MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL New Chairman of Marcham Parish Council

At the September meeting of the Parish Council, David Walton stepped down as Chairman of the Parish Council. In his place the Council elected Michael Hoath to be the new Chairman until the next annual meeting of the Council.

Play Area - Dogs

Reports have been received that dogs are being taken into the play area in the Anson Field. The Council would remind residents that this is not permitted, and the sign at the entrance indicates this. There are health hazards associated with a dog lifting his leg on the play equipment, and also with dog faeces, particularly toxocariasis, a serious illness caused by a parasite that lives in dogs' digestive systems. The parasite can stay in the ground for a very long time, and young children can become unknowingly infected. Children can also be scared and frightened by a dog. Please would dog owners, kindly not take them to the play area.

Footpaths within Monk Walk

When the planning application for the Monks Walk development was approved, it had been agreed that the paths around the site would be constructed of tarmac. Unfortunately the paths were installed as gravel/hoggin so are forming ruts, have weeds growing through, and are not suitable for pushing push chairs or wheelchairs. The Vale of White Horse District Council has recently advised the Parish Council that the developer has now agreed to install a tarmac surface as originally envisaged.

A415 Zebra Crossing

A large vehicle has hit the Belisha beacon bracket at the zebra crossing over the A415 near The Crown Public House. This has been reported to the County Council as highway authority, so that repairs can be undertaken.

Allotment Rent Collection

Owing to Government Guidance in regards to Covid, and advice from the National Association of Local Councils, the annual allotment rent collection will be in a different format this year, and there will not be an evening set aside as in previous years specifically for allotment rent collection. The Council is currently working on a plan to ensure that the method for allotment rent collection is safe for everyone.

The County Council is offering free electric blanket testing as they do every year, but because of Covid restrictions the process will be a bit different.

They'll post a special plastic bag to the address for residents to put their electric blanket in, and then someone will come and collect the blanket from their homes, take it away to be tested and then return it once it's done. ATTENTION DOG OWNERS

Like many of you, we enjoy going for walks in the countryside around our village. However, on a recent walk in the field next to Leas Lane, my two young sons and I had a serious issue: an off-leash dog ran at my four-year-old. The owners did absolutely nothing to intervene, claiming that the dog 'just wanted to play'. My terrified and screaming son clearly did not want to play. They left without apologising, or even a hint of concern or remorse for my two very distressed children.

While the majority of dog owners we meet are very responsible, can we ask everyone to remember that the countryside code asks each of us to both respect others, and keep ourdogs under reasonable control – not every child is okay with a strange dog approaching them. In a time of social distancing, it is even more critical that we avoid times where a dog has to be physically removed from the presence of others. I keep my children next to me the entire time we are near others when we walk the fields, I ask the same respect from dog owners. Will it take an accident or injury to get people to take this seriously?

Sharing the footpath on the A415

The footpath along the A415 to Abingdon is used by many people – walking, pushing prams and buggies, with dogs and of course, cvclists.

I have been surprised several times by cyclists coming behind me without warning and trying to get past me and my dogs. It would be better if they had either a bell or called out before trying to pass me. There have also been cyclists without lights which makes them imposible to see until they are nearly on top of you.

This is a busy road with cars moving at 50mph and we should try and be considerate to each other when we are using the footpath. *Name and address supplied*

From The Highway Code www.gov.uk/browse/driving/highway-code-road-safety

Rule 60: At night your cycle MUST have white front and red rear lights lit. It MUST also be fitted with a red rear reflector (and amber pedal reflectors, if manufactured after 1/10/85). White front reflectors and spoke reflectors will also help you to be seen. Flashing lights are permitted but it is recommended that cyclists who are riding in areas without street lighting use a steady front lamp.

Rule 62: Take care when passing pedestrians, especially children, older or disabled people, and allow them plenty of room. Always be prepared to slow down and stop if necessary.

Oxford back on amber alert as local coronavirus cases mirror national rise

People in Oxfordshire are being advised to only get tested for COVID-19 if they have symptoms as the level of positive cases in Oxford mean the city is once again on amber alert.

The number of cases in the city currently stands at 25.6 per 100,000 of the population. The figure for the whole of Oxfordshire is 14.3 per 100,000


The figures for Oxford rose to amber alert level in mid to late August but then fell back again. An amber alert happens when cases rise above 25 per 100,000 of the population.

