

MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL Council Tax 2023/24 - Council Tax Freeze at parish level

The Parish Council reviewed its comments from the December's finance meeting and has now finalised the budget for 2023/24. It is requesting £71,500 from the Vale of White Horse District Council to help with the costs of running the parish. The Parish Council is very aware of the economic climate, rising costs and expenses for parishioners. It has therefore worked hard to control its spending, and resolved to keep the part of the Council Tax paid to the Parish Council exactly the same as last year. Applying a Council Tax freeze means that individual households will continue to pay the same amount of £76.77 per Band D property. The budget can be found on the Council's www.marchamparishcouncil. gov.uk. As well as needing to undertake regular maintenance, and grass cutting within the village, the Council has set aside funds for awarding £7500 in grants to organisations that support the parish, and has carried forward £5000 towards the costs of progressing a Neighbourhood Plan.

Parishioner of the Year - Reminder -**Last Chance for nominations**

The Council is again considering the possibility of an award for 2022, to be presented at the annual meeting of electors later this year. The Award recognises the efforts of local people who at any time have significantly contributed to life within the parish. The Council would invite anvone who wishes to put forward a new suggestion, to submit a short statement of not more than 200 words, as to whom he/she wishes to nominate, and the reasons why the person should receive the award. All nominations to be emailed to the Clerk at the email address below. All names previously given will be carried forward and added to the ones received. The Council has a working group who prepares a short list from which the Council selects the worthy recipient.

Thames Water Resources Management Plan consultation

Water supply is under severe pressure, and Thames Water is obliged to plan for the future. They have recently published the draft Water Resources Management Plan and have launched a public consultation exercise on it. It explains how they plan to meet the water resource challenge, by fixing leaks more rapidly, reducing water consumption, and investing in new infrastructure including the new reservoir in Oxfordshire just south of Marcham, as well as other measures. There are differing opinions on the need for the reservoir, so it is important that they collect the views of residents.

SIGN UP FOR LOW-COST BROADBAND CITIZENS ADVICE TIP

Citizens Advice has expressed concern that people in need are not taking advantage of cheap broadband and mobile phone schemes set up specially to help them. Loosely termed "social tariffs" or "essential broadband", these schemes are discounted deals intended for those on Universal Credit, Pension Credit, Employment and Support Allowance, and some other benefits. Statistics show that only 1.2% of those eligible to register for these low tariffs have done so, although they could save over £100 a year.

Social tariffs are provided in the same way as normal phone and Internet packages, but at a lower price. Network providers liaise with the Department of Work and Pensions (DWP) to ascertain customers' eligibility, and the DWP is required to provide only the necessary information, so that personal information remains safe.

At the time of writing, not all telecom companies offer social tariffs but it is possible for those who qualify to switch to a supplier that does provide them. The usual fees for switching contracts, leaving a contract early or terminating them have in many cases been scrapped for those on benefits who qualify for these tariffs – but check with your supplier to make sure.

Yellow Room

The children have had a productive start to the year and joined in with the Kite Festival which took place at the start of the month. 




For this report, I have picked out a few issues which I think might interest you, so read on!

Photo IDs needed to vote at elections

government has introduced requirement for all voters to show a photo ID at a polling station at some elections. This will apply for the first time in England at our local district elections on Thursday, 4th May 2023.

Acceptable forms of photo ID will include, but are not limited to, passport, driving licence (including provisional licence),

Great British Spring Clean



Council will tackle food poverty and promote sustainable local production

Oxfordshire County Council has allocated £250,000 of funding to be divided between district and city councils to help create and deliver their local food action plans. The Vale will use the funding to work with its partners to create and deliver a local food action plan in 2023. Covid-19 brought the issues of food insecurity, access to healthy, affordable food and the impact of these on health into sharp focus. Oxfordshire food banks saw a three-four-fold increase in use, with a conservative estimate that around 6,000 people a week required support to access food. Local community food networks across the district rose to the challenge, but it became clear that there was a need for an end-to-end strategy covering all key organisations and stakeholders in the Oxfordshire system. The district and city councils agreed that Oxfordshire County Council would commission Good Food Oxfordshire to develop a food strategy for Oxfordshire. Now the Vale has a Food and Farming Champion, Cllr. Paul Barrow, to help reduce food poverty by promoting food production, distribution, and healthy eating across the district and so work towards the vision of Oxfordshire Food Strategy.

