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GARD Newsletter for December 2023



GARD is a local community group formed to campaign against Thames Water's proposals to build a reservoir south-west of Abingdon.

GARD has written to the Secretary of State for DEFRA (Therese Coffey) to ask her to confirm the timetable for her decision on the Thames Water plans, and particularly for the Mega-Reservoir. Our information on the grapevine is that this will be around the end of November. We will let all residents know her decision (Newsletter or Village website).

Until then, GARD will continue to send in our list of unresolved Issues about the Reservoir plan, which Thames Water refuse to answer properly. Looking at TW's "Statement of Response", GARD finds that they did not actually answer criticisms properly. If you feel that they have not answered complaints you made to Thames Water in the consultation, you can write to the Environment Agency and/or Ofwat and complain. This should be done as soon as possible, so it can inform the Secretary of State's decision. Email your complaint to one of these and please Copy to your MP and to GARD.

In the meantime, Thames Water are on a 'charm offensive' trying to sell the Reservoir plans to local residents. They were met by protesters at their 'Drop-in event' at East Hanney Village Hall on 10th November, when Councillor Sally Povolotsky and Helen Marshall (Oxfordshire Director for CPRE) were interviewed by Press and TV. Thanks to all protesters, including other Vale and Parish Councillors from Steventon, East Hanney and East Hendred. Thames Water gave the usual PRbased presentation (not a bulldozer in sight on any of the posters, one assumes the work will be done by birds and butterflies). We are promised 'leisure facilities' (which we already have, and which they have no idea how they will provide, after devastating the area), but our questions on disruption, pollution, flooding and safety of the structure were brushed aside. We must keep up the pressure for the Reservoir plans to be scrapped!

The Gardening Column

Is It A Sign?

Is it me, or did the leaves not change to their Autumn shades as early this year?

Normally, September and October is when I become aware of the vivid colour changes, but truth be told, I didn't really seem to start noticing it until November. At the same time, I noticed a couple of Daffodils, with leaves already 6 inches tall, when I was visiting the village of Flore, in Northamptonshire.

Meanwhile, at the same time again, locally here, in Oxfordshire, I noticed some spring 'weeds' already emerging, and even a number of Dandelions in full bloom, months earlier than they should have been. I remember when I lived in The Peak District, the fields there were often bright yellow with Dandelions in late Spring and Early Summer, so was taken aback to see so many in flower here in November.

Is this a sign of global warming, whether it's man-made or not, or do you see these anomalies year on year? I'd be interested to hear what you are seeing at a time of year that maybe you shouldn't. Or what you are in fact not seeing that realistically perhaps you should. We're not likely to end the debate in these pages of whether man-made influenced global warming is real or not, but I am interested to hear what is happening out there on the ground as it were.

By the way, I have been asked if I will be seen out and about less now I occasionally need to use a wheelchair. No chance, I'll be getting my wheels just as muddy as my walking boots, so I hope to bump into you in a greenspace soon. If you see me out and about, come say "hello".

Triumph in North Abingdon as funding is secured for Lodge Hill Diamond Junction

After more than 30 years of campaigning, local Liberal Democrats have today secured the funding for the completion of Lodge Hill Junction on the A34.

Lodge Hill junction is a vital piece of local infrastructure, with local Liberal Democrats campaigning for the junction to be completed with south-facing slip roads for more than 30 years. The upgrade will reduce traffic flow through the centre of Abingdon and support development in the area.

The government backed the scheme in 2017, promising £9 million of funding. The County Council proceeded on that basis, securing Growth Deal funding and contributions from housing developers. But the government reneged on their promise and dropped the funding last year.



The £28 million project has been one of local MP Layla Moran's top priorities since being selected as a candidate in 2012. She raised the project in her first speech in the House of Commons in 2017, and has continued to press the government for action ever since. In April, Layla held a debate in Parliament on the project, where a Minister revealed that a portion of funding was available and waiting for sign off from the Treasury.

Layla has met with Ministers, written several letters to the Secretary of State for Levelling up and the Chancellor, and raised the issue in the House of Commons, urging the government to release the funding as soon as possible.

After months of delay, the final piece of funding had finally been secured, with £17.3m coming from Homes England. This means the project has now been given the go-ahead. Local Liberal Democrats joined Layla Moran MP at the site to celebrate.

