbourhood Plan contains planning policies which guide future development. They explained the benefits of a community undertaking a Neighbourhood Plan, and explained the process and support available. If you would like to help plan the future of Marcham, then please register your interest with the Clerk by emailing clerk@ marchamparishcouncil.gov.uk

Reports too were given by **Cllr. Richard Webber** and **Cllr. Catherine Webber** on their activities at the County Council and Vale of White Horse District Council. **Viv Hutchinson**, Headteacher at the primary school too provided an insight into life in the school during Covid.

Potholes

During the Parish Meeting questions were asked about the state of the roads, paths and white lines which appeared around some potholes. Last year the County Council trialled a system in parts of the county, whereby a 'super user' could raise works orders for fixing potholes and kerbing issues on unclassified roads of less than 30 mph. An appointed volunteer assists highway officers by being the eyes and ears locally. The scheme was extended, and Marcham has its own 'super user' James Plumb. James has undergone a training course, as not all issues can be raised directly with the County Council's work team operatives. Residents can contact James directly regarding serious potholes. He can check the problem, and if it meets the relevant criteria, he will be able to issue a direct works order to have it fixed.

Road Closures

The County Council is proposing the following road closures:

A section of the A415 Kingston Road from its junction with A338 at Frilford over a 24 hour period for carriageway patching. 11th July, 2022 to 12th July, 2022

Packhorse Lane, Marcham from 26th July to 8th August over a 24 hour period for GigaClear works.

Blackhorse Lane, Cothill on 27th July 9.00 a.m. – 4.00 p.m. for carriageway patching.

Street Lighting

As part of Oxfordshire County Council's LED street lighting replacement schemes, contractors are looking to carry out lighting replacements within Marcham Parish from the 30th May 2022. These works include replacing all street lighting columns which are over 25 years of age and replace the street lighting lanterns with new low energy LEDs.

Vale of White Horse District Council / South Oxfordshire District Council - Joint Local Plan Consultation

The two District Councils are working together on a new Joint Local Plan. They want to hear your thoughts on the main issues affecting the districts and how the Local Plan could address them. 


Dear MADNews Readers





All of the children could speak about the importance of caring for the environment. Chloe and Zara focused their attention on the effect of human behaviour on animals. Ruby and Tiarna both mentioned their care and concern about the world. Oliver loves trees while Dexter wants us to conserve water.

- 'I care about the animals and their habitats. When we litter it can hurt them'
- 'Looking after the water is really important. There is too much rubbish in the sea and it harms animals'
- 'I love trees! We have to stop wasting paper'
- 'The Earth needs looking after'
- 'We have had an amazing focus on this in Cubs. And I was on the eco committee in years 2 and 3 as well'

What have you done in the role so far? What do you talk about in meetings? The students have taken an assembly in school to focus everyone on how to help the environment. I asked them how we could do that:

- 'Turn off lights!'
- 'The teachers need to turn off their laptops when they are not using them – and put them on standby'





- 'We should turn off taps when we are not using them and not keep them running while we wash our hands'
- 'Pick up litter and use recycling bins'

All of the committee are keen to keep the message in the forefront of everyone's minds by designing posters to display around school. They also have plans to ensure the recycling bins are in use. Well done to all of them!

A Look at Fungi

It's been suggested to me I review some books that readers might like to read that expands all our connections with the natural world around us.

One book I've read, which is worth reviewing is: Entangled Life: How



Fungi Make Our Worlds, Change Our Minds and Shape Our Futures by Merlin Sheldrake.

This is a potentially perspective-altering book, and at times remarkable, linking science and lived experience. This book quickly reveals the natural world, that we are part of, is more extraordinary and more intricate than we could imagine. The science is often explained in simple terms, but I think there could have been more of a focus on it, and less focus on magic mushrooms and drug-taking subject matters.

At times the text lacked direction, and I felt I could get a more concise explanation via a good Google search, but at other times the text was enthralling.

It's a good read, helping give fungi the understanding and relevance they really should have. Though if you are looking for illustrations and images on each page, this isn't a book for you, as it may not engage you. Many people are engaged by images first, and then read the text and this is very much a text-dominated book.

There is a bit too much repetition for me, but it does reinforce some of the points the book rightly raises. The book is on the whole inspiring, and exercised my mind, by developing new thoughts and ideas about my own experiences in nature, and made me think about how so much of the world around us is interrelated, and reliant on hidden structures and processes.

If humanity learnt more about the unseen, and undiscovered species in the natural world, then we may just start to realise what we are at risk of losing, and convert that into actively trying to protect it.

There are end notes in this book, ideal for a reader who wants to do further exploration.

