ANNUAL COUNCIL MEETING

The annual meeting of the Council was held on 12th May. The annual meeting is a formal meeting which must be held every year, and covers the election of a Chairman, and appointment of working groups. Mark Harvie was elected Chairman for the next year to May 2026. Various working groups were set up to look at planning applications, allotments, footpaths, and considering future burial space, as well as formal internal administrative groups to review policies, and audit processes.

NEW COUNTY COUNCILLOR

The Parish Council welcomed the newly elected County Councillor for the Division, James Plumb, to the Parish Council meeting. James, as many of the readers will know, lives in Marcham, and was formerly a parish councillor. The Parish Council is the most local level of local government, representing the community, and having been involved previously, James should be aware already of the issues that the parish faces. However, he left the meeting with a list of highway items which he is helping to pursue. These included :

- a speed reduction along the Sheepstead Road and Faringdon Road
- relocating further away the Morland Road footway which is currently too close to the Barrow Close entrance
- the replacement of the 20 mph signage and recalibrating the vehicle activated sign on the A415 to 20 mph, and the general speeds of traffic passing through the village
- protection from vehicles for cyclists/ pedestrians using the footway/cycle track plus dealing with cutting back the grass verge and overgrowth
- Clearance of the culvert which goes under the A415 at the western side of the village to help ensure there is no road flooding next Winter.

James is currently the highway super user for the parish. This means he may be able to help fix problems by using his local knowledge and fast-tracking the process of repairing defects by ordering works direct with the contractor. There are only certain categories of problems such as some potholes, blocked drains, damaged kerbing that can be fast-tracked, but he has a can of spray-paint and has received training by the County Council.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING FOR ELECTORS - 15TH MAY, 2025

The Council was pleased to see residents from the village attend the annual meeting for electors. The meeting is an opportunity for residents to find out more about what is happening in the immediate area where they live, and feel part of the community. The Local Government Act 1972 states that the Chairman of the Parish Council shall preside, so the job of running the meeting fell to Mark Harvie. He gave an overview of the Parish Council and spoke about the grass cutting, work to improve footpaths, a new unique noticeboard and bench

MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL seating funded by art monies given by the local housing developers, the ongoing works to finish off the new play area, and improvements to the allotments. He also listed the grants awarded by the Parish Council over the past year.

> Viv Hutchinson, Head Teacher, gave a very interesting summary of the curriculum and focus of the school since her appointment, and reflected on the things that had been shared at previous annual meetings.

> Robert Clegg, the District Councillor, and James Plumb the newly elected County Councillor, too gave their reports on the key matters happening at the councils where they represent Marcham. Three of the big issues at the moment are the central government's plans for unitary authorities, the proposals by Thames Water for a reservoir and the redevelopment of the Dalton Barracks site.

GRASS CUTTING

This is the first full season of using a new contractor for grass cutting in the parish. The same contractor is emptying the litter bins, and checking the play area too. The new firm, Tactical Facilities Management Ltd, undertakes grass cutting and general maintenance for other Parish Councils at various locations in Berkshire and Oxfordshire, and came recommended from a local parish who also use them. The grass works are being monitored and inspected, so if you spot a particular problem, then please let your local parish councillor or clerk know.

FRAUD WARNING

Matthew Barber, the Police and Crime Commissioner has said that "Investment fraud is one of the most common types of fraud and it can destroy lives and leave people feeling humiliated and helpless. Some feel guilty they were groomed or that their contacts were used to target other victims through social media, but only the fraudsters are at fault. People are being robbed of their life savings and future through more and more sophisticated scams, many using AI impersonating loved ones. I urge those who have been affected to report investment fraud and seek support. I also encourage everyone to continue to heed police advice."

The advice is to be cautious if you are approached via social media, see investment opportunities that mention cryptocurrency, trading or stocks and shares, or uses advertisements with well known celebrities. In order to protect yourself from fraud, the advice is to not be rushed into making decisions, seek advice first from trusted friends or family or professional independent advice, and use the Financial Conduct Authority's Register to check if companies are regulated by them.


We will be repeating the photo competition again next year so keep taking them and save them in readiness for entering in 2026.




Monday 16th June 7.30pm at Marcham Centre **'Isn't it cold in the winter'**

Otmoor, A Wetland Restored


a talk by Peter Barker



This talk looks at what has been achieved in the twenty-eight years since the RSPB took over some not very promising farmland. It covers why the place was special and how we have created the wildlife haven that it is today.

The second half of the talk takes a whistle stop tour through a year on Otmoor reflecting the changes in the

wildlife through the seasons. Peter Barker has been involved with the Reserve as a volunteer warden and wildlife surveyor since the first land was purchased. He also teaches bird identification for the RSPB. He is a retired teacher having taught in Oxford for almost forty years and an artist, photographer and writer. He wrote the *Birds of Otmoor* for the Oxford Ornithological Society.



