#### **Annual Meeting for Electors**

This year the annual meeting for electors will take place on Wednesday 24th May at 7.30 p.m. in the village hall. Please put a note of the date in your diaries. Further details to follow.

#### GigaClear-Parkside Cabinet

GigaClear have offered the Parish Council £500, as a goodwill gesture, towards improving the aesthetics at the Parkside corner, following the installation of the fibre broadband cabinet. Residents who live in that area have been asked for their thoughts on how the money can best be spent.

#### **Voter ID – New requirement at Elections**

When voting in person in the May elections this year (Vale of White Horse District, and Marcham Parish Council elections), you will need to show photographic ID when receiving your ballot paper. Acceptable forms of ID are: passport, driving licence, blue badge, older person's bus pass, national identity card issued by an EEA state, PASS card issued by the Post Office (www.postoffice.co.uk/identity/passcard), or anonymous elector's documentation. If you do not have any photo ID, or you look very different from your old photograph, or your name has changed and is not the same as on the electoral roll, you can apply for a Voter Authority Certificate. Details about this are at https://www.electoralcommission. org.uk/i-am-a/voter/voter-id/applying-avoter-authority-certificate. The deadline for applications is Tuesday 25th April, 2023. Don't be caught out and lose your vote. Check in good time that you have an appropriate form of ID document.

#### A338 – Speed Limit

Concerns have been raised with the Parish Council recently regarding the speed limit along the A338, particularly as there are no footways near housing, and residents have to cross the road to access bus stops. The Parish Council has written to the relevant authorities to see whether steps could be taken to reduce the speed limit down from 50 mph, particularly as the Vale of White Horse District Council has agreed, in principle, to alterations to the Frilford crossroads junction which have been designed to improve traffic flows.

#### Thames Water – Water Resources

Management Plan - Consultation deadline

Please note that the consultation on the Water Resources Management Plan for the area ends on 21st March 2023. Anyone who wishes to make comments, can find further information at https://www.thameswater.co.uk/about-us/ regulation/water-resources

Two awards were presented last year, and to allow sufficient time for nominations for the next award to be considered, the deadline for the submission of them has been extended. The Council has agreed to continue to invite submissions until the Autumn. Therefore if there is anyone who knows of a volunteer who has significantly contributed to life within the parish, they are invited to submit a short statement of not more than 200 words, as to whom they wish to nominate and the reasons why that person should receive the award. All nominations to be emailed to the Clerk at the email address below.

#### Planning Applications considered by the Council

P22/V2988/LDP Change existing door from timber to UPVC at 4 Mill Road. The Council had no objections provided it was in keeping with the property's adjacent window, and suitable for a conservation area.

P23/V0233/HH Erection of 4 bay oak framed garage at Manor Farm, Mill Road. The Council noted that some changes had been made to the previous application, but it continued to express concerns regarding the impact on the area, access, vehicle movements, and queried the use of an upper floor. Use should be restricted to agricultural.

Process.There was over an hour of very positive Q & A,in conclusion there is more than enough support to complete the application and apply for a VCA Order.

By the time you read this the steering committee will have submitted the application, including a high level business plan. The VoWH then have 8 weeks to determine if the threshold has been reached.

A developer has made an offer to the owners of the Crown which has subsequently been accepted. Their intensions are unclear but may involve a change of use.

If we are granted a VCA order by the VoWH, the Parish Council and theCommunity will have a voice in deciding what happens. We have engaged with CAMRA and Plunkett who are advising and supporting the application. An Email address will be set up, and an online survey created; the aim is to keep the whole community informed and involved as the process evolves. #### MARCHAM NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE

Since April 2012, local communities have been able to produce Neighbourhood Plans for their local area, putting in place planning policies for the future development and growth of their neighbourhood. Marcham Parish Council as announced selected the neighbourhood area to be the same as the parish boundary.

Neighbourhood planning provides the opportunity for Marcham Parish to set out a vision for how we want our community to develop over the next 10 years.

Depending on the issues identified during consultation and surveys the final plan may deal with a wide range of issues (like housing, employment, heritage, and transport as examples) or it may focus on just one or two issues that are of particular importance to residents of Marcham Parish.

#### WHY ARE WE DOING THIS?

Our Neighbourhood Plan will be subject to examination and referendum and then it will form part of the Local Development Plan. It will have statutory status and as such once completed our Neighbourhood Plan will need to be considered in future development plans.

What are the next steps in the process? *Please see below the current outline timetable* 

There are 10 key steps or phases in the development of the plan that is already underway.

