

MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL Christmas Tree Recycling

It's that time of year to begin to think about Christmas trees again, and how to dispose of them once the festive period is over. The Vale of White Horse District Council will be running its Christmas tree recycling scheme this year. Trees can be taken to Millets Farm or placed on the hardstanding by the Salvation Army textile bank in Howard Cornish Road (opposite Duffield Place). Please do not obstruct access to the textile bank or the bus stop though. Trees will be collected from Millets Farm on Sunday 8th January, 2023, and from Howard Cornish Road on Wednesday 18th January, 2023. Trees will need to be left, at the latest, the day before collection. In case of changes please keep an eye on the District Council's website/ social media for any collection updates.

Parishioner of the Year

The Council is again considering the possibility of an award for 2022. The Award recognises the efforts of local people who at any time have significantly contributed to life within the parish during that year, or at any time prior to 2022. Nominations from previous years have been carried forward, however the Council would invite anyone, who wishes to put forward a new suggestion, to submit a short statement of not more than 200 words, as to whom they wishes to nominate, and the reasons why the person should receive the award. All nominations to be emailed to the Clerk at the email address below.

Grant Applications

Applications for grants were considered at the November meeting of the Parish Council. The Council awards grants, subject to certain conditions, where there is benefit for the residents of Marcham. The Council was pleased to be able to support the following organisations:

- Marcham Parochial Church Council £250 towards the costs of running Friday Club
- Vale of White Horse and Ridgeway Archaeological and Historic Trust - £1000 towards roof repairs on their archive facility.
- Marcham Community Group £2900 towards grounds maintenance on the field

- Abingdon Carousel Family Centre £300 towards running costs.
- South and Vale Citizens Advice Bureau -£1000 towards running costs
- Be Free Young Carers £150 towards running costs

• Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal - £150 Community Speedwatch Group

A Community Speedwatch Group is a partnership between the community, the Local Authorities and Police, and gives local people who are concerned about traffic speeds in their area the chance to become actively involved in road safety. The Council has agreed to start a speedwatch group for Marcham, and two parish councillors, James Plumb and Warren Brooker have

undertaken training. We now need a team of local residents who are willing to volunteer a small amount of time on a regular basis, to be trained and use the speed detection equipment to check traffic speeds in areas where it is thought vehicles are travelling in excess of the permitted limit. Drivers of vehicles observed speeding will be sent a warning letter. If found to be a persistent offender, further Police action could follow.

If you are interested in becoming part of Marcham's Speedwatch Group then please let the Clerk or your local Parish Councillor know. Christmas Tree – Village Green

To bring seasonal cheer to the village, the Council is again planning to site a Christmas tree on the village green. It is very grateful to Andrew MacLean for providing the tree again this year. Andrew has also very kindly offered to provide a bare rooted tree which can be planted to grow gradually for future years. Sadly the tree planted last year did not survive the high winds.

This month many people attended the Remembrance Service at the Church and War Memorial. The structure, described as a wayside cross, was first dedicated on the 25th June 1920 and was bestowed to the Parish by Mr and Mrs Gore-Browne of Oakley House.

Marcham has changed significantly since 1920, not least the amount of traffic along Frilford Road passing by the Memorial.

Accordingly,to recognise the changing face of the village there is some discussion as to whether the current location of the War Memorial is the most suitable.

Therefore Marcham Parish Council would like to announce the intention to begin a consultation process, commencing in the New Year, involving the residents of Marcham, Frilford and Garford to understand views, concerns and wishes for the War Memorial.



History came to life for the Marcham Society in November with a well attended visit to the house of **Oscar Nemon**. Who? I hear you ask.

Nemon, as he always referred to himself as, was an early twentieth century sculptor of considerable talent.

Born Oskar Neumann in the town of Osijek in present day Croatia, he developed his skills during his teenage years. Later, he settled in Belgium to study at the Académie de Beaux Arts in Brussels; however, Nemon was born to Jewish parents and it became increasingly clear that he would have to escape mainland Europe to keep one step ahead of the growing influence of the Nazi party.

Ultimately, Nemon settled in Oxford in 1942, and sculpted in his studio, Queen Elizabeth (The Queen Mother), Churchill, Freud, Truman, Eisenhower and Macmillan among many other notables during his time there.

He lost many of his family during the war, and created an area of remembrance in his garden, where, at 1100 on the 11th November we stood in reflective silence.

