Marcham Pre-School

Marcham has expanded hugely over recent years, and I'm sure all readers of the MADNEWS will agree that the opportunities and facilities now available to the local community are incredible. As a community we are very fortunate to have such committed and caring local citizens that have helped to make this village so special.

Less than 18 months ago, a seed of an idea was planted to improve and develop the outdoor space for the youngest children of the school/preschool community. After a chance discussion with Adam Hopcroft of Kingerlee Ltd, a plan began to build to transform the old, uninspiring playground/grass space into something where the children could play, learn and develop using all their senses and growing skills.

Staff from Marcham Pre-school and Marcham C of E Primary School were able to secure funding to enable the playground to be resurfaced (well overdue!), which would allow a fantastic 'blank canvas' on which to build this environment.

We have been so widely supported by local community groups as well as larger corporations and it makes me extremely honoured to have been part of this project.

With phase 1 almost complete, we would like to display all the facilities that have been put in place to date. Here's a small selection of the resources and equipment that are now available... and the people/groups responsible!



With grants received from Thames Water, Vale of White Horse Community Lottery, Tesco Bags of Help, Doris Field Charitable Trust, Bag2school collections we have been able to add the additional touches that have helped to transform this area into such a valuable learning space.

Planning for phase 2 has now begun, and a generous grant from Marcham Parish Council will see a 'high street' of role-play houses allowing the children to engage in imaginative play opportunities, mark making/writing opportunities, maths, physical development and so much more! What will they be? A hospital, school, fire station, shop, vet's surgery, police station, or a home.... We'll let the children decide!

So many people have been involved in this project and our thanks go to each and every one of you.... but particularly school and pre-school teachers and staff, including those in the school office who have had to manage the orders and deliveries!

This has become a community project in every sense of the word... and what an amazing community we have proven it to be.

The Gardening Column

What Does A Garden Actually Look Like?

Interesting title to reflect on, 'What does a garden actually look like?'

Over the last 30+ years, I've seen, met, and experienced many types of gardeners and gardens, so when I was asked yesterday, what does a garden actually look like, it gave me plenty to reflect on.

I've seen urban gardens, rural gardens, woodland gardens and allotment gardens. Rose gardens, rock gardens, stump gardens, and gardens full of ornaments, suncatchers and gnomes.

I've met many gardeners too, and they too vary in form, as much as the gardens they tend.

What I came to realise, many years ago, was that assumptions are often inaccurate, and form deep rooted barriers in life, so assumptions are not a good barometer, or gauge, when considering what a garden actually looks like.

I think a garden and gardeners are something that is felt and experienced, not just something to look at. It seems to be more about a measurable connection between the garden and the wildlife, the features and the attractions therein, and the custodian. Note I say custodian, not gardener. Calling them custodians seems more apt, as do any of us really 'own' anything?

I see people give their gardens, balcony plants, or window boxes, the same amount of care, and see the same levels of connection, and appreciation exhibited in all of them.

I've even met guerilla gardeners, when they don't have their own area to grow in, surreptitiously sow seeds, plant seedlings, or give plants a helping hand, that grow in the parks, lanes and greenspaces we all share. I see the same connection and love in them as I do in people who have their own garden area.

So instead of putting our understanding of what a garden is in a box, and sticking a label on it, or categorising and stereotyping what a gardener looks like. Let's broaden the narrative and question, from what does a garden look like, to how connected are we with the natural world around us, on a daily basis? To be aware and connected makes us more likely to want to protect the environment.

Casual Vacancy

A vacancy exists on the Parish Council. Current projects involve preparing a Neighbourhood Plan which will give the community a direct power to develop a shared vision for the area and shape the development and growth, changes to the public footpath near the Church and out towards the Cemetery, and possibly reviewing the suggestion for lighting along the path from Harding Way to Howard Cornish Road.

Christmas Tree Recycling – Reminder of where to take your tree

Real Christmas trees for recycling can be taken to Millets Farm by Saturday 6th January, or left on the hardstanding by the Salvation Army textile bank in Howard Cornish Road – opposite Duffield Place by Tuesday 16th January in order to meet the collection dates. If taking your tree to the Howard Cornish Road location, please do not obstruct the textile bank, or the bus stop area.

