

The Council was please to co-opt Keely Ewart-Brookes to the Parish Council to fill a casual vacancy that had occurred. Keely lives in Morland Road and has been in the village for 12 years. The Council wishes Keely success in her new role.

Grants

The Parish Council considers any requests for grants at its November meeting. Grant requests are considered usually just once a year. Therefore, if there is any worthy and needy organisation where Marcham residents benefit which is considering applying to the Parish Council for a grant, and has not yet done so, then please note the deadline for submissions is Friday 15th October, 2021. Applications received after that date will not be considered.

The Council's grant policy and grant application form are available in the publications section, on the Council's website **marchamparishcouncil.gov.uk** Please complete the application form and return it to the clerk – details are on the form. Please also enclose a copy of your organisation's accounts.

Garden Waste Update

Fortunately garden waste collections are to resume following a temporary garden waste timetable. The brown bins will be emptied on the same day as the green recycling bins, but on a 4 weekly cycle. Marcham could be split into areas, so that not all households in Marcham with a brown bin will be emptied on the same day. The service is to resume from the end of September. The situation will be reviewed by the District Council in a few weeks time. Please see www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk/gardenwastecollection/changes for the latest information.

Mill Road Bridge – Bridleway 17 – Repair works

The consents and permissions required from the various authorities such as the Vale of White Horse District Council and the Environment Agency have now been granted, and a contractor has been appointed to undertake the required repair works to the bridge. All parties involved were working on the assumption that works would progress in September, but unfortunately following discussions with various interested parties, a decision was made to postpone the start date, as water levels in the river Ock were expected to rise during Autumn/Winter, and there potentially could be a flood risk to neighbouring properties. The works are now due to start next Spring as soon as conditions permit. This will be disappointing news to those hoping that the bridleway would reopen this year. The Parish Council will be advised once a firm timetable for the repair work is finalised. In the meantime, the bridge remains closed.

Noticeboard

Now that the Institute has been converted into housing, the public Noticeboard that was

attached to the wall outside has disappeared. The Council is considering whether to replace this by erecting a Noticeboard elsewhere in the village. Could residents please let the Clerk or local councillor know if they would like to see a new board somewhere, and if so, where they think it would be best located.

Allotment Rent Collection

The Council has resolved to give notice to increase allotment rents, and to update the terms of the allotment agreements. Letters have been sent to allotment holders. Previously up to 2020, allotment rent collection has been face to face, but again as last year, owing to steps to try and avoid unnecessary contact, it would be helpful if tenants could arrange to transfer the rent amount due straight into the Council's account via online transfer. Any tenant not having on line banking can still send a cheque payable to Marcham Parish Council for the amount due to the Clerk's address.

Planning Applications considered by the Council

P21/V1846/O - Erection of semi-detached dwelling joined to 19 Mill Road. The Council sought clarification on various points and asked for amenity area and parking to be identified.

P21/V2345/HH New garage with office above at The School House, Oakley Park, Faringdon Road. The Council asked that any accommodation be used in association with the existing house, and that a new independent unit not be created.

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District Council

Dear residents

The parish council has reported to us that there is a growing dog fouling issue across our districts.

Although there are many benefits that come with owning a dog (especially during lockdown), there are also responsibilities which include cleaning up after your dog. Please be aware that it is an offence to not clean up after your dog or leave used dog waste bags anywhere other than an appropriate bin. Under the Dog Fouling of Land Act 1996, allowing your dog to foul can result in an on-the-spot fixed penalty notice of £50 and incorrect disposal of dog waste bags e.g. not putting them in the bin can result in an £80 fixed penalty notice. If fines are not paid, cases can be escalated to court resulting in **fines of up to £1,000**.

There are some council owned litter bins within your parish. These can be used for both litter and dog waste bags – you do not need to find a specialist dog waste bin. You can also put dog waste bags in your black general waste wheelie bin so if you cannot find a bin or bins are full, please take it home

We know that most residents take a lot of pride in their local area and we encourage everybody to take extra steps in keeping your parish clean and tidy.





INDEPENDENT DIABETES TRUST



According to National Guidelines, people with Type 1 or Type 2 diabetes are supposed to have 9 key checks annually to protect their health and help to prevent long-term diabetic complications.

