MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL **Elections**

Elections are being held on Thursday 4th May, 2023 for both the Vale of White Horse District Council, and Parish Councils. Councillors serve for period of 4 years.

A parish/town council is a local authority that makes decisions on behalf of the people in the parish. It is the level of local government closest to the community,

There are 10 seats on Marcham Parish Council, all of which become available.

Why not consider joining?

- Representing the views of residents within our parish.
- Run local services, such as the play areas, open spaces, cemetery, and allotments.
- Deciding on how much to raise through council tax in order to deliver those
- Influencing and shaping the long term development policy for the parish, helping to undertake a Neighbourhood Plan, and as part of the planning process, comment on planning applications in the parish.
- Improving the quality of life and the environment in or local area.
- Working to identify issues which are important to the lives of the residents you represent.
- Working to bring about improvements through local projects.
- · Lobbying other service providers and working in partnership with other parishes and agencies.

The Council meets monthly, except August. Any candidate is not obligated to a long commitment, as it is possible to resign before the next election, if required.

The Notice of the Election is now out, any one who wishes to join the Parish Council can obtain the nomination pack from the Electoral Commission's website.

N.B. The deadline for submission of the nomination which has to be delivered to the Vale of White Horse District Council offices is 4.00 p.m. on Friday 4th April.

Voting on Election day – Thursday 4th May - Key dates

Don't forget you will need to be on the electoral roll for the parish in order to vote. If you need to apply for a postal vote, the deadline is Tuesday 18th April. If you wish to appoint a proxy to vote for you, the deadline is Tuesday 25th April. Photo ID will be required in order to vote in person at the election. If you do not have any photo ID, you can apply

for voter ID by 5.00 p.m. on 25th April.

Further information and the forms on which to apply for postal vote, proxy, or voter ID, are on the District Council's website. www. whitehorsedc.gov.uk, call 01235 422 422, see the poster on page 7 or the County Councillor's report on page 18.

Play Area

The Council would like to thank everyone who took part in the consultation on the proposed new play area, and who took the time to complete and return the survey form. These are being analysed and the comments are currently being studied. They will help guide the plans as they progress.

Annual Meeting of Electors

The Annual meeting of electors currently is scheduled to take place on Wednesday **24th May**, at 7.30 p.m. in the new village hall. A decision has been made not to have a guest speaker this year to allow more time for local reports to be given. There is much going on in the parish, so we will hear about the new play area, and progress with the Neighbourhood Plan.

Parishioner of the Year

The Council is again considering the possibility of an award for 2022, to be presented at the annual meeting of electors later this year. The Award recognises the efforts of local people who, at any time, have significantly contributed to life within the parish. The Council would invite anyone who wishes to put forward a new suggestion, to submit a short statement of not more than 200 words, as to whom he/she wishes to nominate, and the reasons why the person should receive the award. All nominations to be emailed to the Clerk at the email address below. All names previously given will be carried forward and added to the ones received. The Council has a working group who prepares a short list from which the Council selects the worthy recipient.

Mill Road - Bridleway 17

Plans are progressing with the aim of delivering the repairs to the bridge this spring. Issues which delayed the project last autumn have been addressed, and project delivery meetings have recommenced. The final construction plans are currently being considered by Oxfordshire County Council, and once approved, they will firm up the delivery programme. Residents will be further advised once the works programme is set.

Brize Norton Air Space - Change proposals draft design principles

RAF Brize Norton intends to redesign the current controlled airspace to the appropriate volume to support RAF Brize Norton's operations. It has undertaken consultation on its key principles that it seeks to include in its draft design. These include self evident issues such as providing a safe environment for all airspace users and minimising the impact to other airspace users. The Parish Council had no comment to make on the principles, and awaits the next stage consultation on the actual options. It will keep a close eye on what is being planned in case Marcham is affected.





Sending letters AND parcels abroad and need a customs form?



The easiest option is to do your postage online and bring it in for us to process. These will now take a bit more time, as we need to transfer the information already written on the customs forms onto the Post Office computer. If you can fill out the forms in advance, it would help and be a time-saver for us all!

As a guide.

- If you are sending something abroad worth between £10 - £50, and not so worried about how and when it gets there? Please ask for a CN22B barcoded customs label.
- If you are sending something abroad worth more than £50, ideally you would want to send it via one of our tracked services? Please ask for a CN22A non-barcoded customs label.
- However, if you are sending something abroad worth £270+.
 Please ask for a CN23 customs label.



