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MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS Annual Meeting of Electors – 25th May, 2016 – Environment Agency

The annual meeting of electors took place on 25th May. Reports were given by the Parish Council on its activities over the last year, the County and District Councillors, parochial charities and Marcham Primary School. It was easy to see, after hearing about everything that is going on, what a very busy village Marcham is. The guest speakers were the Environment Agency who outlined the plans for the Oxford Flood Relief Scheme to reduce flood risk for Oxford. They also spoke about the plans to help Abingdon's flood problems Modelling was being undertaken for a flood storage area for Sandford Brook and also the river Ock. The storage area was likely to be west of the A34 and south of the A415. Modelling will be complete in the next 2 months or so. The Oxford Scheme will be presented at a drop in event in Oxford Town Hall, on 28th June between 2.00 p.m. -8.00p.m.

Grass Cutting

Like last year, the County Council, owing to its budget restraints has had to restrict the number of times the grass verges alongside the roads are cut. The Parish Council expressed great concern to them that the sight lines when leaving Howard Cornish Road and joining the A415 had effectively disappeared owing to the length of the grass, and the junction had become very dangerous. At the Parish Council's request this junction has now been cut as a one off arrangement.

Mobile Library

Unfortunately the mobile library service in Oxfordshire will cease in September. The County Council has reached this decision as part of its huge financial savings that it has to make. The last round of visits will being on Monday 5th September 2016, and the final day of the service will be Friday 16th September. The County Council will continue to work with the users of the service to find alternative ways for them to access library services either through the network of library buildings, the online library service or Home Library Service.

Changes to Bus Services

Following the withdrawal of bus subsidies by the County Council owing to its budgetary constraints, the bus companies have been working with the County Council to see how the affected areas could be best served. As a result some changes to the local bus services have had to be made. Fortunately the 31 is a commercial service so is unaffected, but the X15 Abingdon to Witney, will be renumbered 15, and will have a reduced timetable. It will still run

Monday to Saturday, but it will no longer stop at Millets Farm, however it will serve Howard Cornish Road. See timetable at https://tis-kml-stagecoach.s3.amazonaws.com/PdfTimetables/XOAO015.pdf

A338 – Proposed new bus stop

The junction of the Faringdon Road and A338 is entirely within Frilford parish. That parish has been talking with the County Council regarding the provision of a bus stop at this junction near the Dog House Hotel. The Council has learned that unfortunately, owing to difficult sight lines, no stop can be provided northbound, but a southbound stop is likely. This should go, some way to helping the residents in the Faringdon Road, A338 and Tubney have slightly better provision as far as the X30 bus service is concerned.

Unitary Authority Proposals

Workshops and forum sessions are being held by both Oxfordshire County Council and the Vale of White Horse District Council to outline proposals and have discussions with the parish and town councils regarding plans for a future unitary authority. Marcham Parish Council is sending two representatives to each of the sessions to learn more about what each Authority is considering.

Youth Shelter

The youth shelter in the Anson field is looking rather tired, and in need of painting. This is currently being considered, and it is hoped that it can be repainted over the summer period.

New signage at The Crown Public House, Packhorse Lane. Council had no objections P16/V1148/HH Single storey side extension, single storey rear extension with 2 storey centre element at 12 Parkside. The Council had no objections.

Demolish previous extensions and extend principal dwelling and former barn with both single and two storey additions, (amended plans) at Marcham Mill, Mill Road. The Council had no objections to the amended plans, but reiterated its comments on the first application to ensure account had been taken of any effect on the watercourse.

I would like to thank on behalf of the family of Maurice Henry Shepherd everyone who has sent their thoughts and prayers at this very sad time. I would also like to thank those who attended my Father's service on Wednesday 15th June. As promised the poem I read out is printed on page 11. Rosemary, despite not knowing my Father you did him proud. My Father was born in the Village, lived in the village, and worked here all his life. Dad fell in love with my mum, Ann, while working in Denman College gardens. They lived at Sheepstead, the Orchard, Mill Lane and finally in the Gap. I have been reading his diaries and been amazed at the work he has carried out during this time. From the 'youth shelter' near the cricket field, the Baptist Church toilets, many houses have been altered or built, the Ha Ha at Oakley park, turned Sheepstead house into two dwellings, and finally his passion of Natural Stone walling all over the fields and pastures of Marcham and Frilford. These walls were built with strong foundations, much like my Fathers passion for Marcham. In his coffin he requested 3 items: a clod of Turf, a cutting from the Willow tree and a small piece of Dry Stone Wall - epitomises my Dad.

