MARCHAMPARISHCOUNCILNEWS

Council budget 2015/16

The Parish Council has carefully considered its budget for 2015/2016 looking in detail at its income and expenditure. The Parish Council has resolved that it requires funding of £40,000 for the next financial year. The Vale of White Horse District Council will provide a grant to the parish of £1034, as part of the council tax reduction scheme, and the remaining parish council tax element will be £38966. Statutory power exists for the Parish Councils to pay basic allowances to their members. The members of Marcham Parish Council however decided some while ago to continue working voluntarily for the parish and not to claim allowances, thus helping to cap the parish element of the council tax.

Community Facilities in Marcham

The Parish Council has recently received a response from the Anson Trust regarding the Council's offer. The Council is considering the response and will reply in due course.

Parishioner of the Year Award

There has been a very limited response to the Council's request for the Parishioner of the Year Award, and the Council has therefore decided not to present an award this year.

Annual Meeting of Electors

Advance notice is given that the annual meeting of electors will take place on Wednesday 20th May in the school hall at 7.30 p.m. This is just after the elections. The Council is considering possible guest speakers, and full details of the meeting will follow in due course. In the meantime please make a note of the date in your diaries.

Best Kept Garden Competition 2015

The Council will again be running the Best Kept Garden Competition in 2015. No entry forms will be required and judges will assess gardens from the roadside without the need for entering properties. Please bear the competition in mind when planning your gardens and planting your seeds.

Elections May 2015

It may seem a little early to consider elections in May, but the term of office for the current Councillors comes to an end in May. Elections for the Parish Council, should there be more candidates than seats, will be held at the same time as the General Election and District Council Election. Now is the time to begin to think about standing to serve the community.

The Parish Council has a wide, but limited, range of powers to provide and maintain a variety of important local services such as allotments, bus shelters, open spaces etc, and it acts as a consultee for many issues. It is a very busy time in a changing parish

with much going on.

Further information about the role of a Parish Councillor and the requirements of office can be obtained from the clerk.

Planning Applications

The following planning applications have been considered by the Council:

P14/V2763 Erection of double garage and single storey side extension at Sheepstead Folly, Sheepstead Road. The Council had no objections.

P14/V2363/RM Reserved matters application for outline consent P13/V2731/O for appearance landscaping, layout, and scale for 54 dwellings and associated works at Willow Farm, Abingdon Road. The Council agreed that the basic layout was acceptable but expressed concern regarding the lack of roadway joining with the adjacent development at The Priory, and the distribution of car parking. The Council also requested that local people be given priority when the letting of affordable housing was undertaken.

In your December issue the Parish Council highlighted the fact that it had made an offer to the Trust to take over the running of the Anson Field, with ownership of the field itself being transferred to a charity run by the Parish Council. We have since written to the Parish Council asking it to provide some detail to support its offer and in particular to confirm that the Parish Council had considered the financial, legal and charitable implications of its offer and that it had:

- the funding necessary to complete the acquisition / lease of the field (if, indeed, that is its intention),
- the funding necessary to renovate or replace the existing facilities,
- considered the potential implications for the parish precept should it have to fund the continuing financial losses from running the facilities on the field in the meantime.

In our reply to the Parish Council we have also posed a number of other questions surrounding the provision of community facilities in the village and we look forward to the Parish Council's response in due course.





ED VAIZEY WRITES...

As you are all probably no doubt aware, by now, 2015 is the year of a General Election. In my constituency this is being held alongside elections for both South Oxfordshire and The Vale of White Horse District Councils and elections for many towns and parishes.



The way people register to vote is changing and it is very important that as many of you as possible have the chance to have your say at the ballot box. Individual Electoral registration (IER) is being implemented which requires each person to register to vote individually rather than by household. Residents who have automatically been re-registered on the electoral roll will have received a confirmation letter from the returning officer, and will not have to do anything more.

To try and increase the number of people registered to vote council staff will be visiting the homes of those who are not registered, or who have not sent back forms asking who lives at the property. These canvassers will always carry identification badges, so please ask to see them, and there is no need for them to enter your homes. You can register securely online by visiting www.gov.uk/yourvotematters or by contacting the shared elections office on 01235 540310.

Thursday May 7th (the date of the election) falls in a week with the May Day bank holiday on the Monday, so if you are planning to take this opportunity to go on holiday, please register for a postal vote as soon as possible.

As so many elections are taking place at the same time, counting the votes is being spread over several days. The General Election votes will be counted after polling stations at 10pm on the night of 7th. District Council counts will take place on the afternoon of 8th and town and parish council counts on 9th. If you are interested in getting involved in any of these counts please contact elections@southandvale.gov.uk or telephone the phone number above.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

The NPPF and what's left of Localism

The fall-out from the 160 home Taylor Wimpey application in South Abingdon has had an enormous impact on the way that OCC Transport/Highway officers can argue traffic impact as a reason for refusing an application. The NPPF (National Planning Policy Framework) states that the impact on traffic must be "severe" before traffic can be used to block an application. Various pieces of case law have demonstrated that unless traffic is at an almost complete and permanent standstill, it will not be deemed "severe" enough. This puts OCC officers, VWHDC officers and planning committee

members under enormous pressure to overlook traffic implications in almost all cases. In short, the NPPF trumps almost all traffic considerations.

Much the same situation has now arisen over "safe routes to school" in the same South Abingdon application. After months of wrangling, the OCC Cabinet have agreed that arguments over the safety of proposed pedestrian crossings in Ock St and Marcham Rd in Abingdon are trumped by the NPPF pressure to allow housebuilding. In short, the NPPF trumps child and pedestrian safety.

