**MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS
Annual Meeting of Electors – 23rd May, 2018 – Emergency Planning**

The annual meeting of electors took place on 23rd May. Reports were given by the Parish Council on its activities over the last year, Viv Hutchinson, Head Teacher at Marcham Primary School outlined what the school had achieved. Cllrs. Richard and Catherine Webber, who represent the parish on the County Council and District Council, also gave their reports. The guest speaker was Andrew Brett, Emergency Planning Officer from Oxfordshire County Council. Mr Brett explained the role of the County Council in emergencies and how they linked with the other services, such as fire, police, ambulance etc. He summarised various cases in which the County Council had been involved. He recommended that villages have a emergency plan in place, in case of any problems that arise. This is something that the Parish Council will be considering at future meetings.

Grass Cutting

As in previous years, the County Council, owing to its budget restraints, has had to restrict the number of times the grass verges alongside the roads are cut. This is only once in the season. The Parish Council expressed great concern to the County Council that the sight lines, when leaving Howard Cornish Road and joining the A415, had disappeared owing to the length of the grass, and the junction had become very dangerous. The Council too has received comments about the length of the grass at the junction of Harding Way and Sheepstead Road, which was causing visibility problems. The Parish has managed, to persuade the County Council to cut these areas. In some parishes, the Parish Council has taken on the grass cutting of the County Council's verges on an agency basis. Marcham Parish Council is currently obtaining details of all the County Council's grass within the village, and seeing whether this might be a possibility, as that might be a way forward to ensuring better sight lines at the junctions.

Parking on Village Green

The Village Green is the open grass area at the junction of Mill Road and A415 opposite The Crown public house.

Residents often want to be able to park close to their houses and the Parish Council is receiving reports that cars are now being left on the Village Green. You may not realise, but Village Greens enjoy statutory protection under two very old pieces of legislation. They should be used for open recreation and enjoyment, and anything placed on the green to interrupt such use

is illegal, as a result action can be taken in the Magistrate's Court, which could result in fines for those committing offences. Parking on the Green will result in damage to the grass, leaving ruts where vehicles regularly go over the same area. Grass cutting becomes more and more difficult. The Council would kindly ask that cars are not left on the Green.

NEWS FROM MARCHAM SCHOOL

What a year it has been!

Since this time last year, we have been inspected by 2 bodies. Many of you will have heard of and may know about OFSTED - the Office for Standards in Education. They inspect and regulate services providing education and skills for learners (of all ages) and services that care for children and young people. We were graded Good in our previous inspection in April 2014 and were delighted to maintain that grading when OFSTED visited (along with someone from Her Majesty's Inspectorate, who was quality assuring the process) in March this year. We were pleased with how much the Inspector seemed to like our school and how he could clearly see the vision we had for its continued improvement.

Being a Church of England school, we also get the added 'privilege' of having an additional inspection by the Church of England. This took place in June last year. The Inspector described the school as having "an exceptionally strong and vibrant Christian ethos firmly built on clear Christian values. This has created a community in which every member is valued and cared for as a distinct child of God. As a result, the children at Marcham achieve and progress well both educationally and socially". The leadership of the school and the link with All Saints Church was particularly praised and we were given a grading of Outstanding, of which we are very proud.


The archaeology on the field to investigate the site of new building was completed in late May and, while the finds were interesting, there was, fortunately, nothing requiring more extensive investigation.

Those regular walkers in the field will have noticed that the second of the two new storage buildings has now been erected on the NE corner of the field.



We are now looking at a way to adjust the line of the fence alongside the access road to enable a safe margin for pedestrians. That should allow us to leave the access road open until building work starts.

The likely start of work on site is now likely to be in the autumn. A number of pieces of the jigsaw remain to be completed, including finalising the detailed drawings based on agreed specifications, subcontractor selection by the builder, and closing out some remaining planning and Section 106 questions from the VWH District Council - this is a complex task.



This timing will allow the continued use of the changing rooms to enable the cricket team to play through to the end of the summer season and also by the cubs.

Potato pastry

- 8oz plain flour
- 4oz mashed potato - cooled
- 1½oz margarine N.B. You can use all marg or all lard.
- 1½oz lard
- 2 tsp of baking powder
- couple large pinches of salt
- Dash of water if needed

Mix the flour with the baking powder and salt and then rub in the fats. Mix the mashed potato in to form a dough and knead (add a little water to the mixture if too dry). Roll out and use as your usual pastry. For more recipes from Christine see her website:





Priorities

We are still patrolling the burglary hot spot areas in Botley and Cumnor Hill areas. We are taking this very seriously and now have a designated team set up to investigate all domestic burglaries. If you would like some advice about home security please contact me.

Speeding

I conducted a speed survey on Cumnor Road opposite the John Werrell entrance. 97 cars went through and 74 were going over 35mph with the highest speed being 54 mph. The results will be sent to the traffic management unit in Bicester who will look at all the data to get a picture of the speeding problem. This usually results in a traffic safety van being deployed and fining those who are speeding.

Community Speedwatch

I am currently talking to Cothill residents about the possibility of setting up a community Speedwatch scheme. This is a scheme where a group of volunteers get funding for their own speed checking equipment. They receive training as Police volunteers and can use the speed gun on the side of the road in a safe area. The results are added to the Speedwatch database and warning letters are generated and sent to those speeding. If someone is recorded three times on the database they can be fined.