Vale Cabinet approves changes to car park permits

Car parking permit fees in the Vale of White Horse District are likely to increase slightly, following a decision at a Cabinet meeting to raise permit costs by ten per cent, in line with inflation levels. From April 2023, monthly permits to district council car parks will increase by £7 on average, with annual permits increasing £81 on average, to help support the delivery and maintenance of the car parks. As a largely rural district, the Cabinet acknowledged the importance of car parks in allowing residents to access their town centres and support the

It cannot be denied that our roads are becoming more and more congested. Even the rat runs are choked with rats. Whilst the pressure for more and more housing remains, and with it the pressure on County Highways to pass new developments, is it inevitable that things are going to get worse? The photographs attached show rush hour queues at Culham Bridge, Drayton Rd, and the A415 at Marcham. It would be only too easy to find many more. Have we already reached saturation point? The latest major housing development to be considered in our area is the Lioncourt development at Fyfield with 600+houses potentially spilling yet more cars on to the Frilford crossroads and Marcham. OCC Highways judge that the effect on Marcham will be marginal, but there are concerns that this argument must soon run out and the cumulative impact of several developments on the immediate and wider area must carry more weight. But spare a thought for OCC Highways and the District Councils. Under our current planning system, Districts have to offer up areas for thousands more houses in their Local Plans. OCC is then charged with trying to make our Highway network function properly and take all the resultant flak. Having just arrived back home from a photography session, having spent the best part of two hours driving a very few miles, I am struck by the irony of the damage we are causing to the environment, to our own physical and mental health and to the impact on local commerce. Are our only solutions growth at all costs and ever more roads?

A lighter note - New Year Resolution

Determined as I am to get out of my car and on to my bicycle whenever possible, I decided a few days ago that the weather was warm enough for a shopping visit to Tesco by bicycle. Yes, it had been raining, but the forecast looked promising. As we approached via the Ock Valley cycle path, we passed a pedestrian coming the other way who kindly warned us that the path ahead was flooded but just about passable. My wife went first through what looked like six inches of muddy water steering her way through an s bend in the path. She managed to get through safely so I followed. I could see that there was a short cut avoiding the s bend if I made straight for the dry path the other side. Older readers will know exactly what I mean when I say that my direct route went straight over a Dibley-scale pothole invisible under the mud. MP'S REPORT

If you haven't heard from me since last year, then Happy New Year. Just before Christmas we had the sad news that a key community figure in Didcot, Hasnath Miah, died at the age of just 49 after a stroke. Hasnath had been homeless for part of his life and had been helped by local people, including through free meals, to get back on his feet. He swore if he was ever in a position to help others, he would do so. He developed a successful restaurant called Indian Dream, and in the pandemic began giving free meals to key workers, the homeless and young carers, just in the way he had been given food. In total he gave away more than 10,000 free meals.

I paid tribute to Hasnath in the House of Commons the following week in a speech including a number of local matters. I included my campaigns to see more GP surgeries here and to reopen Grove Station. I updated people on the Local Electricity Bill that I am the lead sponsor of, which aims to remove the barriers to community energy being created by local communities and sold to it.

And I talked about a couple of the things that have come out of activities I ran for the first time last year: firstly the crime summit, where antisocial behaviour was a recurring theme – something my boss in the Department for Levelling Up, Michael Gove, is now tasked with working up a strategy on – and my work experience campaign for local young people. Many employers have got out of the habit of providing work experience with so many staff now working from home, yet it's a vital way for young people without connections to learn about the workplace.