Ansaf Azhar, Oxfordshire County Council's Director for Public Health, said: "Since Oxford's cases last rose to amber, there has been a large rise in cases across the entire country. Locally, if we want to avoid the tighter restrictions that we have seen in the north-west, our best strategy is to follow the rule of six to the letter and to keep doing those basics – wash your hands, keep your distance and wear a facemask. Collectively, the situation is in our own hands - as individuals, families, colleagues and neighbours."

Meanwhile public health teams at councils across the country are aware of well-publicised issues regarding the availability of COVID-19 testing. There is a national issue with testing capacity, which is due to rising demand, and it is affecting all parts of the country.

To supplement national resources in Oxfordshire, a local testing site has been set at Oxford Brookes University campus site in

Headington. The facility is available for residents as well as Brookes students and staff. The Regional testing site at Oxford Parkway is still open every day

It is essential that people do not turn up at their local A&E asking for a test.

There are hopes of securing an additional local testing site in Oxford as well as further sites across the county.

Ansaf Azhar added: "Oxfordshire has had among the highest rates of testing in the south-east region. However, as with other parts of the country, we do have an issue with rising demand. We are therefore actively urging people not to book a test if they are not symptomatic. If you don't have COVID-19 symptoms, please do not book a test - you could be taking a test away from someone who really needs it."

Booking slots are made available the evening before for morning appointments, and on the morning for afternoon appointments. There are times therefore during the day where test booking may not be available. Booking slots are released continuously, so people who are symptomatic should come back later to the website or 119 service and re-attempt their booking.

FLU VACCINATION

Pharmacies in Oxfordshire are preparing for their most challenging flu vaccination season ever, in an effort to ease pressure on the NHS this winter.



Eligibility for free flu jabs, which are also offered by GPs, has been expanded this year to protect more vulnerable groups and prevent an influx of ill patients coinciding with any second wave of coronavirus.

The chief medical officer, Chris Whitty, has asked health professionals for a 'concerted effort' to achieve at least 75 per cent uptake across all eligible groups, as well as 100 per cent of frontline health and social care workers.

David Dean, chief officer of Thames Valley Local Pharmaceutical Committee, said flu season 2020 was 'almost like a dress rehearsal' for coronavirus.

He was speaking in a webinar to pharmacists across the region as they prepared to tackle the unique challenges this year and the role pharmacists can play.

Across the Thames Valley, 3,800 patients have already received a free NHS vaccination from community pharmacists in the first week of September.

Initially, priority is being given to people in high-risk groups and those aged 65 years or over. The full list of those eligible for free NHS flu jabs is:

- All people aged 65 years or over
- People aged from 18 years to less than 65 years of age with one or more serious medical condition(s) outlined in Appendix A in the PGD (pages 17 & 18 in this downloadable leaflet)
- Pregnant Women
- Shielding Patients and their household
- Care Home or Long Stay Residential Home Residents
- Carers Immunocompromised Household Contacts
- Social Care Workers and Staff
- Hospice Workers
- Workers employed through direct Payments/ Personal Health Budgets
- "Healthy" 50-64yr olds timing to be announced later.



Polarized Views, Where's The Truth?

I personally face another mini'lockdown' as last week I came into relatively vague contact with someone who tested Covid positive. So, I'm spending reflective time in my garden again, as many of us have been in 2020.



I've been reflecting on polarized viewpoints, and where the tipping points are that lead to the solutions to the arguments and debates. Wildlife gardening and traditional gardening is a great case in point. Many wildlife gardeners are considered as eccentric new age hippies and idealists. Traditional gardeners considered 'stick in the mud's' and habitual control freaks. Well, those are maybe the inaccurate stereotypes we tell others and ourselves.

When we make the effort though and get to know the person behind the stereotype, we realise, like us, they're ordinary people. If we get to know the person, their polarized views in comparison to our own can often seem less impenetrable, less extreme, as we start to really listen to what they are saying.

During my reflection's I've also been drawing parallels like this with the environmental protestors on the streets of London in early September 2020. Many people dismissing their disruptive actions by attacking them personally, as middle class, or unwashed hippies. Attacking the perceived hypocrisies, and ignoring the actual issues being highlighted by the protests. Though paradoxically one could argue, the issues have still been put in the public eye, by the shear fact the wider public are engaging by attacking the messengers. I don't know, just thinking aloud!