National Audits of the services people receive have shown that only around 50% of people actually have all 9 checks, although this number varies according to where people live and where they receive their care and treatment. The pandemic has made this situation even more difficult because many routine checks and face to face appointments have not been available. However, many people do not know they are supposed to receive these 9 checks nor do they know what they are, what they are for and how they are carried out.

The InDependent Diabetes Trust (IDDT) has published a new FREE booklet which explains what the 9 key tests are and why people with diabetes need them. It helps people to look after their diabetes and their future health by ensuring that they know what health checks they need and that they are carried out by the health professionals looking after their diabetes.





The new children in Reception (Pandas class) have also told of their favourite thing about school since starting at Marcham...



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Some Trees Are Greater Than Others

As September arrived, I had already seen some leaves start to alter colour, or dry out on the trees. Just the odd one here and there, but they were there. I noticed I was trying to convince myself



that it was just the trees drying out in summer, but who am I fooling? In all honesty, it's the first signs of autumn. We often say it's in the British culture to deny winter heading our way, but my view on culture is, it's a powerful influence if left unchecked, but we have the power to break away from it in part, through personal choice. Once I accepted the shock of seeing the passing of time right in front of me, I moved over to looking in awe at the trees before me. As we know, trees absorb carbon, and though some do absorb it via the leaves direct into its branches, much of the carbon absorbed stays in the leaves, ready to be dropped in autumn, which then rots into the soil below. Ultimately consumed by the tree roots, up into the trunk and branches etc.

I was walking through a local wood and saw a fallen Larch tree, blown over by the strong winds, its rootball pulled out of the ground in one piece. It made me realise how shallow some roots are, and how effective they are at absorbing each leaf fall that happens every autumn. It again got me thinking how effective trees really are at absorbing carbon, if surrounded by concrete and tarmac in a car park or street scene? The roots just can't get at the rotting leaves on the surface, and Council workers diligently sweep up the fallen leaves and drive them to where they are composted, burning more carbon on the journey. Then dig out the rotted compost when it's ready (this digging process releases yet more carbon). They then drive that compost and deliver it where it's needed (again burning more carbon in that journey).

The message is, choose wisely where you plant trees, and try and leave the rotting leaves under trees untouched. If leaves can be just left to rot into the soil, undisturbed, it's a good thing, as carbon is locked into that soil and the trees. Soil and plants are the best carbon capture device we have, but often overlooked. It's a cultural thing this overlooking, and a culture we can change through personal decisions.

When you next see a tree struggling to survive, surrounded by concrete, soon to be replaced by a new tree, that in turn will likely struggle as well. Question whether all trees absorb carbon effectively? Trees absorb the stuff, yes, but they are most effective, and efficient, where soil is around the roots, and not behind by a barrier of tarmac

It really is true, trees are great, but some can be greater than others if planted in better locations. Any old tree isn't always better than no trees at all.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT GARDEN WASTE...WHAT HAPPENED?

I know that many of you are very frustrated by the suspension of the Garden Waste collection, especially as it is a paid for service and we gardeners are in the middle of one of our busiest times of the year, as far as garden waste is concerned.

As you will all be aware, the whole country is suffering from a huge shortage of HGV drivers, for lots of reasons including drivers going on holiday, some shielding, some discouraged to return to Britain from the EU because of visa issues etc. During July and August we were aware that the number of calls to the call centre complaining of missed bin collections had increased ... a sure sign that something was awry. On the 2nd August, the Biffa CEO looked out of his window to see that the number of bin drivers assembled in the yard was well down. On counting those there, he realised that a bin collection had to be suspended to allow the other collections to go ahead. And in consultation with the Vale and SODC, it was decided that the one that would affect the least number of people (44%) was Garden Waste, but that it would only be a temporary suspension of between 4 to 6 weeks. The other core collections, recycling, residual and food, affects 100% of our residents. So, the BCP (Business Continuity Plan) was activated and Garden Waste drivers were put on the other core collections. Since then there have been endless meetings and consultations going on as the Vale tries hard to find a solution with Biffa. The Vale is locked into a legal contract with Biffa until 2024, so much of what happened is tied up in legal confidentiality. What I can say is that every effort is being made to reach a reasonable solution and every garden waste resident can be assured that he or she will not be out of pocket. As soon as I have any more news I will let you know via the Marcham website.

