Annual Council Meeting

At the annual council meeting held on 8th May, Mr. David Walton was elected Chairman for the forthcoming year and Miss Ruth Mander as Vice-Chairman. Mr. William Cumber will represent the parish on the Hills Aggregates Liaison Committee. This Committee acts as a forum for discussion on the operation of the sand extraction site at the northern end of the parish. Mr. Walton will be the parish transport representative at meetings with the county council on public transport issues. Various other appointments were made to internal working parties and to other outside bodies. The contact details of the Council members can be found on the Council's noticeboard outside the Institute.

New Community Facilities

The Parish Council has discussed how best to proceed with the matter at its recent meeting, and has agreed that all parties concerned needed to be brought together where there can be collective input into the problem. Hopefully such a meeting should lead to some common understanding and act as a forum whereby everyone can work together to find a solution and move forward to an agreed course of action. To this end a meeting between the Parish Council, the Anson Trust, MCG and JUPG will take place in early June.

Vale of White Horse District Council -**Community Governance Review**

The Vale of White Horse District Council is undertaking a review of community governance looking at the parish level over the whole district. This could include creating a new parish, merging parishes, creating wards within a parish as well as other local changes. The Parish Council has discussed the possibilities and has agreed that it would not wish to see any changes from the current way of operating as far as Marcham is concerned.

Cothill Road – Closure

A temporary road closure order will apply to part of Cothill Road from the end of Blackhorse Lane around the first bend to the Merry Miller in order to allow telecommunication works to take place. The road will be closed from 4th June for

about 5 days. Access will be maintained for emergency vehicles. The alternate route is via Honeybottom Lane, Wootton Road, Long Tow, via Shippon, Gozzards Ford, and Blackhorse Lane.

Cothill Road – Dog Waste Bin

Many people seem to be taking their dogs to the former quarry area off Cothill Road to exercise them. The Parish Council is investigating the possibility of installing a dog waste bin at this location in an attempt to encourage people to clear up after their dog and not leave the mess for everyone else to be possibly affected by toxicariasis, or to tread in.

Planning Applications recently considered by the Parish Council

P13/V0575/O Erection of 48 dwellings with associated means of access, car parking, new footpath links, amenity space and landscaping Kings Field, Sheepstead Road The Parish Council objected to this application. The proposal was considered not sustainable in terms of the size of Marcham as a village. The school was unable to accommodate a significant increase in the number of children, the sewage system was at capacity, surface water drainage was a concern, as was housing numbers as Marcham would be expected to take more than its fair share of those required in the draft Local Plan.

P13/V0859 Development of 18 dwellings with garages, access road, associated works, public open space and a detention basin. (amended plan) Land north of Priory Lane

The Parish Council objected to this application. It upheld its earlier concerns as per the first application and was concerned that the footpath within the site and alongside the A415 had now been removed from the application, adding to the dangers for pedestrians. The housing had been moved closer to the existing dwellings in Priory Lane which would have greater impact.

MARCHAM VILLAGE SHOP & POST OFFICE

You know the saying 'It takes a village to raise a child'? Well it turns out it also takes a village to run a shop.

With its current workforce of thirty eight active volunteers and three paid staff (some of whom are pictured on the cover), the community led Marcham Village Shop & Post Office has now been open for almost a year. I'm sure Natasha Kingsbury and Ruth Mander, who manage the shop, would say time flies when you're having fun.

In all seriousness though, running a service like this is no easy task, on some weeks taking up to 40 hours of management time. The shop provides a valuable service to the village, especially to those who can't drive, mothers at home with small children, the older generation and the less mobile.

Marcham Remembered (also on sale in the shop) shows a picture of the original shop (right), which was bought in 1934 after a previous life as a bakery. Without the 'break in service' in recent years when the previous business closed, it seems, unless villagers know of other gaps, that Marcham would have had a shop for 79 years.

Keeping villages alive these days is hard. It needs people, with passion, time and energy, to want to do it. Marcham as a community should be thankful to the quiet dedication of the committee who have set up the shop and who run it with the managers, and to all the volunteers who work there.

