It certainly has been a very unusual vear again, and the tree helps brighten up the village during the current climate when many are feeling low and anxious for a variety of reasons. The Council is very grateful to him for his generosity. The grateful thanks of the Council also go to the family and friends of parish councillors Sandra Hill and Ruth Mander who helped decorate the tree.

Christmas Tree Recycling - Reminder of where to take your tree

Real Christmas trees for recycling can be taken to Millets Farm by Saturday 8th January, or left on the hardstanding by the Salvation Army textile bank in Howard Cornish Road opposite Duffield Place by Wednesday 19th January in order to meet the collection dates. If taking your tree to the Howard Cornish Road location, please do not obstruct the textile bank, or the bus stop area.

Predictions are that it will be a cold and possibly snowy winter, so keep an eye on the District Council's website / social media for any collection updates.

Please also remember to observe the Government's Covid 19 regulations in force at the time when in public areas.

Bus Changes

As from 2nd January, there will be changes to the bus services in our area.

The S8 Wantage to Oxford via Marcham will cease to be operated by Stagecoach, and will become the X1 service operated by Thames Travel. At the time of writing the new timetable is awaited, but will be able to be found on www.oxfordbus.co.uk. Most journeys will be extended to Headington to provide connections between Oxford City Centre and the Nuffield Orthopaedic Centre. The S9 Wantage to Oxford via the A338 Frilford will continue to be operated by Stagecoach and journeys will run every 20 minutes Monday to Saturdays, every 30 minutes in the evenings, and every 30 minutes on Sundays. The new timetable can be found on the Stagecoach website www. stagecoachbus.com

Parishioner of the Year

The Council is again considering the possibility of an award to be presented at the annual meeting of electors should one be able to be held in spring next year. The Award recognises the efforts of local people who have, at any time, significantly contributed to life within the parish. Previous nominations have been carried forward, however the Council would invite anyone who wishes to put forward a new suggestion, to submit a short statement of not more than 200 words, as to whom they wish to nominate and the reasons why the person should receive the award. All nominations to be emailed to the Clerk at the email address below. Owing to Covid 19, the Council, was unable to give an award for the past 2 years, and the names of those previously nominated will be carried forward and considered this year along with any new nominations.

Allotments- Cow Lane and Parkside

If you have an allotment you are reminded that allotment rent collection for the 21/22 financial year is taking place. For those who have not paid, please transfer the sum due to the Council's bank account (details available from the Clerk if needed), or let the Clerk have a cheque payable to Marcham Parish Council. Those in arrears with rent or found not to be utilising their plot could lose it by the service of a Notice to Quit.

Council Tax 2022/23

The Parish Council will be carefully considering the budget for 2022/23 at its meeting to be held on Monday 10th January. Once finalised, the Council will set the amount of council tax that comes to the parish from the total amount paid by residents to the Vale of White Horse District Council.

Grant applications deferred from the last meeting were considered. The following sums have now been awarded:

- Marcham Community Group £41 for maintenance within the recreation field area
- Be Free Young Carers £150 towards their running costs.

Planning Applications considered by the Council

P21/V3081/N4BPrior approval for the change of use of an agricultural building to create a dwelling at Hitchcopse Farm, Cothill Road. Council did not wish an independent unit to be created, and expressed concerns regarding possible drainage into Parsonage Moor.

P21/V3185/HH Erection of log stores at 17 Parkside. Council requested that there should be no change to the colour and materials, that the ground be left permeable, and that the stores should not be used to support a business.

P21/V3297/FUL Erection of 2 storey 4 bed detached dwelling at Greystones, 8A The Gap. Council objected as it considered the proposal to be overdevelopment of the area. P21/V3164/HH Erection of 2m high wooden fence along boundary at The Old Bakehouse, 4 North Street. Council had no comment on the change of hedging to fencing.

P21/V3227/FUL Erection of 4m ball stop netting on south of football pitch and 6m netting on east boundary of the football pitch in Barrow Close. Council sought assurance that the fence would be removed out of season, and pointed out that the route across



Abingdon Reservoir – Latest from GARD

Progress this month - opposition from all levels of local government.

On 8th December, the Vale of the White Horse District Council debated a motion opposing the reservoir. The motion was proposed by Councillors Andy Cooke and Richard Webber and in the public session there were very strong speeches by Dr Chris Wilding, Chair of Steventon PC, Cllr Sally Povolotsky, Hendreds & Harwell (includes Steventon) OCC, and our own Dr Derek Stork, Chair of GARD. The motion was passed unanimously, so the reservoir is now opposed at all levels of local government. Well done to everyone involved.