Speaking afterwards Layla Moran MP said:

"I am incredibly excited that this vital piece of local infrastructure has finally been given the go-ahead. The plans have been shovel-ready for months, with money from the County Council and developers ready and waiting. It was high time the government made good on their promises".

"Local Lib Dem councillors have been tirelessly campaigning for years, determined to see local residents get the infrastructure they deserve. Abingdon's County Councillors, Alison Rooke, Nathan Ley and Neil Fawcett, have worked really hard to keep the County Council moving on the project.""

"I look forward to being there to cheer when the first shovel hits the ground".

Abingdon East County Councillor Alison Rooke said:

"Local residents will be delighted to hear this news. This shows what happens when you elect Liberal Democrats. We've worked tirelessly to get this project over the line. In the face of broken promises, empty words, and interminable delays from the government, we have not stopped fighting for what Abingdon needs".

December is a busy time for me from a work point of view but I think it is family life in the run-up to Christmas that makes life much busier, and that is the same for many households, not just a vicarage one. We have to be careful not to let the busyness of the festive season take over. Having said that, there will be some who long for a busy Christmas, but for particular reasons won't get one this year. Perhaps your Christmas used to be filled with family and friends, but that was a long time ago. Marcham Parish Council News

Mill Road bridge – Official Opening

Residents and cyclists from Drayton and Marcham gathered on 10th November, 2023 with Peregrine Bryant - architect for the bridge project, Hugh Potter – Rights of Way group manager in the Countryside service team at Oxfordshire County Council, and Sally Stradling - former conservation and historic building officer from the Vale of White Horse District Council to recognise the culmination of many people's hard work over a long while to restore the bridge and the bridleway to Abingdon and Drayton. Each of them spoke briefly about their role, and answered questions about the project. The Council was pleased to also welcome the District Councillor Rob Clegg, and County Councillor Richard Webber who latterly had been kept busy keeping residents informed as to the works and progress of the restoration and reinstatement of the bridleway. The Parish Council is very grateful to all who worked hard behind the scenes to bring the project to fruition. The restored bridge will bring benefits for walkers, cyclists and horse riders once again opening up the routes that were once enjoyed.

Christmas Tree – Village Green

To bring seasonal cheer to the village, the Council is again planning to site a Christmas tree on the village green. It is very grateful to Andrew MacLean from ADM Trees at Frilford, for once again providing the cut tree this year. Sadly the bare rooted trees planted previously have not survived, so the Council will need to look at other options for the future.

Christmas Tree Recycling

The Vale of White Horse District Council is again recycling real Christmas Trees in January. When you no longer need your tree, it can be put out next to the brown bin at the kerbside provided it is less than 1.8m or 6 ft tall. If larger than this it will need to be cut into sections. If you do not have a brown garden waste bin, then your real Christmas tree can be placed by the Salvation Army Textile bank in Howard Cornish Road (opposite Duffield Place). Again, please cut it into sections if it is taller than 1.8m (6ft). The last day for depositing your Christmas Tree at the textile bank will be by the end of the day on Tuesday 16th January, 2024. Trees left after this date will not be collected. Please do not obstruct the textile bank, or more particularly the bus stop, when leaving your trees.

Also there is to be a Christmas tree collection from Millets Farm, so this is another opportunity for local residents to recycle their tree. Trees need to be dropped off at Millets by the end of Saturday 6th January.

Play Area

The Council is pleased to be able to confirm that all the new equipment is now accessible and available to residents. The playground provides a range of items to cater for children of all ages and abilities. The Council's working party will continue to meet to plan the next stages of phase II, which includes seating and picnic tables, and also to provide a focal point which older children/early teens can enjoy.

Grants

The Parish Council annually awards grants to local organisations, in accordance with local government legislation, where there is benefit to some or all of the residents of the parish.

Applications for grants were considered at the November meeting of the Parish Council. The Council was pleased to be able to support Marcham Community Group towards the expenses of the Anson field maintenance, the Marcham Parochial Church Council to support its running of the childrens'club and outing for village children, the South and Vale Citizens Advice Bureau who have helped quite a few local people over the past year, and the Abingdon Carousel Centre which supports families, and is visited by some from Marcham. The Council has also set aside some funds to help Marcham Pre-School, but is first seeking clarification on some points before reaching a final agreement as to the amount to award.