Scams Awareness Month

Scams Awareness Month 2018 took place throughout June. We want to help you to identify scams and take action by reporting any suspicious activity! Some of the various Scams are listed below:

- Fraudsters pretending to be from the police cold calling members of the public and telling them that their bank account has been compromised by criminals. The fraudster suggests that the person should transfer their bank balance into a 'safe' police bank account.
- Fraudsters pretending to be from the police attending people's addresses and retrieving the person's card and PIN.
- Members of the public receiving letters on bank headed paper informing them that their account has been the subject of a fraud. The letter advises them to transfer their funds to a 'safe' account and that an official will be in contact to provide them with a new card and PIN.
- Fraudsters contacting members of the public requesting them to cut their cards in half because their account has been compromised. They are then asked to post the cut card to an address where fraudsters simply tape the card together again and can use the details to commit fraud.
- Police advice is that if you receive such a call, end it immediately. If you have elderly or vulnerable family members, friends, or neighbours, let them know about these scams.

Please be aware that:

- Your bank will never attend your home
- Your bank and/or the police will never collect your bank card
- Your bank and/or the police will never ask for your PIN

If you receive this type of call, report it to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040, or via their website. In an emergency, dial 999 or 101 non-emergency number.

Lots of good news for our local area. Last month Business Secretary Greg Clark launched a major new scientific centre in Harwell Campus and announced its first major projects. The Rosalind Franklin Institute, which is backed by £100mil in government investment, will focus on a number of projects, including the development of the world's best ultra-fast video camera for imaging, which will be invaluable for both detecting and treating disease.



The Big Lottery Fund has announced £17,280 of funding for projects in the constituency such as the The Pelvic Partnership in Harwell, which focuses on treatment for Pelvic Girdle Pain. The fund distributes money raised by the National Lottery to good causes which seek to improve lives and communities. If you have a cause that you believe deserves funding you can apply at biglotteryfund.org.uk.

Huge congratulations to Wallingford School, who have been awarded the prestigious ISM Trust's Silver Certificate in Music for 2018, and King Alfred's, who have been awarded the Bronze Certificate. This means that more than 15% and 10% respectively of all the schools' GCSE students who entered into GCSE music achieved an A* to C grade. This is a huge achievement and demonstrates a real commitment to music in both schools. The Teaching Apprenticeship Programme (TAP) launched across the country last month to help schools recruit, train and retain the best graduates into teaching roles. TAP offers a 1 year programme which guides apprentices towards Qualified Teacher Status and schools can also use the Apprenticeship Levy funding to train and retain the best graduates into teaching roles. COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT
Committee System v Cabinet System?

Most residents are not particularly interested in how their councils organise themselves. But it is a matter of great concern for the councilors who serve on those councils.

Backbencher local politicians often get a raw deal. Whether their party is in power or in opposition, decisions are made by members of the Cabinet (rarely more than 10 members of the ruling party). All other politicians often feel that they are little more than voting fodder – expected to support their own side through thick and thin. Under the

whipping system, there are occasions when they are under pressure from their own side to toe the party line – even though they may not agree with it.

This is the **Cabinet System** and is followed by most Councils. Its advantage is that decisions are made efficiently and quickly. Its disadvantages are that only a very small proportion of councilors (the Cabinet) take part in the decision-making, and other councilors can become disillusioned with their role and enthralling potential new recruits gets harder.

In recent years, a number of councils have switched to an alternative system – the **Committee System**. Here, each council department has a committee making the decisions - made up of councilors of all parties. The numbers on each committee are set to ensure that they are in line with the proportion of councilors of each party. This ensures that the ruling party always has the ability to hold the majority on each committee. The advantage of the system is that all Councillors sit on at least one committee, all are involved in discussions, vote on decisions and all are obliged to work hard. The disadvantage is that decision making is slower.

Oxfordshire County Council is currently studying a number of Councils which have switched to the Committee System. The evidence so far is that it particularly suits a Council where there is an even balance of power between parties. Oxfordshire County Council is just one of those. A decision to change, if it happens, will be made next year.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

As you are all probably aware, whenever an application is being considered by the Vale Planning Committee, the members are always reminded that the NPPF stipulates that you have to consider each development in relation to the social, economic and environmental aspects of the area. So, for example, the economic aspect would raise such issues as whether the development would enhance the economy and bring jobs to the area; the environmental aspect would raise such issues as whether the development would fit into the boundaries of an area without too much change, or whether there are special features in the area that need to be protected such as archaeological features or certain wild life, such as bats; and the social aspect would raise such issues as whether there are suitable features in the area which could sustain a new development such as a school, a church, a shop, businesses, a bus route, a village hall, sports fields etc. A development must be sustainable and enhance an area in some way.

It was with these three strands in mind that I thought of Marcham and its new developments. Economically, there is no doubt that the village has benefitted from the S106 contributions from each development. The village hall and its sports facilities are the main beneficiaries of this money. It has also stimulated some jobs. Environmentally, the village has grown considerably with these developments, (some would say far too much) and mainly on its edges. However, care has been taken to protect any rare species of wildlife and trees, if possible; green areas have been included in all the developments; its ancient history has been protected; developments have followed the Design Guide to ensure that the new houses complement existing street scenes. Socially, the village has welcomed many new residents, some of whom are taking an active part in village life, such as by joining the school or church or village clubs, or writing for the MADNews, or helping in the Village Shop. But here is the rub! To keep a village sustainable we all have to do our part. And the village shop is struggling. Everybody loves the convenience of popping into the shop to use the Post Office or buy a packet of flour or simply to chat with friends over a cup of coffee. But it needs more helpers if it is to stay in existence. If the NPPF is working properly, then the extra housing that Marcham has generated should be encouraging more volunteers to help with the shop.

So keep your lovely village thriving by taking part. And if you feel you could spare some time, why not consider helping in the shop, for example?
