WOULD YOU LIKE TO BECOME A PARISH COUNCILLOR?

The Parish Council currently has vacancies and would like to co-opt residents who have a little time to spare to help Marcham become a better place to live. There are various projects currently being undertaken, so if you want to find out about what a councillor does, and how you can help in the parish, then please contact a councillor or the Clerk for further information.

SPEED REDUCTION REQUEST -ST PETER'S CROSSROADS

The section of the Faringdon Road by The Dog House public house, and to the east of that, is a 40 mph area, as is Gozzards Ford. Interestingly, the section in between, at the point of the crossroads where there is a significant number of vehicle movements, is a 60mph limit. The speed limit in Sheepstead Road too is 60 mph which many consider too fast, particularly with bends in the road, and vehicles trying to emerge from properties where there is reduced vision. The Parish Council has started the process to try and get Oxfordshire County Council to reduce the permitted speeds in these areas. The County Council, in order to consider a request, first requires a traffic survey to be undertaken. This is being arranged and the results will be available in due course.

20 MPH SIGNS A415

Residents will have noticed that the 20 mph signage at the eastern side of the village on the A415 has disappeared. This has happened only since the completion of the road works by Bloor Homes. Enquiries have been made of Bloors, who in turn, are liaising with their technical department which has been dealing with the County Council about the road works. The Parish Council, once clarification has been obtained as to what is happening, will keep residents informed.

ELECTIONS – THURSDAY 1ST MAY OXFORDSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL

Don't forget you will need to be on the electoral roll for the parish in order to vote in Marcham in the forthcoming Oxfordshire County Council elections. The election will be held on the new boundaries, which were brought into force by The Oxfordshire (Electoral Changes) Order 2025. Previously Marcham was in the Sutton Courtenay with Marcham division, but following the boundary review and a consequent increase in the number of County Councillors in Oxfordshire, Marcham has been placed with the parishes to the north instead, so the new County Councillor will represent a different area from the present one. If you need to add

MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL your name to the electoral register, then the deadline for doing so is 11th April. Anyone needing to apply for a postal vote has to do so, by 14th April. Proxy applications can be received up until 23rd April. Photo ID will be required in order to vote in person at the election. If you do not have any accepted photo ID, you can apply for a voter Authority Certificate by 5.00 p.m. on 23rd April.

> Do not leave things too late. Act now. Further information about the election is on the Oxfordshire County Council's website www.oxfordshire.gov.uk.

ALLOTMENTS

Replacement fence works are due to be carried out at the Cow Lane site in April, as well as clearing work on the eastern corner near the wall of the Parkside site. Readers will have seen in an earlier edition of MAD News that Marcham Society was wanting areas of the village where archaeological trial pits could be dug. The Parish Council has agreed that some of the untenanted allotment plots could be used for this purpose, and even those with a tenant, provided the tenant is in agreement.

It is now spring, when allotment plots should be tended a little more frequently, as the growing season is upon us. To prevent your plot from becoming untidy, and a nuisance to others, please ensure that it is tended regularly.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS **CONSIDERED BY THE COUNCIL**

P25/V0379/HH Rear first floor extension. Minor alterations to existing elevations and minor adjustments to the internal layouts at 9 North Street. The Council had no objections.

P24/V1986/FUL Change of use of the land at the rear of The Black Horse, Gozzards Ford, to construction material storage, and marble cutting shed & storage at The Black Horse, Gozzards Ford. The Council objected to this application. It had great concerns regarding noise, dust and odours, frequent transport issues with the use of the area for construction material storage, as well as regular delivery lorries. This site, in the open Green Belt area was not considered suitable for the industrial uses proposed.

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

George Owen (1499-1558), Royal Physician to three monarchs

Paul Whitton

Paul is a local historian, member of Longworth & District History Society and editor of the Longworth Rose history magazine. His illustrated talk explores the fascinating life of Dr George Owen; Royal Physician to three monarchs; Henry VIII, Edward VI and Mary I.