Oxfordshire County Council - Consultation

The Parish Council has discussed two matters raised by the County Council. Firstly there has been a proposal to extend even further, the white gate village entrance feature on the A415 at the Eastern side of the village. Whilst it was going to be moved a short distance owing to the proposed Bloor Homes development on the southern side, it has had to be moved again further Eastwards as drainage ditches were interfering with the proposed location, and there was not a suitable place for it to be installed. The Parish Council had no objections.

Secondly the Parish Council was consulted on a Lane Rental Scheme. Currently Oxfordshire County Council charges a fixed £300 fee to utility companies for a permit to work on the highway. There is a new proposal to charge £2500 per day for all works undertaken at peak times on certain roads in Oxfordshire. The intention is to change behaviour patterns so that the effect of roadworks on traffic movements are reduced. The Parish Council thought that such charges to utility companies would filter through to consumers, and was not in support of the idea.

School Admissions – Entry to primary or infant school September 2024

If you are a parent or carer of a child 3 or 4 years old then you need to apply for a primary school place now. This is for children born between 1st September 2019 and 31st August 2020 (inclusive). You still have to apply even if your child already attends a nursery attached to your preferred school. Parkside – Bench Seat

A contractor has now been appointed to install a slab base and bench seat off New Road, at the start of Parkside on the opposite side to the Gigaclear cabinet. Anyone who digs on a highway needs to comply with the County Council's requirements, and there was some delay in finding an appropriate firm with the street works accreditation who could undertake such a small job. It is hoped that it will not be very much longer before residents can have the benefit of a new seat.

Planning Applications considered by the Parish Council

Upwood Quarry, Hills Aggregates, Ground Water Monitoring Report -

Owing to the location of the quarry off the A338 close to Cothill Fen, the firm undertaking the sand extraction is required to produce an annual report which analyses the effects of their works on the special area for conservation. The Parish Council encouraged the County Council to consult with the Berks Bucks and Oxon Wildlife Trust too, as the report indicated that there were some changes in mineral concentrations which needed close monitoring.

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MP's Report

Thank you very much to the 2,127 people who signed my petition to re-open Grove Station. It shows again the huge strength of feeling on this locally, and I will now be presenting it to the House of Commons and to the Department for Transport to make the case to them. Thanks too to Andy Holding of the Wantage and Grove Rail Supporters Group for his support. I will keep pushing for this station, which makes economic, social, and environmental sense.

We are the proud home of the 11 EOD and Search Regiment at Vauxhall Barracks in Didcot, and it was a pleasure to visit again and meet Lt Col Rob Swan and the team. Just this year they have so far responded to more than 1,800 requests in the UK to deal with explosive devices and I planted a remembrance stake in Parliament's Garden of Remembrance in their honour. I also, as ever, took part in poignant remembrance services and parades – this year in Wantage and Didcot. Thank you to everyone who made them happen.

UK Parliament Week takes place every November, and I was pleased to visit local schools and talk to different youth organisations about my role as an MP and how they can get involved in politics, including: Wallingford School, St Michael's CofE Primary School in Steventon, Brightwell Primary School, St Blaise Primary School, the 7th Abingdon Beavers, Chilton Explorer Scout Unit and Brightwell cum Sotwell Scouts.

I have been campaigning to improve our roads since I was elected and I have now launched my Local Roads Survey to give you the opportunity to tell me exactly where you are seeing issues on our roads that need to be resolved – including potholes, congestion, speeding and other safety concerns. I want to pull together a complete map of all the issues we are facing, and where, so that I can raise these with the road authorities. Fill it out at www.david-johnston.org.uk/RoadsSurvey.

Now that I am the Minister for Children, Families and Wellbeing, one of the things I have responsibility for is overseeing the Government's big new expansion in childcare for parents. Once it is completed in Autumn 2025, it will give working parents 30 hours of free childcare every week from when their child is 9 months old until they start school. It is great be involved in delivering this exciting new policy and you can see exactly what you're eligible for at www.childcarechoices.gov.uk

It is also great that the Prime Minister has successfully delivered on his promise to halve inflation by the end of the year. It involved hard decisions and discipline, but it is right that we focused on this as inflation eats away at the pound in your pocket and has had negative effects on both prices and interest rates.

