

Marcham Community Shop**

The Parish Council would like to congratulate all those involved in getting the community shop open and running for the benefit of the village. A lot of hard work and effort has paid off, and there is much positive feedback from villagers. The Council has received formal notification from the Post Office Authorities that the Post Office within the shop has closed on a temporary basis, and that it will re-open the third week in October. Trick or Treat - 31st October

It is approaching that time of year when children can be tempted into going out trick or treating. Normally it is a harmless pastime for children, but it can also be both frightening and intimidating. Much distress is caused by unexpected knocks on the door or loud noises. Some residents may welcome treat or treating, others do not. If your children do go out, please encourage them to call only on those whom they know and to respect the wishes of anyone who does not wish to participate.

If you do get an unexpected caller, make sure the chain or door bar is on before you open the door. Do not let anyone in your house unless you are happy with their identity. If you need to talk to the police call 101 or dial 999 in an emergency.

Fireworks

November will soon be here, and the letting off of fireworks seems to spread over several days rather than on just 5th November. A reminder therefore, to be considerate for neighbours and the many pets and animals in the village when letting off your fireworks. Please notify others when any fireworks are going to be lit so that villagers are aware and arrangements can be made to keep pets indoors.

As you will no doubt be aware, the Post Office is closed temporarily so that we can carry out the necessary refurbishment work and transfer of ownership to Marcham Village Shop Ltd. We have agreed a schedule of work with the Post Office, the main bulk of which will be carried out during the week commencing 15th October.

The Post Office will operate from a new open plan counter located next to the shop counter, and apart from minor changes, we will be offering the same range of services you have been used to - with the benefit that our opening hours will match those of the shop. So if you need to get something posted pop into the shop on your way to work - and why not pick up a paper and sandwich for lunch at the same time? For details of all the services we will be able to offer, we have literature in the shop which you can pick up on your next visit.

During the short period of closure our nearest Post Offices are situated in Kingston Bagpuize, Gainsborough Green in Abingdon and West St. Helen St (situated inside the Co-Operative Store); should anyone require transport during this time, please contact either Chris Ricketts, Ruth Mander or Natasha Kingsbury.

At the same time, we will be increasing our opening hours during October, shutting only over the lunch-time period and re-opening from 3.00-6.00pm Monday - Friday. Our weekend hours will remain the same 7.30am-1.00 pm. Finally, after two months of trading we'd like to say a big thank you to our volunteers, without whom MVS would not work! In response to Frank Buckingham's letter last month, I would like to echo his sentiments regarding the generosity of the ex-serviceman's club. It was a pleasure for my daughter to receive a Jubilee Mug, which she will no doubt treasure for years to come. However, I would like to clarify that Pre-school did not make a complaint about the group not receiving commemorative mugs. When planning our own celebrations for the Jubilee, Marion (the Supervisor) merely enquired to an ex-serviceman's club member whether the Pre-school group would also receive a mug. She was told in no uncertain terms "why would you, you're not part of the school and in any case in a few months you probably won't even be there". We subsequently made our own arrangements for marking the Diamond Jubilee with the pre-school children.

However, the attitude that Marion's enquiry was met with is still inexcusable. This is our 5th year within the school, and having worked in a formal partnership over that time we have built a superb continuity of care and education for our members (most of whom live within Marcham) as they enter Pre-school and move on through the school. It is disappointing to say the least, that after the 'outstanding' efforts of the pre-school staff, the committee, the teachers at the school, governors and parents, (and not forgetting the children themselves) there are some members of the village who still consider that Pre-school are not an important part of the school community. Those families who have had recent involvement with the group will know what a valuable role we play in the children's early years, and have worked hard to ensure that our success as well as our continued presence and partnership within the school WILL continue well into the future. We are secure in our position, continue to grow and thrive as part of Marcham's local community (and the surrounding areas) and will continue to do so thanks to the support of those that matter.

The Anson Trust company (The Arthur Anson Memorial Trust Limited) has completed its final accounts for the year ended 31.12.2011 and these have been submitted to Companies House.

In accordance with the Directors' policy of providing as much information about the Trust as possible to parishioners, the full accounts are being made available on the MADNews website (and on the Trust's website www.ansontrust.org).

