MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL

HOWARD CORNISH ROAD -

SALVATION ARMY TEXTILE BANK

An appeal again to please not leave clothing sacks on the ground next to the textile bank. Any clothing left can become wet and dirty and unsightly. This is regarded as fly tipping which is a criminal offence. The bags are likely to go into municipal waste and will not be recycled. The Salvation Army has indicated that the chute easily becomes blocked by large black bags. Please place clothing in smaller bags or insert it loose. Statistics as to the volume of textile collected in recent months, provided by the Salvation Army are:

February – 741kg March – 757kg April – 1274kg May – 468kg June – 750kg

In addition, over the past 2 years, over 700kg of non textile related fly tipping has had to be removed. The Salvation Army very much appreciates the donations of reusable textiles, but cannot accept non textile items, or duvets and pillows.

So please leave clothing textiles only, by placing them in smaller bags or loosely in the chute, and do not leave bags on the ground. The next nearest bank, is either at Millets Farm, or Tesco Extra, Marcham Road. MARCHAM CEMETERY

The current available space in the cemetery is reducing, and in order to prepare for budgeting for next year, a clear idea of exactly what is required needs to be prepared. The Parish Council has therefore formed a working group to plan for a new burial area. The group will oversee the planning and implementation of a new area, to ensure that it meets the needs of the expanding community, and complies with burial legislation.

The group comprises 3 parish councillors from Marcham, 1 representative from Frilford Parish Meeting, and 3 members of the public. If you are interested in helping plan for a new area for burials, and would like to be one of the 3 members of the public serving on this group, then please contact the clerk to the Council whose details are below.

You need to be willing to give up some of your time. How much depends on you and your commitment to work for your community without being paid. Parish Council meets once a month (except August) usually on the second Monday of the month. You must be 18 or over, be a British Citizen or eligible Commonwealth Citizen, and an elector or worked in the parish, landowner or tenant of land in the parish or resided within 3 miles of the boundary over the last 12 months.

Details of where to send the application are on the form. The deadline for submissions is 15th October 2025. Applications received after that date, or not on the application form will not be considered.

ELECTORAL ROLL

The District Council is carrying out its annual canvass to compile the electoral register that will serve for the next year. You will either receive an email, or a letter in the post, regarding voters at your address. Please respond by following the instructions in the letter, and recording the people who are resident at your address. A new electoral roll will be issued from December 2025.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

P25/V0730/HH Amended drawings for works at Trinafour, Abingdon Road. The Council reiterated its previous comments regarding sight lines and drainage. It did not support a high gabion front wall believing this to be out of context with the street scene. It requested a low fence with internal planting.

P25/V1273/DIS Discharge of Condition no. (4). A demolition Statement and Construction Transport Management Plan for works at Denman College. The Council commented on the Construction Management Plan where the text and map were inconsistent. It reiterated previous comments that it would not wish to see the main construction access via the conservation area and New Road.

DATE OF NEXT COUNCIL MEETING

The next meeting of the Parish Council is Monday 8th September, 2025 at 7.30p.m. in the village hall. Currently it is planned that a representative from Community First Oxfordshire will give a presentation on community-led housing.

JUDITH FONTAINE – A TRIBUTE

Judith Fontaine, a long term Marcham resident, sadly passed away on 30 June

Judith was born in Yorkshire in 1950. She attended primary school in Yorkshire, before moving south to attend Chilton Primary School.

Aged 11, Judith passed the 11 Plus exam to attend Didcot Girls Grammar School. Judith attended secretarial courses at Abingdon College and worked part time in a café whilst attending the college.

Judith then worked at the **UK Atomic Energy Authority's Harwell** site for more than a decade. She initially joined the typing pool, before working as a personal secretary for several scientists. She was praised for her superb organisational skills.

During this time she met Peter Fontaine, the son of a neighbour in Chilton. Peter immediately found that she was very interesting to talk to and they were married in July 1971 and moved to **Tower Close**, Marcham, where they lived for the next 54 years.

Judith and Peter were made welcome from their first days in Marcham. They received huge support from their neighbours in Tower Close over the years. They and many of their neighbours all moved into the end of Tower Close as the houses were being built in 1971. They felt like they were part of an extended family, seeing their neighbours' children grow up and have children of their own.

Judith left her career at Harwell to spend seven years as a full time mother, taking care of her son Paul. Paul remembers her as always extremely caring, as well as strict when she needed to be. She taught him about history and politics, and encouraged him to learn about the world.

Judith then worked part time as a classroom assistant at **Marcham Primary School**. She later worked as a receptionist and administrative assistant at **Abingdon Community Hospital Physiotherapy Department**.

Judith and Peter were very active in the local community in and around Marcham for many years. They delivered **MADNews** before also taking over the distribution management for over 22 years which also included collating and stapling 1000 issues each month around the dining table before the printing method was changed! Judith was a stalwart with the teapot at the MADNews tea parties.

Judith and Peter were both on the **Parent Teacher Association at Marcham School**, and Peter was also treasurer for some years.