Marcham Road Health Centre PPG Are you a patient at this practice? This article is written for you



At Marcham Road Health Centre, interest in research is high on the agenda. This helps to identify patients who could benefit from research and also keep up to date with research programmes that can be passed on to patients to help them improve their own health. With this in mind, The Patient Participation Group (PPG), which represents patients, recently held an event where Sleep Research was on the agenda. Advanced Nurse Practitioner, Carley Moore, invited guest speaker, Dr Fiona Tierney, from Oxford Brookes University, to speak to some patients from the practice.

Her approach was to elicit sleep experiences from the audience to enable her to give pragmatic advice and make suggestions to improve their quality of sleep. This prompted a fascinating range of sleep experiences, including; the impact of exercise, smart watches, bright light, shift-working, herbal teas and body rhythms.

She explained how she uses three prompts: Lights, Lions and Tools to help us to manage our own sleep. The Light prompt refers to the Circadian process and she recommends exposure to light especially in the morning, as this is more effective, and to avoid napping for more than 30 minutes. The Lions prompt requires us to ask ourselves, have we done enough exercise, do we have regular meal-times and regular bed-times? Finally, Dr Tierney explained, "it's important that our brain feels it's safe to wind down and go to sleep" which brings us to the Tools category that requires us to consider what we can do to make our brain feel that it doesn't need to 'be on alert'. Things that patients can try are: a regular night-time routine, not watching television an hour before bed-time, having a night-time drink or reading in bed. She emphasised, "We're all different so try some of the above and see what works for you".

All the attendees were asked to complete a simple questionnaire, which will be used to improve future events and to provide information to the Practice & PPG. The participants thanked the PPG for organising the event, Dr Tierney for her talk and Carley Moore for hosting it.

SPORT REPORT

Football

This month's sport review must begin with the outstanding success of the Marcham footballers. This 2024/25 season has been exceptional for both League and Cup achievements.

In the League (North Berks League Division 2) Marcham won 13 of their 20 games with leading goal scorer David Murphy scoring 35 out of 74 goals. Marcham were just 22 goals behind the League winners Woodcote Development and 7 goals ahead of the second placed team, Burghclere First. At the end of this season Marcham are 3rd in the League table with 41 points.Since the 2021/22 season Marcham have climbed from the bottom of Division 3 (now defunct) steadily upwards. Let's hope for even greater success in the forthcoming 2025/26 League season.

In Division 2 there are three cups to be won – The North Berks Cup, the North Berks War Memorial Cup and the North Berks League Cup. As noted above, the latter was won by Woodcote Development. Marcham had a great cup run, winning the remaining two cups.

Both games were played in front of a full crowd of enthusiastic supporters which made a huge difference to the team. To reach the finals of the cup games David Murphy (co-manager) top scored with 12 goals out of 38, closely followed by Sam Ricketts with 11. Alfie Kingsbury had 3, with Dan Barnes (co-manager), Christopher Murphy and Josh Taylor on 2 each. Other Cup scorers included Mason Curtis (team captain), Tom Dowdell, Joshua Rough, Jack Smith, Lewis Wilson and Joshua Bushnell each with one goal. The stats also reveal that Marcham scored more goals than any other team (38) followed a long way behind by Drayton Reserves on 17 goals and Woodcote Development on 12. Whilst goal scoring is clearly important, defence is also crucial to the overall team performance, and whilst stats are difficult to compile for this aspect of the game, in the League we only lost 5 games and drew 2, so well done to all those unsung heroes who kept Marcham in the hunt by keeping 6 clean sheets in the League. In the Cup games we kept 2 clean sheets, only conceding 8 goals overall. Plaudits must also go to the supporters, club officials and wives, partners and/or parents who have 'been there' during the bad times and the good.

All Saints Summer Holiday Club Tues 26 – Fri 29 August 2025 "So Vicar, are we seeing a 'quiet revival' in our churches here?" is the question I've been asked a few times in various ways recently, by church people and non. The background is the recent Bible Society / You Gov survey producing what felt like a surprising result. In 2018, just 4 per cent of 18–24-year-olds (Gen Z) said that they attended church at least monthly. Today, the survey suggests this has risen to 16 per cent, with young men increasing from 4 per cent to 21 per cent, and young women from 3 to 12 per cent. It suggests a shift not just in attendance, but in openness to faith, the Bible and spiritual conversation. There have also been reports of large increases in sales of Bibles in the UK, with the increase again driven by young people. Churches across the country, and across denominations, have been fit to burst at Christmas and Easter services especially in the last few years.

