NEW PARISH COUNCILLORS

The Parish Council has been operating with a reduced number of members for some while. It is very pleased to have co-opted 3 new councillors. One is Tanya Rosenfeld who has lived in the south of the village, for about 7 years, and has previously served as a Parish Councillor for 3 years between 2019 and 2022. The second is Keely Ewert-Brookes who has lived in the village for 16 years, and too, has previously been a Parish Councillor in 2021/22. The third is Andrew Mason, who happens to live in Abingdon, but close enough to meet the statutory requirements for being a councillor. Andrew's parents live in Marcham, so he is a regular visitor to the village, and takes a great interest in the life of the parish. The Council welcomes them to their new roles. There is one vacancy remaining, so if you are interested in helping the community please contact the clerk or your local councillor to find out more about what is involved.

A415 - 20 MPH SIGNAGE

As mentioned in the last issue queries have been raised with Bloor Homes regarding the removal of the 20 mph signs, and the lack of an entrance gateway. Bloor Homes have stated that their road design works for moving the 30 mph further eastwards were progressing in advance of, or at similar times, to the County Council's plans for a 20 mph limit so their topographical drawings did not include the 20 mph. Bloor Homes have agreed to replace the 20 mph signage, and install the new gateway at the entrance to the village. The wording of 'Marcham please drive carefully will be replaced. White lining at the edge of the footway will be reinstated, as will the 20 mph roundel on the road. It is also hoped that the vehicle activated sign by

MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL the gas governor can be replaced to indicate 20 mph when motorists enter that zone.

CEMETERY WASTE BINS:

POLITE REMINDER

In the cemetery there are 2 large waste bins which are emptied fortnightly by a contractor. One bin is for green waste only, and the other is for general waste such as wrappings, ribbon, paper etc. There is also a 3rd bin which is for the temporary storage of soil from dug graves. There are notices on the lids, indicating what waste goes in which bin. Recently the contractor has had difficulties, as all three bins seem to have been used for waste, and it is all mixed waste, and has not been separated.

The Council would ask residents to ensure that all waste is disposed of correctly by placing it in the appropriate bin. This helps enormously with responsible waste management, as the green waste goes into composting, and the general waste goes for incineration to create energy. Please observe the bin labels.

ST PETER'S CROSSROADS - TRAFFIC SURVEY

The traffic survey has now been carried out. The results show that whilst the average speed of some vehicles is 35-40 mph, there is an alarming number of cars going significantly faster. The Parish Council is progressing with the application to the County Council to try and have the speed limit reduced to 40 mph.

TREES - HARDING WAY

The Parish Council has instructed a tree surgeon to carry out some dead wood clearance works on trees on the public open space in Harding Way. A date for the works is awaited.

WASTE DISPOSAL / GRASS CUTTING

It is that time of year when we are all out cutting grass and managing our gardens. The Council would remind you that the Vale of White Horse District Council provides a successful recycling and waste collection service for all its residents in the district.

Please remember you now need a permit to stick on your brown bin, obtainable from the District Council, if you use this service. In addition, the recycling centre at Drayton is open all week from 8.00 a.m. - 5.00 p.m. every day. Please do not fly tip grass and garden waste on highway verges, private land, paths, in the Arboretum and Anson playing field, as such action interferes with the enjoyment of these areas, and can result in composting grass odours which in turn are a nuisance to those who live nearby.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS **CONSIDERED BY THE COUNCIL**

P25/V0485/LB Convert ground bedroom to kitchen/diner and existing kitchen to downstairs bedroom at 14 Mill Road. The Council had no objections, but did comment that if other works were needed e.g. damp proofing, then they should be considered at the same time, to be able to assess any impact on the listed building.

P25/V0630/LDP Demolition of existing side projection and erection of single storey rear and side extensions, roof extension, and incidental outbuildings at Hitchcopse, Cothill Road, Cothill. Council appreciated that this was an application for a Lawful Development Certificate, but did state that more screening was required if these works went ahead. It was concerned too about further changes taking place without express planning permission being granted.







Marcham hung on to secure their first ever victory in the War Memorial Cup.

The bigger cup shock came when the team beat Berinsfield 3-1 in the North Bucks Cup semi final. Berinsfield sit top of the First division with a perfect record of no defeats this season. But Marcham performed brilliantly throughout the game to take the victory leading to a Final on the 10th May against another first division side in Frilsham and Yattenden.

Aunt Sally

Those of you who successfully answered the 3 questions in the quiz above (or who looked at the end for the answers) will realise that they all are linked to the term 'Aunt Sally'.

There is a pub game commonly associated with Oxfordshire, that has a rather gruesome history. It also has a peculiar name – Aunt Sally. You will be pleased to hear that Marcham has two Aunt



Sally teams who play in the spring and summer. Those with good memories will recall the report on last year's Aunt Sally teams' exploits in the November 2024 issue of MADNews (Vol 46, No 11).

The unsettling history suggests that Aunt Sally developed from the practice of tying a cockerel to a stake and people paying to throw sticks at it. If someone managed to kill the bird, they could take it home for tea. Others suggest that it arose from bored soldiers playing a game where the target was a wooden skittle or doll on Port Meadows, Oxford, during the Civil War. The doll was a caricature of an ugly old woman (sometimes black) with a pipe in her mouth, the aim being to break or knock her pipe out of her mouth. As is often the case, the origins of the game are obscure, but James Masters (https://www.tradgames.org.uk/games/Aunt-Sally.htm) presents a number of theories.