The next consultation and upcoming local meetings

The next steps are to see what is released in January as part of the next consultation. Cllr Sally Povolotsky has kindly helped with some funding for us from the Councillor Priority Fund, which will help us produce some leaflets and hire some local village halls so that we can hold public meetings in the local villages. We expect these to start in February and early March so that we can pass on the results of our analysis of the next consultation round. Our first meeting is already booked for **Friday 4th February in Steventon Village Hall** (more details to follow). We fully expect the reservoir to still feature in the water companies plans, so please be ready to come and show your support and get ready to write response letters. See you there!







To remember those visits and appearances during the last year of the various parts of the ecosystem that





DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

ENVIRONMENT BILL... "its ambition is to leave the environment in a better state than when inherited"

This seems to be a good topic to start the year with as it will directly affect everybody in the Vale and covers environmental areas from waste to biodiversity. In this article, I will focus on Waste and briefly on Air Quality.

WASTE

You will see a major shift of priorities in collecting Waste in the future as the emphasis will be upon Reduce, Reuse and Repair before Recycling. So the aim is to reduce the amount of stuff we put in Waste; to reuse and repair articles wherever we can looking for help from Repair Cafés and advice on repair websites, and only then consider recycling ... this is a major shift in our way of thinking. Recycling is low down the waste hierarchy as it is not carbon neutral and remember we are trying to reduce our carbon footprint in the Vale to be carbon neutral by 2045. Collecting, sending for sorting, then re-manufacturing items that are then placed back on shelves is far less efficient than either the public refilling containers directly themselves, using less packaging and/or buying fewer new items to start with.

What will the Environment Bill mean for waste services in South and Vale?

The type of waste collected and the quantities of waste collected will change at the kerbside. This will be achieved through:

A Plastic Tax. This is being introduced this year and manufacturers using less than 30% recycled content in plastic products will have to pay. This should drive up the value of recycled plastic as well as encouraging manufacturers to switch to non-plastic alternatives; already some single-use plastic products, such as straws, have been banned.

Extended Producer Responsibility. This is also a measure targeted at the manufacturers, taking in all packaging, not just plastic. The aim is to make the companies who produce packaging pay for the costs of having to either recycle it or dispose of it. This new arrangement will run from 2023. A new body will be appointed to oversee the whole thing. This 'Scheme Administrator' will check what is in the waste we collect and pay us back the cost of collecting the packaging waste element of it. This will reduce the amount of packaging by between 3 and 9% over time, as packaging producers change packaging to get around the charge. Deposit Return Scheme. Some of you will remember in the past collecting tins or glass bottles to take to a shop where you could claim money in return for these items. A similar national high tech scheme is being rolled out for glass bottles by 2025.

Depending on how many items get included in the scheme, kerbside-collected recyclate will reduce by between 11 and 19% with the public returning most bottles directly to shops. Hence waste in your recycling bin will reduce.

Garden Waste There is a proposition that garden waste collections will be free for every household but it is controversial and may not happen. We will know more later this year.

AIR QUALITY

This Bill requires the government to set and meet an air quality target for fine particulate matter (fine particles caused by cars braking and the friction of rubber tyres on the road) and the Vale is ahead of the game as it is piloting a particulate monitor in Marcham's AQMA. It starts monitoring particulate measurements this month and will continue to do so for a year.

How to reduce our personal carbon footprint. As you know I have concluded all my articles by putting forward 4 different ways of reducing our personal carbon footprint each month (ie one a week). I wonder how useful this has been and would be grateful if you could let me know if you would like me to continue doing so this year.

Help for Essentials

There is a new Voucher Scheme to help struggling residents. It is a scheme paid for by the Government Household Support Fund to help cover the cost of food, energy, water bills and other essential costs, and it is not just for people on benefits but also for others who fit the criteria of a "struggling resident". COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

The Season of peace and goodwill

There is much uncertainty and anxiety in the media at present over Covid, over the Climate Emergency, house building, planning, the state of the UK and the state of the world. However, in the spirit of seasonal peace and goodwill, I will endeavour to stay positive.

Reservoir

Thanks to the expertise and determination of GARD (Group against Reservoir Development) together with the unanimously agreed motions passed by OCC and VWHDC, the residents of Oxfordshire have made their views clear that the proposed TW Reservoir is not wanted and not needed. There are cheaper, better and far less environmentally damaging solutions to potential future water stress in the south east of England.

COP26

Whilst there are some who were disappointed that the conclusions and decisions of COP26 did not go far enough, much was achieved. – not least an agreement to accelerate the timetable for future COPs and agreement that coal and a reduction in the world's dependence on it would, for the first time, be firmly on the agenda. Those dragging their feet on such issues are going to be increasingly exposed to world disapproval, as are the wealthy countries of the world to finding ways of compensating poorer countries for the costs of carbon reduction policies. More locally there is a need for better coordination between national and local government's actions on tackling the climate emergency.

