Elections – Thursday 4th May, 2023 – ID Requirements

Please remember your photographic ID when going to vote. This can be your passport, driving licence or blue badge, bus pass, voter ID document, or certain other government issued documents. You will need to show your photographic ID before being issued with a ballot paper. You will not be able to vote unless you have proof of ID with you.

Parish Council Election

There are 10 seats on the Parish Council. 9 nominations were received by the Vale of White Horse District Council, so no formal ballot to elect parish councillors is required. The Parish Council itself can proceed to coopt a 10th person to complete the Council. Anyone interested should contact the Clerk. The 9 councillors who have been elected without contest are: Chitvan Amin, Sheena Bigden, Warren Brooker, Mark Harvie, Michael Hoath, Ruth Mander, James Plumb, Suzanne Saunter, and Joe Withers. These councillors live in slightly different parts of the neighbourhood, so residents are evenly represented. As Marcham is not warded, should you need any assistance with Parish Council matters, then you can approach your nearest councillor. The new Council will commence from 9th May, 2023, with the first meeting being held on 16th May.

Path – Howard Cornish Road to Harding Way - Closure for Tree work

Please note that the path from Howard Cornish Road to Harding Way will be closed mid May for approximately 3 days to allow for essential tree work to take place. The aim is to start the works on Tuesday 16th May through to Thursday 18th May. The Council apologises for any inconvenience, but the closure is needed to ensure the safety of the public whilst the works take place.

Marcham Play Area

The Parish Council has been working with the selected playground manufacturer, and their design was out for consultation in March. Comments on the design have been analysed. The Council has received 151 responses, 95% of those were Marcham residents, and 74% brought children to the play area. Some people may have misunderstood the questions, as their comments related to the existing equipment rather than the new proposals. Comments, on the whole, were very positive saying that the range of equipment is much better than what is there at the moment. There was a request for items for older children and adults, such as a zip wire, skate ramp, trampoline and outdoor gym area, as well as for items suitable for the less mobile. Concerns were raised by some about anti-social behaviour, noise and intrusion that would follow if a new play area were provided.

The Council has carefully considered all comments, and the manufacturer has worked again on the design, adding space for benches and picnic table, and possible chimes. Consideration has been given to the location www.marchamparishcouncil.gov.uk

of the taller items. Items within the fence have been changed around, but the items for older children outside of the fence remain in their planned position. There is a restricted space available as sports pitches are close by, and there is a need to protect all users of the field, as well as occupants of housing, yet at the same time provide facilities for a fast growing village. The Council has lodged a planning application, and is now talking to the manufacturer regarding timescales for installation.

Waste Disposal / Grass Cutting

It is that time of year when we are all out cutting grass and managing our gardens. The Council would remind you that the Vale of White Horse District Council provides a successful recycling and waste collection service for all its residents in the district. In addition the recycling centre at Drayton is open all week from 8.00 a.m. - 5.00 p.m. on all days other than a Thursday when it is open even longer until 8.00 p.m. Please do not fly tip grass and garden waste on highway verges, private land, paths, in the Arboretum and Anson playing field, as such action interferes with the enjoyment of these areas, and can result in composting grass odours which in turn are a nuisance to those who live nearby. For those of you undertaking DIY works, please note that Oxfordshire County Council has increased its charges slightly, for the disposal of items such as rubble, soil, fence panels, work tops, sinks and bathroom fitments. Charges can be paid at the Recycling Centre by card only. No cash is accepted.

Parishioner of the Year

The Council is again considering the possibility of an award for 2022, to be presented later in the year. The Award recognises the efforts of local people who at any time, have significantly contributed to life within the parish. The Council would invite anyone, who wishes to put forward a new suggestion, to submit a short statement of not more than 200 words, as to whom he/ she wishes to nominate, and the reasons why the person should receive the award. All nominations to be emailed to the Clerk at the email address below. All names previously given will be carried forward and added to any new ones received. The Council has a working group who prepares a short list from which the Council selects the worthy recipient.

Chimney Meadows floodplain restoration

Lisa Lane

Lisa Lane started working for Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire Wildlife Trust (BBOWT) in 2004, as Chimney Meadows Project Officer, creating a nature reserve from a mixed commercial farm.



The nature reserves that BBOWT manages are unique and special havens, alive with plants, birds, mammals and insects. Whilst being important refuges for wildlife, it is increasingly clear that these isolated areas of habitat surrounded by relatively hostile urban, agricultural and industrial landscapes are not enough. The way forward is nature conservation on a landscape scale, working with others to create a Living Landscape for people and wildlife.