Allotments - Cow Lane and Parkside

If you have an allotment you are reminded that allotment rent collection for the 23/24 financial year is taking place. For those who have not yet paid, please transfer the sum due to the Council's bank account (details in the letter sent out, or available from the clerk if needed), or let the Clerk have a cheque payable to Marcham Parish Council. Those in arrears with rent, or found not to be utilising their plot could lose it by the service of a Notice to Quit.

Council Tax 2024/25

The Parish Council will be holding an additional meeting on Thursday 4th January 2024 to carefully consider the budget for 2024/25. Once finalised, the Council will set the amount of council tax that comes to the parish from the total amount paid by residents to the Vale of White Horse District Council. This meeting, owing to the closure of Marcham Centre, will be held in All Saints Church.

20 mph for most of the village

The County Council approved the scheme for most of the village roads to be 20 mph, and is currently planning to erect new illuminated poles on the Frilford Road. This is likely to take place early in the new year. Once the poles are up, the signage will follow.

Planning Applications considered by the Council

P23/V2087/HH Garage conversion and fenestration alterations at 3 Hyde Copse. The Council had no objections.

P23/V2608/HH Removal of existing lleylandii hedge, erection of hazel hurdles along west facing boundary of property, inside the stone wall on the border of the garden. Remove existing hedge and plant laurel hedging in its place at The Old Bakehouse, 4 North Street. The Council had no objections provided the hazel hurdles were set back from the stone wall, and a reasonably tall laurel hedge was planted closest to the road.

P23/V2522/HH Single storey front, side and rear extensions at 87 Howard Cornish Road. The Council had no objections, but commented on the loss of permeable land, and the fact that as the public sewer ran through the garden Thames Water should be consultee.

GARD Newsletter for January 2024

At the time of writing (15th December) the Secretary of State for DEFRA (Stephen Barclay) has not made any decision on Thames Water's reservoir plans. So there is still time for you and our MPs to influence his decision. If you sent your complaints to Thames Water in the consultation, and you feel that they have not answered your points, or you want to write against the new, larger, project, then we urge you to follow GARD's example and write to the Environment Agency and/or Ofwat and complain about TW's attitude. This is the best way to get your point across now (before EA and Ofwat produce their advice for Stephen Barclay). Email your complaint to:

Support from Councils and other organisations

Oxfordshire County Council have written to DEFRA citing unresolved issues from the consultation (see above), as have Steventon Parish Council and CPRE.

There was good support for the anti-reservoir demonstration, organised by East Hanney and Steventon's county and district councillor, Sally Povolotsky, at East Hanney, outside the Thames Water 'drop-in' event on the Reservoir on 10th November. Inside the drop-in at East Hanney Memorial Hall, it was the usual 'brochure stuff' from TW, no proper details of the design, or about the 10-plus years of disruption, but lots of pictures of butterflies and birds in unspecified locations. GARD remain absolutely convinced that there will be major damage to biodiversity by the reservoir project. We are taking legal advice on whether Thames Water's Environmental Assessment of the project, which we believe to be flawed and biased, is actually illegal, not meeting the standards set down by the government.

Both the County Council (on the 12th December) and the Vale of White Horse (on the 13th December) have passed unanimous council motions re-affirming opposition to the Reservoir, asking for talks with the Secretary of State, and for the reservoir plans to be suspended until issues have been resolved. GARD supports these calls. Thanks to those councillors who proposed and seconded the motions: at the County, it was Sally Povolotsky and deputy Council Leader, Peter Sudbury; at the Vale it was Robert Clegg (Marcham District Councillor) and Andy Cooke (Drayton District Councillor)

"There are few emotions more powerful than hope." That's the opening line from an online course our churches will be offering this January. In a world where hope often appears lacking, real hope is what the Christian faith claims to offer. 



MP's Report

Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year! I particularly enjoyed attending the Wantage Dickensian Evening to kickstart the festive season. It was minus 2 degrees, but the atmosphere was very warm and everyone from the Wantage Silver Band to Island Farm Donkey Sanctuary to Team Mikayla was there to celebrate.