The VWHDC Planning committee's decision to pass the latest iteration of the giant Warehouse on the edge of Sutton Courtenay because traffic impact is deemed to be "not severe enough", air quality "not bad enough", scale "not large enough" and cumulative impact of 500 odd houses + Didcot B + FCC recycling+ Milton Park not large enough" to warrant refusal, is the latest example of the NPPF's enormous impact on planning. Indeed, one begins to wonder if planning committees have any room for manoeuvre at all. Faced with County and District Officer recommendations to accept applications, it seems that the financial risks are so great that refusal of large scale applications is all but impossible.

A select committee of MPs from all parties made recommendations to the Minister for Local Government broadly in support of the arguments above and that the NPPF was in need of modification. The Minister, in his wisdom, disagreed stating that he felt the NPPF was delivering housing and growth as it was designed to do, and there was no need to modify it.

So there we are. More houses, more jobs, more traffic, more growth and, under the NPPF, at almost any cost. The problem for our area is the very uneven dispersion of the population. 90% of population, along with the jobs and the traffic is crammed into about 5% of the available land. Abingdon, Didcot and all the villages in between are on the verge of merging. We may just about get away with our planned numbers and allocations for 2031, but heaven help us if we cannot find a better solution thereafter.

Politicians need to be starting a grown-up conversation on 2031 solutions now – not in 15 years - a conversation which allows the voice of Localism (so drowned by the NPPF) to be heard.."

We are both entirely in support of the sentiment of Keith Mersh's article in last months' MAD News, in which he urges all parties interested in the future of Marcham, its recreational and leisure facilities and its need for a Village Hall, to get together and begin some serious talking without pre-conditions.

The meeting we held in the Parish Church in November was a first step in this direction. Representatives from all interested parties were present and there was some initial agreement as to how we could take the process forward. That meeting was called at the suggestion of the Anson Trust.

It is imperative that we do not allow the positive feelings, which that meeting may have generated, to dissipate. It is essential that interest groups are not allowed to retrench but each is encouraged to stay "round the table".

The problem with the initial meeting was that there were too many people present to allow any detailed discussion, so we have to find a way of reducing the number of participants whilst allowing everyone to feel that their views are being represented.

There is also an issue that those around the table should be speaking and be seen to be speaking for all those they represent. Those are the problems, and we are attending separate meetings of the interested parties to try to bring this about.

The ultimate goal is a grand plan for Marcham, which addresses most of the problems, a plan that everyone can sign up to with enthusiasm – including OCC and VWHDC.

It will not be easy, but it is not impossible. We will keep you posted on progress.

Reconciliation

Over the last twelve months, I have been thinking a lot around the issue of reconciliation. I've commented in this page on the story of Ian Paisley and Martin McGuinness and the way that they laid aside their past differences and brought peace to Northern Ireland. The same too applied to the story of Nelson Mandela who, after years in prison came into government and saw the end of apartheid. Mandela chose not to go down the road of retribution but instead laid aside all bitterness. The example mentioned last month, of the 1914 Christmas truce, where soldiers climbed out of their trenches and realized that they were not so different from each other is also an example to us all.

In the last few days, I was curious how reconciliation is handled in a larger arena. The Conflict Research Consortium, University of Colorado, focuses on the study of settling international disputes and says this on one of their webpages:

Reconciliation is the ultimate goal of peacebuilding. It occurs when disputants develop a new relationship based on apology, forgiveness, and newly established trust. reconciliation involves all those processes. It brings people together, enabling them to grow beyond the past to re-establish a normalized, peaceful, and trusting relationship in the present.

It seems that looking at those international experiences, there needs to be a willingness to do three things.

- to lay aside the past, being prepared to apologize and to receive the apology of the other party with grace.
- to forgive and to receive that forgiveness gracefully from the other party.
- to be prepared to genuinely listen to each other, being prepared to concede that the other party or parties might have a valid point to make.

So what does scripture say about this issue? There is no doubt that forgiveness and reconciliation is the most important part of the good news. The subject is not just one of reconciliation between mankind and God but also one of reconciliation between individuals or groups. Reconciliation is probably the major Christian theme.

The issue of reconciliation is a subject, which Jesus spoke much about. A commentary on the subject says this:

When a person wrongs us, bitterness places within us a wall against that person; a roadblock in our way of building a reconciled relationship. If we are to destroy the roadblock that is in the way of restoring a right relationship, then forgiveness is basically a choice that we must make. If an individual has done something wrong against another and it has caused them to hold a grudge against you, then it is your responsibility to go to that person and try to make things right. Your goal should be to be reconciled with that person.

But isn't it a lot easier to forgive somebody when they come to us first and offer their apology? When you go to somebody and ask for their forgiveness, what you are doing is helping them to break down the roadblock that is in the way of that reconciliation and a restored relationship.

The issue of reconciliation is one that can apply to us all, in our personal relationships, between family members or between friends. When those relationships have problems, it could be something major but might just be as a result of something small, or even merely a misunderstanding. But regardless of the magnitude of the felt hurt, a refusal to forgive by one party can be overcome by humility and genuine repentance by the one who has caused the hurt. Similarly, a willingness to take the initiative to forgive can be what breaks down the barriers of hurt and grievance.

But that issue of being reconciled one to another can also apply between groupsnot just internationally but at a more local levelgroups who have been unable to understand the position taken by those they are in conflict with.

As The Conflict Research Consortium in Colorado said:, *Reconciliation occurs when disputants develop a new relationship based on apology, forgiveness, and newly established trust. Reconciliation involves all those processes. It brings people together, enabling them to grow beyond the past to re-establish a normalized, peaceful, and trusting relationship in the present.*

Let's make the choice to apologise, forgiveand then learn to trust so to break down the walls that divide us and move on.