He was the last surviving founder member of the Ex-Serviceman's club, which Marcham has also sadly lost this year. When I was little he used to make me chop lighting wood to take round to Nancy Brown, Miss Hyam, Miss Tyrells, Nelly Gosling...the list was endless. Never took a penny because that was what the Oldies did back then. Help one another, we could all learn a thing or three from their example. In fact a few of you, and you know who you are, have been so kind and helpful these last 2 weeks, without your help; the sharing of words over a cuppa, this would have been doubly difficult.

Dad is now at peace next to the love of his life, in his churchyard, in his village. Garry Shepherd.

NEW ROAD NAMES

I have been asked about the origins of some of the new road names.

Marcham has over 250 new homes proposed or being built at the moment and new roads are required to serve those estates. Some road names have disappeared from Marcham like Rhubarb Alley. However, here are some of the new street names that you might be asked about:

- Abbots Grange on Priory Field derives from the ancient monastery that was there.
- Harding Way on Kings Field is a local family name.
- Willow Farm off Packhorse Lane is named after the farm that was there.
- Bakehouse Lane off Packhorse Lane there used to be an old bakehouse near this site.
- The Paddocks off Packhorse Lane is named after the house at the front.

Most of these roads already have signs up making it easier to direct someone if lost.

But there are also new road names still to come which have been agreed by the District Council:

- Pointer Place off the Willow Farm development is a local family name.
- Greenwood Grove, Lea's Lane and Plantation Avenue off Longfields: these match the surrounding themed roads Longfields and Hyde Copse
- Higgins Row for the 4 houses on North Street opposite The Crown pub. The Higgins family owned the land for their coach company.

However, there are still more roads to name. The Parish Council looks at historical, family, local knowledge and connections and consults with local groups. It then compiles a shortlist to send to the District Council for consultation and agreement. Any ideas for road names are welcome. Please send these to the Clerk.





I was delighted to see that a local charity, based at Long Wittenham, The Earth Trust, has been given The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service. It is thanks to volunteers like this that many of us have access to large areas of open space, which they use freely and widely, such as Wittenham Clumps, Thrupp Lake, and the Castle Meadows in Wallingford. The work done by the Earth Trust Volunteers is undoubtedly deserving of this award.



Young people looking for volunteering opportunities over the summer months might be interested in the programs run through the National Citizen Service. This is a program for 16 and 17 year olds, and runs for three weeks in the summer, followed by a 30 hour community action project. I frequently get contacted by constituents who are experiencing problems on the roads. Highways England have informed me that they are updating their route strategies which will inform projects for the period 2020-2025. This is one of the key steps of research required to help provide information on the use and performance of roads and shape future investment priorities. An online mapping tool has been launched that allows the public to inform them about the performance, impact, and challenges the road network faces. Beware the man with forked tongue

The trouble with experts is they do not always agree. Even those employed to give independent, dispassionate advice to the decision-makers often give conflicting advice. There is a similar danger that the two firms, paid to advise us all on Unitary Government in Oxfordshire, may also wind up giving us conflicting advice The problem is compounded if the "experts" appear to have been "got at" by people seeking only the advice they wish to receive. This devalues the perceived integrity of independent advisors and, as with the EU Referendum, it leaves the decision-makers (in that case you and me) in a state of confusion as to whom to believe.

By the time you read this, the Referendum will most likely be done and dusted, but the one question I have been asked time

and again over the last few weeks is "How can I believe what the experts say?". Leaving aside the question of whether you and I are capable of making a decision requiring a detailed understanding of economics, the best answer I can give is – find the experts you trust most, and question their possible motives for giving the advice they are giving. At the same time look at the advice being given by those with least to gain or lose from any outcome. It is interesting therefore, that Vladimir Putin, Marie le Penne and Donald Trump all think we should vote to leave the EU. That advice, together with what I hear from most young people makes my decision as to which way to vote on June 23rd much easier!