HIF1 and Active Travel

There is much conversation going on at OCC over the right way to tackle traffic congestion. More roads lead to more traffic in the long term, but past housing growth means we need to reduce gridlock fast, particularly around Didcot and surrounding villages. Like it or not, most are agreed that the new road and Thames bridge are needed. Given that there are problems over increasing materials costs together with costs of reducing the impact on Appleford, there are urgent discussions going on between OCC and government over how to bridge the sizeable funding gap. Meanwhile OCC is wrestling with the problem of how to encourage more people out of cars and into using foot, cycle and public transport – and all on a tight budget.

Parish Councils

Whilst many of our local Parish Councils have vacancies for more councillors, in most cases there has been a welcome influx of new, energetic and young councillors. With both Sutton Courtenay and Marcham working on Neighbourhood Plans, there is much work to be done. Congratulations and thanks to all the new arrivals, and please consider getting involved if you have not already done so.

Planning Issues

With a new Minister for local government and a new focus on "levelling up", some substantial changes are on the horizon. The Oxford/Cambridge Arc is likely to take more of a back seat, whilst the pressure on our area to produce ever more likely housing and

growth is likely to reduce – or at least be diverted elsewhere. Hopefully, this will divert the major developers from exploring and capitalising on gaps in the planning system. As with the Thames Water Reservoir (now in its third iteration), there are examples of developers engaging in a planning war of attrition in which the same application returns again and again. This causes untold anger in village communities.

But I said at the start I wanted to stay positive. So I will wish everyone a very **Happy New Year** – even developers large and small!

MP'S REPORT

I'm delighted to have secured a debate in Parliament on the role of developers, housebuilders and management companies. I could talk for hours and hours about the complaints I receive — to the games developers play to outfox the system, to the low-quality of homes that are built and how bad they often are for the environment, to the lack of affordable houses to the extortionate service charges people are paying for communal areas to be maintained. I'll be covering all of this and more — get in touch if there is something in particular you think should be raised.

Following the success of my pre-COP26 summit for constituents in the summer, I've decided to make it an annual event. I'm very pleased that Alok Sharma, who remains President of COP for another year, has agreed to speak at it. I will share further details as and when they're confirmed in the coming months.

I write this just after the House of Commons has had to vote on so-called Plan B regarding Coronavirus. I share the frustrations of those who don't want to see restrictions re-introduced but I voted for the measures that were proposed as I believe they are proportionate and sensible. I will be as pleased as anyone if Omicron turns out to be much less of a concern that it is right now, but the Government is right not to take the risk.

The particular controversies were over what were described as 'vaccine passports' and the requirement for NHS workers to be vaccinated. Both are sensitive issues, but given you can show a negative lateral flow test (or exemption) instead of proof of vaccine, I do not believe what has been agreed can be described as a vaccine passport as commonly understood. And for decades there has been a requirement for NHS staff, depending on where they work, to have a number of vaccines including MMR, Influenza, BCG and Hepatitis B.

I am a patron of 3 of our local organisations –Play2Give, SecretSanta365 and Team Mikayla – all of which were out in force over Christmas. I was pleased to deliver presents with the first 2 and visit the fantastic Christmas lights display (30,000+ lights!) of Team Mikayla. Those of you who are familiar with them will know what great work they do – those of you who are not should go and check them out!

Finally, I had another great Christmas Card competition with entries from primary school children right across the constituency. It is always a very tough decision, so I end up with several runners-up. Congratulations to Ollie, age 4, from Hagbourne C of E school, who won; Nicholas from Fir Tree Junior School; Avril and Gil from Uffington C of E; and Myah who were runners-up. Special mention to Millie from Charlton Primary School, who did a pretty good drawing of the PM!

Safe and well visits offer practical advice to older and vulnerable residents about the risks in their home that could lead to falls, fire, or any source of harm.

Firefighters or dedicated advisers will talk to residents about smoke and carbon monoxide alarms (or fit them) and about how they can keep themselves safe in the event of a fire.

They can also provide advice and signposting on alcohol use, staying well and warm, and scams and doorstep crime prevention. If you work or support vulnerable people in their own homes, you can refer someone for a safe and well visit on the county council's website here:

If you have spotted any of the following, then consider a referral:

- There are no working smoke or carbon monoxide alarms in the property.
- The resident may find it difficult to react quickly in the event of a fire or emergency.
- They are using electrical equipment with trailing leads, lots of extensions or possible unsafe wiring.
- There are large amounts of post or other indications that the resident is being targeted directly by possible scams.
- The resident has made comments that they have concerns about staying safe.

There's no cost for a safe and well visit. It's just practical advice and peace of mind.
