The Parish Council has applied to the Vale of White Horse District Council for a road closure order on Sunday 13th November, to close New Road, Church St and the section of the A415 between North St and Church St, between 10.45 a.m. and 12.15 p.m. in order for wreaths to be laid at the war memorial. A road closure throughout the whole of this time may not be required, and the road will re-open as soon as possible. There will be minimal disruption to bus services. Anyone attending the event held at the war memorial should be mindful of Covid, and follow sensible precautions whilst gathering.

Fireworks

Again, the annual reminder for those of you who may have purchased fireworks and intend letting them off in your garden, please be considerate for neighbours, the many pets and animals, and wildlife in the village. Please notify others when any fireworks are going to be lit so that villagers are aware and arrangements can be made to keep pets indoors.

The Crown Public House

Concerns have been raised regarding the closure of The Crown public house. The Council has made enquiries of, and received a report from the business development manager of Admiral Taverns. He has confirmed that the pub is not for sale, and it is currently undergoing a costing and design exercise for a planned investment scheme which will start once a new tenant has been found. Unfortunately he is not in a position, at this stage, to say when The Crown will re-open.

Parking at Junctions

Concerns have been raised with the Parish Council regarding the difficulties encountered by the elderly, particularly

those with mobility scooters and wheelchairs who are obstructed in their movements by vehicles parked on pavement areas at road junctions. The Council appreciates that the number of car owners in Marcham is increasing, and it is therefore important that vehicles are not parked irresponsibly or left in places which cause a problem for others. Please would motorists think carefully about where their vehicles are left.

Cow Lane Allotments

The Council draws allotment holders' attention to the fact that the Government has recently announced the introduction of an Avian Influenza Protection Zone across the country, with the aim of mitigating the spread of the disease and placing requirements on bird keepers to take steps to ensure greater safety. Wildlife Gardening Jobs for Autumn

I love it when a reader suggests an idea for content, and the latest request is, "a brief article about 4 key things one can do this autumn, to help nature in our gardens?"



Easy, as there are only 4 component parts to wildlife gardening in my view, as most considerations come under these 4 umbrellas.

- 1. Water
- 2. Flowers/Trees/Shrubs with different colour and shaped blooms
- 3. Grasses of a differing length
- 4. Deadwood

With water, just try building a pond or placing out a container of some kind that will hold water next spring and summer. You'll be surprised how quickly wildlife finds water you put out. Remember though, don't put goldfish into your pond, as they will likely eat most of what you want to attract.

With flowers and trees etc, simple. Extend the flowering season by growing a climber of some kind over trees and structures. A clematis or honeysuckle will extend the flower season very quickly and provide some new crevices and spaces for insects, birds etc to hide in.

Grasses of differing lengths, with this one, just don't be too handy with the mower or strimmer. If you've been growing a patch of grass all summer to attract more life, then don't cut it all down again this winter. What



you've attracted needs somewhere to hibernate, or for the eggs laid on the grass to hatch next year. Most of what could emerge could be the predators of what you consider pests next year too.



Deadwood, again simples! Deadwood isn't always good to hide behind your damp shed. Some creatures like dead wood in the full sun or semi shade too. So, this autumn think about having log piles in more interesting and creative areas.

Wildlife gardening is mainly a mindset thing, a wildlife garden doesn't have to look any different to a manicured garden. The main difference is you are looking to try and create a more diverse range of habitats.

So, the fifth bonus task this autumn is to just look at your garden differently, and start to see the opportunities it may provide. For you and the wildlife.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

In October, the District Council held their regular full council in the Beacon, Wantage, as they are now out of their Milton Park offices and based in Abbey House, Abingdon, waiting for the Didcot Gateway to be built – their future home with SODC. Abbey House is too small for large public meetings so they are now being held in the Beacon for the foreseeable future, but unfortunately, meetings cannot be streamed from there, which is why I will focus this article on the last motion debated on



Fracking. The other two motions were on Waste and Small Businesses. For both these, we are asking government to treat as urgent the need for much more clarity and to speed up their decisions (see the VWHDC website for more information).