Close to its first Anniversary, the shop is thriving, with the small profit it makes being re-invested into the business.

From 10 June 2013 both the shop and the post office will be open all day from 7.30am-6pm, with no closure over lunchtime during the week, on Saturday 7.30am-1pm and on Sunday 8am-1pm.

So what does the shop provide?

As well as stocking brand name products at Tesco prices, ordering in your newspaper and magazines for you and selling seasonal goods like barbecue charcoal (we live in hope), the store's suppliers include many local businesses:



This has made me think that now is the time to transfer these to digital, in order to preserve them. And why not at the same time release a copy of them to those who have taken part or have any interest in them?

I would like reproduce them onto DVDs, to be copyright free and available to everyone. By grouping them under the heading (as above) it will identify these various videos as free of charge. DOG FOULING

The community Led Plan highlights a major concern about dog faeces being left around the village. The Parish Council have invested in Dog Poo bins and have placed signs around the village to remind dog owners of their responsibilities. Several of these signs have been damaged or destroyed already and it's a shame some people believe it is acceptable for there dogs to foul open public places in our village when it is such a simple thing to carry a poo bag and clear mess up.

One dog owner has gone to great length to deposit a pile of poo by a sign in the churchyard. Maybe they think it is amusing but can we assure the person that did this the vast majority of the parishioners and responsible dog owners find this act totally repulsive. Legal Position: It is the the responsibility of the dog owner or the person in charge of the dog to clear up any dog foul left by their dog. If you fail to clean up after your dog you can be issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice, or if the case goes to court a fine of up to £1,000.

The regulations state specifically, that being unaware that the dog has fouled, or not having a suitable means of removing the faeces is not a reasonable excuse for failing to clean up after your dog.

Medical Position: Dog fouling is not only unpleasant it is dangerous. The biggest threat to public health from dog excrement is toxocariasis which is an infection of the roundworm toxocara canis. Symptoms include eye disorders, vague ache, dizziness, nausea, asthma and, in extremely rare cases, seizures/fits. Often the eggs are ingested when passed to the mouth by the hands, but this can also occur through contact with dogs or other inanimate objects including the wheels of toys and the soles of shoes. Infected soil is often found in play areas so Toxocariasis most commonly affects children 18 months - 5 years.

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REPRESENTATIVES' REPORTS

ED VAIZEY WRITES...

I frequently receive information from public bodies that may be useful for constituents, and there have been several things recently that readers may like to know about.

Firstly, the General Medical Council has published a new guide to what patients can expect from their doctor. You can see the guide

at http://dmtrk.net/t/CUG-1FJKJ-4GCWXV-KJ25D-1/c.aspx. You can also call 0161 923 6602 if you don't have access to the internet. Patients deserve the highest standards of care and the GMC is committed to ensuring that they understand what these are. They have therefore produced this guide ,which underlines the importance of dignity, mutual respect and partnership between patients and their doctor. It also sets out the duties of the doctor and that all doctors need to be honest and open if things go wrong, and to make the care of patients their first concern.

I've also received information from Thames Valley Police about how they have been performing locally: it's good news. Across South Oxfordshire and the Vale of the White Horse, violent crime has reduced by 15.6%. Detection rates are going up: for dwelling burglary by 27.5%, for serious sexual offences by 30.3% and for violence against the person with injury by 47.4%, and overall crime is at its lowest level for 15 years.

We are lucky to live in a part of the country with relatively low crime rates (the Vale of the White Horse was recently reported as one of the 20 most peaceful areas in the UK) but every crime committed has a huge impact on its victims, while every crime solved reassures us all about the efforts of our police force. I am very pleased indeed to see these results, which are part of a pattern of reducing crime levels over a number of years.

The Heritage Lottery Fund has contacted me with information about Heritage Enterprise, a new £125million grant programme specifically designed to stimulate local economic growth, generate new commercial income along with new jobs and skills by unlocking the latent commercial potential of unused historic buildings and sites across the UK. There are grants available from £100,000 to £5m. You can find out more about how your community could benefit from Heritage Enterprise by visiting their website; HLF is also offering start-up grants between £3,000 and £10,000. These grants will enable groups to create the organisational structures needed to deliver projects and to help with the associated costs, such as obtaining professional and legal advice.