I've been thinking that environmentalists, like climate change deniers, are all seemingly locked into the same systems we have to live by, and that's not someone else's problem, it's a problem we share. It's not about totally doing away with all the mod con's, otherwise one can be accused of being a hippy (which doesn't suit everyone),

and if environmentalists have all the mod con's then they are called middle class hypocrites. This is all a distraction from the core debate around what is sustainable. It's not about what we do, it's about the energy and systems contained in the production, supply and running of the mod con's. For example, it's not just that we should travel less, it's how we travel, and how that's fueled that should be looked at. Often environmentalists are accused of not living by what they preach, and live totally zero carbon lives, but it's not that black and white. Protestors have been accused of not walking to and from the protests, having been seen on gas guzzling public transport, whereas the real issue is, let's move away from running public transport in that way, and not just accept the status quo. There are some big moral issues here though. Environmentalists are highlighting how hard it is for anyone to live in a zero carbon way, and sustain quality of life. This is all about quality of life, and how we support everyone in the transition to more sustainable ways of living that still sustain choice. The current systems make us all hypocrites, frankly, and few can deny that, whatever side of the environmental debate we are on, when you look how we could all live cleaner and greener. Environmentalists morally should use mod con's more sparingly, but they are though, more aware of the energy and systems that are hidden behind daily life, than the blind consumerists out there.

If both sides in any argument, whatever it is, stopped, and debated, the common ground might just be found that both parties share. From there clear pathways forward maybe, just maybe, could be found?

The middle ground could be mediocre and beige, but the truth is often found somewhere between these opposing

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Lioncourt Development and Marcham

I am writing this in Dumfries, on the way to a short holiday in Scotland. As we travelled through the beautiful countryside from the Lake District northwards, I was struck by the openness of the rolling hills, often peppered with sheep, and couldn't help reflecting on how crowded parts of the Vale has become with housing. And this made me think of the development for 700 houses in Fyfield....The Lioncourt development.

This development affects Marcham directly, most particularly its AQMA. The inspector put forward two important conditions on agreeing to this application, as he said it would generate a lot of traffic on our already congested roads. The developers must put forward acceptable solutions to mitigate the already congested traffic movement at the Frilford lights crossroads and to avoid increasing the air pollution in the AQMA. Both of these have been problem areas for a long time, and with this development will come approx. 2,500 additional vehicles per day through Marcham and the additional burden on air quality would be equivalent to the construction of 300 to 500 houses in Marcham. In response, the developers have suggested that all HGVs should be directed along Faringdon road from the Dog House pub through Gozzards Ford, by the airfield and out onto Abingdon road near the A34 intersection. I will let the County Councillor respond to that suggestion.

My new cabinet role

There is a grand reshuffle going on in the Vale cabinet and 7 councillors are taking on themes rather than the traditional silo portfolios....this is to encourage members to be more aware of the work going on across the Vale and therefore to work together to find solutions or put forward creative ideas. My old role was Planning, which has now been divided up into several themes; instead I am now taking on the role of Cabinet member for Tackling the Climate Emergency and the Environment but inevitably this will cross overplanning issues. It will also mean working closely with CEAC (Climate Emergency Advisory Committee) who have been doing a brilliant job during this last year. I have to admit that I am really looking forward to this challenging theme.

COVID news

The Vale has been made aware of a worrying trend of people turning up at our hospitals in Oxfordshire, asking to be tested for Covid-19. This is possibly as a result of the national issue with testing capacity, where people have struggled to book a test online. We are therefore supporting our NHS and Public Health colleagues in pushing out the extremely important message that people with symptoms must NOT go to a hospital. Testing does not take place in hospital settings and by turning up people are putting extra strain on resources by having to turn people away and also potentially putting vulnerable people at risk.

If you're aware of anyone struggling to book a test online the advice is to keep trying as it's only possible to book a slot when one becomes available. Slots become available throughout the day so it may take a few attempts at different times of the day. The other key message is to only book a test if you're displaying symptoms. You can book a test by calling 119 or by registering online via gov.uk/getting-tested-for-coronavirus.

Help for residents struggling financially because of COVID-19

The government has given the Vale some emergency assistance funding to support any of our residents who are struggling financially as a result of the pandemic.

We are working closely with local information and advice centres to help us identify residents who might be in this situation and to help provide support.

If you become aware of anyone in this situation, please signpost them to one of the following:

- Citizens Advice 0300 3309042
- Wantage Independent Advice Centre 01235 765348

It's important we manage their expectations as there is strict criteria that residents must meet to receive support, and it's important they're aware that any support they receive is emergency support while we work with them along with other relevant agencies to put in place an ongoing package of help.

It is also worth noting that these are limited funds, which we're expected to spend by 31 October 2020 at the latest

Electric Blanket testing

The county council is offering free electric blanket testing as they do every year, but because of Covid restrictions the process will be a bit different.