Our visit there was truly interesting, enhanced by our enthusiastic and at times, emotional guide, Alice, who is the daughter-in-law of Nemon, to whom we are all thankful for a day that we will remember for many years to come.

During the Covid lockdowns we all reflected on what was important to us, and became more aware of how caring for and appreciating nature is. Collectively though maybe, we've slipped back to some old habit since then, and when fresh challenges arise, we are maybe only then reminded of the importance of nature? So I propose we set up a new international day, a **Remember Nature Day**, with the subheading of, **We Are Part Of It And Not Separate To It**. It's just a thought. Anyway, enjoy the season, and remember to allow time to reflect now and then on what matters. Notice how an appreciation of nature increases in us at challenging times.



DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Despite all the tempestuous, disturbing national news, not least the very serious position the world is in as far as Climate Emergency is concerned and the very high risk now that we will exceed our global temperature target of 1.5 degrees, councils have to keep going and do the best as possible for their residents. Below are the latest updates of what is happening in the Vale:



SUPPORT FOR STRUGGLING RESIDENTS

The Community Hub at the Vale and SODC have set up support and advice for those who are really struggling at this difficult time. They have sent out a leaflet with all the information which you will find on the Marcham website or you can contact them on 01235 422600.

The sort of things that are covered is advice on food support; housing support, including help with renting,housing advice and homelessness; mortgage payment support; help with home improvements and utility bills; council tax; debt advice; health and well-being advice. So please don't suffer in silence. Check out the website or contact the Vale.

UKRAINIAN SUPPORT

Residents who are still supporting Ukrainian families after the initial 6 months will be eligible to receive an increase in their funding from £350 to £500 payable in arrears from !st December.

WASTE COLLECTIONS

The re-routing of bin lorries to make collections more efficient has been rolled out with little disruption. Where there have been a few issues, the waste team has responded quickly and efficiently. Also, residents have been encouraged to report any missed bins in the usual way by calling Biffa on 030000 610610. If you need to check your collection details you can visit Binzone at: whitehorsedc.gov. uk/binzone

CROFTS COURT IN BOTLEY

The Community Led Housing development on Crofts Court in Botley is now underway and recently featured in a report on BBC South Today. This exciting project is made up of five one bedroom and three two bedroom flats which are available to those on the Vale housing register to apply for. The Oxfordshire Community Land Trust (OCLT), which is a non-for-profit organisation, has funded the homes and is now keen to find further sites and to work with town and parish councils across our districts.

SOLAR FARM PUBLIC CONSULTATION

A developer has launched a public consultation for proposals for a large solar farm in the Vale, West Oxfordshire and Cherwell. The developer proposing the Botley West Solar Farm advises that it is large enough to be considered a 'Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project', which means it will be determined by a government appointed Planning Inspector. The Vale will be responding to the applicant's consultation and will be encouraging local residents and businesses to do the same. The project developers have posted consultation leaflets to over 22,000 homes and are publicising the consultation to the wider area. The deadline to submit any comments is the 15 December and there will be public events taking place across the area from 19 November – 5 December.

COMMUNITY GARDEN AWARDS – THE NATIONAL GARDEN SCHEME

Some of you will know about the CARF scheme at the Vale which is up and running again and encouraging residents to apply for a grant of up to £5000 to realise their climate focussed project. If you remember, Neil Rowe and his church group won £5000 towards

rewilding and landscaping part of the churchyard. However, that scheme closes on November 25th 2022, but enthusiasts might like to apply for The National Garden Scheme which provides grants of £500 to £5,000 for the creation of a garden or a similar project (such as an allotment) with horticultural focus for the benefit of the local community.

Community groups, either a charity or Community Interest Company (CIC), can apply and each application must itemise the details of the costs they are planning to cover. Eligible costs could include, for example, site preparation (including hire of small mechanical tools such as rotavators), hand tools, plants, trees, shrubs, containers and seating. Applications will be accepted until 31 January 2023.Further details can be found if you search Community Garden Grants - National Garden Scheme (**ngs.org.uk**)

