

ED VAIZEY WRITES...

Every year Halloween, Bonfire Night and Remembrance Sunday seem to me to form a seasonal boundary: as they passed, we were well into autumn and winter is now here. Over the summer, I wrote in a parish newsletter about opportunities while the sun was shining to make our homes warmer for the winter ahead. In such



a rural area as ours, many of my constituents are reliant on oil to heat their homes

A national campaign has been launched urging people to Buy Oil Early. In past severe or prolonged winters there has been significant increased demand for heating oil, and weather conditions have had a negative impact on supplies reaching customers. Since 2010, the Government has worked with the industry and consumer representatives to help them co-ordinate their Buy Oil Early campaign messages, and to provide guidance on setting up or joining consumer buying groups. In Oxfordshire, we are particularly lucky to have Oxfordshire Rural Community Council's bulk oil buying scheme, which has been very successful indeed in getting the best possible price for heating oil for many local residents. You can see details at the ORCC websites, www.oxonrcc.org.uk or call them on 01865 733214. To help with the impact of cold weather more generally, I am pleased that extra money is now being given to help the NHS deal with the increased pressure the cold weather brings, that 'Cold Weather Payments' have been increased to from £8.50 to £25, and the Warm Home Discount scheme has already ensured that over one million of the poorest pensioners have received £130 off their electricity bill. If you think you might be eligible please ensure you log onto Gov.uk and find out.

The past month has been a varied one for my mailbag. I've received emails and letters about women's rights in Afghanistan, Scottish independence, abandoning horses (known as fly grazing), inheritance tax, medical marijuana, dementia research, deafness in children and World Toilet Day, which aims to highlight the 1 in 3 people around the world who don't have a safe or private place to go to the toilet - leading to horrible disease and even systematic sexual assault.

WATER COMPANIES AND WATER COSTS

On December 11 2013 Vale Council passed unanimously this motion: Councillor Gervase Duffield moved 'In the light of Thames Water's continuing interest in a major local reservoir this Council welcomes Ofwat's rejection of the recent Thames Water price increase application, and hopes that Ofwat will be specially vigilant on large applications costing vast sums where these can be undercut by reliable cheaper methods. This Council requests the Chief Executive to convey this motion to Ofwat, Thames Water, and the Vale area MPs, and the Water minister.'

I doubt if any reader will need reminding of the problems we all face with rising utility bills. Of late most of the attention has been on power, electricity and gas; but we all need water, and we cannot just switch water suppliers. So what are we to do to contain the rise in water prices? First, we need to understand the nature of our problem. When water was first privatised, some years back now, everyone knew that *January 2014*

considerable capital expenditure was needed to get the water industry up to scratch. It was the same with most newly privatised industries. And to meet this need the Government gave generous tax breaks; the problem now is that this is still the situation when most of us think the original need has long passed. The effect of this is that if a water company can persuade the authorities a huge and expensive project is needed, they can make a lot of money out of it. No UK water company ever had any problem with borrowing from a bank as no Government could ever let a water company collapse. The water users pay the bill for any huge project approved, and the Water company retains the assets (unlike France where the water company only uses the assets but they are owned by the public) and the profits.

Water Company Gains

All this means that a water company can get huge benefits for its shareholders, acquire new assets which we the users pay for, and on new capital projects currently get the money tax free. So if a company builds a major new project, it gains and flourishes financially with all the tax breaks whereas if it mends the leaks, it get nothing extra. That is just part of their routine business. This situation has to change so that water companies concentrate on value for money for the community not huge tax free projects.

How do we prevent this? We put pressure on Ofwat the Government water watchdog to stop very large and unnecessary projects like the projected reservoir [which is currently shelved but which will doubtless come back again soon] when much cheaper alternatives are available (water transfer and reverse osmosis). Since the Reservoir was turned down at a public enquiry, Thames Water have requested a huge sewage system west of London which a Government committee rejectd as far too large and only allowed a small part of it. Since then there is talk of another huge sewage project in London, a mammoth tunnel under the Thames.

Action

So first we ask Ofwat to reject these excessive projects and to go on doing so, when they are not necessary, are not good value for money, and often there are cheaper alternatives as we demonstrated with the proposed local reservoir. Then there is the tax question. I have no objection to a water company paying good wages, making a decent profit, and paying dividends, but not when such achievements are based on huge and unnecessary expenditure. Is it really right that a company paying handsome dividends should pay little or no tax? The Chancellor and the Treasury need to look into this. It grieves me to see headlines in a newspaper like this one: 'Thames Water will not pay tax for a DECADE'. I hope my motion to Vale Council points the way. We all need to increase the pressure on Ofwat, MPs, and the Treasury.

Local Issue

There are three important local water issues. First, with the closure of Didcot A which was a vast water guzzler with all those cooling towers, the water consumption in the western sector (known as SWOX) of Thames's area will consume a lot less water, especially if RWE give up that part of their water extraction license which they no longer need. There may well be a Didcot C station one day, but it should be air cooled like the B station, and under no circumstances be allowed to be a water guzzler.

Second, Thames Water has not given up on a local reservoir but it is currently somewhat on the back burner, but it is an open question how long a company should be allowed to hold a planning stranglehold on the projected reservoir area. I am not sure when reservoir plans first started but they have been going for well over twenty years and so far always been rejected.

