

No Elections this Year in the Vale of White Horse

The Vale of White Horse District Council has been approached by some people making enquiries about elections in May. Unlike other parts of the county, there is no election here on 3rd May. No poll cards or postal votes will be sent out. The next elections which are due in this area will be in 2019. These will be Parish and District Council elections.

Oxford Cambridge Expressway

Highways England has given a briefing to the County Council on the Oxford Cambridge expressway proposals. The Parish Council has had sight of the slides shown. There are 3 main broad corridors undergoing study. The information available to date is not detailed, and it is therefore difficult to form a view on how Marcham will be affected. The Council has written to the Department of Transport requesting that it be formally consulted in due course, and has received an assurance that the Parish Council and others in the community will have the opportunity to express views on the scheme during the development process.

Abingdon Flood Alleviation Scheme

Modelling of the rivers Ock, Stert and Thames are still ongoing, as well as studies to use Abingdon Common, west of the A34 Marcham interchange, as a flood storage area. The results of studies will update the flood map. The Environment Agency's newsletter about the whole project including the Oxford Scheme is available from them. Thames Water Utilities – Water Resources Management Plan

Thames Water's plan has been considered by the Parish Council. Of note, of course, is the proposal for a reservoir in years to

REPRESENTATIVES' REPORTS

ED VAIZEY WRITES...

Three pieces of excellent news on new investment in roads and infrastructure this month. The first is about the A34, the bane of many of our lives. After months of campaigning by myself, local MPs, councils, LEPs and the A34 Action Group, the government has agreed to fund some much needed safety improvements. Upcoming changes will include improved laybys and digital signage, which will change



depending on traffic flow. A new sign has also been recommended, to make it clearer to HGVs where they are not allowed to overtake. Removal of vegetation from junctions was another recommendation and this will be improved.

The second piece of news concerns support for new infrastructure for the new homes being built in our area – an issue that is raised with me regularly. The government has announced up to £150 million to build much needed bridges, roundabouts and roads and £60 million to support new affordable homes. In total the government has committed up to £215 million of funding.

Finally, I was very pleased to open the Harwell Relief Road last month. The road will provide a route from housing development west of Didcot at Great Western Park and Valley Park to Harwell Oxford Campus and support delivery of planned housing growth. The road will make the journey to work easier for the five thousand people who work at Harwell Campus and I am particularly pleased that it will relieve the pressure of through traffic on Harwell village.

Other news - the National Lottery tell me that they are funding 4 projects in Wantage worth £30,905. Well done to all those who applied for funding, you can still do so at www.biglotteryfund.org.uk/funding. Last month I met with Fyfield and Tubney parish councils about the A420, and visited local social enterprise Maymessy in West Challow, which offers gardening, kitchen craft and family-style sit-down meals and picnics for disadvantaged children and volunteer groups. I received 523 items of correspondence (emails and letters) from constituents. Subjects raised with me included local infrastructure, Brexit and new data protection rules.

COUNCILLORS' REPORT

Notes on the AQMA Meeting on Wednesday, 4th April 2018 The panel was made up of:

Rachel Roberts, The VWHDC Air Quality Officer (RR)

Jason Sherwood, a senior OCC Highways Officer (JS)

Richard Webber OCC Cllr for Marcham (RW)

Catherine Webber VWHDC Cllr for Marcham (CW)

More than 40 Marcham residents attended to hear presentations and answer questions.

RR began by explaining how the 1995 Environment Act first gave a legal status to the quality of air we breathe. Marcham was declared an AQMA 5 years ago, as measurements of NOx gases in some parts of the pinch-points in Packhorse Lane were in excess of 40micrograms per/l – the EU agreed safety limit. RR pointed out that 2 years ago the measured figure was well over 50. Last year the figure had reduced to below 45. There has been a countrywide decrease in Nox Levels over the past year, but we are not sure why, although the improvement in diesel engines in HGVs and the increase in the number of electric cars on the roads will have helped.

The District Council's role is to measure and publish the measurements. They are also charged with presenting ideas which could be investigated to bring the measurements down. One such suggestion was an HGV weight limit through the village. This was the thinking behind the Marcham residents' traffic survey of 2017.

JS followed by explaining that the County Highways Department had modelled the effects of removing the HGVs from the AQMA on the traffic movements in the wider network, based on the figures that were collected over a year ago from the residents' 24hour survey. He said that this could result in 60 more HGVs in Abingdon's AQMA, 417 more HGVs diverting through Grove and Wantage and cause extra

congestion in Wootton, Dry Sandford, Denchworth and the A34 at Botley. So, he concluded that an HGV ban through Marcham would have an unacceptable impact on the whole surrounding network – which was already severely stressed.

