June 2023

The annual meeting of the Council was held on 16th May. This was the first meeting of the new Council following elections. The new councullors will hold office for one year. As 9 candidates stood for election for 10 seats, they were automatically elected. The Council co-opted Sandra Hill to fill the vacancy. Various working groups were established to consider administrative and parish issues: One will consider "green" issues dealing with footpaths and climate matters, one to deal with the new play area, another for allotments, plus a group to review the internal audit processes, systems and controls for the spending of public money and actions of the internal auditor.

The Council was pleased to welcome **Robert Clegg** to the meeting, as the newly elected Vale of White Horse District Councillor for Marcham. We look forward to receiving regular reports from him in regards to District Council matters.

Potholes

A while ago the County Council trialled a system in parts of the county, whereby a "super user" could raise works orders for fixing potholes and kerbing issues on unclassified roads of less than 30 mph. An appointed volunteer assists highway officers by being the eyes and ears locally. The scheme was extended, and Marcham for the past year, has its own "super user" James Plumb. James has undergone a training course, as not all issues can be raised directly with the County Council's work team operatives. Residents can contact James directly regarding serious potholes. He can check the problem, and if it meets the relevant criteria, he will be able to issue a direct works order to have it fixed. He can be contacted on 07779386205 or via email at jamesplumb22@gmail.com Footpaths - Overhanging Shrubs

This time of year, shrubs and grass are growing well, and need maintenance. The Parish Council has had reports of some footways and paths being difficult to walk owing to shrubs and hedges that are overhanging. It is appreciated that occupiers may not necessarily be aware of the difficulties. The Council would kindly ask for assistance from landowners, to cut back hedging and trim shrubs, if you find your property is one of those causing problems.

20 mph limits

The Parish Council some while ago requested that the County Council consider 20 mph limits for the A415 through the village centre, and Howard Cornish Road. The County has been considering Marcham, along with many other parishes that too have requested 20 mph areas. It is developing a plan whereby some other adopted village roads too could possibly be included. Public consultation on the final proposal will take place in due course. Similarly it is proposed that the speed limit in parts of Cothill including Blackhorse Lane are reduced to 20 mph.

These were: dominoes, a broken calculator challenge, a bike ride challenge, train times, pentominoes and a card sorting exercise. We had a fantastic afternoon and really enjoyed the challenges that we were working on. DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT THANK YOU

A huge thank you to everyone who helped me over recent months in one way or another, including campaign volunteers, the many with whom I had friendly chats on doorsteps, and the even more who cast their votes via post or at the polling stations... and, of course, those hard-working individuals who operated the polling stations and at the count on the day after. Speaking with



so many of my neighbours over the campaign period was a truly uplifting experience, and I hope that this will continue: I'm often out and about around the village, including often at Saturday-morning Thirsty Cafe, so do please feel free to grab me for a chat. I can't promise that my small children won't also want to join the conversation, so be prepared to answer questions yourself about, e.g., who your favourite Disney princess is.

It may come as a surprise but I would like to thank my opponent in the election, James Plumb. While running unopposed would have been easy, it would have been a failure of our democracy to deny residents any choice in who represents them at the district level. No-one could doubt James's capacity for hard work, as demonstrated both on the campaign trail and through his ongoing community activities: it is his political affiliation that I, and it appears others, take issue with. I'm sure he will continue to serve this community well on the Parish Council and I look forward to working with him in this role.

Lastly, the biggest thank you of all to **Catherine Webber**, my predecessor in this role, who served Marcham and Shippon for 10 years. Catherine was the first to see potential in me as a candidate, gave up her time to explain what the role entails and to support me once selected, and has promised to continue advising me as I settle in. Catherine left very big shoes to fill and, although I bring a different set of skills to the table, living up to Catherine's example of tireless service to the community will be my overall ambition.

