MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS **Annual Council Meeting**

At the annual Council meeting held on 9th May, Mr. David Walton was elected Chairman for the forthcoming year and Miss Ruth Mander as Vice-Chairman. Mr. William Cumber will represent the parish on the Hills Aggregates Liaison Committee. This Committee acts as a forum for discussion on the operation of the sand extraction site at the northern end of the parish. Mr. Walton will be the parish transport representative at meetings with the county council on public transport issues. Various other appointments were made to internal working parties and to other outside bodies. The contact details of the Council members can be found on the Council's noticeboard outside the Institute.

Vale of White Horse District Council -**Interim Housing Supply Statement**

Changes in planning law introduced by the Government's National Planning Policy Framework mean that the District Council's proposals cannot now be adopted as a formal policy of that Council. Instead, a five year housing land supply statement will be produced, plus a separate sites assessment document, which the planning committee will take into account in reaching its decision, alongside the formal policies of the Council.

Dial a Ride Service

A new county wide service has replaced the Octabus Dial a Ride. It is being operated by the County Council's own integrated transport unit. There is a new number for users to phone to book their dial a ride journey. This is 0845 310 11. The service will still operate 9.00 - 5.00 p.m. Mondays to Fridays. Concessionary bus pass holders will still be able to travel free of charge. The service can be used for any purpose of journey, except journeys to hospital appointments and to County Council funded day centres. If your travel needs are more complex, or you want to know about other door to door services then call OxTAIL (Oxfordshire Travel Advice and Information Line on 01865 323738.

RECENT METAL THEFTS

With soaring demand for metal in the Far East has come an equally rapid growth in metal thefts. Lead, copper and stainless steel roof coverings, roof flashings, copper lightning conductors and lead rainwater pipes have all been targeted. Whilst world demand for metal remains strong their scrap value will continue to be high, making them an attractive target for thieves and churches will continue to face this problem for the foreseeable future. Churches may be among some of the easiest of targets, many of them set in isolated locations with minimal CCTV coverage, but still the scale of the theft is staggering. There are many ways that we can help tackle recent metal thefts. Firstly applying Smartwater and signage to property is an undeniable deterrent. This forensic marking will trace property back to its original owner if recovered and studies show that 74% of offenders are put off of property marked with Smartwater. Joining the local Neighbourhood Watch scheme and keeping a watchful eye out for anything suspicious around church's can be a big help that costs nothing. Such activity, if identified, should be dealt with by calling the police straightaway on 101. St Mary Magdalene Church in Shippon and St Leonard Church in Sunningwell have been recent targets.

Anson Field Sports Facility Update

You are no doubt aware the planning application has now been before the Vale of White Horse District Council (VWHDC) for about a month. A number of people have commented on the application whether in *June 2012*

Taylor Wimpey Planning Application for 51 houses on the Anson field and a new community hall rear of Hyde Copse/Longfields.

The District Councillor, Jane Hanna and the Parish Council have been circulating consultation questionnaires to gather the views of the residents on the Taylor Wimpey proposals. At the time of writing, questionnaires are being returned and the comments assessed. The questionnaire provided an opportunity to state whether you supported the proposal or not. Once the results are known these will be released publicly, and displayed on noticeboards. The intention is to inform the Anson Trust and other groups such as the Marcham Community Group, just as soon as practicable.

There will be an additional meeting of the Parish Council, which is open to the public, on **Wednesday 6th June** in the residents' lounge at Duffield Place at 7.30 p.m. when the Council will discuss the application in order to determine its response to the Vale of White Horse District Council. There will be some time set aside for public participation, so if anyone wishes to address the Parish Council, then you are requested to give notice in advance by contacting the clerk (email:clerk@marchamparishcouncil. gov.uk or tel: 391833) by 12.00 noon on Tuesday 5th June. This is in order to fairly share the time available and, if necessary, to encourage those with similar comments to appoint a spokesperson.

support of or against the proposals, or to raise queries relating to specific matters.