WEEKLY TIPS ON REDUCING YOUR PERSONAL CARBON FOOTPRINT FOR THIS MONTH

The next 4 tips to decrease your carbon footprint

How are you getting on with these monthly suggestions? I hope that some appeal to you and that you are managing to keep some going. If not, perhaps these next 4 might appeal to you.

Week 1 Plastic free cotton buds – we have already looked at how to reduce your consumption of plastic by giving up straws, plastic bags, and using reusable coffee cups and water bottles. But did you know that plastic cotton buds are one of the top ten forms of beach litter (Remember those awful pictures of beautiful sandy beaches covered in plastic waste?) Instead you can use biodegradable cotton buds.

Week 2 Tree Planting. As you know the Vale is in the final stages of getting a tree policy out for those of you who are keen to plant trees on Vale land. Or you might like to join a group of enthusiastic volunteers who are keen to plant trees through Friends of the Earth programmes (/treeplanting.html), or even to add a tree or two in your own garden. This is a great way to support wild life, combat climate change or compensate for your own carbon footprint.

Week 3 Harvest rain water. Make the most of rainwater by collecting it in a water butt. This water will help to reduce your water bills as well to reduce your carbon footprint and help to conserve water reserves.

Week 4 Be bee friendly. Bees are essential for the environment, our crops and our economy (pollinating 80% of European wild flowers and providing at least £1.8 billion (https://friendsoftheearth.uk/bees/why-do-we-need-bees) to the UK economy each year through pollinating our crops), but their populations have fallen

significantly due to pesticides and loss of habitat. Do your bit to support bees by providing a source of water and bee friendly plants in your garden (such as lavender, crocus and marjoram). You could even consider going an extra step and let your grass grow a little longer and building a bee "hotel" out of bamboo sticks. Small actions like these can go a long way to aid in protecting bees and supporting the pollination of plants and crops alike.

The latest on Afghan asylum seekers

Many of you have expressed a desire to help Afghan asylum seekers and you will be pleased to hear that one family has now been settled in the Vale and SODC.

Encouraging the uptake of the Covid Vaccine

Better leisure is encouraging people between the ages of 16 and 30 to take the vaccine by offering incentives to vaccinated customers. A £10 voucher to be used against a Better operated leisure facility and a three day free pass to any of its leisure centres or gyms are yours if you get vaccinated and are within the right age bracket.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

No Easy Answers

I believe we have all noticed the increasing amounts of traffic on our local roads since lockdown ended. This together with increasing numbers of reports on speeding, particularly those coming to our villages from elsewhere, has made me want to focus on roads and speeding this month.

Some of the things I have learned over the last 16 years on these issues include the following:

- 1. The majority of excess speeding is carried out by locals and the residents themselves. This may well be that they know their roads best and believe they know where they can safely put their foot down.
- 2. The regular hold ups themselves lead to frustration and the temptation to speed to make up time.
- 3. The police, in my view rightly, deem that their major focus should be on keeping down crime.
- 4. The available police resource for enforcing minor driving offences (the sort that many of us have committed) is therefore limited. It may be that minor infringement being taken over by local councils as with roadside parking is where we will be in a few years.
- 5. There is an increasing dependence on voluntary support for trying to encourage us all to drive slower and with more care. "Speed watch", Neighbourhood Action Groups (NAGS) and other initiatives do make a difference. For those who would like to get involved, details are in all Parish magazines and newsletters.
- 6. There are various speed reduction measures that have been tried over the years. These include: i) speed bumps expensive to install, noisy and can damage vehicle suspensions. ii) Vehicle Activated Signs (smiley faces etc.) cheaper, but plenty of

evidence of a reducing impact as time goes on. iii) Speed Cameras – again expensive to man and maintain – many taken down after a few months as a result of public anger and only have an effect over a short distance. iv) Raised tables as per Drayton - but these need to have adequate warning signs and colouration for best impact v) Chicanes and build outs. Reasonably affordable and increasingly used. Some evidence of excess speeding being caused by the chicane itself. vi) Improved road design taking into account visibility and driver perception.

7. There are no easy answers and each area probably needs its own specific solution.

So what can be done?