- Phase 1 initial feedback and early consultation completed thank you to all the groups who participated in this phase.
- Phase 2 background research to ensure the Plan meets the basic conditions- meaning it is in line with National and regional policies. January/ February
- Phase 3 Survey development to consult with the Parish and gather thoughts and comments. March
- Phase 4 Survey GO LIVE and distribution for completion and return more details to follow April.
- Phase 5 Review and analysis of the completed surveys May.
- Phase 6 Based on the survey findings organise a series of focus groups based on the main themes from the survey for input and suggestions to be included in the plan June.
- Phase 7 Develop the draft plan Summer 2023
- Phase 8 Formal pre-submission consultation of the planminimum 6 weeks August / September
- Phase 9 Review and incorporation of the consultation into the final plan before submission to local planning authority who will be responsible for publicising the plan and arrange independent examination.
- Phase 10 If successful at the examination stage, including any modifications, if necessary, the local authority will arrange a neighbourhood plan referendum. If there is a majority YES vote, the neighbourhood plan is completed and becomes part of the statutory development plan for Marcham Parish.

The neighbourhood planning body of Marcham Parish Council are seeking more members to join the group to contribute and help shape the future development of our local area. If you are interested to join, please send your details to clerk@marchamparishcouncil. gov.uk.


Well we have certainly managed to pack plenty of fun into February already here at Marcham Little Angels! On Saturday 4th Feb



#### MARCHAM PRIMARY SCHOOL NEWS

It is always heartening, at the end of a school day, to hear parents asking their children how their day was. Very often we hear, "What did you do today?". One of things we are encouraging our children to do is to reflect on what they have learnt – not necessarily just the



activities they've undertaken. They may have learnt something new or may have practised a particular skill or process and improved. We ask our pupils about their learning every week and share it in our newsletters (available on the school website). Here are some examples from one week in February...

**Pandas** This week, the Pandas have been learning about penguins and the Antarctic. Today they created their own penguin racing track and raced with penguins frozen in ice. *Ivo* said, "The finish line is so far away, the ice might melt so they need to be quick!".

**Leopards** "We learnt about Buddy this week. He helps children. He taught us to tell a trusted adult if we are sad, worried, or hurt. We thought of adults we trust in school and out of school. We learnt the number 08001111; it is for Child Line. They help children" *Alba and Maryam* 

"We learnt about double numbers. This is two numbers that are the same. We add them together. I liked the dice game." Scarlett

"We've been reading 'Where the Wild Things Are' We made predictions, I thought it would be about monsters." *Megan* 

**Tigers** "This week, we have been learning about food chains. In Literacy, we wrote instructions about how to make a bird feeder, after we made our own!" *Year 2* 

**Kangaroos** "In Maths on Wednesday we were going to different areas in the school and measuring how long they are, like the playground and the hall." *Robbie* 

"We have been measuring in mm, cm and metres and seeing which objects are bigger or smaller than a metre." *Arlo* 

"In PSHE we are learning about resilience, problem solving and personal space. We thought about how someone might feel if they were worried. We also saw the solving tree which helps tells you how to solve your problems." *Isabella* 

"In Science I have been learning about gravity, friction and different surfaces. Friction is a type of force. It makes stuff stop moving - rough surfaces have more friction than smooth." *Naia* 

**Meerkats** "This week we have been multiplying numbers by 10 and 100. It was a bit tricky at first but then I got used to it. When you times by ten, the number moves one space to the left and a zero takes its place. In English, we looked at conjunctions and we wrote compound and complex sentences about our book "The Journey". *Bellah* 

**Wolves** "In Wolves this week we have been learning how to add mixed numbers if they don't have the same denominator. We learnt that we need to convert them all to the same denominator before we can add them." *Joseph* 

"We have been learning how to edit and improve nonchronological reports about a rainforest animal of our choice. I wrote mine about a spider monkey." *Ellis* 

**Giraffes** "This week we have been learning about the rainforest. We have also been doing homework related to the subjects: creating biomes, making booklets with loads of facts in and producing power points. In PE, we have been doing salsa with Mrs Hutchinson, there were spins and tapping our feet on the floor. We had so much fun. After learning some moves, we chose a partner and created our own dances with our teammate." Anthony and May

National Story telling week was the week commencing 30th January. Telling stories is an age-old tradition that has been used to share histories, advice, warnings, and entertainment for every culture, in every period of human history. It is vital our children understand this fundamental human experience. To celebrate, we combined classes and enjoyed sharing a range of stories with each other. The Pre-school and Pandas (reception) joined together, Leopards (year 1) and Giraffes (year 6), Tigers (year 2) and Wolves (year 5), plus Kangaroos (year 3) and Meerkats (year 4). #### MCG Community Investment Fund

Marcham Community Group (MCG) has been running Marcham Centre successfully since it was handed over in 2020, on a roughly break-even basis.