For those who do not have access to the website or would rather not view the full set of accounts, the principal figures are as follows:-

This means the Trust made a 'loss' of £8,823 in 2011. This loss, together with those that we have suffered historically and the prospect of them only worsening in the future, serves to reinforce our view that the recent successful planning application represents a very significant step forward for the Trust and the community of Marcham.

PICKING FUNGI

This time of year is when you often see fungi collectors out there in the countryside, foraging for the fruiting fungi, taking them home to eat afterwards. Obviously care needs to be taken for this activity, as some are toxic to humans and you really shouldn't take wild mushrooms from nature reserves or land protected for the benefit of wildlife. The majority of fungi are made up of water, and the dry substance is a mixture of fat, carbohydrates, vitamins and protein. So one can instantly see why these fruiting bodies are sought after.



Good rules to stick to when collecting fungi to eat are:

Only take those that you can identify with certainty, that are not a rare species; Cut the fungi off carefully near to the hole which is then left in the soil; Clean these where you picked them so the spores spread in an area that the particular species likes; Take the produce home in containers with good air circulation, never in paper or plastic bags; Keep edible fungus separate from any you are unable to identify in the field and are transporting home to look at under the microscope otherwise you could contaminate the edible ones rendering them completely inedible.

Once home, you can freeze fungi, but only the ones freshly harvested and that have the flesh intact and firm. Fungi must be sliced then cleaned before freezing, and once frozen can last for up to 5 months. When you are ready to use them, do not thaw them out, fry them in a pan from frozen.

As I say though, be very careful with picking fungi, as a lot are toxic. Also a lot of destruction is caused on the fungus forays that are organized around Oxfordshire, as people pick everything they find only to realise most are not fit for our consumption. It is better to only pick what we know we can eat, and not lay waste to entire swathes of countryside in the hope that what we get home may just about be fit to cook.

I don't want to ruin people's enjoyment of the local environment, but pick fungi responsibly as they play an important and fascinating role in the local ecology.

ED VAIZEY WRITES...

One of the best things about being a local MP is being invited to some great celebrations. Recently, I was asked to present medals to some of the children who have completed the Summer Reading Challenge. Using local libraries and with the help of lots of local volunteers, hundreds of local children each read 6 books over the summer. The enthusiasm and excitement of the children, and the pride both they and their families felt in their achievement, was wonderful! That's not the end of the many activities available in local libraries for children (and adults!) so do visit your local library to see what you might interest you.



I am very glad to see that the work to improve Didcot Parkway station is finally underway. Thousands of people from across the constituency travel through the station every day, and the improvements will make their journeys much easier. As the work will take around 15 months to complete, it may get worse before it gets better, but I'm sure that this partnership between the various local councils, Network Rail and First Great Western will eventually be good for everyone.

This summer has been an eclectic couple of months for my office mailbox. The parliamentary recess has been so full of amazing sport and other spectacles that people have been very distracted from political campaigns. But as soon as the parliamentary term began again on September 3rd I was flooded with emails and letters. I have continued to receive representations on same-sex marriage; I've had a quite a few emails about the price of petrol; and, more recently, a few submissions for the consultation on internet parental controls. However, by far the largest campaigns have been for the Post Office DVLA contract and the reduction in Air Passenger Duty tax.

Unfortunately, while I very much support the post office bid to run DVLA services, the DVLA is required by EU law to tender the contract competitively and so the Government cannot take sides on this occasion. As for the Air Passenger Duty campaign, it may be the largest one-issue campaign I've ever seen as an MP. In the past few months almost 500 people have got in touch to express their views. I know that my colleagues in the Government have also had their mailbags flooded with similar letters: they have already taken firm steps to limit any rise and will continue not to levy VAT on domestic flights.

A village united (?)

Since news of the Vale Planning Committee meeting on 15 August reached the wider community (see MCG page in last month's issue at www.madnews.co.uk) there is one thing that seems to have united those who opposed the Taylor Wimpey planning application and those who supported it: a feeling that the planning approval process was extremely unsatisfactory. So much for localism! At the time of writing this, formal planning permission has not yet been granted. The target date was 29 August.

MCG—what comes next?