If anyone out there has read this book as well, I'd be interested in hearing your thoughts.

AN EXTRAORDINARY WOMAN

The family have been overwhelmed by the many good wishes we have received since Mum passed away The following words stand out in the cards, letters, emails and social media posts:-

determined, caring, positive, inspiring, welcoming, adventurous, creative, willing, talented, generous

I'd like to sum up all these words when I think about Mum's life and the impact she had on others. Mum has always had a love of writing, keeping a diary since a young age and producing many accounts of her life, some of which have been published and have won prizes. It is from a selection of these writings and my own personal memories that I have written this tribute to her.

Mum's childhood in Nottingham was dominated by the war. Living in an industrial city the threat of air raids was ever present. An air raid shelter was built in the family cellar, furnished and frequently occupied in the early years. Mum left school at sixteen in her own words "having scraped the school certificate" and got a job at the Ministry of Works, meeting future husband Victor who also worked there. They say office romances never last but Mum definitely thought he was a keeper and they were married in 1952. Dad's job with the UK Atomic Energy Authority took him to several sites ending up at Harwell and an Authority house in Abingdon. Mum was a full-time housewife at the time bringing up her three boys. The house we had was a little small and the search started for a bigger one. Dad worried whether they could afford a move but Mum had other ideas and looked for ways to move up the housing ladder.

Mum trained as a teacher to boost the family wage, attending Culham College. After leaving teacher training college Mum got a job at Larkmead School. Mum loved teaching, passing her knowledge to generations of kids and in her later years loved to be approached by pupils she had taught, some of whom had been inspired to teach themselves or had learned a musical instrument or joined a choir, but also by the more 'unruly' element of kids who confessed they had been disruptive but held her in respect for her can-do attitude and her enthusiasm for teaching the subject she loved. Teachers at the school were amazed at the determination she showed in getting pupils of all abilities involved, giving them the confidence to sing in choirs and act in school musical productions. With the extra money coming in from her teaching job the family were house searching and we found our present family home in Marcham. When we moved there over 50 years ago, Mum and Dad wasted no time in integrating themselves in village life, contributing to many social events such as the Marcham Son et Lumiere, Old Tyme Music Hall, plays and pantomimes. Mum was devoted to all aspects of church life at All Saints, playing piano at services and leading the church choir.

In Abingdon, Mum was a founder member and first President of WI Abingdon Fitzharris Branch. She joined WI in Marcham and using the extensive facilities of the college literally on her doorstep, let her art and crafts creativity run riot. Mum really was multi-talented – egg decorating, making corn dollies, pottery, brass rubbing, embroidery, watercolour painting, it seemed there was nothing she wouldn't try.

My father Victor suffered with dementia from 1982 until his death in 1999. For nearly twenty years, Mum was his devoted carer. She displayed great courage and patience in looking after him at home. Mum pored over research articles into the disease. Using her musical and organisational skills, she got heavily involved in fundraising events for the Alzheimer's Society. She took time to support and befriend fellow carers. She appeared on TV and Radio several times during this period of her life, contributing to documentaries on the subject to help raise understanding of this cruel disease.

During the later years of Dad's illness, Mum had to retire from teaching but her thirst for learning was still strong. She studied for several years with Open University on top of caring for Victor, achieving a BA with Hons in Humanities and winning a National Award for adult learning through the WI. She has also studied successfully for the Licentiate of the Royal



Academy of music (LRAM), a very prestigious qualification. Mum was a keen environmentalist and joined Abingdon Carbon Cutters in her later years becoming their oldest and most active member. The environmental imperative to act on climate change before it is too late for future generations was her main focus.

Mum was a pretty resilient woman, having survived breast cancer, pneumonia, a minor stroke and a very bad fall over the last twenty years or so but unfortunately her latest cancer diagnosis and subsequent treatment was to overwhelm her and severely restrict the busy life she had led until then. She became more reliant on home care but was determined to live independently in the house and village she so loved.

I would like to thank those close to her who helped her through her last few months and all of the love displayed by people in the village. *MARTIN WHILD*

REPRESENTATIVES' REPORTS

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

I thought I would start this report by highlighting a few recent Vale press releases which you might have missed.

FLY TIPPING MAN FINED

Following a successful prosecution, a man was fined £2,700 for fly-tipping a load of household waste in Shrivenham, including car seats, laminate flooring, a fire extinguisher and a dog basket. The Vale is keen to ensure that nobody is fooled by rogues, offering to remove your large waste, by following the SCRAP code:

S – Suspect all waste carriers – don't let them take your waste until you know they are legitimate.

C – Check they are registered waste carriers.