Speeding and traffic behaviour on the B4106 between Drayton and Sutton Courtenay is an issue all down its length. Noise and building damage issues exist in both villages. Congestion at busy times of the day causes much aggravation not just to the through traffic, but also to vehicles exiting on to the road. The road has a known poor safety and accident record. The proposed build out/chicane at the edge of Sutton Courtenay – if agreed after the full, public consultation will, it is hoped, reduce the average speed – hopefully to well below 30mph. The new HIF Road between Didcot and the Thames, we are told, will reduce the overall volume of traffic on all the roads between our villages – certainly for 10 years. We have to hope the Highway Officers are right.

The A415 between Abingdon and Marcham is also experiencing increasing traffic volumes. The reduction to 50mph has helped, but there must be a question of the road becoming more suitable for a 40mph limit. Work has been commissioned to find options for a redesign of the Frilford crossroads – possibly with dedicated bus and cycle lanes and even, yes, the long promised bypass.

But ultimately, the only long term solution is to encourage people out of cars and to walk and cycle wherever possible, and provide regular, reliable public transport where that is not feasible. At present cycling on our local roads is a risky business whilst walking on many of the roads is even worse. Buses are too infrequent and many villages have no service. HGV traffic is another whole problem.

It may be that, in the future, computers will be able to drive more safely than humans – but not yet.

With the police, Local Councils and Central Government all under budgetary restraint, there is no alternative but to be inventive where possible, and as patient as possible – particularly behind the wheel. *RICHARD WEBBER* Cllr OCC SC & Marcham Division.

MP'S REPORT

I am writing this after the first full week of parliament's return, when all MPs have been present. While I had been going down to London Monday-Thursday once it was permitted again, some MPs have not been physically in the House of Commons for nearly 18 months. All of us who were attending physically had been subject to a socially distanced chamber with only a fraction of MPs allowed in and all committee meetings were on Zoom.

The place is now transformed, with much more atmosphere; proper debates where people can 'intervene on' (interrupt to politely make a counterpoint) each other; and I for one felt our first Education Committee meeting was much more focussed and better for being able to put ministers and their officials under scrutiny. Virtual parliament is better than no parliament, but a lot is lost.

With the exception of a few days in Yorkshire and a couple of days in Norfolk,I spent most of recess at home in Didcot. There were some great events just before we returned. One was the Longworth Church Fete, which had a good turnout and good weather, a very competitive dog show and classics like a tombola and coconut shy. Another was a tea party at the Almshouse of Robert Stiles

in Wantage, to celebrate the 75th anniversary of the Almshouse Association. Almshouses have existed in the UK for more than 1000 years and provide low-cost housing to the local community. They have something in common with fetes in that both are run by volunteers. And, as with the return of parliament, they give a taste of what's been missed through Covid.

I know that the pressure on GP services continues to be a bugbear. Over the summer, I met with both the Wantage surgeries and chaired a larger meeting of the Didcot surgeries, Clinical Commissioning Group, Patient Participation Group reps and the District Council in Didcot. The long-overdue expansion of Mably Way in Wantage has just had a step forward after a meeting of the CCG: the business case has been approved and the planning application has been submitted. In Didcot, there is both the particular short-term need presented by the new houses at sites such as Great Western Park and a longer-term need given the expected population growth. In broad terms there's agreement about what we need. My job is to do all I can to try and ensure we get it.

Other recent meetings of note were with some residents of Appleford and some residents of Sutton Courtenay. The Appleford meeting was specifically about the location of the relief road and the desire of the group to see it moved 200m to where Oxfordshire County Council were originally going to put it. I think there is a compelling case for this and have contacted the County Council with the points the group wanted raised. The Sutton Courtenay meeting was a broader one about the development that has taken place and promised improvements that have still not arrived -at my request, they're giving me a task list of things they'd like me to do! A final mention for a couple of charities. Adrian is an ambassador for the Stroke Association and runs a group in Grove. He can deliver free of charge presentations to groups of any age about the risk factors for having a stroke. The other is Root and Branch, near Shrivenham, which runs outdoor activities for those with mental health difficulties. I visited this month and they need volunteer blacksmiths/metal workers to help run classes for those that use the service.