This experience of the National Planning Policy Framework in action in Marcham has vindicated the membership's decision of nearly a year ago. MCG agreed to work through discussions with the Anson Trust and Taylor Wimpey to try to ensure that their proposed community building met community needs, in case it did get planning permission.

Over the past year MCG has progressively taken on the role of enabling local groups and others interested in the proposed community building to understand what was proposed and to ask for changes they felt were necessary to the layout. MCG presented the results of the two User Group Forums to Taylor Wimpey and the Anson Trust and pressed for the recommendations to be implemented. The MCG committee believes this process needs to continue as there are still some aspects of the internal layout that could be improved. In addition, with the prospect of the proposals becoming a reality, it believes it is time for user groups and the wider community to get involved in planning the future management of community leisure facilities. If you have any interest in community facilities in Marcham, please join us at the Open Meeting on 16 October (details below) to discuss these and other issues.

Joint Users Planning Group (JUPG)

Until now MCG's facilitating role has been reactive—we have sought user and community views after proposals were made. The committee felt that a proactive approach would be better and held preliminary discussions in August with the main village user groups to see what interest there was in forming a joint group able to represent all interested groups in discussions with the Anson Trust and Taylor Wimpey. The Joint Users Planning Group (JUPG) held its first full meeting on 12 September when the Anson Trust outlined its business plan for the new community facilities. Individual user groups are considering this information and the JUPG will hold further meetings with the Anson Trust over the coming weeks to review the plan in more detail.

The JUPG intends to become an effective single voice for community groups.

Being a Community (God's Way!)

Ruth and I have lived in the village now for four years and have been impressed by the good community spirit. We have made some friends since being here, have been to a number of village events and had some good fun. Last evening we filled in the questionnaire that will help, along with the views of many others, to shape the Marcham Community Led Plan. Whilst Ruth and I were completing the form, I reflected on what it means to be a community and particular what that means in connection with a living faith in God.

What does it mean to be a community in God's eyes?

Christian communities have been shaped all over the world ever since the first one took shape in Jerusalem nearly 2,000 years ago. The following few verses from the book of Acts in the Bible is a paraphrase of what is recorded of the early days of the church. The passage tells of the ways that the early and vibrant church operated in the weeks that followed the resurrection of Christ – the very event that caused the formation of this bold and dynamic new faith.

All the believers were together and had everything in common. They sold property and possessions and gave to anyone who had need. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favour of all the people. And God added to their number daily those who were being saved

This is a story of people sharing together, helping those in need in practical ways, having fun together and all with a focus on God. They ate together, sharing their food and they sold what they did not need, in order to give the proceeds to those in want. Faith in God through Jesus Christ is not something that is realised through being dry and religious. It is about a living faith that impacts lives on a deep and personal level. It's about being sacrificial, giving to those who need help – giving not only financially but being generous and free in the giving of time and of resources.

I came to faith in Christ at around the age of forty and one of the things that struck me early on in my Christian walk is the many times that the words 'one another' or 'each other' appear in the New Testament. We are told to 1) *Live in harmony with one another*, 2) *Be devoted to one another*, 3) *Love one another*, 4) *Accept one another*, 5) *Stop passing judgement on one another*, 6) *Encourage one another*, 7) *Be kind and compassionate to one another*, 8) *Forgive one another* the list goes on and on. This is a significant part of the way that God calls us to live together in community, preferring the needs of others above ourselves. It's a tough call – one that is not easy to follow but God does not call us to go for the easy options and what God did for us through Jesus Christ was not an easy call either.

Even if at this time you don't have a Christian faith, there is much to commend those sentiments that echo throughout scripture. Living a sacrificial life, caring for others and looking out for the needs of those around us are ways that we can all surely aspire to live.

But what about the verse that precedes the verses in the Book of Acts quoted above?

They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer and to praising God.

Could you investigate faith for yourself? Might looking into the apostles teaching (as recorded in the New Testament), or spending time talking to God in prayer, or praising God with others on a Sunday morning be something that you could do too? I would be delighted to chat with you to help you investigate faith for yourself but if that's a step too far, then why not get a modern translation of the New Testament, spend some time reading it and talk to God about what it means?

Ruth and I plan to be here in Marcham for some time to come yet and we look forward to seeing the ways in which our community develops over the coming years.


