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MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS Planning Application – Development of Kings Field

The planning application P13/V0575/O for the erection of 48 dwellings and associated means of access, car parking, new footpath links, amenity space and landscaping on land off Sheepstead Road, north of Kings Avenue will be discussed at the Parish Council meeting to be held on Wednesday 8th May in the residents' lounge at Duffield Place at 7.30 p.m. There will be some time set aside for public participation, so if anyone wishes to address the Parish Council, then you are requested to give notice in advance by contacting the clerk. (email:clerk@marchamparishcouncil. gov.uk or tel: 391833 by 12.00 noon on Tuesday 7th May) This is in order to fairly share the time available and if necessary to encourage those with similar comments to appoint a spokesperson.

**Recycling Banks Howard Cornish Road** Last month it was reported that the recycling banks in Howard Cornish Road are regularly overflowing and have general waste, including trade waste, left around them. The problem is not only experienced in Marcham but at other recycling areas in the district as well. The sites have become a magnet for fly tippers, and they quickly become an eyesore. When fly tipping takes place the recycling in the bins become contaminated meaning it all goes into landfill. The Vale of White Horse District Council is inviting comments on the suggestion that the banks should be removed, as there is no reason why the recycling banks should need to be used. Any excess recycling that does not fit into vour green wheeled bin can be placed in a clear bag or open box, next to the bin on the usual collection day. Comments on the proposal to remove the recycling banks can be sent to waste.team@southandvale.gov. uk The deadline for comments is 3rd May.

### **Vale of White Horse District Council – Taxi tariffs**

The District Council is encouraging residents to have their say on how carriage taxi pricing is set, with one lucky resident winning a £50 High Street shopping voucher. For further information visit www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk where the details are on the home page.

### **Weed Spraying**

The spraying of the footways will take place in May. Access to kerb edges will be required, so it would be helpful if residents would bear this in mind when parking their vehicles in the day time. If there is any obstruction to the road edges and kerbs, then areas earmarked for weed spraying will be missed.

### Local Government Boundary Commission - Vale of White Horse District Council wards

Local Government Boundary Commission has completed its electoral review of the area and confirmed that the Vale of White Horse District Council will have 38 councillors from the next elections in May 2015. The aim of the review was to recommend ward boundaries that ensured that each councillor represented approximately the same number of residents. The recommendation is to essentially leave Marcham ward as it is at the moment, as a one member ward. It will have similar boundaries as at present, other than minor changes in the Cothill Road area where some houses in St. Helen Without parish are included in a ward with the rest of Dry Sandford.

### **Best Kept Garden Competition**

As a reminder the Council is organising a best kept garden competition this year. Judging for this year's competition will take place during the early part of June. This will be front gardens only. Final round judging will take place during July. Please remember the competition when planning and planting your gardening this month.

### The Demise of an old friend.

The Didcot A coal fired power station is no more. At least it is still standing there, but it will never be used again, though it now has to go through a period of decommissioning, and then finally demolition, so it could easily be five years before it finally disappears, and of course meanwhile there is a gradual run down of staffing levels. (The B station continues to flourish and will be expanding).

I must be one of the few locals who was resident here before the A station was conceived and then built. So readers might be interested in a few facts and salient features. The station was designed in the 1960s and built to open in 1970, and has run pretty well without a serious hold up ever since until this Spring. It took nearly 30,000 tons of steel in its construction, and the main foundations took almost 500,000 tons of concrete. Getting on a four miles of roads were constructed.

By the 1990s the A station was joined by its B sister, a gas fired station and very much smaller which started generating in 1997, and is still going strong. Didcot A survived the miners' strike but had to get special permission to bring in coal by road, since the station had been planned for exclusive rail deliveries. There were some disagreements and misunderstandings about the despatch of spent fuel to Radley lakes, but now happily resolved. There was unauthorised entry and tower climbing by Greenpeace and others, but the police and the station staff dealt with that promptly though these invasions did cost the owners a lot of money which no doubt ended up on all our electricity bills.