MCG received gift-aided money from Marcham Community Trading, the volunteer-run subsidiary operating the bar, from profits generated in 2021-22. The trustees have agreed that this fund will not be used to cover costs of normal Marcham Centre operations, but will be designated for investment in our community.

MCG will use the fund to invest in community activities and projects, for example, by:

- making facilities available at a discount to normal community hire charges where a new activity needs help to get going or an existing one needs help to meet running costs;
- investing in new equipment or projects that provide a direct and tangible benefit to our local community; and
- investing in extending the Marcham Centre facilities to enable activities that will benefit the community.

Decisions on investments will be made by the trustees (who are elected by MCG members) who will consider the impact on the community and will be subject to funds available.

To ensure that these decisions are made on a properly informed and auditable process, we will invite formal applications from those making proposals for investment.

The trustees will welcome proposals from anyone on behalf of local community groups. A simple application form is available from admin@marcham.org.

# DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT TIME TO STEP DOWN

After 10 years as your district councillor, I want you to know that I have finally decided not to stand again in the Vale local elections this May, mainly because my family is needing my help more and more.

It has been a huge honour and privilege to represent Marcham and Shippon on the Vale council and working to get the best for my residents. Looking back, I have so enjoyed getting to know you either individually, or in



groups, or through the church, or even behind the counter when I helped in the shop for several years.

There are many highlights that stand out for me. One is getting the Vale council to recognise the poor air quality in Packhorse Lane by classifying it as an AQMA (Air Quality Management Area) and thereby ensuring that this is always taken into account when new developments are being considered....at least one development has been turned down because of the AQMA. Another highlight is my role in planning for the new village hall ... and finally getting it built. Working closely with Jim Asher and his group, Neil Rowe and the Anson Trust, the Parish Council and the Vale council officers, I watched it grow from a fledgling idea to the finished article several years later. It was particularly satisfying as strenuous efforts to get a village hall had failed in the past. And then there was the occasion when a group of determined residents joined Richard (county councillor) and me on a 24hour traffic survey to count the traffic and to identify the type of vehicles going through 1) Packhorse Lane and 2) the T junction at Barrow Road and Faringdon Road. Traffic in Marcham continues to be a major problem which my successor will have to keep raising.

As you know, I also have been a cabinet member of the Vale for 3 years, and as the previous cabinet member for the Climate Emergency, I oversaw a new grant (CAF-£50,000) being implemented to encourage groups in the Vale to set up projects to mitigate the Climate emergency. So, it was very good to see that a group from Marcham, led by Neil Rowe, qualified for the maximum CAF grant of £5,000 towards a project in the church grounds. You might be interested to know that at the February Council meeting, the councillors voted to increase the CAF pot to £100.000 so more projects can be funded.

Looking to the future, it is so good to see that Marcham's Neighbourhood Plan is finally happening under the careful stewardship of Mark Harvie, and once it is done, it will mean that Marcham will have much more control over its future.

Finally, I would like to thank you all very much for all the support you have given me over the last ten years and to wish my successor the very best of luck.

#### FULL COUNCIL MEETING ON FEBRUARY 15TH

The last full council meeting, held at the Beacon in Wantage, had good news for us all! The council has faced up to the challenges of high inflation, the national finance turbulence and extra demands resulting from Covid-19 and, with careful handling, has managed not only to set a balanced budget, but to add £2.6million to the Vale's reserves this coming year. This will mean that that we will not have to cut frontline services, can continue our Community Hub (which delivers cost of living help for those in most financial need) for a further 2 years and will be allowed to apply for the many grants out there. This is a major turn-around from an expected shortfall of £5.6million four years ago.

Furthermore, the Vale has been awarded £6 million in decarbonisation funding to install air source heat pumps and solar panels at Wantage Leisure Centre and White Horse Leisure and Tennis Centre. This is something I had championed loudly while I was on the cabinet, and these heat pumps and solar panels will reduce the council's overall energy use by 25% as well as help to

reduce the centres' costs and move the Vale closer to our carbon neutral targets. In Wantage, the council also plans to invest £2million in a new learner pool and in Faringdon, work is about to start on a new artificial turf pitch. All exciting news!

Finally, the thorny issue of council tax! The council continues to charge one of the lowest council tax rates in the country with a below inflation increase of 3.5% for 2023-24 to fund services in the district. So, for a Band D property this equates to £5 a year (10p a week) bringing a total charge of £151.69 a year (£2.91 a week).

All in all, I feel this was our most successful budget of the last 4 years, and I am particularly excited to see that we are able to do more and more to mitigate the carbon emissions in our district and to creep closer to our carbon neutral target.

# COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT OPINION POLLS

It is all too easy to become excited/ depressed/anxious (take your pick) over the state of the nation's local and national politics. It almost seems that there is a competition going on between polling organisations to grab the headlines over who can be most dramatic. But is this the best way to test public opinion? And more



importantly, how far do these polls actually influence public opinion? There are many examples of the polls turning out to be very wrong. Do they merely solidify passing trends or do they stimulate resentment in an electorate that does not like being told how it is going to behave?

I am not clear what purpose they serve except to give the chattering political classes something to chew on. At best, polls are a vague guide as to how public opinion might be shifting and at worst, a hindrance to independent thinking.

With some important local elections in May, many media outlets are beginning to obsess on what national polls are saying. I very much hope that people will make up their own minds and, as far as possible, ignore the polls.

#### **BUDGETS**

After many weeks of discussion and consultation, the process of forming a Council's budget culminates in a formal Councillor Budget debate. Yesterday's near 6 hour meeting at which an alternative budget produced by the opposition had to be considered first, culminated, as expected in a comfortable majority passing the ruling administration's budget. The whole exercise is called "a debate" but the outcome is almost always predetermined. It can be very frustrating for Opposition councillors as it is far too late for any of their ideas to be built into what will be passed on budget day. But having served as an opposition councillor for Hello many years, I have some sympathy for them.

That said, I am very pleased with the outcome this year. OCC's finances are looking remarkably secure given the amount of financial uncertainty around. In summary, more money is going into

- Adult and Child social care,
- Highway maintenance,
- Tackling climate change and
- Protecting the most vulnerable from the worst of the cost of living crisis

As a package it seems to offer something for almost everyone with one proviso, that the increase in council tax of 4.99% (although in line with more than 70% of all other councils) is a tough ask of those in the next most vulnerable category. It was a choice between

the pain of a Council Tax increase over the pain that would result from cutting frontline services. Politics is about making choices often difficult ones.

There are plenty of other risks around the corner, however, not least the impact of inflation on all areas of the budget together with the announcement from government that we need to prepare for further cuts in central government finance in 2025-6.

#### OTHER CHALLENGES

In the next financial year, a number of issues affecting us all will have been resolved or irrevocably decided.

- The Thames Water Reservoir.
- The HIF 1 Road
- The development of thousands more houses at Culham, Didcot and Kingston Bagpuize.

More clarity on the number of houses we need to build elsewhere. The potential development of Abingdon airfield.

And those are just the major issues. At the same time there are a number of other Highway and traffic issues that have been outstanding for far too long.

#### **MP'S REPORT**

I'm delighted to have secured a breakthrough for the local AEAT Pensioners after 10 years of dogged campaigning by them. The National Audit Office – which has investigated high-profile cases such as Equitable Life and British Steel – has agreed to my request to look at the AEAT case and will produce a report setting out their views in the coming weeks. Parliament's powerful Public Accounts Committee will also hold



an inquiry and are calling for evidence for this until 5th March: https://committees.parliament.uk/work/7230/aea-technology-pension-case/

A highlight in the last month was, of course, President Zelensky addressing Parliament. He gave a very powerful speech, conveying the bravery of the Ukrainian people and his thanks to the UK for our support during the past year.

For anyone born in the UK after the world wars, as I was, it is impossible to truly understand what his countrymen and women are going through at this time, subject to a relentless bombardment by Russian tanks and planes every day that takes the lives of their family members and causes untold destruction. The President's speech made us all feel proud of the UK's support. We were the first European country to start sending lethal aid to Ukraine and are the second largest donor of military aid in the world after the USA – a total of £2.3 billion since the outbreak of war.

In addition to all the military equipment supplied – and a major new package of air defence to help protect Ukrainian civilians and critical national infrastructure from Russian strikes – we've provided a £220 million humanitarian assistance package and issued some 218,000 visas to Ukrainians. Oxfordshire has of course been at the forefront of hosting Ukrainian refugees, many of whom I have had the privilege to meet. Our support is very important – and must continue.

I was very pleased this constituency was the place Michelle Donelan, the new Secretary of State for Science, Innovation and Technology, chose to make her first visit – to the **Rosalind Franklin Institute at Harwell**, which the Government has just committed a further £40 million to. The Department will be key for this constituency and its creation has happened just before I hold the first meeting of my Science and Technology forum for businesses at Harwell, Milton Park and elsewhere, with George Freeman, Minister for Science, Research, and Innovation, as the guest speaker.

The other event coming up in the near future from me will be an Apprenticeships Fair for local young people and employers. While there has been a welcome growth in apprenticeships with the Government's Apprenticeship Levy, many employers struggle to fill their apprenticeships while, nationally, the highest-level ones disproportionately go to young people from higher income families.
