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MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS Parish Council Vacancy - Casual Vacancy

The Vale of White Horse District Council has confirmed that a formal election is not required to fill the vacancy on the Council. The Parish Council will therefore be able to co-opt someone. If there is anyone interested in joining the Council, then he/ she is invited to contact the Parish Clerk for further information about the role, and eligibility criteria.

Remembrance Sunday – Road Closure A415 Frilford Road, Church Street, New Road

A road closure order for the section of Frilford Road between Church Street and North Street, Church Street itself and new Road has been obtained for the latter half of Sunday morning 10th November. This is to allow the parade from the Church, after the Church service, to the War Memorial in Frilford Road, in order to lay wreaths. Please note that the diversion will be along North Street to St. Peter's cross roads, then left to the junction with the A338, and left again to the Frilford Service Station.

Closure of A34 – Full weekend closure

The Highways Agency will be carrying out essential works to College Farm Road bridge at Beedon where the A34 goes over the local road. The work will be undertaken in various phases. From 10.00 p.m. on Friday 15th November until 6.00 a.m. on Monday 18th November there will be a full closure of the Southbound carriageway of the A34 between Milton Interchange and the M4 junction. Similarly from 10.00 p.m. on Friday 22nd November to 6.00 a.m. on Monday 25th November the Northbound carriageway will be completely closed between the M4 and Milton Interchange. The recommended diversion route is M40. A404/A404(M) and M4, a diversion of some 68 miles. Significant delays will be expected during the weekend closures. It is advised that you plan ahead of your journey to allow for extra time or preferably avoid this route where possible.

Real Poppy Campaign

This campaign is aiming to plant poppies to remember the sacrifices made during the first world war. the 100th anniversary of World War I being next year. The Parish Council would welcome suggestions as to where there are suitable soil conditions and where to sow the seed, bearing in mind that they should not be in areas where they would cause a danger for traffic or a nuisance for agriculture.

Public Transport Bus Review – X15

Oxfordshire County Council is reviewing the subsidised X15 bus service. The Parish Council has asked that consideration be given to routing the bus around Howard Cornish Road rather than running along the A415, and also that consideration be given to looking at the timetable as the service to Abingdon runs through the village at a similar time to the Stagecoarch 31 service. A more evenly space timetable would improve bus choice for Marcham residents. Vale of White Horse District Council – Parish Boundary Review

The Vale of White Horse District Council is currently undertaking a community governance review and has recommended that consideration be given to placing Cothill a single parish. At the moment, the boundary between St. Helen Without parish and Marcham parish passes through Cothill. Marcham Parish Council has supported the principle that consideration be given to reviewing the parish boundary at this location.

Parishioner of the Year Award

The annual award for the parishioner of the year is presented in May each year. It therefore seems possibly a little early to begin to consider worthy recipients, but from next month the Parish Council will be inviting nominations for the next award. Please therefore begin to think about who you would like to put forward

"My Pear(!) Tree.

I have a small apple tree in the garden, which I'd been told many years ago, was a "Lanes Prince Albert", a type I'd never heard of before or since. As my RHS gardening encyclopaedia didn't include fruit trees, I thought I'd see if there was an "expert" in attendance at the "Apple Day" event being held in the school on the 19th, who could enlighten me on its origins etc. Sure enough, there in the corner of the hall, surrounded by boxes of apples of different sorts and poised over a pile of illustrated books of apples sat Murray Maclean - THE expert. Having the foresight to take a few of the recently picked apples off my "LPA" apple tree for examination, I told him my story and waited for his verdict.

These cooking apples have been grown on a small tree which started life as a rooted "twig" about 15inches long planted at the end of April in 1967. This "twig" plus 2 others were GIVEN to me (as he wouldn't accept any payment) by a local nursery man when I moved into our new house here in Marcham on the understanding that if they didn't grow I wouldn't/couldn't complain and ask for my money back if I'd paid him (as it was the "wrong time of year to plant young trees like this!!"). He assured me that they were all grafted onto dwarf stock and wouldn't grow very big, therefore being suitable for my small sized garden.

46 years on, this tree is now no bigger than a large golf umbrella, about 41/2 feet in diameter and roughly the same height! For the past 40 years or so this one tree has produced 30 to 40 smallish (2 1/2ins) apples, growing in pairs along the 4 main branches. (That's why I sometimes call it my "PEAR" tree!!!!!!) This year however, it has produced 60 beautiful apples ranging from 2 to 3 inches in diameter weighing a total of 25 pounds (11+ Kilos), - truly a bumper year for apples and other fruit.

Yes, Murray did confirm my apples were the "Lanes Prince Albert". An old variety, a very nice cooker, not very common now and not readily available but he could get one if required".