We are obviously monitoring all of the responses submitted to understand the issues that have been raised. In relation to the principle of development, we have set out our thoughts on the recently issued newsletter that was circulated to all homes within the village. Notwithstanding comments relating to the principle of development, there do appear to be three technical issues that have been raised that I consider appropriate to provide a brief comment on below. The three issues are foul sewage, drainage and highways:

Waste Water Infrastructure: Thames Water Utilities have not objected to our application but have recommended that a suitable condition be attached to any permission to ensure suitable mitigation works are undertaken, if deemed necessary. The proposed development comprises 51 units, which will create an additional peak flow of circa 2.36 litres per second. Thames Water Utilities will undertake a comprehensive impact assessment based upon this peak flow and will y advise whether or not mitigation measures are necessary. These measures, if needed, would be wholly implemented at the cost of Taylor Wimpey.

Drainage: Our development cannot be deemed acceptable if it increases the risk of flooding either on or off site. The development will incorporate various sustainable urban drainage (SUDS), which will control surface water discharge to match that of a Greenfield site for a 1 in 100 year 30%, (additional protection against global warming) storm event, which is the design criteria laid down by the Environment Agency. These SUDS measures will include extensive areas of permeable paving together with suitably located soakaways, which will facilitate the discharge of surface water into the ground at source. We will also be undertaking additional mitigation measures to protect against an exceedance event, which will comprise suitably located earth bund together with a cut-off drain in the south east corner of the site. The details of this are still evolving and will be submitted to VWHDC in due course.

Highways: Our application is supported by a Transport Statement which comments upon the impact on vehicle flows that a development of 51 homes would create. For clarity and in response to some of the comments raised, the existing access to the Anson Field will be widened and enhanced through the development so as to allow the free flow of two way traffic at the junction so as to avoid cars waiting on Morland Road to pull into the site.

I trust this update is of use and would once again wish to thank all persons who have commented on the application proposals for both sites. These comments are continually being reviewed and if amendments are required these will be made to our application proposals.



ANSON FIELD - ARCHAEOLOGY SUMMARY

Great

Marcham Jubilee

Under the instruction of Taylor Wimpey following a request from Oxfordshire County Council our consultants undertook an archaeological investigation of that part of the Anson Field that is the subject of the application for residential development. The investigations have been undertaken in three phases which are set out below:

Geophysical Survey:

Prior to any trenches or excavations being undertaken a geophysical survey was undertaken which records the make up of the ground e.g. whether it be stone, soil or something else. From this it is possible to review the make up of the ground and whether there is a chance that there are archaeological remains within. This survey clearly showed that the site has some archaeological merits.

Excavation of Trenches by Little Angels Nursery:

In March, 6 archaeological trenches were excavated. Within the trenches, numerous remains of prehistoric date were identified, including the remains of a Bronze Age (c. 2000BC) burial mound or barrow and an Early to Middle Iron Age (c. 700-350BC) settlement, which was potentially occupied beyond the Roman Invasion of 43AD. The identification of a ditch (see cover) associated with a Bronze Age barrow may still contain a central burial, and suggests that similar features identified during the geophysics are also likely to be the remains of barrows.

Extensive Iron Age settlement features including numerous storage pits probably reused for rubbish dumping contained pottery dating to the Early and Middle Iron Age. Boundary ditches potentially separating fields or properties and possible timber structures were also recorded, suggesting a thriving community existed here for several hundred years. An example of the type of thing found is shown on the cover – to confirm this is an example of a similar thing rather than that which has specifically found in Marcham (those found are generally smaller).

Excavation of Football Pitch Area:

These trenches have only recently been dug and the results are being evaluated. However, it appears that similar finds have been made to those set out above and these results are being evaluated and further information will be provided once that information is available.

Summary:

As is clear above there have been some archaeological finds on site. We anticipate that as a result we will need to undertake further excavations and investigations before any development can commence on site but this is currently being reviewed and negotiated with the County Archaeologist at Oxfordshire County Council.

ED VAIZEY WRITES...

I have met up recently with two constituents who are succeeding against the odds. I was very delighted this month to give tea to Faith Alabi from Didcot, in the House of Commons. I supported Faith's application for a bursary at the Guildhall School of Drama, without which she would have had a hard time financing her studies.



She has now secured a bursary set up in memory of Josephine Hart, the late wife of Maurice Saatchi, so he came to meet her as well. Faith has also been selected to perform in the Olympics opening ceremony. I look forward to her winning an Oscar.