Help it, assist it, enhance it.

Sunshine, blue skies, wind in the trees, bees amongst the flowers, frogs in the pond. All as much part of a garden, as are the close mown lawns, the well-tended roses, the daily watered



planters and the veg plots we readily recognize.

Yet, consider how much more variety would be in your garden and local green spaces, if you started to introduce more of the habitats the wildlife that's already inhabiting that space, really desires.

There'd certainly be more variety of plants and colours, very likely during periods where you feel colour is lacking. Habitats go beyond your flower borders though, as they include deadwood, grasses of differing lengths, and water.

I always say, building from the insects and the plants up, will mean the larger things in these local food webs will follow.

Maybe though, you don't know what wildlife inhabits your local area, so have no clear pathway to knowing what new habitats you could put in. Well, that's a simple one - every county has an Environmental Records Centre, so contact them, send them your postcode, and ask for data about any living thing that's been recorded as being present within ½ a mile, 1 mile or 5 miles of your garden, and they'll send you that information, FREE! You'll know then where to start, what species there are, and after some further research, you'll learn what habitats they like, what you can do to help them. For the Thames Valley: www.tverc.org If this year you want to garden a different way, having spent years doing the same things, making the same mistakes, experiencing the same disappointments, then maybe this is a way to change things up and trying to do things differently, and a chance to start enjoying the garden through a new lens. The lens of the wildlife perspective. Maybe this year you can begin to see the world through the eyes of the wildlife that's out there already sharing the space with you. Wildlife is struggling yes, but there's always more we can do to help it, assist it, enhance it.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT ACTION PLAN FOR MARCHAM'S AQMA (AIR OUALITY MANAGEMENT AREA)

On Thursday16th March, I attended a meeting with officers responsible for overseeing the management of the Marcham AQMA (Packhorse Lane), one of 3 in the Vale. To help to devise a new Action Plan for all three areas, Adkins was employed to collect in data and to come up with some measures within a strict legislative framework. Each measure had to be clearly allotted to those responsible in the district and county councils. And now the work is with the SMT before being put out to public consultation for 6 weeks in May.



This is where you can have your say on what you think of the Action Plan before it is put in a final plan ready to license for approval.

As the work is not public yet, I can say little about it in this article, other than to say that there were no surprises in the solutions they put forward. To remind you of the previous action plan, there were 3 possible actions put forward.

- 1) To build a by-pass.
- 2) To make the AQMA a low carbon zone by only allowing vehicles with low level of pollution ,eg electric ones, to pass through.
- 3) To look at how to restrict HGVs

None of these measures have been actioned, for reasons of cost mainly, so it will be interesting to see if the new action plan proves to be any better.

The good news is that the air pollution levels (Nox gases) in the AQMA have dropped to below the permitted level, although this will be monitored for several years yet before the AQMA label is removed. Also, after a year of measuring the particulates in the AQMA, the average readings again are below the permitted levels. But what is not improving is the traffic volume passing through the AQMA and this is likely to increase even more with the new housing developments in the area.

SOME VALE NEWS

1) Waste contract: The Vale's waste contract is one of the most expensive agreements that the Vale has to set up, and the present joint one, which was particularly good for the Vale and SODC, comes to an end in 2024. As we do not know all the detail of the requirements the government want to implement in their Environment Bill, we are delaying the start of a new Waste agreement by 2 years until the end of 2026. The good news is that although this is a difficult discussion and is confidential, I can say that talks about the interim contract are progressing well.

On the subject of Waste, you can now download the Waste and Recycling Collection Calendar from the Vale website. Alternatively, if you receive your tax bill by post, it will be in the envelope.

- Neighbourhood disputes: a free mediation service is available to help disputing parties. If you know of anyone who might benefit from this service, please direct them to the following: whitehorsedc. gov.uk/mediation or 01494 520821 (Mediation Bucks)
- 3) There is an online course for free training for food businesses to help improve their low hygiene ratings. Usually this would cost £35 per person. Information can be found on: env.health@ southandvale.gov.uk
- 4) Let it Bee: Last year the Vale supported the No Mow May campaign to encourage increasing biodiversity. This year it is the Let It Bee campaign which aims to increase biodiversity by setting aside 9 sites belonging to the Vale to allow existing plants to thrive, which in turn will increase wildlife in those areas, including insects and birdlife. Locations have been chosen which don't impact on pedestrians or sightlines for drivers and are also in areas with shorter grass for walkers and those that want

to exercise. COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT ELECTIONS

This month's contribution is as non-party political as I can make it. It confines itself to the elections process.