District Councillor's Report

Remembrance

It was an honour to lay a wreath at the Remembrance Sunday service in Shippon. Although the smaller of the two main villages within Marcham Ward, Shippon's link with Dalton Barracks makes its service especially pertinent and it was a privilege to meet serving members of the Royal Logistics Corp (RLC). With conflict continuing on the European continent and beyond, it's as important as it ever was that we acknowledge the sacrifice made by those who have, or indeed still do, risk their lives to keep us safe.

A huge thank you also to personnel from 7 Regiment RLC, who helped clear away weeds from the War Memorial in Marcham ahead of the Remembrance Sunday service there.

Reservoir

Thames Water's plans for building a huge reservoir to the south of Marcham appear to be gaining momentum. The Vale continues to be concerned about the underlying data used by TW in their modelling and by the important questions that TW still has yet to answer. We are stepping up our efforts even further on this: more news to come.

Homelessness

As winter approaches, it's especially important to help prevent homelessness. The Vale has a good track record here, with a significantly higher success rate than the national average, but with an increasing demand for emergency homelessness there's no room for complacency. Swimming pool grant

South and Vale were recently awarded £440,000 by Sport England to support swimming pools across the two districts. There has been huge increase in costs to manage the pools over the last few years due to the rising energy costs and other financial pressures because of the Covid-19 pandemic, and so this funding is a very welcome boost to keeping our local facilities in good shape.

Christmas parking

As an initiative to support local businesses in the run-up to Christmas, free parking is being provided at various sites in market towns across the Vale. On Saturday's 2nd, 9th, and 16th of December, Vale-operated car parks in Abingdon will be free to use, and there are similar schemes running in Wantage and Faringdon. The ticket machines will indicate free parking and there's no need to display a ticket on those days, but maximum stay times will apply.

County Councillor's Report

Are we losing the ability to disagree constructively? For much of the past month, I have been fielding questions/concerns and sometimes abuse over transport and highway issues. From Oxford's LTN's (about which I can do very little) to 20mph zones (which I fully support) these issues provoke strong feelings. Of course they matter, but with our social services under ever more financial strain, and a cost of living crisis that will not go away, it is interesting, and a bit depressing, that potholes and restrictions on traffic speed seem to dominate the local agenda.



There has, however, been good news (most agree).

The delivery of the long awaited Drayton Road Build Out in Sutton Courtenay together with the new SID (speed indicator devices) will, we hope, go some way to improving the accident statistics and quality of life along that road - similar hopes for the new SID at Appleford Railway Bridge.

The completion of the Mill Road bridge in Marcham will allow greater access to the countryside for residents of Marcham and Drayton once the weather cooperates.

Work continues to resolve County and District planning issues in Drayton.

Work between District and County Councils on the Joint Vale and South Local Plan continues apace. New government allowing, we are hopeful that Housing delivery targets will be more modest than many we're expecting.

Whatever the numbers are, planning enforcement is in dire need of reform. Many councils do not have the resources to provide a decent service. Too few enforcement officers and a set of regulations lacking teeth, have steadily eroded public confidence in the planning system. Too often planning conditions sidestepped and even ignored, weak penalties for abuse, an endlessly forgiving system over retrospective planning applications and over long time given to applicants to comply with conditions, have all resulted in a general perception that planning is entirely in the hands of developers rather than planning authorities. It is time for a wholesale revision of planning regulations to restore public confidence in the system.

The Thames Water plans for a Reservoir rumble on. TW would now like the reservoir to be even larger. Most local residents would like the whole idea to be shelved. 2024 may well turn out to be decisive.

And finally, has anyone else noticed the enormous increase in the local squirrel population? We now have a family who have settled in under our eaves and are becoming increasingly assertive. There is one who looks back in through our window in the mornings, with a look of defiance on its face having spent the night chewing through the wire mesh, moth balls and polystyrene filler we have used to try to fill its access points. Using poison which birds and pets can pick up, we are told, is illegal and I don't own a blunderbuss. We are now trying "pigeon spikes" – potentially turning the house into a prison camp. Are these squirrels just picking on us or are others having problems?