I was also privileged to meet a very special Wallingford resident. Sharon Dumper has recently completed a course in nail technology at Abingdon and Witney College, and has won an award, recognising how she has turned her life around. Before taking the course she was virtually housebound, suffering from depression. Now she is starting her own business.

As I have promised to do every month, I will go through the campaigns and issues that have filled my mailbag. The largest number of emails I've received recently have been about fuel duty. I have also had letters about the Winsor review into Police pay and pensions, mostly from police officers; and letters on both sides of the debate over the proposals about equal marriage for same-sex couples. There has been a campaign about malnutrition in Africa and calls to commit to our continued spending on overseas aid, ahead of the upcoming G20 summit in Mexico. My other correspondence has included opinions about the proposals to reform the House of Lords. Some are concerned about the current make-up of the House of Lords, others are saying that more elections would cost too much and serve no purpose. I've also had a few emails about the recent passage of the Legal Aid Bill.

Over the past couple of months I've also received emails from churches and communities concerned about the Chancellor removing the VAT exemption on listed buildings alterations. Understandably people were concerned about the rise in costs of fitting modern facilities to old buildings. So I was delighted to hear that the Chancellor has arranged for an extra £30m per year to be added to the Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme (LPWGS) to help offset the higher costs, taking the total available to £42 million.

You may have heard the Vale has abandoned its interim housing plan. Because of the recession and other problems some of the large housing projects in the constituency have been delayed which means the council had to consult on an interim plan to deliver enough new homes to meet their five year targets. Small sites were identified in villages such as Marcham, Drayton, Kingston Bagpuize, Harwell, Steventon and Sutton Courtenay. I know there was a lot of concern about the plans, but I also know that many villages do need a few more homes. I will be awaiting the publication of their new core housing strategy which should come out soon.

I'd like to mention the 'We Made It!' competition which invites young people to submit designs and ideas for an object, gadget, gizmo or toy which they would like to see made. The winning designs will be invited to a Fab Lab, the outstanding facilities provided by MIT and the Manufacturing Institute which allow anyone to make anything using high-tech methods and materials and with the support of experts. If anyone is interested in taking part then please send an email to my address below.

Finally, I would like to make everyone aware of the new Money Advice Service, a free and independent service established by government and funded by a levy on the banks and financial services industry. It is very important that everyone has access to advice on their personal finances. The website (www.moneyadviceservice.org.

uk) gives a wealth of financial advice tailored to all kinds of difficult situations. It also offers a free financial health check and a quick questionnaire to help people plan for the future.

Although the newspapers have reported regularly on the drought and the hose pipe ban, not a lot has been said about reservoirs, except that they are now full. Certainly storage capacity is a concern and Thames Water is accused of selling off 19 small reservoirs over the last 20 years for development and profit while their leakage levels are still far too high at about a quarter of overall demand. However, having seen the detail, they are wise to maintain the current restrictions as the flow in the Thames relies on the water held in aquifers (water bearing rocks like chalk) which are still well below normal despite recent rainfall. The desalination plant at Becton is in operation for the first time to help meet London's water requirements.

Meanwhile GARD's expert consultants are maintaining pressure on Thames Water by checking progress on the studies which the company was required to commission following the Public Inquiry. The research includes the ecological effect of low flows in the Thames due to over abstraction (which is legally required to meet the EU standards of The Water Framework Directive), the environmental assessment for the river Severn to ensure that periodic water transfer would not damage the Severn ecology, the engineering options for Severn Thames transfer including the Cotswold Canal route, and the measurement of the quality of treated effluent produced by the upgraded sewage treatment works at Deephams. Much of this is very technical and we are fortunate to have a team which both Thames Water and the Environment Agency respect. We will continue to fight against selection of the expensive option which would flood and destroy our neighbourhood!

Layout improved—tweaks still in progress

At the Open Meeting on 24 April MCG members discussed the Anson Trust/Taylor Wimpey planning application and voted by a majority of almost two to one to support the principle behind the proposals: raising the funds for new community facilities on the northern edge of the village through new housing on half of the Anson Field. Members also agreed broadly with the layout of the community building proposed in the application. However, some modifications were still needed. A report of the meeting, with the voting results, is on the MCG website.