This month's mailbox has been largely dominated by issues relating to animal welfare. People are concerned over the exports of living animals, and sentencing for those who commit acts of cruelty. Other issues that I have seen in my mailbox include support for Amnesty International's campaign to improve women's rights in Afghanistan, which is still an essential part of the UK's foreign policy priorities, and the Government's reforms to teachers' pay and pensions.

COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

I would like to thank all those who took part in the recent County Elections. I am very aware of how close the voting was in our Division and from painful experience, I do know how it feels to be on the wrong end of a closely fought election. I would like to



thank all my fellow candidates for helping to make it a fiercely but honourably fought contest. One certainty in a tight election is that every vote counted. A 31% turnout was rather better than some had forecast, but it is hardly a triumph for the democratic process. If I have one priority over the next four years, it is trying to engage and involve many more people in local issues and decisions.

Despite the widely reported anger and frustration with the state of things, I found the doorstep reception more friendly than recent elections where expense scandals, electoral systems produced strong feelings. That there is frustration and a sense of resignation cannot be denied.

In this part of the world, immigration and the EU seem rather distant issues and, in my view, are more likely to be symptoms than causes of the frustration. Top of my list of possible causes is Planning. Where we put our housing, how much we need, how we keep it affordable, how we conserve our countryside in the face of building, how we cope with the need for energy, for waste disposal, for water and so on, are all helping to produce a sense of helplessness and resentment at what "they" are doing to us. The irony is that under the Localism Act, we should be feeling more empowered than ever before. For Localism to work two things have to happen. The first is that local people have to believe that they now have powers they have not had before, the second is that "the powers that be" have to be prepared to hand over some power and trust local people to make sensible decisions.

Second on my list of possible causes of current frustration and depression at the state of things is the weather. We all need a long, hot summer to cheer us up.

I cannot do anything about the weather, but if, after four years, I haven't done everything in my power to make people in this division feel better about the state of things and to feel more empowered, and more in control, then I will have failed.

MARCHAM SOCIETY'S APRIL MEETING

Somewhere in a box, not far from where I am sitting now is a photograph of my sister and me standing beside the Cutty Sark in Greenwich. The year was about 1958 or 59. Little did I know then, or in deed until the recent Marcham Society talk, that the ship had only been set in its final resting place in 1957! In fact, the Cutty Sark was still transporting cargo until 1938. At the May talk we were enlightened and entertained by Martin Woodgett who spoke with great passion and authority about the Cutty Sark. His Great Grandfather, Richard Woodgett, was the captain of the ship for ten years from 1885 and his Grandfather, another Richard, had been apprenticed on ship during part this time.

But what is so important about the Cutty Sark that she should be preserved? Sitting, as she does, resplendent in her dry dock. Now surrounded with a glass awning representing the sea on which she travailed for many years. She is the only surviving tea clipper in the world, the tea clipper being very important to our merchant naval history. At one time she won the coveted accolade of making the fastest crossing of any tea clipper from China to Britain. Even over taking a steam packet! The Cutty Sark is kept as a memorial to all merchant seamen who have lost their lives at sea, which include the convoys of the Second World War where many seamen lost their lives.

The Cutty Sark was built in 1869, the same year in which the Suez Canal was opened, which would ultimately ring the death kneel for these beautiful sailing ships. The tea clippers took cargo from Britain to Australia, then, with another cargo on to China ready for the final race home, literally packed to the gunnels with tea.

We heard many interesting facts about the ship, but seeing this article is getting rather long, and not wanting to incur the cut of the editor's scissors (metaphorically speaking). I will finish by saying *cutty sark* means short petticoat and is the garment worn by the witch in the Robert Burns poem 'Tam O Shanter'. This very witch, wearing her cutty sark is the figurehead which for many years ploughed through the restless seas bring the British their favourite drink – tea! **CFS**





Radio, posters, leaflets and Facebook advertising have been used to inform the public to contact the charity if they have any information or suspicions on who or where illegal rolling tobacco and cigarettes are being sold.