The rules are straightforward, the 'pitch' is on level ground. The dolly is 6" tall and 23/4" diameter. It sits upon a metal pole 21/2' tall (it has no facial features). The competitor stands 30' away and throws 6 sticks which are 18" long and 2" diameter. A point is scored each time the dolly is knocked off the iron platform. Each team of 8 players has 3 legs or 'horses' with each player throwing their 6 sticks. The winners are the team with the highest number of points.

The Oxford & District Aunt Sally Association has been around for 80 years, containing about 120 teams, whereas Marcham plays within the Abingdon & District Aunt Sally League which has been in existence since 1960.



"We could remove the sticky tape that covered our windows protecting against bomb damage, and very soon the street lights would come on again..." an extract from her memories of VE Day 1945 by the late Christine Whild, former resident of Marcham. Imagine that! because thankfully that is all most of us can do. Imagine having no street lights and your windows taped up for years. 80 years ago in May, victory was won in Europe and the country celebrated after years of tyranny and the threat of invasion. During those long years of war the country was called to prayer no less than seven times. From the miracle of Dunkirk in 1940 to D-Day in 1944, the King, Parliament and the Church called the nation to its knees at crucial moments to ask for God's help and deliverance. Those prayers were answered, and much of Europe has largely been at peace ever since. Sadly in eastern Europe in the 1990's and specifically in Ukraine in recent years, that peace has been shattered. But for most of us living in the UK in the last 80 years, our experience has been one free from the threat of bombs and bullets. This is cause for deep thanksgiving and prayer for continued protection into the future. I imagine in these days of increased spirituality many, most even, will chime a note of thanksgiving in their hearts for the blessings God has given us as a nation. We have so much to give thanks for. Just think how different life would be today had things not turned out as they did in 1945. Equally, we all simply long for future generations to thrive in prosperity and peace as we have been so blessed. In that sense, the commemorations this May are a good time to ask, "for what has this peace been granted?"

There will be a service of thanksgiving to mark 80 years since VE Day at 10.30am on the Anson Field in Marcham on Sunday 11th May. All welcome.

VE DAY ANNIVERSARY

Thursday 8th May marks the 80th anniversary of VE Day, an opportunity to reflect on democracies defeating fascism and on an end to conflict in the European continent – topics more pertinent today than we might have expected. As well as a flag raising at Abbey House, anniversary celebrations can be found on South and Vale's local tourism website (southernoxfordshire. com) and the Government's VE/VJ Day website (ve-vjday80.gov.uk).



TOUGHER FINES FOR FLY-TIPPING, LITTERING, AND GRAFFITI

The Government has increased the maximum fines that can be issued to those caught fly-tipping, littering, or making graffiti. As the authority responsible for tackling these problems in the district, the Vale has adopted these higher fines (from 1st April 2025). It's not just those who actively despoil the environment who can be fined: householders who hire someone unregistered to dispose of their waste for them, who then dumps it illegally, can also be fined (up to £600). To check if a waste carrier is registered, please search on the Environment Agency's website: environment.data.gov.uk/ public-register/

CLIMATE ACTION FUND REOPENS

The Vale's Climate Action Fund (CAF) reopens for applications from early May to late June. Local 'not for profit' organisations and town/parish councils can apply for grants up to £10,000 to help tackle climate change or help restore nature in the district. If you'd like to apply, please visit the Vale's website **southandvale.gov.uk** and/or get in touch with me.

NEW TICKETLESS CAR PARK MACHINES

Two car parks in Abingdon – Civic and West St Helen – will soon be trialling ticketless machines for three months. Users will still pay in the same way (cash/card/app), after first entering their vehicle registration and selecting the length of time, but the machines will no longer print a paper ticket. Users will be asked to complete a quick survey, either by scanning the QR code on the machine or by visiting **southandvale.gov.uk/parkingmachinetrial** – the results of the survey will be used determine which system is adopted in future.

MP'S REPORT

It has been a pleasure this month to get out on the doorstep in such glorious weather, and hear your concerns and suggestions directly.

Mega Reservoir (SESRO) – I know that many people who live in Marcham and Abingdon are rightly concerned about the mega reservoir planned by Thames Water. I have repeatedly



called for Thames Water to prove that such a large-scale solution is needed and to fix the leaks in our network before spending £2.2 billion on this proposal.

Health and Social Care Committee work: This month I've heard evidence for our social care and mental health inquiries, including from Wes Streeting. I asked him whether the abolition of NHS England will help achieve the better service we all want. This includes better community care, more prevention (as opposed to treatment), and improved use of digital technology to improve productivity. The details matter, and we need to see more from the government.

Taking the Prime Minister to task: In a committee appearance, I asked Sir Keir why social care appears to have been kicked into the long grass. He agreed that social care is a key enabler for growth, but frustratingly would not commit to bringing forward the review of social care, due to be complete in 2028.

Progress on key infrastructure project: I am delighted that works have started at last on Lodge Hill junction on the A34. This will serve North Abingdon, and relieve pressure on the Marcham interchange, an improvement I have long fought for.

Europe continues to be the elephant in the geopolitical room, with the government still failing to consider a customs union with the EU. Our GDP is an estimated 4% lower as a result of this failed Tory Brexit project. I made this case to Robert Peston on ITV, and will continue to bang the drum on this issue. The world has changed, we should have a different conversation.

Local Elections: Finally, I am pleased that local elections are going ahead in May. This is your opportunity to listen to the candidates and vote for who represent your needs.


