**MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS
Parishioner of the Year Award**

The Parish Council is again inviting nominations for the Parishioner of the Year Award. This is to recognise the efforts of local people from anywhere within the parish who have contributed to local community life. Marcham Parish covers the wide area from the A420 in the north to the River Ock in the South and from the A338 in the West across to and including most of Gozzards Ford in the East. The Council gives the award to anyone who, at any time, has significantly contributed to life within the parish. Should there not be any appropriate nominations, then the award need not be made. The certificate is presented at the annual meeting for electors each year. Would anyone who wishes to submit a nomination please contact the clerk, whose details appear below, sending a short statement of not more than 200 words, as to whom he/she wishes to nominate and the reasons why the person should receive the award.

Inconsiderate parking

The Parish Council is appealing again to motorists to think carefully about where vehicles are left in the village. The Council has received complaints about a truck parked very close to the junction of the A415 and Howard Cornish Road. Depending on where this is left it has caused ruts in the verge, or an obstruction on the junction or footway. Please be considerate where you park, and do not cause problems for others or damage to the verges.

A415 – footway to the south side

After struggling for some months, contacting the enforcement planners at the Vale of White Horse District Council, the County Council and the contractors, to try and get the path finished, the Parish Council is pleased that Persimmon Homes has made an attempt to put on the final surface to the new footway on the south of the A415. There are still some issues outstanding such as the unfinished end near the entrance to Abbots Grange, and the width of the path at certain points. These details are being pursued by the Council.

School Admissions – Entry to primary or infant school September 2018

If you are a parent or carer of a child 3 or 4 years old then you need to apply for a primary school place now. This is for children born between 1st September 2013 and 31st August 2014. You still have to apply even if your child already attends a nursery attached to the school. For further information and to apply online go to www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/admissions The closing date for applications is 15th January 2018. If you do not have internet access, then

you can access the internet at many of the County Council's libraries, and children's centres.

Longfields house for sale

Longfields is a development created in 3 phases, supported by the Parish Council and for people with a local connection to Marcham as defined in various planning agreements completed as the time of each phase.

A shared ownership house on the first phase has become available for sale to a local person.

Planning applications considered by the Parish Council

P17/V3170/HH Single storey rear extension to allow concrete block finish to the west elevation at 1 The Gap. The Council had no objections to the change from brick finish to concrete, but did comment that traffic management during construction should be in place to prevent obstruction within the road.

War Memorial – Listing

The Parish Council has learned that Historic England is considering "listing" the war memorial in Frilford Road as a structure of special architectural and historical importance. If it is listed, it will be protected as part of the historic environment.

ED VAIZEY WRITES...

May I take this opportunity to send each of you my best wishes for a peaceful and prosperous start to 2018.



In November, the Chancellor delivered his **Budget**. No one can pretend it was radical or revolutionary. But most will think that's a good thing. There's quite enough turmoil at the moment. The main focus of the budget was housing - a deeply controversial issue in our part of the world. Nevertheless, people do know that we need to build more houses, as property ownership has fallen dramatically and houses have become unaffordable for many people. I am therefore encouraged that the Chancellor has outlined the Government's ambition to increase housing supply to its highest level since 1970 by the end of this Parliament. This will put us on track to deliver 300,000 homes a year by the mid-2020s with £15.3 billion new financial support for house building over the next five years – taking the total to at least £44 billion. On a local level, it was promising to see an additional £215 million set aside for Oxfordshire to build infrastructure, deliver new homes and increase economic productivity across the county. This is a welcome step in ensuring our local area is fit for the future.

I welcome the announcement from Chris Grayling of the £47.9bn overhaul of the rail network in England and Wales, including restoring the **Oxford to Cambridge rail link**. This is part of the overall strategy suggested by the National Infrastructure Commission's report earlier this month on infrastructure growth across the Cambridge-Milton Keynes-Oxford Arc, which Wantage & Grove Station is part of. I will be continuing to campaign in Parliament for a new station at Wantage & Grove whilst there is so much interest in rail infrastructure.

The Department of Digital, Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) has recently compiled a handy **list of funding sources** available for arts, heritage and cultural projects which may be useful for local organisations. There are many different avenues that organisations seeking support can pursue and I would recommend that anybody wishing to make an application first contacts the relevant local office. Their staff will then be able to provide advice and support regarding the application process. Full list can be found at: goo.gl/QihSKD

On a similar note it is fantastic to see that over the past three months the **Big Lottery Fund** has provided nearly £55,000 of funding to 6 projects in the constituency. Every week over £13 million is awarded across the UK to support community activity with the money raised from National Lottery players. The organisation works hard to ensure the money reaches the people and organisations who make a real difference and it's great that the benefits are being felt in our area.