TO FRACK OR NOT TO FRACK

The last motion, proposed by a Conservative Councillor and seconded by a Lib Dem Councillor, was concerned with the Government's intention to allow Fracking – the cracking of rocks, to release gas, which is then extracted in a convoluted way, which is extremely bad for the climate. The motion declared:

"No viable deposits of shale gas a have been identified in or around the Vale of White Horse, but if one were to be identified, the potential introduction of Fracking into the Vale would have a number of detrimental implications for the local area, which include:

- 1. The introduction and effects of heavy vehicle movements on our roads.
- 2. The seismic risks caused by fracking, especially considering the uncertainty about steps to predict and reduce its impact.
- 3. The potential impact on our rivers and protected streams.
- 4. The hugely detrimental potential effect on our areas of outstanding natural beauty. Typically, many ugly drilling holes would have to be made in each site before any gas was identified."

Fracking would be particularly difficult in the UK because of our uneven geology. Over the eons, plates have been crunched together making them contorted...twisting, turning, spiking, dipping...all in a small island, which makes fracking a real safety risk to local residents and their property. Also gas deposits will be few and far between. We only have to look in the north of England, where, in early trials, small earth tremors occurred, shaking buildings and terrifying residents. Although there is no evidence in the UK of larger earthquakes being caused by Fracking, there is plenty of worldwide evidence, so we cannot be complacent and ignore such warnings.

Where Fracking is successful (as in parts of the US and the Far East) it is largely because it is carried out in remote, sweeping, flat areas like deserts, where the deposits are easier to access and there is less risk to nearby settlements.

Perhaps, most importantly for the world, is the fact that Fracking will necessarily create a huge carbon footprint resulting from the exploration for sites and the extraction/removal of gas from the sites. This is diametrically opposed to this council's ambitions to reach net zero by 2045 and the Government's expressed intention to do the same by 2050.

So, the motion concluded by asking the leader to write to the appropriate Minister expressing the Council's deep concern about the threat of Fracking and its unsuitability as an alternative energy source. Two points were emphasised:

- 1. Clear confirmation that no Fracking sites would be allowed without the District Council's approval.
- 2. The Minister should consider requiring a referendum of local residents to be carried out at the cost of the energy company.

This was a particularly satisfying motion to speak to as politics were put aside and we all came together to support this very serious issue.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT STAYING OPTIMISTIC IN AN ATMOSPHERE OF TRICKLE DOWN DEPRESSION

Clearly, things are not going as well as anyone would want. More people are angry and anxious than I can ever remember. I will sidestep Westminster difficulties and stick to local government, which finds itself squeezed between the uncertainty trickling down from above with the state and prospects for the economy and the desperate desire to do something for local residents arising from the cost of living crisis.



The demise of the Oxfordshire 2050 initiative and its ambitions to bring councils together on housing numbers and traffic has enormous implications for our future local economy.

With high inflation, the funding of the HIF1 Road, designed rightly or wrongly to address past shortages of infrastructure, is of increasing concern. If we want higher growth, we need new ideas on how to manage and fund our dated highway network.

Add to these concerns the other effects of the cost of living crisis and the urgent need to address the climate emergency and there are few grounds for optimism.

In short, it's all an unholy mess and there is a distinct shortage of ideas to sort it out. MP'S REPORT

I've been pleased with the response of local companies to my work experience campaign. We've now got a great set of placements happening for over 30 sixthformers at schools across the constituency, from Wallingford to Faringdon Community College. I'm very grateful to organisations from Oxford Sigma and Hachette UK to Rebellion and Astroscale.



The point of this campaign is work

experience is really important to help young people understand the world of work, but placements have dried up due to Covid and lots more people working at home for at least part of their week,

meaning young people are not getting the opportunities others used to, particularly disadvantaged young people. I'm hoping this will grow in the years to come.