What happened to the other 2 "twigs"? Well, they grew, and grew and grew, (just like Topsy!) until the trunks are now 12-15ins in diameter and are 20feet tall, even after much drastic lopping and pruning over the years. They are NOT Lanes Prince Albert trees, but BRAMLEYS and are definitely NOT on dwarf stock, but do produce pounds and pounds of large delicious cooking apples each year, that when properly stored keep until Christmas. You, dear reader, may have sampled some

of these apples as they've been available in the village shop for the past few weeks. I hope you've enjoyed them!!! Bon appetit. **TONY BLACKLER**

Community leisure facilities: a welcome initiative

Every household should have received a leaflet from Taylor Wimpey outlining its latest proposal, and inviting them to the exhibition that was held on Saturday 5 October.

This new proposal is a package that has four linked parts:

- A modest village hall but no houses on the Anson Field. The Anson Trust would continue to hold the entire field in trust for community use.
- 92 houses built on Hyde Copse.
- New sports pitches and a sports pavilion on leased land north of Hyde Copse.
- Two new classrooms for the school.

Readers with long memories may recall the first proposal by Taylor Wimpey and the Anson Trust which would have involved the Trust selling the football pitch for housing and creating new leisure facilities on what is now agricultural land to the north of the village. At that time, some people were asking whether the housing could be on the edge of the village instead, leaving the Anson Field undeveloped. In essence, this is what the latest proposal does.

MCG asked those who came to the Taylor Wimpey exhibition to complete a questionnaire giving their views on the proposal overall and on its different parts, and detailing their concerns about the effects of the proposal if it went ahead. More on this in the next issue, and soon on our website *www.marcham.org*.

MCG Open meeting on 26 September: Leisure facilities – the options

By a coincidence of timing, a meeting which had been planned some months ago was able to discuss the outline of the new proposals although the Taylor Wimpey leaflet delivery had not been completed when it took place. Members and others present broadly welcomed the new initiative while pointing out that there was no real detail as yet. Members voted 35 for and 3 against (with 2 abstentions) approving the principle behind the new proposal, and voted unanimously in favour of the MCG committee working with the Community Facilities Group on the details when they became clear. The rather small turnout reflects a normal AGM attendance (the AGM preceded the Open Meeting) rather than the level of interest in the new proposal – we didn't have the opportunity to publicise beforehand the topic the meeting was actually able to discuss.

2nd MCG AGM Thursday 26 September

The chairman, Jim Asher, summarised MCG activities during the reporting year 1 April 2012 to 31 March 2013. MCG had been active on community facility proposals, holding and reporting on consultations on the proposals then current. It had formed the Joint Users' Planning Group to try to ensure that all groups in the village had a voice as the proposals were modified. It had also worked with Marcham Parish Council on the Community Led Plan, and had continued organising community and fundraising events, including the Great Marcham Jubilee Weekend.

REPRESENTATIVES' REPORTS

ED VAIZEY WRITES...

As we are now approaching the first anniversary of the Localism Act, it's worth remembering the range of powers and programmes which communities can use to shape their areas. The Government has published a guide which can be accessed at this website: www. gov.uk/government/publications/youve-got-thepower-a-quick-and-simple-guide-to-communityrights. It's described as quick and simple, and as it



runs to just 23 pages it is a model of brevity compared to many documents produced by civil servants. There's concise guidance on the options that might be available in different sets of circumstances and then advice on what each process will involve as well as examples of how each of the powers has been used by a different community. It's well worth a look.

This has been a busy month in politics. The major parties have all had their conferences and Parliament has returned for the autumn. With all the issues that have arisen and the policies that have been discussed in recent weeks, it's no surprise that my mailbag has also been keeping me busy. I have had emails on a wide variety of issues but two campaigns have been particularly noticeable: Firstly, there is a campaign to speed up the approval of a Royal Charter to regulate the press. I can assure you that the Government and I are committed to implementing a tough new system of press self-regulation, and a royal charter with cross party agreement was agreed to earlier this year. This is now being fully considered, to ensure that the process of implementing the Leveson recommendations is as robust as possible. While I understand the desire to see changes made as soon as possible, given the importance of these measures I would be reluctant to see the process rushed in any way.

Secondly, there have been a number of emails arising from the film 'I Am Breathing', which tells the story of Neil Platt, a young man with motor neurone disease. MND is a dreadful, devastating disease and I am sure that his important film will not only raise awareness of the condition, but act as an inspiration for others. The cause of MND is unknown and therefore there is no known cure. However, the treatment of MND and other long-term health conditions remains a priority in this Government's plans for the NHS, which is why there is now a £3.8bn fund to aid the joining up of different health and care services to ensure that people get the specific care that is right for them.