The brand new **Didcot Concert Orchestra** gives its inaugural concert at Cornerstone Arts Centre, Didcot at 4pm on Sunday 11 February 2018 playing music from the late Romantic era. More info can be found at: <http://www.didcotconcertorchestra.org.uk/>

I am delighted that this Orchestra has been established. Didcot is a vibrant and growing town, and the arts have always been a central part of its life. The concert orchestra fills a gap, and it is very much needed. Music brings great joy to people, and it also plays an important role in our schools and our communities. I wish the Dicot Concert Orchestra every success and I look forward to seeing them perform soon in Didcot – if not at the Proms!

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

November 23rd 2017 – A day to remember?

The Autumn Budget (formerly the Autumn Statement) contained highly significant news for this county. Only one county, Oxfordshire,

was specifically mentioned by the Chancellor as being a focus of attention for the Government. We have known for some time that our county is thriving economically and had very low unemployment. Our knowledge and scientific expertise based on our Universities and Enterprise Centres are the basis of the government's aspirations for economic growth nationwide. To that end it is likely (and will be confirmed in February 2018) that we will receive circa £215million over the next 5 years to fund infrastructure. There are at least two other pots which may almost double the circa £215million figure.

So what is the deal? It seems that government expects Oxfordshire to provide 100,000 new homes over the next few years. This is roughly the total number planned in all Oxfordshire's Local Plans so is no more than we were expecting – this will be a relief to many. Providing the figure is confirmed, this will allow the county to improve and repair its much criticised road system. Exactly how much will be used to rectify past problems, and how much to build brand new roads, we wait to see. But the outlook, for this County at least, is certainly better than it has been for many years. And that is good news as we approach all the uncertainties of 2018.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

District Council letting us down?

On Wednesday, 13th December, I proposed a motion at the full Vale Council Meeting firstly, asking the council to make sure that the next budget set aside enough money to fulfil the bulk of the eleven Air Quality Action Plans (AQAPs) that, in 2015, it had promised wherever possible in the Vale. Secondly, I asked if it would follow South Oxfordshire District Council's example by creating a low emission strategy to reduce air pollution in the Vale, particularly in AQMAs. The 11 actions are listed below:

- 1) To create a "low emission strategy" (LES) and "low emission zone study" (LEZ) (target date 2017).
- 2) To install electric recharging points.
- 3) To supply parking permit and pricing incentives for green vehicles (target date 2016).
- 4) To create a feasibility study for freight transport consolidation (FCC)/freight quality partnership (target date 2016)
- 5) To create taxi licensing incentives for green vehicles (target date 2016).
- 6) To improve use and enforcement of traffic regulation orders (target date 2016).
- 7) To review the council and contractors fleet.
- 8) To implement eco driving training (trial to be completed by 2016).
- 9) To give air quality guidance (target date 2015).
- 10) To encourage community involvement projects.
- 11) To introduce south facing slip roads to Lodge Hill interchange.

Remember, these are all actions that had been passed at council in 2015, so the council is obliged to honour its commitments and its target dates, but only a few actions have been done or completed. To its shame, after a fairly feeble debate, the council voted against the motion (20 votes to 8, with 3 abstentions) and so against its obligations. I find this quite extraordinary and very depressing, especially as we know that in the Vale more than 50 people a year die from complications directly related to poor air quality (figures from HM Government). It is up to us to make sure that the air quality issue is not allowed to be suppressed, and that every effort is made to encourage both County Council and District Council to work together to accelerate actions to reduce air pollution in the Vale. Actions are now needed, not just words. A New Year Resolution for us all, maybe?

Despite this rather sobering article, may I lighten the mood by wishing you all a very happy and healthy New Year, 2018!



Burglaries and attempted
burglaries**



Our area remains a low crime area but we have seen a slight increase in burglaries in the Abingdon area including the married quarters of Dalton Barracks and the Cumnor Hill area. The neighbourhood team are working with detectives from the Burglary team to investigate the offences. I will be doing some joint patrolling of the married quarters with The Army to provide reassurance.

Make it difficult for the burglar

Home security is the best way to reduce your chances of being burgled. A lot of burglaries are spur of the moment, carried out by opportunist thieves who don't even need to use force – they get in through an open door, window or other easy point of entry and take their chances. The good news is that it doesn't take much to improve security and put off burglars. Spending money on security measures can seem daunting but it's a good investment, it will last a long time and can add value to your home.

Look at your home through the eyes of a burglar

If you think your home security looks poor, chances are so will a burglar!

- Are there places where they could break in without being seen?
- If you have forgotten your keys but can still get in, so can a burglar!