THE ROLE

So what does a District Councillor do? I'm no expert (yet!) on the subject, but thought it would be helpful to give a brief overview, as this will help inform what people can expect from me over the next 4 years. The first step is explaining the levels of local government. In order of increasing geographic size:

• Marcham Parish Council is formed of local residents who selflessly give up their evenings to care for issues such as footpaths, allotments, and playgrounds;

• the Vale of White Horse District Council covers approximately the south-west quarter of Oxfordshire and is responsible for issues such as housing and planning, and waste collection;

• Oxfordshire County Council tackles other issues such as social & health care, schools, and roads & transport.

I am of course prepared to lobby other councils on behalf of residents where the issue is outside of the Vale's remit, but if you're happy to cut out the middleman then that should usually yield a quicker response. As the District Councillor for Marcham & Shippon, I represent local residents on the Vale-wide Council which meets five times each year. I have also been appointed to various Vale committees: Planning (as a 'Preferred Substitute'*), Appeals (as Chair), and as a member of the Climate Emergency Advisory Committee. Tying this all back to local residents, I attend Parish Council meetings in Marcham and in Shippon, keep residents updated on recent developments (e.g. via MAD News!), and take on case work when residents contact me directly with concerns.

* A little complicated, come have a chat if you're curious.

SPECIAL MEASURES

Residents may have spotted a recent report that the Levelling up secretary, Michael Gove, has written to nine councils about their below-target response times to planning applications; the Vale was among these. The speed of determining applications in the Vale did indeed dip below the required rates for a short period during 2021, and Mr Gove recognised that the Vale's performance had since improved. This is an area that the council is monitoring closely to ensure that the action plan put in place to tackle the earlier issue continues to deliver significant improvements. I will share any updates once available.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT A REASSURING MESSAGE

One of my obligations on your behalf is to serve on the Thames Valley Police and Crime Commissioner Scrutiny panel. There I meet Councillors from all around the Thames Valley area to discuss how we should hold the Commissioner to account. The reputation of our police has taken quite a battering largely as a result of happenings in the Met. As we are the nearest neighbours



to the Met, we might have expected that similar problems might spill over from the Met area into the Thames Valley. I am happy to report that I have seen little sign of this. Indeed, I have been very impressed with the determination shown by our Chief Constable and his team of Deputies in dealing with potential problems of misogyny, racism, bullying and the like.

A recent BBC documentary on some of the behaviour at the UN where there were accusations of bad behaviour running right up to the top of the organisation, made me realise just how important it is for the public to have confidence in large organisations that senior management is open, transparent and honest over any shortcomings. The moment that there is any sign of cover up, the reputation of the whole organisation is threatened. This is why I was much reassured by discussions with the senior Thames Valley Police team.

On a lighter note, we were shown one picture of the Commissioner walking across a field between two police officers. Doubtless, this was to convey the daily consultation that goes on between TVP and the Commissioner. However, it struck me that it could have been construed as the Commissioner being "taken in for questioning". It just demonstrates how important presentation and image is in public life!

ELECTION MAYHEM OVER

As new Councils and Councillors begin to get their feet under the table, the same local problems and challenges that we faced last month are facing us now. Housing and housing numbers, roads, traffic, active travel and the climate emergency all still need solutions. At the same time, inflation is proving harder to bring down than we thought. If any of our new councillors thought they were in for an easy ride, I fear they were mistaken. But with a bunch of new, fresh faces comes a feeling of optimism that things could get better. That is something we all need to build on

who completed my health services survey for doing so. I've had responses from nearly 3,000 people, which is a really great number to give a picture of what people are feeling across the constituency. It's clear that, as I expected and as my inbox reflects, many people feel we do not have the health services we need. Nor do I. People particularly struggle to get an appointment with a doctor or with a dentist, but this is not the only thing that people would like to see more of when it comes to health. I will continue to campaign hard on this – watch this space.

After I held a successful crime summit with Thames Valley Police in Wantage, I was asked by local residents to hold one in Wallingford. I can confirm this will take place on 15th June, 6.30pm – 8pm and Waitrose have offered their café. Sign up on my website: **www. david-johnston.org.uk**.