The Crown as a Community Pub Update


There is little to report this month as we wait for the VoWH Community engagement team to evaluate our application for a Valued Community Asset Order on the Crown. They have until about the 19th of May to determine if the evidence reaches the threshold to justify granting an Order. The site is still under offer from a developer, but the sale has yet to complete. If the order is granted it would remain in place whoever owns the freehold. This will give the community a voice over future use of the site, and any subsequent planning application for at least 5 years. Should our application be successful the steering group will reach out to the current owners and the developer to discuss the options and the best way forward for all parties.

Whether or not we realise it, my Spidey Sense tells me it's an example of us gardeners, us growers, us as a species, already adapting to the different growing conditions we get these days.

Whether that's man-made climate change, or natural climate change, or just the heatwaves we've experienced over the last two summers, causing this change in behaviour in the people I've seen out gardening lately. It's still that healthy year-on-year adaptation process we gardeners go through, have always gone through, and will always go through.

Gardening and wildlife gardening is thriving and well, but it seems the concept of gardening and how we do it is changing, largely due to modern living. It still survives though and will be a popular pastime for generations to come yet.

Since I wrote the last article, I've spent time in cafés of local garden centres, people watching, especially over Easter. I overheard many conversations of people questioning if certain things will grow now conditions are dryer? The message is out there on some level, it clearly doesn't need commentators, experts, or article writers to keep telling us. Things are changing and from the conversations I overheard, they are changing permanently.

I'm really interested to hear if and how you are gardening differently this year. I'd like to hear why you are doing it, and what you are doing differently. I think a lot of shared learning can come from that.

Whether you are gardening the same this year, or completely differently, just get out there, give it a go. It's not something old people do, it's something we all do, even if we just have a few pots here and there. Enjoy.

The event is in aid of wildlife charity Wild Oxfordshire, with 50% of the profits donated directly to them.

A leisurely guided walk around the old vineyard before the debate, with its wildflower meadows and new pond will be an additional attraction. GEORGE ALLEN FEATHERSTONE (Joe) joined the Royal Air

Force as a Radar Technician to complete National Service in 1954. He loved the lifestyle. He got paid 2s 6d and three meals a day.

He loved it so much he remustered into the Physical Training (PT) branch as a Regular Serviceman. This increased his wages threefold and he was posted to St Athan to complete his basic training. All members of the PT branch were required to specialise within the branch. Joe chose parachuting and became a Parachute Jumping Instructor (PJI).





His first operational service was in Libya in the late fifties and early sixties. He was then posted to RAF Turnhouse which is now Edinburgh Airport, and to the South of France for three years.



On return to the UK he was based at RAF Abingdon where he was involved in the trials for the new square steerable chutes. These trials were completed in all weather conditions including jumping into the jungle, into water and at night.

He had two tours with the RAF Falcons Parachute Display Team. This was to take him all over the world promoting the Royal Air Force. This included a 6 month tour of Australia, and a 3 month tour at Fort Bragg in America.



Joe saw service with various Airborne Regiments of the Army as their PJI. During this time he trained and despatched thousands

of trainee parachutists. He served multiple detachments with the Special Forces and the Territorial Army.

During his 35 years service he completed 732 military parachute jumps and over 2,000 sports parachute jumps. He retired from the RAF in 1989 and worked with the civil service for a couple of years before retiring completely.

As a consequence of his jumps Joe has had two hips and a shoulder replaced and now sets off the alarms at airport security!



Joe moved to Marcham while serving at RAF Abingdon in the early sixties. He is now living a quieter life enjoying his garden and greenhouse; and can be found on Monday evenings playing bridge at Marcham Centre.



DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT WHAT IS SO SPECIAL ABOUT MARCHAM?

As this is my last article for the Mad News, before I hand over to your next District Councillor on May 9th, I thought I would use this opportunity to look back over the last 10 years and highlight what I have found special about the village of Marcham.

My overwhelming impression of Marcham has always been its wonderful community spirit. This was very evident during Covid when, amongst other kind help, an active Covid support group was formed to help



those who had to self- isolate or who had other issues. And right at the centre of any community movement, such as this, we usually find Marcham church which works quietly and compassionately with the residents of Marcham.