ED VAIZEY, MP Wantage and Didcot (Con) COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

Oxfordshire County Council, in common with most County Councils is very short of money. It has capital reserves, but its Revenue Budget gets tighter and tighter every year. In the next financial year, it is going to have find tens of millions of annual savings to makes its books balance. Hard decisions are going to have to be made over which services, traditionally offered by OCC should be cut. With Social Services, Roads and Education being the major costs, and the Education budget being largely protected, the options are not attractive. By contrast, District Councils, by and large, are comparatively wealthy; Parish Councils also have more freedom to raise money (at present) than either District or County Councils. We can either complain and demand a reverse of direction or we can embrace the change and endeavour to make it an opportunity rather than a threat. Money flowing down the chain towards Parish Councils, empowering people to take more responsibility for local decisions, raising the status of, and public interest in the work of Parish Councils, is no bad thing. Indeed, it is what Localism is about. However, giving people more power over their own lives only works if a) local people are prepared to take up the responsibility and b) those, who have traditionally held the power, understand that they are required to give some of it up. None of this will happen quickly, indeed, it may take years to achieve. However, having watched the Parish Councils in my Council Division in action, I cannot accept the old argument that such bodies are not capable and fit to make sensible decisions for their communities. There is much to threaten us out there at present, but there is also great opportunity. So where does this leave a County Council? Maybe Social Service responsibilities are gradually being handed downwards. Academies are steadily removing County powers over Education. It seems that the only certain future responsibility of Counties is around Roads and Transport. It may well be that in future, what money the County Council has is spent largely here. If the whole place is not to seize up, if people are going to be able to November 2013

get to our Schools and our Social services, we are going to need some solutions to our transport problems in this rather overcrowded part of these overcrowded islands.

I have had a very useful and constructive meeting with Marcham Primary School Governors at which we grappled with the problem of future numbers of Marcham children and the future size of the school. Whereas the current agreement with Taylor Wimpey involves 2 extra classrooms, the worry is that future developments will put even more pressure on the Primary School. If Marcham is to grow much bigger, the prospect of a

rimary School. If Matchain is to grow much bigget, the prospect of a new Primary School on the edge of the village raises its head. The present school is ideally located in the middle of the village and we would like to keep things this way as long as possible. Governors and I are on the same side over this and I am now embarking on discussions with the Education Department at OCC and will keep you informed.

The new pedestrian crossing over Packhorse Lane is being appreciated and used by an increasing number of people. The new Priory Field development will increase its use still further. However, Marcham PC and I are concerned at the safety issue involving westbound traffic. Traffic emerges from the S bend and immediately faces the crossing. A number of drivers seem so pleased to be through the S bend that they are already accelerating at the crossing. Several pedestrians have already reported having to step back from the crossing as motorists have ignored, or not noticed them. The County Council transport authorities have agreed to the following: 1) There should be signage before the S bend to warn westbound traffic of the pedestrian crossing and 2) That if PC and I are in agreement over the funding (some £3K) an enhanced more noticeable LED lighting system should be installed. If you would like to see one in operation, enter Wantage from the East – they are expensive, but very effective.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR REPORT

How good it is to start this article with a really positive piece of news – namely that eight people of Marcham have been chosen to receive an award over lunch at the Guildhall, on 19th October, in recognition of their selfless hard work in keeping the Community Shop running successfully: Natasha Kingsbury, Eileen Cartledge, Chris Ricketts, Ruth Mander, Suzanne Crafer, Jennifer Allan, Mike Hudson and Malcolm Denton. Both Richard and I bore witness of this the other weekend when we held our Surgery at the shop for a couple of hours – the regular hustle and bustle interspersed with cheery chatter and laughter as people shopped was resounding proof of its success. So many congratulations to our award winners.

Now to a more sobering subject. As you may know, the OCC is always looking for ways to save money. One way is to move premises to a cheaper venue, and as both New Abbey House in Abingdon and the SODC building in Crowmarsh Gifford are only 50% filled, mainly because of the amalgamation of the two District Councils some years back, it seems sensible to move the 400 OCC members into one of these. As Abingdon is the natural centre for the District Council with its 35,000 inhabitants, is easily accessible for the people of the Vale as it is on good bus routes (unlike Crowmarsh Gifford) and has a much better building in New Abbey House than the SODC building in Crowmarsh (which had a damning report in 2004) it seems preferable and more sensible to keep the Vale District Council in Abingdon. However, quite suddenly last week, we were told that moves have gone on apace and that most officers will be moved out of the Vale, bar a skeleton group, by next July to give the OCC room to move in! No consultation of the Vale inhabitants or their District Councillors! No clear figures for people to see! No debate! And the sobering fact is that once this move happens it is set in stone for at least 10 years, with the possibility that the Vale's identity will be swallowed up by South Oxfordshire. I have been very disappointed that there has been no consultation. If you agree and would like your feelings known, please will you contact the Vale urgently, as time is limited. (01235 520202 or via the VWHDC website).