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT CYCLING

Since the first lockdown, like many, I have been moved to use my bike to get around much more. Whenever possible, I cycle to my Council Offices for meetings. I am past the age of being a member of the Lycra brigade, and as a result of pressure from family and wiser colleagues, I am now wearing my crash helmet. My car



usage has dropped dramatically and I am becoming an expert on understanding how and why the X2 bus timetable behaves the way it does. Living in Drayton, I am fortunate to be close to a regular half hour bus service in most directions. Many people are not so lucky. If/when the buses are late, it is almost always because they have been held up in car traffic. It is all very well for the likes of me to bang on about encouraging people to use their cars much less, but so often the major obstacle to this is the unreliability of our public transport together with the safety of our cycle network. Here and there, we have stretches of well made, dedicated, safe and attractive routes for cyclists (Peepoday Lane being the classic example). Very few of these join up properly at present and the cyclist too often has to take his/her life in their hands as they try to negotiate busy roads and fast traffic.

Last Saturday, we decided to try a longer trip to a cup of coffee. Only about 20 miles + hills, but even after careful planning, it involved some stretches of busy roads. Most car drivers are very aware of the need to give cyclists (particularly those not in the flush of youth) plenty of room as per the new Highway Code. However, a significant number seem to find cyclists little more than an irritating obstruction. While we cannot afford to join up safe cycling routes as quickly as we would like, and so many of our roads are too narrow for dedicated cycle lanes, all of us – cyclists, pedestrians and car drivers have to accept the need for sharing the roads. In the past 30 years, the number of cars on our roads has doubled. That cannot be sustainable. Last Saturday, we decided to get off main roads wherever possible and explore usable byways. This involved carrying the bikes at various points and negotiating gates and even stiles at one point.

On the way home, we took on the roads again and risked the traffic. Summing up our day, we agreed that it had been a beautiful day www.madnews.co.uk December 2022

and we were fitter than when we started and we were still alive. But was it enjoyable? Nowhere near as enjoyable as it should have been. Having been overtaken by two electric cyclists, even older than us, shooting up Steventon Hill, we are seriously considering the latest electric adaptations to normal bikes - less than half the price of new electric bikes. We wonder if by going a little faster on shared roads might actually make us safer.


A recent VWHDC publication caught my eye recently."The councils intend to encourage sustainable active transport methods like walking and cycling, and to make maximum use of green spaces and the districts' waterways as it's widely recognised that spending time in the natural environment is beneficial for mental health and wellbeing."

Meanwhile, OCC is heavily involved in a "Vision Zero Summit" on road and cycling safety. Bring it on.

MP'S REPORT

My work experience campaign has been a great success and I'm very grateful to all of the employers who offered placements to local young people this year. I visited a number of the young people participating while they were on their placements and they had all enjoyed their time. They found the workplaces friendly and felt they had learned new things. The whole point of this campaign was that work experience



working from home – but they remain a vital way for young people to learn the skills the workplace needs.

It was standing room only in Westminster for the first meeting of the Community Energy All Party Parliamentary Group, which I chair and which is sponsored by Power for People. As readers know, I am the lead sponsor of the Local Electricity Bill, which is designed to remove the barriers to local generators of renewable energy selling that energy to local people.

The bill now has support from 311 MPs, within touching distance of half of the House of Commons. There was a great atmosphere in the room with people having come from as far as Scotland to attend! The bill has changed significantly as a result of conversations between the campaign team and civil servants and we remain hopeful of seeing it incorporated into other legislation.

Another issue I have campaigned on is anti-social behaviour. In my first couple of years, most of the complaints I received were about anti-social behaviour from unauthorised traveller camps. This is something I raised in the House of Commons as it was frequently accompanied by local people being subjected to abuse, theft and damage to their properties.

In the past few months, I have received increasing complaints about broader anti-social behaviour and crime, including drug dealing and business burglaries. I have made visits to businesses that have been burgled - sometimes repeatedly - and I held a crime summit in Wantage for local people to raise the experiences they've been having directly with Thames Valley Police.See my Facebook page (www.facebook.com/davidjohnston4wantage) for updates about the outcomes of this.

We also saw Back British Farming Day this month. I am a regular visitor to the constituency's first-rate farms -and a regular consumer of their meat and dairy products! - and I see first-hand how hard our farmers work. We should do all we can to support them, not least by buying local wherever possible.

I've continued my visits to every kind of organisation we have in the constituency - including sports clubs. I am a big sports fan and

have recently been to both Grove Rugby Club and Wantage Town FC games. We have lots of sports clubs in the constituency. They are almost all run by volunteers and act as a great resource for the community -do visit the ones near you when you can.


