Oxfordshire County Council - 20 mph proposal for village roads
The County Council is reviewing the proposal to make most of the village roads 20 mph. The roads on new developments which have not yet been adopted by the County Council unfortunately have not been able to be included, as they remain private roads. The project team undertaking the investigations will report back on key outcomes, and their report is currently awaited.

Fettiplace Road / The Gap alleyway barrier

The remaining barrier at The Gap end of the alleyway has been removed by the County Council. The Parish Council has requested information from them as to the reasoning for this.

Play Area

At the time of writing, work has started on removing old items of play equipment, and preparing the site for the installation of new items inside the fence. Planning consent is required for the new items outside the fence, and that decision is awaited.

The Council appreciates the residents' patience and understanding during the time the area has had to be closed, particularly as this is during part of the school holiday. However, it was important to have good ground conditions for vehicles, and avoid times when the sports pitches were in use.

Mill Road - Bridleway 17 to Drayton

The County Council has advised that works have now started to repair the bridleway bridge. The duration of the works is estimated at up to 12 weeks, but due to the age and condition of the structure this may extend depending on how things progress.

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
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We are appealing for witnesses and dash-cam footage following a multiple vehicle collision on the A34 northbound.

At around 1.20pm on Friday (18/8) six vehicles were involved in a collision on the northbound carriageway of the A34 underneath the Botley interchange.

A white Mercedes Benz Tourismo coach is believed to have collided with stationary traffic.

Two people were taken to hospital but have since been discharged with minor injuries.

No arrests have been made, but our investigation is ongoing.

PC Shaun Kipling of the Joint Operations Roads Policing Unit, said: "We are appealing for anyone who witnessed this collision or may have dashcam footage to please get in touch.

On Tuesday September 19 2023, Patrick Bird, one of Abingdon's Town Criers, will give a talk to the Abingdon & District National Trust Association entitled Oyez, oyez, oyez: A call to find out exactly what a Town Crier is and does. A town crier, also called a bellman, is an officer of a royal court or public authority who makes public pronouncements in the streets as required. The Normans brought this with them in 1066 and the tradition of crying has been continued ever since. Abingdon has the only Guild of voluntary Town Criers in the UK and dress in the traditional colours and coat of arms of Abingdon. The Criers can often be seen on official occasions and announcing events around the Town. Patrick is a member of the Abingdon Guild of Town Criers and is going to tell us just what all this means. 
Help with learning about diet and the roles of various foods and drinks is important, especially at the present time when people are often not receiving face to face health care appointments and food costs are high.

The million dollar question is, can we as individuals make a difference to the changes we are experiencing in the world's climate? When people like Mr Sunak have their fingers in what many would call the wrong pies, how can what we do make a difference to his far-reaching decisions? I feel the answer is yes though the challenges for us as individuals appear insurmountable and demoralising. The bottom line always remains the same for me though, most things come down to individual actions, brought together to build up a head of steam and positive momentum within communities and society as a whole.

What difference can an appreciation of the local green space have on the world's climate? Well, that appreciation and enjoyment can be infectious, and can foster an understanding of what could be lost if these green spaces disappear under concrete. Maybe take a step back when bringing new objects, materials and plants etc onto your plot and think do I really need this? This is the reduce aspect.

Another aspect to consider in your garden is to see what you already have and transform it into a new use and into a new incarnation. That's the reuse phase.

Then finally look at the recycle stage within your garden.

You may feel what's the point when the world's grand polluters are running rampant. All any of us can do though is focus on that which we can change, setting aside the stuff

we can't.

County Councillor's Report

Drayton 20mph Zones

3 years ago the County Council unanimously passed a motion calling for the consideration of 20mph limits in any County Parish that requested them. At the time I do not believe any of us thought that such a policy would be quite so well received.

To date, only a tiny majority of Parishes have failed to take up the offer or show interest. If my own mailbox is anything to go by, I would say that those in favour outnumber those against by more than ten to one.



Understandably, the police are concerned over the potential pressure on their resources of enforcing these speed limits. However, the evidence so far is that 20mph limits do indeed bring down average speeds in our villages making life for residents, quieter, safer and more pleasant. Of course there are some concerns over potential consequences. Some Bus companies argue that the limits could make it harder for them to keep to their timetables. There is not enough evidence one way or the other to know the answer. A minority of residents argue that 20mph is annoyingly slow and leads to impatience and bad driving. Again, there is too little evidence to be certain, and it seems probable that it will take some time for drivers to become accustomed to slower speeds in all built up areas. What evidence there is, suggests that there is a driver learning process, but that 20mph limits lead to traffic flowing more smoothly and there is little impact on journey times. In our immediate area, Shippon's 20mph zone is already operational. Drayton's is well underway and all the other Parishes are investigating where 20mph limits might be needed.

Changes in the way traffic and driving is managed bring out strong feelings initially but Oxfordshire's immediate path on this issue is set.