JS explained that in 1990, the County looked in detail at Faringdon Road as a possible alternative route ... the state and quality of the road, the pinch points etc ... and came to the conclusion that compulsory purchases would have to be made to make the road safe, and the road itself would have to be rebuilt. He said the cost would be the same as a bypass!

The meeting was then opened to questions.

Why can't an HGV ban be set up for a month as a trial to get a definitive answer?

This is possible but would be difficult and expensive. We would still have the problem of impact on surrounding network

Why can't gating traffic lights be set up?

There would be multiple things to consider such as how much queuing would result with standing traffic belching out fumes and how long would be the delays? How would the slip roads be affected? This would result in long queues, and now, at peak times, traffic backs right into Marcham from the Frilford junction! Also, the traffic at the junctions onto the AQMA would need to be controlled. Long waits.

How can money be raised to pay for a by-pass?

a) Thames Water are keen to build a reservoir near Marcham and a condition could be made for them to pay for a by-pass. Many listeners did not like the idea of a reservoir, especially as it was expected to attract over one million people to the area each year with their cars.

b) The Growth Deal would release millions of pounds to deliver infrastructure for the new housesthe new roads would relieve Marcham's AQMA, but not until 2030!

c) The proposed Oxford Cambridge Expressway too would generate a lot of money and also would take a lot of traffic travelling east...this may relieve the AQMA but not until 2040!

Can we have a 20mph in the AQMA?

Yes, but now the traffic here tends to be forced to travel at about this speed. It would probably make little difference.

Can we have car plates- recognition to allow only low-emission vehicles through the AQMA?

Very expensive. This is a successful cities' solution, but not so successful in rural areas.

Conclusions

Despite the general message that we won't be able to get an HGV ban in the AQMA, the meeting ended with some positive messages.

RR is insisting that all new housing developments in the Vale have to have electric charging points.

New HGVs are cleaner than many cars ... that is if it hasn't been fitted with an illegal emulator or other system to fudge the figures!

A suggestion put forward by Mike Blanch, a Marcham resident, was enthusiastically received ... to put up notices at each end of the AQMA saying: "You are entering an Air Quality Management Area.

We welcome drivers of low emission cars."

In the summer, OCC is setting up an all air quality action group – made up of councillors and officers from all councils to make recommendations. The levels of poor air quality in the Marcham AQMA have dropped quite significantly in recent years. Although he is not optimistic, JS agreed to look into a one- way system through the AQMA. A proposal to reduce the speed limit on the A415 might well reduce the stop/start behaviour of traffic in Packhorse Lane.

The meeting concluded with thanks to both Jason and Rachel for their very sympathetic and knowledgeable contributions and to All Saints for hosting. Everybody had the chance to put forward their points, and many came up to speak to the officers at the end. Incidentally, this was Rachel's last official meeting, as she is now on maternity leave, expecting her baby next month. We wish her and her family all the very best!.



MarchamCentre — on-site work has started at last!

After many years of working and waiting, on-site work to prepare for the building of new community facilities for Marcham has now started. Fencing was put up and topsoil is being removed from the area to start the first stage of the work, the archaeology investigations of the parts of the field that will be built on. We will have a better idea of the finish date for that work once the archaeological dig is underway.



The main gate to the site will be locked for normal vehicle access to the field to ensure the safety of pedestrians entering and leaving the field from Morland Road. There is no public access to the fenced-in area during the site work. Access to the rest of the field and the nursery is on foot from Morland Road, Tower Close, the North Street footpath, or Packhorse Lane. Parents of nursery school parents are being informed by Little Angels of changes in arrangements for drop-off and pick-up.



Like during a walk in the woods or an African safari, we have no idea what wonders Mother Nature will present to us around the next corner or on our own doorstep.

So your challenge today is to take a philosophical walk around your own garden and see what you find.

The Marcham MARCHAM SOCIETY TALK Society 10TH APRIL 2018

On 10 April, the Marcham Society heard an interesting talk on the architecture of the Radcliffe Camera by Geoffrey Tyack, who explained that "camera" is the Latin word for "room".

John Radcliffe was a very successful 18th century doctor, with royalty on his patient list. He left his large fortune to Oxford University, stipulating that a new building be provided to encourage the study of medicine, which was not a popular choice then. Nicholas Hawksmoor provided the initial design for the Radcliffe Camera, but died before building commenced. The project was taken over by James Gibbs, an architect who had trained in Italy. The result was a less heavy design, with alternating niches and windows on the first floor. Inside, there is vaulting over each ground-floor window and a beautiful iron-work staircase. It is built of Burford and Headington stone and was completed in 1747.

Unfortunately, there was little increase in the number of medical students, so the building was taken over by the Bodleian Library. Such was John Radcliffe's generosity, there was enough money left over from the project to build the Radcliffe Infirmary and the Observatory. JF