The picture isn't uniform, and it may be too soon after the major hiatus of Covid to diagnose precisely what is going on. But in answer to the questions I've been asked regarding this apparent quiet revival, I've said things like... "I'm pleased to hear some good news of growth for once. However, our parishes here are not exactly flush with Gen Z. The majority of our young people are younger than 18 and nearly all our adults are much older than 24. Nevertheless, I would agree that across our churches we are seeing lots of interest in church services and activities too, gentle even steadily increasing interest. These are pleasing signs of growth". One striking aspect of the quiet revival (if that is what it is) are reports of people being drawn again to the power of the gospel in its strangeness, not its polish, and to its core, not to its periphery. They are interested in a crucified King, in bread and wine as signs of grace, and in a Spirit who convicts, comforts and saves. Interesting! Let's see what develops. DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

FLY-TIPPING

In last month's MAD News I wrote about increased fines for fly-tippers and, in the time between submitting my report and the edition being published, I was alerted to a fly-tipping incident in the Arboretum. The Vale's EnviroCrime team cleared the mess within a couple of days and has since erected signs at that location and at the entrance to Cow Lane, another hotspot for fly-tipping. They are conducting more frequent patrols around the two areas.



RESERVOIR

In early May I visited Thames Water's Clay Compaction Trial (CCT) site for the proposed reservoir to the south of Marcham (SESRO). While it was interesting to see the earthworks up close, the key value of the visit came from discussions with some of TW's experts who joined, particularly the Panel Engineer* and the Ecologist. Together with other local councillors, we grilled them on various aspects of the CCT and of SESRO and were generally reassured by the answers. TW's experts did, however, broadly accept our concerns that the proposed design for SESRO is simply so big that it poses a strategic risk of TW putting 'all its eggs in one basket': should something go wrong with SESRO, for any of a number of reasons, then reliance on it could threaten the water supply of much of the South East. A solution to this problem would be to instead build several smaller reservoirs (say, three reservoirs of around 50 million m3 each) but TW are constrained here by a lack of suitable sites.

* 'Panel' as in a group of people, rather than as in a sheet of metal!

CLIMATE AND ENVIRONMENT

Lastly, I'm pleased to announce that I have an extra role within the Vale: I have recently been appointed Chair of the Climate Emergency Advisory Committee (CEAC). Having been a member of CEAC for two years I'm already very familiar with its purpose and ways of working, but it will be interesting to see what goes on 'behind the scenes' between the Chair, the relevant cabinet member, and officers.

LOCAL ELECTIONS

I'm delighted that the Liberal Democrats have formed a new, majority administration as a result of the local elections on 1 May. I will continue to work closely with the county council and local councillors to ensure that core priorities are delivered on including investments in infrastructure and improvements to education and SEN provision.

ASSISTED DYING

One of the most difficult and personal issues on which we are called to vote is that of assisted dying. I believe that the law should be changed to legalise assisted dying as a choice for terminally ill, mentally competent adults, with the strong safeguards in place to make sure that it only happens if someone has made a genuinely voluntary, clear, settled and informed choice to end their life. The Bill has returned to MPs with amendments which improve oversight and strengthen safeguards. I have received a lot of correspondence on both sides of this debate, and I take all concerns raised into account in my approach to the Bill, in particular focusing on palliative care. I am pleased to see that changes have been made to ensure that palliative care would also be offered when a doctor speaks to a patient about assisted dying.

HILL END

Many of you, especially those with young children, will have been amongst the 23,500 visitors to Hill End Outdoor Education Centre over the past year. It is a fantastic educational facility, recently celebrating its 100 year anniversary, and continuing to develop and improve their facilities and offering. If we succeed, there should be a Public Inquiry with open and unbiased scrutiny. This is what we have been asking for, for over a year. If we don't succeed, Thames Water proceeds to apply for the Development Consent Order (2027, to be decided in 2028).

PUBLICITY: tell the Secretary if you'd like to display a banner or poster. Online leaflets are available about Groundwater effects, GARD's thoughts on a smaller reservoir and a comparision on Thames Water's claims versus reality.

THE PETITION: Sign the GARD / CPRE Petition for a Public Inquiry Stop Thames Water's costly mega-reservoir - fix the leaks! (see 38degrees.org.uk online) currently at about 6100 signatures. Tell your friends to sign - bring it to 6500 before it goes to the government in June.

FUND RAISING: GARD needs to raise funds for its ongoing Campaign. The legal costs for the Judicial Review are very high and have absorbed available resources. Please contact us with your ideas or offering your expertise. Donation details are below.

Thames Water will be pressing on with their publicity and 'consultation' in the summer, with glossy brochures full of pictures of sailing on Farmoor or on imaginary lakes. Look out for their dates (not yet known) and go to all the events to express your views.