Spare a thought for the Councils, Council officers and residents who have some elections every year. West Oxfordshire elects one quarter of their councillors every year. In Cherwell, it is one third. Thankfully



in SODC and VWHDC, it is an election every 4 years. County Elections, every 4 years, happen in between. It's a complicated systemand can often seem to be an irritant to busy, working people. Add national elections which can happen anytime and it is not much wonder that many residents, already confused about what different councils actually do, are further confused over which elections are about to happen and who is standing for what. It does make one wonder if those countries that have all elections on the same day in a fixed cycle might have it right. In these countries, the fixed day is often made a public holiday with the result that turnout is higher. Democracy is said to come at a cost, but the system of a fixed day for all elections is certainly more cost effective and raises the status of elections in most people's minds.

ELECTION 'PURDAH'

For six weeks leading up to Election Day, there is a period of purdah. In this period, Councils are run by officers rather than elected politicians. This ensures that only non party political decisions and announcements can be made during purdah. Political leafleting can still go ahead (and does) in which each party makes its offer to the electorate and tries to explain why its opponents are wrong. There are rules about what can and cannot be said in leaflets and political organisers are adept at getting around them. However, the local District Office has powers to take action against those parties that transgress.

SO PLEASE VOTE

If democracy is going to flourish, it is vitally important that people vote. If you feel that all politicians are born of satan, try ordering them in the order in which you hate them and vote for the one(s) at the bottom of your list. If the country is to be governed by those who most people want to govern them, please vote so there is some hope for the process.

Gentle reminder on new rules for voting at a polling station.

Remember to bring your photo ID with you as you will need to show this to the polling station staff before you vote. You do not need to bring your poll card with you to cast your ballot, however it may speed things up if you do.

There is no dress code when visiting the polling station and it is OK to wear garments that might obscure your face: for instance, hoodies or the niqab, but please bear in mind that you will need to remove any face coverings so that staff can verify your identity as part of the requirements for Voter ID, however.

MP'S REPORT

Whether you live in Wantage, Didcot, Wallingford, Faringdon or any of the 64 villages I represent, my constituency-wide survey on local health services is currently open. It's just 8 questions long and should only take about 5 minutes – no more than 10 – and you can complete it until 17th April on my website: https://www.david-johnston.org.uk/health.



Increasing our health services relative to the population growth we've had is one of the

things I have campaigned on most since being elected 3 years agoparticularly the need for more GP surgeries. I've spoken about this in 19 debates in parliament and had numerous meetings with the local councils, local health leaders, ministers and local people about it. The more people who complete it, the stronger the message we can send.

I held a successful inaugural meeting of my Science and Technology Forum for the companies we have at Harwell, Milton Park and elsewhere which George Freeman, the Minister at the new Science Department, spoke at. He and I are very keen to promote what is going on here more as it is of both national and international significance – and we discussed some good ideas to do so. Watch this space!

I'll be holding an Apprenticeship Fair for local young people and employers across the constituency at Didcot Civic Hall on 24th April. I visit at least 1 school and at least 1 employer almost every week (and have been to 600-odd organisations overall since being elected) and I hear regularly that young people don't know the apprenticeships open to them and that employers struggle to recruit enough apprentices. I'm hopeful this fair will help.

My campaigning on behalf of the local AEAT Pensioners has been bearing fruit: the National Audit Office has published its report on the case following my request and Parliament's Public Accounts Committee recently held a hearing on it, with their own report to come.

A few highlights from many visits in the last month. It was good to be interviewed on Wallingford Radio which has been going great guns since it got its FM licence. You can listen live on 107.3FM. I had a great visit to the new wedding dress shop in Wantage, About You Bridal, set up by Sharon to make the process of buying dresses, shoes and accessories as stress-free as possible. It's also home to Gallery Cakes, set up by Nicki, so that you can order your wedding cake too!

It was very good to see The Place in the Corn Exchange in Faringdon, having seen the space when it was just an idea, which supports parents and their children under 5. I also met Keith and Sue to talk about the Faringdon Day Centre and will be back to visit that soon. And I'm pleased to say Michael Gove was very impressed with the Greencore Construction houses I took him to see in Southmoor.