There are several steps you can take to increase the security of your property at this time of year:-

- Do not leave presents on display either in vehicles or visible through the windows of your property.
- Make sure all doors and windows are locked and secure.
- Maximise surveillance levels i.e. cut back tall trees and bushes to make your property more visible to neighbours.
- Consider installing a CCTV system.
- Use timer switches to make it appear that there is someone in the property if you are out for long periods of time.
- Consider using a property marking system like SmartWater which will make your items less desirable.
- Take down serial numbers of presents and valuable items in your house so that they are identifiable if they are stolen.

Anti-social behaviour (ASB)

So when you are putting you plot to bed for the Winter or getting it ready for Spring, try and see if you can garden with a similar light touch. Leaving few, if any footprints at all.

RESEARCH LOST WAYS

Walkers, riders and cyclists from Oxfordshire, Berkshire and Buckinghamshire gathered at Henley-on-Thames Town Hall on Saturday (18 November) to learn how to research and record lost public paths. Henley's Mayor, Kellie Hinton, and Councillor Sarah Miller were there.

On 1 January 2026 the official map of public paths (the definitive map) is to be closed to applications for the addition of routes based on historic evidence. Even if a route has not been used, if there is historic evidence that it was once a highway and it has never been legally stopped up it should be shown on the map. Now there are only nine years left for people to research the records and apply to the county or unitary council to add paths to the map—regardless of whether those paths are in use. 

YOU NEED NEVER MISS ANOTHER WASTE COLLECTION!

Waste collection information is now just a screen tap away in South Oxfordshire and the Vale of White Horse. The two district councils have launched a brand-new smartphone app, which is available free of charge for iPhone and Android phones right now. The app is called **Binzone** – by simply tapping their postcode in and selecting their address, residents can find out which bin is being emptied this week, and what day it's being emptied. The app will also send users a notification if their waste collection day changes due to a bank holiday – very handy for keeping track of what day bins will be emptied over the Christmas period.



It will also let residents know if collections are disrupted by snow or icy conditions.

That's not all though – residents can also use Binzone to look up what bin their rubbish goes in. Ever been confused as to what bin an empty aerosol can goes in? Not any more – residents can simply search for it in Binzone and find out. It's the green recycling wheelie bin, by the way.

Councillor Charlotte Dickson, cabinet member for waste at the Vale of White Horse District Council, said, "The app is so easy to navigate and will save residents time by having all the information needed right at their fingertips, especially the changes to collection days around bank holidays."

Councillor Tony Harbour, cabinet member for waste at South Oxfordshire District Council said, "If the weather worsens again this winter I think the Binzone app will come into its own by keeping our residents informed on what is happening to their collections. It is very handy to have the information in one place." *Binzone is available to download free of charge on the iPhone Appstore and the Google Play Store*

Much loved iconic landscape, Wittenham Clumps, threatened by new highway proposal

Earth Trust is raising strong objections to a proposal currently being considered for a potential link road from the A34 to the new Oxford to Cambridge Expressway. One of the route options would cut across Earth Trust farmland, impacting on its economic viability, which will undermine their ability to manage the Wittenham Clumps and other national assets that Earth Trust safeguards.

Earth Trust is an environmental learning charity which manages this 1,200 acre site, including farmland, woodland and wetland. Set within an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB), the Wittenham Clumps and Little Wittenham Wood Nature Reserve have been designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), a Special Area of Conservation (SAC) and include a nationally important Scheduled Ancient Monument. In a county with limited accessible greenspace for people to enjoy, this great heritage landscape is much loved and plays a major role in the visitor economy. It is the most highly visited, free to access greenspace in the South East, with more than 150,000 visits made to the Wittenham Clumps each year.

The proposed route cuts across this land, destroying the economic viability of the Earth Trust Farm which supports the management and setting of this historic and biodiversity-rich landscape.

Jayne Manley, CEO of Earth Trust says: "This proposal will damage the viability of Earth Trust and our ability to manage the Wittenham Clumps and the surrounding farmland and forestry. We look after the living genetic collection of hardwood timber trees, Paradise Wood, and this link road will undermine our ability to protect this nationally important resource. Therefore, for many reasons it is important that this accessible greenspace is protected."

A letter from Earth Trust has been sent to national bodies including Highways England and the National Infrastructure Commission raising concerns about the routes published on maps which represent local understanding of route options. Local MP Ed Vaizey will be helping Earth Trust to make sure the importance of the site and their work is properly understood.

Graham Shaw, Chair of Trustees for Earth Trust, said: "This site is steeped in heritage and rich archaeology; there is evidence of people living in this area right through from the Stone Age to the modern era, including Bronze Age, Iron Age, Roman and medieval remains. Nowadays, Earth Trust adds to the tourism of the area and sits within Oxfordshire's Science and Knowledge Spine attracting scientists and technicians to this area, to live and work. This proposed route option will severely impact upon all of this."