Third, The Oxford East MP has raised the question of whether it is fair for rural areas like ours to pay the costs of expensive projects exclusively for London. That wants looking into.

Better News

The latest suggestions (December this year) from Thames Water contain some good news. They mention three lines of approach for water supply. Water transfer (from the Severn Trent area in our case), reverse osmosis (reusing the water as it travels down the Thames; this happens already and could be significantly increased for London), the third line is still a reservoir which needs great vigilance on water users' part.





LINK YOUR GARDENS TOGETHER

Just a brief wildlife gardening article this month, but one with a clear message.

Last week I was working in a garden when I saw over in the neighbouring garden the homeowner was digging up his entire 100 foot mixed native hedge.



Doing this in autumn with all the berries and hibernation areas, you can imagine my horror.

Over a period of time, the garden in question has been cleared of all life and all that remains of a once abundant habitat is a lush lawn (void of weeds) surrounded by close board fencing.

When I leant over the fence and advised that autumn wasn't probably the most advisable season to do this with wildlife in mind, and that did he really need to clear the entire hedge line as diversity is the name of the game. The response was "Oh I can't be bothered with gardening, I'm going to dig the lawn up to and put an artificial one down. Anyway the wildlife will look after itself, there are plenty of other gardens around".

Now, my take on this is that wildlife shouldn't have to adapt just because we decide to leave carnage in our garden. Many people are doing the same in their gardens, so where has the wildlife got left to go. Also what this gardener failed to realise was this was the last mixed hedge in his area, so he was totally removing the last resting place for wildlife that only uses native hedges. Remember I said many insects are host specific. Just because they are in one type of hedge, doesn't mean they can quickly adapt to another type.

Lastly, wildlife uses hedges linking many gardens as navigation highways, linking communities together. When removing a hedge or a stand of trees, stand back and see if you are clearing a void in these highways that intersect your area.

You could be isolating a population of insects as they can't navigate around, which ultimately can cause local extinction if the clearance is on a large scale.

Next time you are gardening, tidying or clearing, look at the bigger picture and observe what it is you are actually doing.

Please buy your firewood from a local supplier to minimise 'fuel miles' and support local businesses. When you buy firewood ask 1. what the moisture content of the wood is (it should be 25% or less), 2. what volume of wood you are getting (you should know what weight or volume you are getting, not just 'a load'), 3. whether it is soft or hardwood (a hardwood log has more energy than a softwood log of the same size), and 4. how long the logs are. Alternatively buy OxLogs: www.oxonwoodfuel.org.uk/oxlogs. The woodfuel programme now has funding to advise community groups of all kinds on installing biomass boilers in their buildings. Please contact manager@oxonwoodfuel.org.uk for more information, also if your community building is heated by biomass and you would be willing to share lessons from that with others.

Peace and Reconciliation

Towards the end of 2013, surely one of the greatest men who ever lived passed from this life. Over a hundred world leaders gathered together to remember the man whose lasting memorial will be his willingness to turn his back on bitterness and retaliation and instead to embrace his former enemies. Some of Nelson Mandela's quotes seem to reflect a deeply Christian ideology. He said for example - "until I changed myself, I could not change others."



In his autobiography, "The Long Walk to Freedom" he talked of his early experiences with Christianity, praising its engagements with the society around him: "The Church was as concerned with this world as the next: I saw that virtually all of the achievements of Africans seemed to have come about through the missionary work of the Church."

His long incarceration on Robben Island, was probably due to the fact that Mandela had gone from purely vocal opposition to apartheid, to embracing terrorism. But it is likely even then that Mandela's Christian faith influenced the outworking of this strategy. Due to the intransigence of the white South African government, Mandela chose to bring pressure and raise the profile of the struggle against apartheid by bombing infrastructure targets, which they targetted at night, rather than bombing densely populated areas and risking civilian casualties.

In his 1994 autobiography, "Long Walk to Freedom", he said: "No one is born hating another person because of the colour of his skin, or his background, or his religion. People must learn to hate, and if they can learn to hate, they can be taught to love, for love comes more naturally to the human heart than its opposite."

An unforgettable witness to his message of reconciliation came in 1995 at the Rugby World Cup. Mandela rallied both blacks and whites to support the Springbok rugby team, which had for years been despised by black South Africans and was a strong symbol of white authority during the apartheid years. However, when the Springboks reached the finals, it was a heart stopping moment when Mandela walked onto the pitch wearing the green Springbok rugby shirt and cap and shook the hands of the mostly white team. In the end, it was a stunning victory for South Africa in more ways than winning the trophy. Barriers spanning decades were melted in an instant when black South Africans watching the game on TV heard the largely white crowd in the stadium shout "Nelson", "Nelson". One of the most iconic images in South African and sporting history is that of Mandela presenting Springbok captain Francois Pienaar with the Cup. Pienaar later recalled that moment, saying: "Mandela said to me "Thank you have done for South Africa." I said to him, "No, Madiba, you've got it wrong. Thank you for what you've done for South Africa." And I felt like hugging him."

As Michael Jackson once sang. 'I'm looking at the man in the mirror I'm asking if he'll change his ways'"