GARD is a local community group formed to campaign against Thames Water's proposals to build a reservoir south-west of Abingdon.

GARD's Annual General Meeting will take place on Tuesday 2nd May at 7.30pm in the Millenium Room, Steventon Village Hall. Thank you to everyone who made a response to the Water Resources South East (WRSE) consultation and to Thames Water's draft Water Resource management Plan (dWRMP). We have been copied into at least 150 WRSE responses, with many more known to have been sent, an encouraging number. At time of going to press, the Thames Water responses are still being written, and many have been copied to GARD.

Where are we now with the proposals and responses?

This stage of the Reservoir proposal features a 'triple bill'. As well as the closed Water Resources South-East and Thames Water dWRMP consultations (the latter closed 20th March), there is the RAPID Gate 2 process on the individual Strategic Sources. RAPID (Regulator Alliance for the Progressing of Infrastructure Development) will produce a draft decision on the Strategic Sources (eg Abingdon Reservoir and Severn Thames Transfer) on 30thMarch. Stakeholders (ie GARD, OCC, the Vale, Parish Councils) then have until 11th June to make representations. GARD will be making representations to RAPID, and we'll keep you informed.

The response of the Councils and of MPs has been very encouraging. Layla Moran, MP for Oxford West and Abingdon, said in her WRSE response: "Relying on large, expensive and time-consuming infrastructure projects has created a regional plan that is not adaptable to changing future conditions. True drought resilience must include more urgently tackling leakage and improving water efficiency.' Later she also says: 'I do not believe that consumers should be bearing the cost of constructing new water resources, when water companies are failing to fix their own existing infrastructure, resulting in significant waste of water."

Councillor Pete Sudbury, Oxfordshire County Council's Cabinet Member for Climate Change and Environment and spokesperson for the Reservoir issue said: "We have consistently opposed this reservoir proposal, which we believe could turn out to be a damaging white elephant that will not be resilient to the kind of multi-year droughts we are seeing in many parts of the world. The South East Strategic Reservoir Option (SESRO) will have significant and potentially unacceptable environmental effects.

The WRSE regional plan should bring forward the Severn Thames Transfer (STT) earlier than indicated in this draft plan. ... Given the concerns, the SESRO should be removed from the WRSE regional plan and the company plans, and not pursued as a strategic resource option."


The **Vale of White Horse District Council** said, in a media release on 6thMarch,that water companies should forget the reservoir and focus on fixing leaks. They added that SESRO should be removed from the plan and is urging water companies and regulators to instead carry out further research into other water resources and to focus efforts on fixing leaks and improving water efficiency.

Cllr Bethia Thomas, Leader of Vale of White Horse District Council, said: "Building a reservoir would cause permanent and irreversible harm to an enormous area of the Vale countryside and potentially result in a significant increase in carbon emissions. We should be doing all we can to tackle the climate emergency and much more attention must be placed on the climate impact of this proposal."

The cross of Jesus remains reassuring enough to be held in the hand of the dying, yet dangerous enough to be banned from display in many countries. It is famous enough to be recognized by billions as Christianity's primary symbol, yet intimate enough to captivate the heart and sustain the soul for a lifetime. It is simple enough to be understood by a Reception class visit to church, yet profound enough to fill volumes of theological text books and hang above the doors of Oxford Colleges. So what is this cross of Christ all about? Why did Jesus have to die on one? Doubtless, the famous Isaac Watts hymn will be sung again in our churches this Easter, and the hymn helps us with an answer to those questions. The cross is about the love of God. "Love so amazing, so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all." The cross means many things. It is about Jesus providing victory over death, and a great example of loving self-sacrifice for human beings to follow. But for me the heart of it is a great exchange. Jesus dies in my place so that I can go free. Out of love, he carries my wrongdoing and instead gives me his goodness and eternal life. We may not think that our sin requires Jesus to die. Our deep, cultural belief today is that human beings are by nature good, and that bad things only happen as a consequence of faulty education or past trauma. This makes the idea of Jesus dying for us seem alien, unnecessary, cruel even. But Jesus takes a different view. He claims that evil comes out of our hearts, and that it has consequences. The cross is where those consequences are dealt with. Jesus died as Saviour for the world. Nowhere else does such love and sorrow met, as the hymn goes. In this season of Easter hope, spring flowers and chocolate, take a moment to "survey the wondrous cross on which the Prince of glory died."