R – Refuse any unexpected offers to have your rubbish taken away. A – Ask what will happen to your rubbish.

P – Paperwork – ensure you get an invoice, waste transfer note or receipt.

NEARLY £600,000 ALLOCATED TOWARDS A NEW PAVILION IN KINGSTON BAGPUIZE

You will all be aware of the large number of homes that have been built in Kingston Bagpuize and Southmoor over the last few years, so it is good news that some of the money (nearly £600,000) collected from developers to build these developments is helping to fund a new pavilion in Kingston Bagpuize. Work on the new pavilion started in December 2021 and completion is expected over the summer. When complete, it will have a new function room with kitchen, together with changing and shower facilities to accommodate both home and visitor teams.

£500 FINE FOR COUNCIL TAX FRAUDSTER

A Grove resident has been fined after fraudulently claiming a reduction on her Council Tax. She claimed £3,500 in Council Tax reduction between 2016 and 2019, even though her circumstances had changed when her partner moved into her property. She will have to pay this money back as well as the fine. It is very important that you let the council know of any change in your circumstances if you are claiming council tax support, as not to do so is fraud. And if you know of anyone who is doing so, you are asked to call the confidential 24-hour fraud hotline on 01235 422483

ABBEY MEADOW OUTDOOR POOL'S FUTURE SECURED FOR FUTURE SUMMERS

This is an exciting piece of news for families and swimmers, as it has been confirmed that an agreement has been made with GLL, the company responsible for running the pool and splash pad, to open the pool in the Summer holidays despite spiralling costs that have closed more than 200 pools across the country. This outdoor pool has always needed to be heavily subsidised, even when at its busiest. Heating costs for the pool alone this season are expected to be around £107,000, compared to £47,000 in previous seasons. To help address these financial challenges, last year the council agreed a financial package with GLL which ensures that the pool is open every Summer holiday until 2026. So, this year, the pool is scheduled to open on 25 July and will remain open for six weeks throughout the holidays. The Abbey Meadows splash pad will also be opened, but a few weeks earlier than the pool, from Saturday 28th May ahead of the Platinum Jubilee long weekend, the same time as the splash pad in Wantage. So, get your swimming things out ready for the Summer holiday!

Other interesting news from the Vale JOINT LOCAL PLAN (JLP)

The Vale and SODC have been working hard on a Joint Local Plan in which there is a strong commitment to the climate emergency



and enhancing the environment (my portfolio until recently (May 2022), when I resigned from the cabinet for family reasons). The Vale is keen to encourage as many people as possible to take part in a new consultation which has just been launched.... an innovative new, digital approach to this consultation This allows people to explore some engaging interactive online content related to the Local Plan and answer quick and easy questions about what they think the key issues are that we should tackle. There is also the more traditional way of responding to the consultation which is found on the Joint Local Plan webpage. If you have views about the next JLP, why not try to take part in this consultation?

ENERGY REBATE

As you know, the news is full of the cost of energy and you might be interested to know that the Vale and South have already paid out over £8million in energy rebates to more than 54,000 households who pay their council tax by direct debit. From 16th May, letters will be sent out to the remaining 22,000 eligible households which will prompt them to complete an online form to confirm their bank account details so that they can receive their rebate. Households will have until 13th June to do this, and once their eligibility has been confirmed they should receive their money by 4th July. COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT B4016

This has been the subject of much discussion for many years now. Indeed, my first piece of casework when elected in May 2013, was to try to get proposals for a buildout to happen. After months of arguing over first the costing, then the type of buildout and its positioning and finally changes to Highway policy and Covid, the scheme was put on hold. Happily, a change in administration last year breathed new life and money into the proposal such that



it will now happen this year. What this scheme, and others have taught me is that it is impossible to get unanimous agreement on Highway schemes.

Concerns about speeding and safety along the whole stretch of this road between Sutton Courtenay and Drayton have been around as long as the buildout. Indeed, I remember walking the road with our MP and OCC Highway officers some years ago to discuss what could be done to prevent any further fatalities. The two new mobile speeding signs have now been commissioned but there have been further disagreements over the siting of the poles to support the signs. In an effort to get things moving, I have agreed with Highway Officers on the initial sitings of the poles, but there is no reason why other poles could not be put up in the future. There is an increasing case for speed signs around Marcham – particularly Sheepstead Rd.

Drayton and Sutton Courtenay and Marcham Parish Councils are considering applying for 20mph zones within their villages.

Finally, if the HIF1 road scheme goes ahead (and there remains some uncertainty), the traffic modelling suggests that the new road would take away a proportion of the traffic currently using the road. It may be little more than a mile of road, but at last things are happening. Hopefully, many of the proposals will make the B4016 a safer road to live beside.