Wherever you live, you can also sign up there for my third annual climate summit, which will be via Zoom and will have Grant Shapps, Secretary of State for Energy Security and Net Zero, giving the keynote speech.

Sticking with the environment and climate change, I continue to lobby for the Local Electricity Bill, which I am the lead sponsor of and which is now backed by 318 MPs. This would make it easier for small, community organisations that generate renewable energy to be able to sell it to the community. I am hopeful that with the Government's Energy Bill making its way through parliament at the moment, we might be able to finally make something happen that enables community energy to flourish.

Thanks to everyone who took part in my Apprenticeship Fair in Didcot – nearly 400 people attended and had great conversations with a range of public and private employers about the range of apprenticeships they offer. I was asked if I will be doing it again and I will be doing so.

A couple of other things in brief. I met with the Chair of Water Resource South East to again convey the objections local people

have about the reservoir proposal. And I continue to encourage people to see if they are eligible for Pension Credit, which can provide an average £3,500 a year to pensioners. The figures show the uptake locally is increasing, but there are more people who could be getting it. GARD's Annual General Meeting took place on Tuesday 2nd May in Steventon Village Hall, and was well attended from across the region. Where are we now with the proposals and responses? There will be news in June.

We await the responses of WRSE, Thames Water and RAPID to our opposition. Responses to RAPID's draft decision have been sent from Stakeholders (i.e. GARD, OCC, the Vale, Parish Councils, Wantage and Grove Campaign Group). RAPID wishes both the Reservoir and the competing Severn Thames Transfer to move on to the next stage of evaluation but GARD believes that **the Reservoir should not be allowed to proceed for further evaluation UNTIL a proper public assessment of the Reservoir's safety and flood risk potential has been carried out and published.**

GARD is considering the next moves and needs to build a fighting fund. We will possibly have to consider a legal challenge. We shall continue to work on publicity and increasing opposition support, perhaps via a petition. We ask you to continue lobbying your MP and Councillors, and we would urge all members and supporters to consider a contribution to our campaign fund.

The proposed Reservoir has no justification and, as Oxfordshire County Council stated in its January 2023 Press Release, it is "**a destructive** scheme, both environmentally and in its impacts on local people".

The Marcham Moldova Lifeline (MML) is a wonderful, fruitful and unique partnership between our community here and the fascinating country of Moldova – a place of huge contrasts less than 3 hours flying time away. Over the last 15 years much funding, prayer and pastoral support has flowed out from Marcham to Moldova, and much blessing has flowed back to us here too from our friends living and serving there. The relationship has been two-way with numerous visits both directions before the pandemic, and many fund-raising initiatives and events here in our villages over the years. In early May I had the opportunity to see for myself how our support has blessed the lives of many people in Moldova throughout our partnership. Neil Rowe and I flew to eastern Romania, and then drove 150km across the border to visit our mission partners near the capital city Chisinau. Patience Brace and Mary Embleton did likewise in April. Moldova is a small country not far from the Black Sea port of Odessa, hence the need to fly in and out of Romania. We found that sadly the threat of war spilling over from Ukraine was the backdrop to much of life in Moldova now. Prices and inflation are high and rising, much more so than here. The population is rapidly reducing as many 20-40's move abroad to live and work. The gap between rich and poor remains very wide, and much of our support through our local partners has been to help alleviate poverty, provide support for children's education, and help the vulnerable within the country. The children and their teachers at school were so impressive though. Their ambitions were high and their English was extraordinary. The children had lots to say about our King, our Premiership football teams and Brexit! It was a privilege to spend time with them. Coinciding with our key partner's retirement in 2025 MML will draw to a conclusion then, so we are keen to finish well over the next years. So do look out for further MML events and projects over the next year. And if you would be interested to visit our partners in Moldova I can say from experience that you will receive a very warm welcome. Revd Nick Weldon