Work experience is of course a familiar theme from my pre-politics career working on social mobility, a topic I used for a PMQ I was drawn for in the first week back of the new year. You're 24 times more likely to become a doctor if a parent is one – only 6% of doctors come from a working class background – and 17 times more likely to become a lawyer. And as I wrote in a recent article, it's not just the responsibility of the Government or schools.

In brief: the Thames Water Resources Management Plan is currently open to consultation. Make sure you take part on their website at **thames-wrmp.co.uk** as it includes the reservoir proposal. You can respond to the Draft Regional Plan for the South East on the WRSE's

website at wrse.uk.engagementhq.com/our-consultation. I know there have been Royal Mail problems again, so I've been highlighting these once more in parliament and with the company. And congratulations to both Grove and Southmoor Kebab Vans on being nominated for the Kebab Van of the Year Award.

Draft plans for WRSE were published mid-November, consultation ends Monday 20 February. Thames Water's WRMP was published mid-December, consultation ends Tuesday 21st March.Information and bullet points to help with the response are available now on the GARD website. You can make a difference to the outcome, as you did in March 2022. NB if there are two householders, it is helpful if both submit a response. Oxfordshire County Council, the Vale of the White Horse District Council and your MPs remain strongly opposed to the plan and these democratic representatives would like to know you have responded. A list of MP and Council contacts is on the GARD website; please copy your response to them and to GARD.

Abingdon Reservoir is still central to the plans with construction starting ahead of the Severn Thames Transfer, for no good reason. If the reservoir plan goes through, you will have to pay for the reservoir through your water bill, even though that money is needed to increase sewage infrastructure and fix leaks, and even before a drop of water is supplied by the reservoir.

The reservoir is a solution looking for a problem. In the plan, it is no longer to provide water for Oxfordshire and Swindon (as in 2010), nor mainly for London (as in 2019). Now the plan is to sell most of the water out of the water-stressed Thames region by pipeline to Portsmouth, for simple profit.

GARD is holding public meetings in February; so is Thames Water. Please come to ours for information and attend the Thames Water meetings to ask questions.

A New Story

Some movie fans may criticise modern cinema as being largely composed of remakes of classic films, sequels and dominated by a few major character franchises. However, it depends where you look, there are many new and fascinating stories being told and worlds that are created through recent movies – *there are new stories*.

The 22nd of February is Ash Wednesday, marking the beginning of the Christian season of Lent which last for 40 days (46 including Sundays) until the celebration of Easter and Jesus' resurrection from the dead. It is a time when people often choose to change something; fasting, giving up particular luxuries, committing to daily prayer or Bible reading etc. This is often done to help people focus on what's important at this time; in essence making space in their life for more of God as we prepare for Easter.

The number 40 is fascinating for many reasons. For instance, it is the only number in English spelt with its letters in alphabetical order. In the Bible, a quantity of 40 represents a significant period of time, usually of testing and trial. For instance, 40 years were spent wandering by Israelites in the desert and Jesus spent 40 days in the wilderness, a time closely associated with Lent.

As well as being a powerful model for fasting and prayer, Jesus' time in the wilderness helped tell a **new story**. We are told in Matthew 4 that Jesus entered the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. In doing so, He is recreating the experience of the Israelites wandering the desert for 40 years before entering the Promised Land but is showing that He is bringing redemption and a better way to live. Where the Israelites complained about food, Jesus refused to turn stones into bread for himself. The Israelites repeatedly put God to the test, doubting his love and provision. Jesus refused to put God to the test by jumping from the Temple. The Israelites betrayed God and worshipped idols they made themselves. Jesus refused to worship any other than God the Father.

As you consider the period of Lent and whether you will mark it with some committed changes, consider it an opportunity for a *new story* – a chance for not only personal discipline but also to positively impact others and share the hope that is fulfilled in the Easter story.