"Illegal tobacco sales can be easily overlooked and considered no more than holiday makers 'doing someone a favour'. Everyone loves a bargain but the sale of illegal tobacco can have a knock-on cost to our local communities," comments Phil Gomm, Chair for Thames Valley Crimestoppers.

"Sales are generally associated with crimes of smuggled and counterfeit tobacco and often linked with serious organised crime gangs. It can also bring our young people into early contact with criminals."

Trading Standards in Thames Valley are determined to crack down on traders of illegal tobacco but they need information from the public if they are to be successful. They recognise that often people know what is happening in their communities but are too scared to speak out to the authorities.

Crimestoppers offers people an anonymous and safe route to inform on the criminals involved in illegal tobacco sales. Where are they trading? Who are they? Do you think you know where the tobacco is being stored or made?

While holding one of my meetings at the Marcham shop concerns were expressed to me about the congested parking around the area of Marcham School at School opening and closing times. I know we all have busy schedules but I would ask drivers to remember it is an offence to obstruct the view at a junction and this is something that must be stressed as it is for the safety of drivers and pedestrians. Obstructing a Junction makes you liable for a thirty pound fine. Also please remember congested parking along the pavements can obstruct the view of children crossing the road so consider this when parking and when you are driving WATCH YOUR SPEED!! I will be planning to carry out patrols in the area in the future when I have completed some of the projects and tasks I currently have to complete.

I will also be carrying out patrols of the Marcham playing field to ensure that any groups that are gathering are behaving themselves and deter any likely hood of ASB in this area, this also includes the anti-social use of vehicles in this area and in the rest of Marcham. Vehicles being driven anti-socially are liable to receive a Sec 59 warning, this warning is given to the driver and the vehicle and if either the driver or the vehicle are involved in anti-social driving again the vehicle being used will be seized. While patrolling the parks I will be engaging with the young people and also make sure no underage drinking is taking place and if it is the alcohol will be confiscated and details taken of those involved.

On the whole Marcham is a very lovely place to live and is a very low crime area and we will all continue to work to keep it this way and I look forward to meeting those of you that I have not met. I am proud of the area that I know cover in my role as PCSO.

WHAT CAN 'I' DO TO HELP WILDLIFE IN 'MY GARDEN'?

I have covered many of the basics involved in wildlife gardening in gardens of most sizes, both within urban and rural settings. On having a long and very interest phone call with an enthusiastic



reader yesterday, I think it would be worth recapping on the basics of wildlife gardening once again, so we are all up to speed. Before I dive headlong into writing another set of these wildlife garden articles that focus on specific areas.

So to recap, the main components to have in any wildlife garden are water, many different types of flowers/shrubs/trees, dead wood and grass of differing lengths.

Water - whether in the form of ponds or an upturned dustbin lid - get quickly colonized by a wide variety of life.

Flowers/trees and shrubs need to be varied with flowers of differing shapes, sizes and fragrance, and that flower at as many different times of year as possible. Remember that some insects have different length tongues so those with short tongues need open flat flowers so they can get to the nectar. Obviously they would struggle with long trumpet shaped flowers.

Dead wood is great, but remember not just to have IT in the shade under some trees. Have dead wood in the sun and semi-shade too as that could attract an entirely new set of creatures.

Finally grass of differing lengths - sounds simple but is so effective. If you have a good population of singing grasshoppers and crickets etc it indicates good grassland management.

Go on - have a go at attracting some wildlife to your garden, making your garden even more pleasurable.

The productions led me to ponder how much we should be prepared to sacrifice our own interests for the sake of someone else. In what ways should we be prepared to stand up to prevent injustice? In such situations, how can we draw hope and strength from God?

Like Les Miserables, the Christian story is one of love and forgiveness, of love demonstrated by Christ's self sacrifice and of the forgiveness that is available to each one that repents and turns back to the God who created us.

It is not too late to join us on Christianity Explored to investigate for yourself the true meaning of Christ's sacrificial love and the forgiveness that is ours - if we will only accept our need for it and ask for Christ to enter our loves. Come and investigate the life changing message of Christ with us.