Dr George Owen was granted the lease of Hinton Waldrist Manor and we start by discovering how this local medieval castle and house became a royal manor. We then go to Oxford to see how George Owen entered the world of Tudor medicine. The talk also looks at the perils facing a physician to a powerful and unpredictable king like Henry. We hear about some of the curiosities of Tudor remedies, with the help of an apothecary. He even worked on translations with Katherine Parr.



As part of his reward for service to monarchs, Owen was granted many properties in the Oxford area. We look especially at Godstow Abbey, Wolvercote, and Cumnor Place, finding there two beautiful ladies who came to tragic ends. Finally, we reflect on his legacy, how he raised standards in medicine through the Royal College of Physicians and became an MP. Maybe his greatest achievement was simply to survive those years of service to Henry VIII

MARCHAM PRIMARY SCHOOL NEWS

We have had a busy few weeks in school. We are always keen to enhance the children's learning with visits and experiences and since half term there have been trips to Williams F1, Winchester Science Centre, and The Living Rain Forest.



However, our biggest news is that we were

inspected by the Church of England Education office on Thursday 6th February. Our SIAMS (Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools), a one-day visit led by Mr Gary Price, looked at how the school lives out its Christian vision; how the school community flourishes through that and through Collective Worship; how our children can show 'courageous advocacy', and the impact of RE.

The way that schools are judged in a SIAMS visit has changed since September 2023. We were, for a number of years, graded as Outstanding but these judgements no longer apply and single word gradings have been stopped. Schools are now judged on whether they "live up to their foundation as a church school" and are enabling both pupils and adults to flourish. We are delighted that the Inspectorate have found that we are passionate about our commitment to this, and the report makes very positive reading. We are pleased with the outcomes. Williams F1 Last week, we went on a trip to the Williams Racing centre. In the morning, we did the STEM workshop where we built

noses for the race cars. They had to crumple/fold to protect the driver. We tested them on a machine which used force to push them against a wall. In the afternoon, we went on a tour around 'the world's biggest formula one museum' and we looked at lots of race cars, their seats and the carbon fibre in a car. Finally, we were allowed to go on the stimulator to race against each other in pretend race cars!

Marcham Cricket Club was established in 1906, and joined the Cherwell League in 2021, prior to that they were playing in the Oxfordshire Cricket Association. The Club is a thriving enterprise and runs two teams in the Cherwell League, and it enjoys the support of the Anson Trust. In 2010 the Trust and Marcham locals discussed a variety of options for the future of the Trust and Anson Fields, including relocation towards

Longfields. Eventually, as we know, the field was retained, and a new building – The Marcham Centre – which includes the changing rooms and acts as a club house on match days was commissioned and built by Thomas Homes.

Now that the weather is improving attention for Marcham CC turns to preparing the square for the coming season. "Easter is late this year." I've lost count how many times I have said something like that in recent weeks. To many people it makes no odds when it is. It's a welcome long weekend whenever it comes. But if you have school-aged children (especially those sitting public exams in the summer term), or you are booking a holiday (especially one involving snow), or you just really like lamb, the date of Easter is crucial. Why is Easter late this year? Well, it's not as late as it could be. It can be as late as 25th April or as early as 22nd March. Easter is celebrated on the first Sunday, after the first full moon, on or after the Spring equinox (21st March). So it's down to the moon then. The history of this dating system is quite tedious complex (!). DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

GARDEN WASTE COLLECTION

As I mentioned last month, any residents who have their garden waste removed by the Vale will need to pay online for an annual permit: see **www.southandvale**. **gov.uk/GardenWastePermit** or call 01235 422422. Any brown bins without a valid sticker won't be emptied after 1st April, so please don't delay!