To help support this community spirit, Marcham can now boast a wonderful Community Centre...the village Hall...which is well placed in the centre of the village on the Anson field. This building now hosts many events and meetings and always seems to be buzzing with activity.... there are yoga classes, bingo sessions, WI meetings, bridge meetings, Marcham Society meetings, Parish Council meetings, church breakfast meetings to name but a few. And to allow people to meet for a chat over a drink or meal there is the Thirsty Café, a very popular facility where again you see members of the church amongst others giving their spare time. Go in on a Saturday morning when you can smell the mouth-watering smell of coffee and sizzling bacon.

Outside the hall there are sports facilities for cricket, football, tennis and a MUGA where you can hear excited young voices urging each other on. And the hall has excellent facilities for visiting sports teams and even a bar where people can celebrate or commiserate after a match. This bar has become very popular and people can spill out onto a terrace outside.... it is lovely to see families getting together to chat over drinks and nibbles while children can play safely nearby. Walking around Marcham is something I enjoy, as, apart from the obvious routes, there are little, secret paths or tracks leading to open spaces, new developments or just connecting areas together. I particularly love those you find around the church and its burial ground or running through new developments, where you can see how each house gradually marks itself out as special with individual additions, plants etc. This need to connect up areas was always uppermost in my mind, whenever a new development in Marcham came forward, to keep Marcham an open, sharing village.

And then there is the Village Shop and Post Office in North Street. Again, the community spirit of different residents willing to give their time to help run and serve in the shop or PO shines through. It was Richard's and my privilege to help in the shop for a few years and I loved meeting old and new faces over the counter. School children spilling off the school bus was always a challenge as they chose their sweet treats! Richard and I even held some monthly surgeries there, using a small corner with a rickety table to listen to people's problems. It was at one of those surgeries that I met someone who was deeply concerned about the poor air quality in Packhorse Lane which led me to get the Vale to relook at how we were monitoring the Lane. This led to the Lane being classified as an AQMA (Air Quality Management Area).

The village school is a real asset to the village and its success is evident by the need to expand it with an extra classroom so that it can cater for those children of Primary school age. We don't want to get into the situation where small children have to bus to another Primary school because their village school doesn't have enough spaces to cater for them.

Closely supporting the school is the village nursery, Little Angels. Some of us remember it doing a great job in quite spartan conditions

next to the old wooden village centre on Anson Field. Now it can boast a purpose-built building near to the new village hall where the youngest children can enjoy all its marvellous facilities. With all the new developments in the village, Little Angels is supplying a much-needed facility for young working families.

At the other end of the scale is the facility for the older members of the village, Duffield Place. I have enjoyed many conversations with several of its residents and gleaned all sorts of interesting information about Marcham, such as when an old lady told me that she knew a nanny who said that Marcham has been asking for a by-pass as long ago as the 1930s. Will it happen one day? And closely allied to this home is Sweet Briar, a retirement housing complex, run by Green Square. It sits behind the community shop, so residents often pop into the shop for a quick chat. Again, I have got to know many of its delightful residents.

To draw all the residents together and keep them well informed, Marcham is very fortunate to have a really excellent, colourful village magazine (available as paper copy or online) in MADNews – all under the stewardship of editor Meriel Lewis.

Lastly, there is Marcham church. You will have noticed that I have referred to the church several times in this article and this is because it is a thriving, active church, always at the heart of the village life. I think this village would be very different and much poorer without the church. It is worth looking at the sand coloured building itself with its unusual twin east end windows , its chunky tower and interesting artefacts inside. However, you will notice that inside it is light and airy with moveable pews and stacks of chairs and tables, ready to rearrange when necessary. This is why it has been used for many meetings, celebrations, as well as parties, such as a Burns Night party where dancing and eating can be enjoyed. The building does not dictate what happens inside...the people do that.



COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT DIFFICULT CHOICES

The problem of potholes has been in the news all over the country in recent months. We have had potholes ever since we had roads and tracks, but I don't remember them being as hot a topic as they are now.





rising over recent years and the ability to maintain our roads in reasonable condition has been becoming an increasing challenge for all councils. To upgrade all of Oxfordshire's roads to an ideal standard would cost several hundred million pounds and there would then be the cost of regular maintenance to keep them at that standard. The cost is more than the County's Adult and Children's social care put together. Not much wonder then that hard pressed Councils have, over the last 20 years, steadily made cuts to their road budgets in order to protect their social care and other services. It is all about priorities. Priorities for Councils and priorities for Government. In present economic circumstances, it is hard to see taxation increasing anywhere near enough to cover the cost of covering the upgrade to all the nation's roads.