We were given the shortest time limit for speeches I've had yet in my time as an MP this month - 90 seconds each! - in a debate about sewage discharges, secured by a Conservative colleague of mine. The reason for the short time limit was there were 33 MPs present for just a 90 minute debate. It was still enough to make some key points: that we all agree too much sewage is released into our waters – it should be rare but water companies don't adhere to this – it is not a new problem and it can't be fixed overnight as the alternative is sewage backing up into people's homes instead.

It was also important to highlight that the claim MPs voted to allow it to happen has been shown to be false by an independent fact-checking organisation, Full Fact. Whichever way the vote in question had gone, the sewage would not have stopped. I welcome the new legal duty the Government has put on water companies to reduce this harm and the £56 billion that is being unlocked by its Storm Overflows Plan to tackle the problem. I particularly welcome that the Government is increasing the maximum fine that can be levied from £250,000 to £250 million.

Sixteen-year-old Niamh from Wantage came to see me about negative behaviour she and her friends have been experiencing from boys and men, including rape 'jokes', which adults around them have dismissed as 'boys will boys'. She is keen to campaign on this area and I am going to help her. I am arranging for her to meet Sharon Gaffka, whose campaign on spiking I have helped and I raised what Niamh had told me in the House of Commons the following week. As I have said before in Parliament, it seems pretty obvious that if we can ensure boys grow up respecting girls, they're unlikely to become men who disrespect women.

Lastly, I will be hosting a Local Crime Summit with Thames Valley Police in the coming weeks, so constituents can share their concerns about local crime and anti-social behaviour. Details will be published on my website and Facebook soon.

Under pressure to use energy pre-payment meter? Citizens Advice can help



In the concluding months of 2022, Citizens Advice is expecting to

see more cases of a disturbing trend: low-income families with energy supply debts being pressured or even coerced into using pre-payment meters for their gas and electricity. Energy supplied by pre-payment meters costs more than energy paid by direct debit or on-demand, and this comes at a time when drastically increased price tariffs this autumn will probably see most people's fuel bills double.

Energy suppliers are legally obliged to negotiate repayment plans with customers who are falling behind on their bills, but many suppliers are ignoring this requirement and proceeding with installing pre-payment meters - or, for customers with smart meters, remotely switching them to prepayment.

"Greater love has no-one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends," said Jesus once. (John 15:13). The season of remembrance is upon us, and again this year, we invite the community to gather at the war memorials in Garford and Marcham on Sunday 13th November to honour the memory of our forebears. The aim of our commemorations is to bring alive some of the stories of local people whose lives were sadly cut short or were forever affected by war. People like Brig. Gen. Julian Hasler, late of Marcham Priory, buried at White House Cemetery, St-Jean-Les-Ypres. He commanded 1st Battalion East Kent Regiment, and was killed by shelling in April 1915. He was mentioned in dispatches four times, and severely wounded twice, once in South Africa in 1901 and again in France in 1914. In a letter to his wife, it was said by a fellow general, "We all recognised him as one of our finest Brigadiers. His bravery was extraordinary, and wherever the bullets and shells were thickest, he was sure to be found. I cannot express to you the terrible grief his death has caused to the whole of his Brigade, every man of which knew him and loved him."

Even though the time since the great conflicts of WW1 and WW2 is ever widening, "remembering" seems to be getting more important to the nation. Sometimes I wonder if the increase is nothing more than wistful nostalgia. After all, it is said that people tend to get more interested in the past when the present is changing at an intolerable rate. Does it also have something to do with longing for heroes and good leaders too perhaps? When we struggle to locate them in the present, we look to the past; and with the notable exception of President Zelenskyy, good leadership is hard to find at the moment. However, when people have laid down their lives for others, the desire to honour their sacrifice should never be derided or under-valued. After all, that is what Christian people have done for 2000 years, honouring the memory of the One whose great and glorious sacrifice is echoed every time a human life is given for the sake of others. We will remember them, and Him.