I doubt if I am the only one who feels a certain nostalgia about the end of Didcot A which incidentally is overwhelmingly in Sutton Courtenay despite its name. We had all got so used to it there, and you could see it for miles around, but now it is going if not gone, and we have to move on. In conclusion I would like to pay tribute to the staff who were well known in the community, especially local schools, and unlike some other major companies Didcot A was an admirable corporate citizen in the community.

### **ED VAIZEY WRITES...**

One of the issues that concerns many constituents is the local postal service, and the wish to preserve the service that we have. Getting the post out to all the residents in our very rural constituency is no mean feat, as I see for myself every Christmas when I visit sorting offices to thank the post teams who do all the



work. At the moment, one particular small but important issue is being considered - protecting rural post boxes. Ofcom have set out proposals that would protect post boxes in our villages by tightening the criteria which oblige the Royal Mail to ensure that there is a post box within reasonable reach of people in all but the most isolated places. This won't mean more post boxes being installed, but it should prevent any more being removed. I think that is much to be encouraged!

As an MP I am often alerted to opportunities that I think may benefit constituents, and two have recently come my way. Firstly, if you are working on a community project, do have a look at the People's Millions website. There's an application form there which allows local community-based projects to bid for up to £50,000. Past successes have included a training service for blind people and a cyber café run by disadvantaged young people, as well as a project that built a new toilet and washbasin area for young people in a memorial hall. There's clearly all sorts of ways such funding could be used, and with the wealth of community projects and activities across the constituency, I am sure that we have some great ideas that could be put forward. The deadline is 13th May, so please don't delay.


Small businesses are vital to our economy, and they too need some help from time to time. One particular problem can be late payments – when larger organisations take far too long to pay smaller suppliers. The Federation of Private Business has let me know about their website www.fpb.org/page/531/Late\_payment\_Hall\_of\_Shame\_.htm which shows details of companies that really ought to behave better than the do in this respect. It is not a website where anyone can post unproven allegations, but does allow small businesses to report late payers. If the behavior is shown to be bad then details will be posted on the website by the Federation. I'd very much hope that no businesses in the constituency either need to be reported or have to report others, but if the reasons are there, then the website will be a very useful tool.

This month I've received a great many emails about the protection of bees in the UK. The decline of bees around the world is a real problem and one that I looked into and raised myself during the last Parliament. In response to recent concerns about pesticides my colleague in the Department for the Environment and Rural Affairs, Lord de Mauley, has written a detailed letter about the work being done in the UK to safeguard bees and the scientific evidence that has been investigated with regards to the harm caused by neonicotinoids and other pesticides. Other campaigns that I have seen in my mailbox include support for the British Red Cross' campaign "Pupil, citizen, lifesaver", which seeks humanitarian and first aid education in the classroom, and also support for this Government's commitment to spend 0.7 per cent of our gross national income on development and aid spending abroad.

### MARCHAM SOCIETY'S APRIL MEETING

On 9 April, the Marcham Society enjoyed a talk by Bob Harris on the early life of Lord Nuffield (William Morris). Bob was well qualified to do this, having started work at Morris's as an apprentice in 1954, staying for 30 years and taking a history degree on his retirement.

William Morris was born in Worcestershire in 1877, but the family moved back to Oxford when he was still a child. At the age of 16, with £4 capital, he set up a bicycle repair business at the family home in James Street. By 1913 he had set up a factory production line in Hollow Way and launched the first Morris Oxford at £170. After the war the production line was extended and 55,000 cars were produced in 1925. Unemployed men came from northern England and South Wales to work at the factory, sometimes walking all the way. Morris kept production going during the Depression by reducing the price of his cars and took a great interest in the welfare of his employees

One of Morris's earliest customers was Dr Osler, Regius Professor of Medicine at Oxford; this began a link which still benefits many people today.

Morris's generosity enabled the Wingfield Hospital in Headington (now the Nuffield Orthopaedic Centre) to be upgraded for the treatment of sick children. Having suffered a bad reaction to an anaesthetic himself, he persuaded the medical establishment in Oxford to allow a Chair of Anaesthetics, the first in the world. He gave £2 million for the funding of this, plus Chairs in Surgery, Clinical Medicine and Obstetrics & Gynaecology. This greatly helped Oxford become the centre of medical excellence it is today. He was made a Viscount in 1938 and took the title Nuffield from the village near Henley where he lived.