Councils have tried various initiatives to begin to address the problem. Prioritising main roads over others has been tried but it leads to the question – just how bad do our rural roads have to get before deprioritising their maintenance becomes unacceptable?

"Prudential borrowing" against assets over many years requires substantial assets which few councils possess and few finance officers will countenance. Borrowing against future income growth depends on the growth happening and is a risky business.

Are there any other alternatives? And if we want roads in good condition along with everything else we want, we have to find a way of paying for it. Persuading road users (i.e. just about everyone) that they must pay through taxation presents a great political challenge – how could it be done? And how could it be done fairly? But then politics, we are told, is all about choices. We just need our politicians to be brave enough to make them while our road system is still usable.

And one final thought. Given the challenge of maintaining our present road system, does it really make sense to be building yet more roads?

Although I live in Didcot, I saw it and many other places in the constituency in

a different light last month: from the back of a police car! No, I hadn't done anything wrong, I'd asked to go on a 'Ride Along' with the local force to get a better insight into the demands on the police as they respond to the calls they receive at the station.

It turned out to be a relatively quiet 4 or so hours, but it was nonetheless fascinating to talk to PCs David and Alex about their experience in the force, the things they've had to respond to, how they're treated by the public and the things they'd like to see change. They perform a very difficult and vital role and I'm very grateful to them for letting me accompany them.

I continue to be on the case regarding the experience of parents and schools with Oxfordshire's service for children with Special Educational Needs. I spoke in a debate in parliament about some of the problems and then met the Government minister responsible for SEND nationally. Oxfordshire has just been given a further £1 million by the Government to deliver outreach services from SEND specialists to support children with a variety of conditions including autism and moderate learning difficulties. But this won't solve the problems people complain to me about regarding calls and emails not being answered and so I will continue to work on this.

On the subject of government funding, the extension to the Energy Price Guarantee for a further 3 months is welcome and will have saved the average household £1100 since it began, while Oxfordshire County Council has just been given a further £3 million to fix the potholes so many of you rightly complain to me about!

The Public Accounts Committee have held their hearing into the local AEAT Pension case I've been campaigning on behalf of and now we have to wait for their report in the coming weeks. I must give credit to OX10 Community Centre, Wild About Wallingford, the Town Council and Incredible Edible for keeping their Public Living Room going at the Bull Croft through a miserable afternoon of rain. It was designed to bring the community together and it did – at least some of them, and a great ukulele band. I had a good catch up with GWR about where next to take my campaign for reopening Grove Station – watch this space. Straight after my Apprenticeship Fair on 24th April at 12pm at Didcot Civic Hall, I

will start planning this year's Wantage and Didcot Climate Summit – the date will be the 13th June.

Long to reign over us

I'm not sure about the quiche, but I am now looking forward to the Coronation. It's taken a while, but the closer we get to the 6th May the more intrigued I am. Like most people, I've never seen a coronation. At the time of writing the order of service has not been published, but the palace has said that the service will contain "the same core elements rooted in long-standing history and pageantry... while recognising the spirit of our times." Much has been made of how different the times are between the last coronation and this one. I wonder what the nation will make of the deeply symbolic and historic Christian elements of the service, and what impact they will have on Charles and his reign in our modern society. If you were watching in 1953 then you may have seen the Orb, the Sceptre, and the Sword. More likely, you've seen them on a visit to the Crown Jewels like me. The Orb and Sceptre are symbols of power, but both are topped by a cross indicating that the Sovereign is the servant of a greater King. The Sword is symbolic of the Sovereign's role in administering justice, but the sword has a blunt tip, reminding the monarch and his ministers that they should exercise mercy as well as judgement. In 1953, church leaders presented the Queen with a Bible, "to keep your Majesty ever mindful of the law and the Gospel of God... we present you with this Book, the most valuable thing that this world affords." And famously, the only part of the service that was kept hidden from public view, she was anointed with oil to show she was set apart to serve. I guess we'll just have to see how Charles does it all. But it will be fascinating, and I hope, inspiring as we pray for him, the country and the commonwealth, longing that his reign will be marked by peace and prosperity for all. Above all, I long that as he serves in the years ahead, we will see the expansion of a greater King's reign – Jesus Christ's – whose mark will be all over the service on 6th May.