The same issue arises over Unitary argument. We are depending on Price Waterhouse Cooper, (employed by the District Councils to advise them) and Grant Thornton, (employed by the County Council to advise them) to give us genuinely dispassionate, independent advice on which way we should go. When asked by GT what I wished from their report, I was very clear that whatever they had to say, it must be independent advice based on their independent analysis. In my view the integrity of the whole process will be blown away if any Council is perceived to have tried to pre-judge or sway the consultants. I expect GT's analysis to be scrutinized for independence and I will be doing my best to ensure that the PWC analysis is subjected to the same scrutiny..

The need for bungalows

The other day I went to speak to the site manager of the Willow Farm development about a rumour that had been circulating in Marcham, namely that the four bungalows that we had worked so hard to get included in that development had been sold to the developer! The site manager was very polite, listened to my concerns and then told me to contact Rachel Lewis of Pye Homes as she was responsible for collating the sales, although Thomas Merrifield is actually selling the homes. Rachel Lewis reassured me that no bungalows had been sold and that they were not going to be released for sale until this August or September, although a lot of interest has already been shown in them. She urged that people could get their names on the list by contacting Pye homes on 01865 373903 or by email at enquiries@pyehomes.co.uk

I can hear you saying "Why can't there be more bungalows in the mix of housing on these developments?" Clearly there is a real need for them, especially with our ageing population, which needs to downsize into suitable housing. But, alas, we are in the hands of developers, who need to make as much profit as they can from any development. The bigger the house and the smaller its footprint, the more profit they make. So of course bungalows are way down on their list of priorities of building types ... a bungalow takes up more land with its footprint and cannot be sold for such a high price as a house. I have tried to persuade each new developer to include bungalows in all Marcham's new developments, but, only Pye Homes, to their credit, have agreed to build a few.

The other risk in building a bungalow is that once it gets into private hands there is the strong likelihood that it will be converted into a chalet bungalow and maybe, eventually, into a full house, like the one next door to us in Drayton. So our stock of bungalows diminishes again and the cry goes up for more bungalows again. So what is the answer? Maybe we should be looking at semi detached bungalows or even quarter bungalows with much smaller gardens to care for and therefore with a smaller footprint. Alternatively we could be asking for more ground floor flats. If anyone has a better idea please let me know...

NEWS FROM MARCHAM SCHOOL

Almost the end of another school year and, as ever, it has been crammed with things that we can be proud of and can celebrate. In an educational climate that is forever changing - and at an increasingly rapid rate – we hold on to our principles and values for the education of our children: friendship and community, respect, compassion, responsibility, perseverance and courage. The seemingly shifting ground of education drives us to continually consider what we do in light of our moral purpose. A part of our vision for the school is that our children are able to contribute positively to the world. It's great that they do well academically (and they do at Marcham) – but to what end? We are not just about taking and acquiring, but about giving back and we are passionate about encouraging children to be the best that they can be so that they can make the world a better place.

Last year, I was delighted to announce that we had been nominated as a Global Learning Expert centre. Mr Codd and I, who lead it, have had 17 schools on our 'books' and we lead training for staff from these schools, from which staff lead their schools and pupils. We have looked at concepts of globalisation and interdependence, images and perceptions and tried to wrestle with the complex and thorny issue of poverty. In our last session we looked at the 17 Sustainable Development Goals - set in September '15 where 193 member states of the United Nations, sought to find ways in which to end poverty, protect the planet and ensure prosperity for all. These followed on from the Millennium goals (8 anti-poverty targets) which made enormous progress - but not enough. Some of you may know about these goals (SDGs). If you don't, may I encourage you to do so: it may just spur you on to thinking of ways in which, working together, we can make things better - in Marcham and further afield. We have been really excited about this aspect of our educational outreach but it is but one of many...Our reputation and visibility within the Abingdon Partnership of schools continues to grow, as Mrs Johnson continues to train Middle Leaders from a range of Oxfordshire schools and Miss Bowles begins her training to do the same in Early Leadership skills.