Having explored the exhibition at the church of the proposed development designed by Taylor Wimpey, I was struck by the positive comments by those who were also looking at it. It seems as if there has been a change in people's thinking and that we are resigned to the fact that new houses are needed. But what we don't want is to be out of the equation. We want to have a say in what is being proposed and what benefits to the village might arise from the development.

MARCHAM PLAYERS FAREWELL TO CHERYLL SEWELL

My first Marcham Players memory of Cheryll Sewell goes back to 1989 and is a slightly disturbing one. She

was dressed as traffic warden and was goose-stepping with several colleagues through the grounds of Denman College. This was of course, a scene in that blockerbuster film 'Yellow Peril' and it was a role that she played to perfection. I hope that the reader is not surmising from this that Cheryll's stage career is, or ever was, only suited to '*nasty pieces of work*' appearances. My real intention is to say that she was a fine actress who could turn her hand to a whole range of roles.

Rarely one to take a leading part in a play, she appeared as all sorts of odd characters and sometimes more than one in the same production. The opportunities for muddling her lines were ample, but she could be relied upon to be word perfect when the curtain rose and the lights dimmed. Indeed, so good was she at handling scripts that she quickly found herself '*prompt*' for a number of shows. In fact so poor were some members of the cast at learning their lines that Cheryll has been known to recite an entire play from the wings whilst the actors mouthed silently under the spotlights.

Being just off stage prompting also put Cheryll in a very handy location for helping with changing props and scenery between acts. Thus, on the fall of the curtain and during the sporadic applause from those members of the audience who were still awake, Cheryll would down scripts and start lugging vast wardrobes and tables across the boards and swivelling tableaux around to turn a country scene into an Edwardian drawing room. And as the curtain began to rise again, so she would leap back to her seat, shuffle through her script and set the next hapless actor off on his ramble through 'Book, Bell and Candle' or which ever play we were massacring at the time.

Proving such an adept hand at handling scenery, it was a natural step to ask Cheryll to start making it too. At times, her front room resembled an artisan's cottage on Victorian Lower Cheapside, it being scattered with odd pieces of old bits and bobs which would eventually end up as policeman's truncheon or a widow's nightcap. Perhaps my favourite was her severed, shrivelled monkey's paw which played a vital part in the play of the same name. It made its first appearance probably as far back as the early 1990s and was still going strong in a resurrection of the play just two years ago at a local prep school where it caused a major health and safety alert when one of the boys dropped it into the stew.



So I hope that the reader will see that in Cheryll, we had a member of the Marcham Players who could turn her hand to anything, whether it be acting, singing, prompting, painting, producing or just

using her school teacher charm to corral errant youngsters in to some kind of order. Indeed, on some occasions she did all this simultaneously. What ever she did, she did to the highest of standards and always, always with a smile on her face. Cheryll, we will miss you! **TO** November 2013

Cheryll Sewell has been a many faceted person in her time in Marcham: a teacher, a Girl Guide leader, a choir member,

She is a person who would always welcome you in to talk about anything under the sun. CHERYLL SEWELL IN TEACHING

After nine years as a teaching assistant at the Manor Prep in Abingdon where she helped look after small groups of children in class, Cheryll trained at Westminster College Oxford to become a fully qualified teacher. Still based in Marcham, she then commuted daily and taught in two schools in Reading, firstly to "Presentation College" and then "The Elvian". She gradually specialised in helping children with Dyslexia and Aspergers - she also taught the pupils music and ran the school Sailing Club. When Licensed Victuallers closed the Elvian School, Cheryll became a Special Needs Teacher at Cothill, much closer to home but not in a full time post. From a personal standpoint, she was wonderful with our children at the Manor and many children both in and out of school have benefited from her patience, care and creativity. *SB*

When I asked around about what Cheryll had done during her 30+ years in the village I was amazed find that there were very few activities she hadn't been involved

with - we narrowed it down to Vicar, Men's Breakfast and Farming - but 1 wouldn't be surprised to find she'd had a go at all

of those as well! You may also have seen her in the shop and transporting trays of roast potatoes for Village Cafe - I will miss her as a brilliant neighbour and friend but I hear she may have a spare room in her new flat !! ML