Grass verges

There has been much local concern around grass cutting and road safety in recent weeks as the weather has encouraged rapid growth of roadside vegetation. There has also been concern that cycle and pedestrian paths have become restricted and even blocked. If we are trying to encourage people to get out of their cars and cycle or walk, it is important that we keep our paths open and conducive to cycling and walking. Many people are passionate about roadside plant diversity. Growth at road junctions is a major concern for road users of all types. Budget cuts over the past 20 years have led to reduced amount of grass cutting down to one per year leading to very careful decisions having to be made over when to carry out grass cutting depending on each year's weather patterns.

Clearly, there is a balance to be had over how we treat our roadside verges. The present policy is one cut per year and junction cuts where safety is the major issue. Junctions are currently cut on a priority basis – major junctions first.

Mill Rd Bridge, Marcham

Good news for Marcham (and indeed Drayton) residents is that work is due to start on the bridge imminently and the work completed this summer. Both Parishes are keen to work together to restore access to the bridge as soon as possible.

HIF1 Road

The major concern for Appleford, Sutton Courtenay and Milton is the OCC Planning and Regulation Committee's decision on the proposed new HIF1 Road. After 4 postponements, the application will be heard on July 17th and 18th. The meeting will be on line. (Update: the application was heard and rejected.)

District Councillor's Report

One might think that something so basic as sewage treatment would be a simple, unexciting topic but, alas, you would be wrong. The crisis in the national water industry is receiving attention from the national media, but how does Thames Water and the Vale of White Horse fit into all of this?

As the water company servicing the area, I hames Water has a legal obligation to meet the capacity need for sewage treatment of the local population: it cannot refuse to connect new housing to the sewage treatment network because there is insufficient capacity, and must instead increase its capacity to treat the sewage that these new residents will produce. As a profit-making business, however, TW has shown that is reluctant to even think about increasing capacity until after this new housing has actu-

ally been built; this introduces a time lag between the need for extra capacity and its supply. During that lag

period, the under-capacity often leads to the sewage being discharged into our rivers and streams, which is toxic to wildlife and deeply unpleasant to local residents. Given the rapid growth of housing across the Vale under the Local Plan adopted in 2016-2019, there has been a corresponding rapid growth of sewage production, but far too little yet in the way of extra sewage treatment capacity.

Not all of this is TW's fault: it wasn't until 1975 that building regulations were updated to force a separation between the sewage and the surface water drainage, so rainfall onto these older houses pours into the sewage network, overwhelming it; housing developers vary in their behaviour when adhering to the rules; and a minority of farmers allow considerable run-off of fertiliser from agricultural land into nearby streams and rivers. The lack of forward-thinking by TW is inexcusable, however, and it reveals a deep flaw in the privatisation of a monopolistic industry such as water.

At the July meeting of all Vale councillors, we debated a motion on sewage treatment and resolved a number of actions: (1) adding our pressure to that put upon TW, both directly and via local MPs; (2) investigating what extra legal routes are already available to us for holding TW to account; and (3) exploring how the need for sufficient sewage capacity can be factored into the planning application process. These won't fix the problem overnight, but they're all steps in the right direction. Look forward to the day when we can stop thinking about sewage once more!

MP's Report

As I mentioned in my last article, access to childcare is something that is regularly raised with me on the doorstep, and I launched a Childcare Survey last month to give parents and guardians across the constituency the chance to tell me about their experiences. Thank you to everyone who took part.

I will be sharing the findings with Ministers at the Department for Education, but the headline results included 95% of people saying we need more childcare infrastructure (much like most other infrastructure!) and 95% of people supporting the Government's plan to expand free childcare to 30 hours every week for children from 9 months old until they start school. This is the largest ever investment in childcare and will hopefully make a huge difference to the 75% who said that cost has been an issue in accessing childcare.



This month I was pleased to host my third annual Wantage and Didcot Climate Summit featuring a keynote speech by Grant Shapps, the Secretary of State for Energy Security and Net Zero, who took questions on everything from renewables to transport. We also welcomed local and national experts including Mike Blanch from the Westmill Sustainable Energy Trust, Jack Richardson from Onward and Professor Adrian Bull from The University of Manchester to talk and take questions about wind, hydrogen and nuclear energy. This was followed by the chance to question Thames Water's Director of Sustainability on water quality and tackling storm overflows. It was a very interesting event, and you can watch the recording on my website.

I also hosted a Crime Summit with Thames Valley Police in Wallingford this month after a local resident wrote to me with concerns about crime. It was a productive discussion about lots of issues and there were several things that TVP committed to go away and look at – including the time it takes to report an incident of anti-social behaviour online.

In addition, I hosted a Farmers' Forum for local farmers with the Farming Minister, Mark Spencer. We had a wide-ranging discussion about food production, farming incentives, the challenges for beef/pig/dairy/arable farmers, the environment and much more.

It is always a pleasure to welcome constituents to Parliament, and it was great to meet with Sarah and a group of young people from SOFEA when they visited again for a tour. I helped organise this after a visit I made to them recently – they do great work for the local community.

As one of the patrons of Play2Give I try to get to as many of Andy Baker's events as I can and this month he was running a great football tournament in Wallingford, which raised over £4,000. Well done, Andy!

In other news, my campaign for the local AEAT Pensioners hit another milestone as Parliament's Public Accounts Committee finished their inquiry that I helped secure and made recommendations to Government. This is a campaign I will continue to support.