They'll post a special plastic bag to the address for residents to put their electric blanket in, and then someone will come and collect the blanket from their homes, take it away to be tested and then return it once it's done.

MP'S REPORT

I spent the parliamentary recess visiting as many individuals and organisations as I could. I met with the founders of innovative companies like Rosemor and Aquobex, whose cleaning and flooding solutions respectively attract custom from around the world. I visited hotels like the Bear and Milton Hill House, hotels being one of the sectors of the economy that has been particularly badly hit by lockdown, with some people being more reluctant to return to their previous way of life. At gyms like tfd Health and Fitness and Fitness Space people are keen to get back their previous way of life – and as a gym-goer myself I understand them! – they just have to book in advance and adhere to a higher standard of hygiene than perhaps they did previously. No bad thing, in my book.

At Farmer Gow's I saw not just what a great family day out the farm is for young and old, but also met the proprietors of successful businesses that Anne Gow has as tenants on the site, from LissieLou, the cake decoration business, to Bark and Berry Dog Grooming and the Oxford Yurt, a pretty impressive glamping site – I've never been glamping myself, but if you like doing so I'd check them out. I was pleased to make my first visit to the Westmill Wind and Solar Farm and delighted they were successful in their bid for Government funding for a new visitors' centre that will increase the number of visitors 6-fold.

Along the way there were lots of other independent businesses, like Didcot Glass and Glazing, Emma's Vintage Style, 30 Something and Bob's Butchers. Charities too, like Children Heard and Seen, which supports the children of prisoners - more on that in a future column. On my Facebook page (davidjohnston4wantage) you'll see I've started 'three questions' with the owners of different organisations to spread the word about organisations people might not have heard of.

On my week off, we went to the Lake District, but unfortunately I crocked my knee on a crag and am currently on crutches! It's my first real experience of having restricted mobility and it does bring home quite how many places are inaccessible for those who need to use crutches or a wheelchair to get around, something I've understood only theoretically before. Parliament is probably one of the worst examples, although I'm grateful I've temporarily been given an office nearer to the House of Commons to reduce the walking I have to do. 



POLICE NEWS

Covid-19 - New Measures





These new measures mean that people in England can only meet in groups of no more than six, indoors and outdoors.

Those that choose to congregate in larger groups will be dispersed and could be fined or even arrested.

Thames Valley Police officers will continue to work with our communities and will follow our approach to engage with, explain and encourage people to follow the new regulations.

Assistant Chief Constable Christian Bunt said: "Preventing the spread of coronavirus is a shared effort and we at Thames Valley Police will play our part. Our officers will be in the community engaging, explaining and encouraging people to follow the regulations. We will disperse groups of more than six people and will issue fines to those who refuse to comply. However, there are a range of enforcement options at our disposal, and this does not always involve fines being issued. Members of the public can expect to see officers out on patrol but we ask that everyone takes personal responsibility so police involvement is a last resort."

What the team have been doing

On Saturday 1st August, PCSO Selene Moquet and PCSO Adi Wright were called to an elderly male in Peachcroft who had forgotten where he lived. With the help of the public and lots of investigation, they finally managed to find a number for his son. He was returned home safely.

PCSO Maddie Highmoor has conducted visits to individuals, who have been reported to have breached the Government Guidelines on isolation, in relation to COVID-19. Please remember to follow the guidelines set out by the Government. The guidelines are there to protect yourself and to protect others. On the Wednesday 12th August, PCSO Selene Moquet and PCSO Adi Wright were called to an elderly male in Abingdon who had forgotten where he lived and was quite distressed. They took him back to the Police Station where he was well looked after. When his daughter came to collect him, he said he had had the best time and wanted to stay!

On the 24th August members of the Abingdon Neighbourhood Team attended an address in Abingdon following reports of

concerns over the welfare of two dogs that had been left inside a property. The dogs were found to be malnourished, covered in faeces and urine and suffering with infected sores. The dogs were brought back to the Police Station and handed over to the RSPCA who are subsequently conducting an investigation.

Officers from the neighbourhood team conducted a successful Licensing Operation on Friday 28th August. They accompanied both Vale of White Horse District Council and Thames Valley Police licensing officers and visited seven pubs in Abingdon to carry out checks relating to Covid-19 compliance, as well as reviewing general licensing matters. They were pleased to find that there was a high level of knowledge and compliance around this subject from the pubs visited, and both staff and customers were pleased to see officers out and about doing these checks once again.