Looking back on the last year, I am pleased with the progress made on a number of my campaigns. We took another step forward on health services with my Health Services Survey, which thousands of you responded to and which was followed with me holding a debate in Parliament on health services in Wantage and Didcot.

My petition to re-open Grove Station was signed by 2,127 of you and I will be meeting the Rail Minister in the near future to discuss this again with him. Thank you to Andy Holding of the Wantage and Grove Station Supporters Group for providing the final signature. I will keep going until we are successful.

My campaigning for more renewable energy run by the local community, through my sponsorship of the Local Electricity Bill, led to the creation of the new £10 million Government Community Energy Fund which will hopefully benefit groups across Oxfordshire.

And my campaign for justice for our local AEAT pensioners resulted in me securing the first ever independent investigation into their case, as well as a Parliamentary inquiry.

I was also pleased to welcome so many constituents to Parliament this past year from schools to charities to members of the armed forces. I also hosted a local young person for work experience almost every month – thank you to all of them. If you are planning a visit to Parliament or would like me to arrange a free tour for you then do get in touch.

In 2024 I will be continuing campaigns on infrastructure issues like GP surgeries and Grove Station, as well as my other priorities like protecting our environment, tackling anti-social behaviour, and improving opportunities for children and young people.

Right now, as part of my campaign to improve our roads, I have my Local Roads Survey running so that you can tell me exactly where you are seeing issues on our roads that need to be resolved – including potholes, congestion, speeding and other safety concerns. Since being elected I have spoken in 13 separate debates about the need to improve our local roads, met with the Roads Minister to raise it with them, led a debate in Parliament on safety issues on the A34 and A420 and welcomed the £3 million for this year from Government to help fix Oxfordshire's potholes.

However, there is more to do and I want to hear from as many people as possible so that we have the best data to make the case for improvements, so please do take part on my website at www.david-johnston.org.uk/RoadsSurvey.

District Councillor's Report

Joint Local Plan (JLP)

The time has arrived. In my report of July/August earlier this year, I mentioned that the new JLP for Vale of White Horse and South Oxfordshire was being prepared and that a draft would be put out for consultation. The draft documents have now been published (see https://www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk/planning/preparation-underway-for-next-stage-of-joint-local-plan/) and the consultation will likely be launched in January. Please take the time to look at this. I appreciate that the documentation is long and not terribly thrilling, but it is very important: we are putting forward an ambitious plan, which we strongly believe is best for local residents, local businesses, the local environment, and for the climate. Widespread engagement from residents will be vital in proving to the Planning Inspectorate that the JLP has democratic support.



As the draft notes, the number of houses in the Vale increased by 20% from 2011 to 2021: this is among the highest increases of any district in the UK over that period. We have long been constrained by the commitments made by the administration of 2012-2016, which signed the district up to this high level of growth without also planning for the necessary infrastructure to support it. This new JLP cannot undo the growth already committed to, but we are proposing no extra net growth across the region (South and Vale combined). That said, there has been a little re-jigging of site allocations and the proposed development on Dalton Barracks has increased from 1,200 houses to 2,750 (Policy AS10). The development would include facilities to support the housing, including healthcare, education, leisure, and employment opportunities. There would be no extra housing development in Marcham (beyond the development in the south-east that has already been approved).

The draft JLP would be, as far as we can see, the most ambitious in the country regarding nature and the environment. This is a vital opportunity to preserve and enhance the natural beauty of the Vale of White Horse, and your support in getting it implemented would be truly valuable.

There will be a consultation roadshow in early 2024, with events held across South and Vale. No event is planned for Marcham, but the closest events will be in Shippon Village Hall on 24th Jan and at Pablo Lounge in Abingdon on 3rd February. Exact timings to be published on the Vale website in due course, together with details about other events across the districts.

Reservoir

I proposed my first motion at the Vale's full council on 13th December, on the topic of the huge reservoir that Thames Water wants to build on the land to the south of Marcham. We continue to oppose the progression of the plans through the RAPID approval process while so many questions remain unanswered: would the reservoir cause subsidence to nearby buildings, the A34, the railway line? Would there be microclimate changes, with rolling fog leading to poor visibility on local roads? What would be the effect on the local flood risk? Thames Water needs to work this out, and to make the evidence public. Following a passionate debate, the motion was passed unanimously.