As I'm sure many residents are aware, developers of large housing estates are

required to contribute funds towards nearby community facilities, either as Section 106 ("S106") or as Community Infrastructure Levy ("CIL"). S106 contributions are specific to a particular facility, whereas CIL contributions are much more flexible in how they can be used. What's much less clear to most people, though, is how and when those funds actually get used. Since owners of houses on these newer estates will have effectively contributed toward these funds through their house prices, I thought it worth providing some recent (past year or so) examples of how and where this money is being spent:

- CIL funds from across the Vale were transferred to the Marcham Road Medical Centre in Abingdon, leading to the addition of 4 consulting rooms and 2 examination rooms.
- S106 funds from the development on Anson Field (Marcham Centre, Little Angels nursery, and houses) and conversion of the Institute into housing (Lion Close) were spent on expanding the Primary School.
- S106 funds from the estates on Harding Way, Abbots Grange, and Monk's Walk paid for the bespoke noticeboard outside the Marcham Centre and 2 benches.
- S106 funds from Monk's Walk, Greenwood Grove, Plantation Avenue, and Leas Lane are being spent on the allotments around Marcham, including new fencing at Cow Lane and a growing area by Park Side.
- S106 funds from the Monk's Walk estate have recently been approved for replacing a food chiller at the Village Shop.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR

Hello, happy spring. Depending on when you read this, we might be in purdah, when we are preparing for county council elections, which occur every 4 years or so on 1st May. For me, it is slightly different, as I was elected only last summer, in a by-election, as my predecessor stood down, which means for this division it is less than a year since you last voted. Sorry, but more democracy should be viewed positively!

In addition, the division boundaries are changing this time, which means I will no longer be standing in Marcham, as Marcham is no longer linked with Sutton Courtenay – where I live. Marcham and Shippon (St Helens Without) move across and join with Cumnor. Your new candidate (should you choose to elect him) is local Ricky Treadwell. Look out for him. He is keen to hear your views and to help improve things.

Rob Clegg remains your very capable district councillor.

I think it might also be helpful if I explain what the county council does as opposed to the district council.

The county council runs social care services (the biggest cost and closely linked to the NHS), schools, libraries, education services, highways, roads, paths and transport infrastructure (except national highways), fire and rescue services, strategic, economic and environmental planning, public health, registration and coroner services. Generally public services where there are efficiencies and economies from running them at a county level.

The district council focuses on local services like waste collection

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and recycling, where there is no advantage to running them from afar, or where detailed local knowledge is paramount, for example planning and permission for existing residents and new developments (except regional and national infrastructure projects to remove 'nimbyism'), along with local services like parks, leisure and community facilities (some of these responsibilities also lie with parish councils).

Before I sign off, I should also say that things are changing with the local devolution bill so next time, the district and county councils will probably be merging, and they may well be part of a larger strategic authority, that is intended to help local devolution of power from Westminster. But in the meantime, May 1st is important (in my opinion) to vote for what you think is best for our area. All the best

JUDICIAL REVIEW: we now have a date for our Judicial Review hearing at the High Court - 25th and 26th June. The High Court Judge has ruled that our claim is 'significant' and, as the case is complex, has taken the unusual step of fixing a 'Rolled Up Hearing' where the issues of permission and the substance will be considered together on the same two days. The outcome of the hearing will be available in July.

RECENT CAMPAIGN ACTIVITY: the campaign against SESRO continues with vigour. Meetings: Two meetings were held in March hosted by Sally Povolotsky (to whom many thanks) and GARD, in Drayton and East Hanney.

New: GARD is planning some 40 minute Zoom meetings to introduce people to SESRO issues. The dates and times will be on Facebook soon – please share with your friends. You can email gard.secretary@gmail.com for information and to reserve a place.

Publicity: We are placing more posters and banners – please contact the secretary if you would like any of these for your area. We have delivered leaflets to the houses closest to the proposed reservoir area in Steventon and East Hanney (many thanks to the volunteers who have helped with this).

There are plans for an **Action Day** (Cllr Povolotsky, 5th July probably) and **BALLOONS**: a helium balloon visual barrier near Hanney (May or June). More ideas? Please email **gard**. **secretary@gmail.com**