Internal changes to the proposed building are possible for a few more weeks and MCG organised a second Users Forum, held on 9 May, to consider these. In preparation, some groups had drawn alternative layouts. The Forum looked at and discussed all the suggestions and came to a consensus on a number of recommendations. These have been detailed in a report, including layout plans, which was sent to Taylor Wimpey and the Anson Trust on 14 May. Following this, MCG sent comments to the Vale District Council on the planning application. The report and the comments are also on the MCG website.

MCG's first AGM

This also was held on 24 April, just before the Open Meeting. The Chairman, Jim Asher, reported on a very successful start for MCG. It was just over two years since the initial meeting. MCG became a limited company in December 2010 and was registered as a charity ten months later. It has over 300 members.

MCG's income has benefited from a number of fund-raising events (Royal Wedding Tea Party, Marcham Masks, Burns Supper, village-wide garage sales, snowball dinners and coffee mornings) and its bank balance is now over £10,000. Through these events, MCG believes it is helping to rebuild a stronger community spirit which has dwindled in the years following the closure of the Institute.

MCG played an important role in launching the Community Led Plan project in July 2011 and is continuing to contribute to the process.

MCG has been tracking closely the development of proposals by the Anson Trust (AT) and Taylor Wimpey Oxfordshire (TWO) on the proposed community building. Since December of last year it has sent three reports with detailed recommendations to AT and TWO, based on wide consultations. The committee has worked hard to be open and to communicate fully with members and the wider community on what MCG is doing, the progress it has made – and the dilemmas it has faced. MCG is committed to identifying the right solution for the provision of community facilities for the people of Marcham.

The AGM approved keeping subscriptions the same for the next subscription year (£5 individual; £8 family) and voted unanimously to elect the six nominations as directors. They are: Jim Asher, Jessica Brod, Suzanne Crafer, Mike Hudson, Joey Maclean, Colin Trinder.

ABINGDON LITTLE ANGELS


The Little Angels have been busy this month looking at mini beasts and exploring the world of insects, The theme table allowed the children to explore








If God Is For Us, Who Can Be Against Us?

Last month, I talked about the footballer Fabrice Muamba, who had suffered a heart attack and was at that time in hospital recovering. Since then, more of the story has emerged. Despite the odds being totally stacked against him, Muamba is now out of hospital and apart from slight lapses in memory, he is fully fit mentally. This is incredible because technically he had died. Though several times the medical staff on the pitch thought of giving up, it was only because of the personal connection between the team doctor and Fabrice that they persisted in trying to save him. Incredibly, they had spent seventy eight minutes trying to revive him before his heart started beating again on its own.

Subsequently the doctors in the hospital were so certain that he would be brain damaged that they gave Muamba's father a manual on how to cope. Mr Muamba threw it in the bin, saying



that he would not be needing it. His faith in God was so strong that he felt convinced that his son would be fine. Fabrice, also someone with a strong Christian faith, is still frail and it's unclear if he will ever play football again. However, if he cannot resume his career, he knows he will manage. After his release from hospital, he said "There is a verse in the Bible, I can't remember which one, but it goes: 'If God is with us, who can be against us?' If God is with me, who can be against me? I died, literally but I am alive. There is nothing now to be in fear of."

The verse that Muamba quoted is from the book of Romans in the New Testament and continues, "If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare His own Son but gave Him up for us all – how will He not also graciously give us all things?" Faith in God through Jesus Christ does not mean that we are protected from sickness or tragedy. Like Muamba, bad things can happen to the best of people, including the most Godly but the Bible shows us that when we put our faith and trust in Him, God is with us through all the pathways of life, carrying us especially with us in times of tragedy, as well as guiding us through life if we are willing to trust Him and be obedient to God's call.

True Christianity is about living a life of faith, regardless of how life's path might twist and turn. No matter how up and down it might be, God is with those who put their trust in Him and as Muamba points out, with God in control of your life, there is nothing to fear. Like other Christian friends in the village, we at Marcham Baptist Church are committed to living that life of faith. We would like to help you to find that faith for yourself – true faith that leads to a trust in the one true God who is with you not solve through the large of life but who also is there.

not only through the joys of life but who also is there with you through times of tragedy and trial.