NOISE

Electric vehicles may well reduce traffic noise, but the amount of commercial activity in our area is giving rise to increasing numbers of noise complaints over lost sleep and impact on mental health. The trouble with noise is that it comes and goes so unless the measurements are taken at the worst time, the evidence is difficult to pin down. However, it is becoming apparent that the impact of heavy traffic is not just its effect on air quality and physical human health, but increasingly on mental health. It is not clear what can be done about this but it is something Councils need to be taking more seriously.

ELECTIONS

For many years, Oxfordshire has been a hotbed of political dispute. At first glance, last month's local elections might seem to have heated the atmosphere even further. There is one positive in that politicians across the County are realising the need for compromise and the need to take account of all opinions if they wish to get things done. This has to be a good thing.

HOLIDAY SEASON

It seems we may be in for a long, hot summer. For those able to afford them, holidays postponed or curtailed thanks to Covid are at last possible. With the world in its current state, some time in the sunshine, time to reflect and reorganise, may be just what we all need.

MP'S REPORT

I recently passed over 25,000 constituent cases dealt with since I was elected in December 2019 (to those who don't like it when they don't get a fast reply, I hope this helps you understand why!). One of the first things to strike me when I became an MP was how the correspondence you get is so different from that in almost any other job, in a good way. Many MPs are councillors before they enter parliament, but even then,

my ex-councillor colleagues might have represented 10,000 people at county or equivalent level andt ypically had a narrow range of topics they were contacted about. MPs represent tens of thousands – Wantage and Didcot is one of the largest constituencies at near 100,000– and are written to about every issue under the sun; during the pandemic, veteran MPs said the rate of correspondence we received was 3 times the level they'd ever seen. But the more people who contact me with problems the better, as being able to help them is the most rewarding part of the job.

Alongside individual cases I've been supporting 4 campaigns recently. One is continuing to help the local AEAT Pensioners obtain redress and I am pursuing something that I hope will give them an avenue for this. Another is to help Didcot resident, Sharon Gaffka, with her campaign on spiking. The Government recently moved the GHB drug – used in the majority of spiking cases – up a category so that the prison penalties for carrying it or producing it are increased. I took Sharon to meet the Safeguarding Minister so that she could explain what else she wants to see happen, including better education of young people.

I'm then supporting the Epilepsy Society's Zach's Law campaign to punish people who – believe it or not – send those with photosensitive epilepsy flashing images online in the hope that they will induce a seizure in the recipient. We're hopeful the Online Harms Bill will clamp down on this. I was also pleased to join 70 colleagues in calling on companies not to digitally alter body proportions in pictures, which give people – particularly young people – an unrealistic body image to aspire to, with negative consequences for their mental health.

Long to reign over us, God save the Queen. We've all been singing that for years and God has certainly answered our prayers. It is 70 years since Queen Elizabeth II acceded to the throne in February 1952. Since then, it feels like so much has changed. In June 1953 27 million people watched the coronation on television. There were only 36 million adults in the country at that time. Perhaps one or two of you were there. Lots were. 8,000 people were in the Abbey, 29,000 members of the armed forces lined the route (nearly as many as in the whole Royal Navy today), and 3 million were on the streets of London. So much has changed in 70 years. Motorways, air travel for the masses, pop culture, space exploration, the internet, mobile phones.... The NHS was only 4 years old in 1952. The Beatles were still 8 years away. And Everest would not be conquered until just before Coronation Day.

It was a different world back then, but not in every respect. In 1952, much of Western Europe was still in the grip of post-war austerity with families struggling to feed their children. The end of rationing was still two years away. There was the growing threat of the Cold War, which would dominate foreign and defence policy for the next 35 years, and strike fear into many Brits as we worried at what Russia might be capable of. Not such a different world then. But amid all this, one person has remained the same. With steady, gracious, faithfulness the Queen has served this country through 70 years of triumph and trial. In that way she is respected by millions the world over, even by those who don't care much for monarchy. She has shaken the hand of thousands of people, the destitute as much as the distinguished, and she has poured tireless energy into the hundreds of charities and good causes of which she is patron.

But it is the Queen's steady faith in God that impresses me most. She is one of the most famous Christians in the world, unashamed of her personal trust in God. She is the Sovereign lady to whom everyone in the country bows; yet she herself bows the knee to Jesus. In her 2011 Christmas message she said, *"Forgiveness lies at the heart of the Christian faith. It can heal broken families, it can restore friendships and it can reconcile divided communities. It is in forgiveness that we feel the power of God's love."* She's right. Long may she reign!