They were dedicated committee members of the **Marcham Society**, with Peter having acted as treasurer and Judith as secretary. During the production of Marcham Society's book in 2009, *Marcham Remembered*, Judith and Peter took responsibility for the writing and production of the chapter on *Occasions and People*.

Peter volunteered in the Marcham Village Shop for many years with a regular shift behind the counter.

These contributions resulted in them sharing the **Parishioner of the Year Award** in May 2018.

During nearly 54 years of marriage, Judith and Peter always had plenty to talk about, but they never exchanged a cross word. Peter was always impressed by Judith's wisdom, intelligence and kindness.


Judith is very sadly missed by all who knew her, but we are all grateful to her, for enriching our lives in so many ways over the years.


out. And, for the tinier members, along with nappies and baby wipes, we also have a new selection of baby products including Farleys Rusks and Organix Carrot Sticks.





SPORT REPORT

BOWLS

community

The mention of bowls brings to mind Sir Francis Drake, acting very cool on Plymouth Hoe by insisting on finishing his game of bowls before seeing off the King of Spain's invading Armada (with a little help from the British summer weather).

Evidence from around 3200BC in Egypt shows children throwing round stone balls possibly at a target, but, more reliably, it was certainly a Roman pastime. Hence the idea of hitting a target with another object, as in bowls and variants thereof, has been around for centuries. Marbles, quoits, skittles, pétanque (French, aka boules), bocca (Italian), rolle bolle (Belgian), ula maika (Polynesia) and bowls all have this common theme. Differences arise from the surface on which the game is played, grass (real or artificial), carpet, earth, or crushed stone, with the balls (bowls) made from stone, steel or wood, which are either rolled or thrown towards a target (usually a smaller ball). Contemporaneously wood has been replaced by bowls made from phenol formaldehyde (a synthetic resin) as wooden bowls made from lignum vitae tend to split, but, confusingly, are still called 'woods'. The 'woods' are almost spherical, but asymmetrically flattened side to side, with one side slightly heavier (the bias). This allows the skilful player to roll their wood around an obstruction such as an opponent's wood.

In Britain the game of bowls is recorded from 1299 on a green, still in existence, in Southampton. Henry VIII banned 'common people' from playing bowls as it took time away from their required archery practice. There are variations of the game - lawn bowls, played outside on a flat pitch using bowls up to 4lb in weight, crown green bowls, played on a pitch raised slightly in its centre found particularly in northern England using lighter bowls up to 3lb in weight and indoor bowls. Indoor bowls can be further subdivided into table bowls, carpet bowls and short mat bowls.

Crown green bowls appears slightly anarchic as, compared with lawn bowls which is played in lanes on the green, crown green is played in any direction (up/down, side to side, diagonally) and with complicated rules regarding accidental collisions with woods from another games being played simultaneously. The green itself does not have the immaculate smooth, level surface associated with lawn bowls

Table bowls is played on a snooker table with a short ramp down which the bowl is delivered. Carpet bowls and short mat bowls are both played on artificial green surface that can be unrolled in almost any village hall. The difference is that carpet bowls has a shorter mat, smaller bowls and no fenders at the end.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT SUSTAINABILITY SUCCESS

It was great to see the Vale recognised for its efforts on sustainability earlier in the summer, not once but twice. Statistics recently published by Defra for 2023-2024 showed that the Vale had the second-highest rate across the south of England of household waste sent for reuse, recycling, or composting; we were narrowly beaten only by our neighbours in South Oxfordshire. Soon



after, Climate Emergency UK published its annual scorecard of all councils, with the Vale now in 9th place for district & city councils (out of over 160 nationwide). Thank you to everyone who helped make this happen!

RESERVOIR COSTS

In mid-July, my colleague Andy Cooke (District Councillor for Drayton) wrote a series of three excellent articles for the Oxford Clarion about SESRO, the proposed mega-reservoir to the south of Marcham. These examined (1) the purported need for SESRO, (2) the risks associated with it, and (3) the likely cost of construction. I won't attempt to summarise them all, as they were deliberately written as 'long reads' exploring each topic in detail, but I strongly encourage residents to look them up if you haven't already. In the third article, though, Cllr Cooke predicted that the cost of constructing SESRO would rise well above the values predicted at the time; he points to the work of Professor Bent Flyvbjerg, an expert in 'mega-projects' around the world, who has demonstrated that construction of huge infrastructure like SESRO practically always overruns in time and cost.

It took less than a month for Cllr Cooke's prediction - that the cost of SESRO would increase dramatically – to be fulfilled. Thames Water announced in mid-August that the expected construction cost had tripled, from £2.2 billion to £6.5 bn. This is unlikely to be the end of the story: mega-project costs typically continue to rise during construction. All this comes at the opportunity cost of not building other infrastructure, such as the Severn-Thames Transfer pipeline, which would be far cheaper, quicker, more effective, and less risky than SESRO. It will ultimately fall on residents to pay for SESRO through higher bills. The Vale continues to oppose Thame Water's misguided proposal.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Poor communication is one of the key reasons people switch off from politics, especially at the local level. That's why I've always made it a priority to keep residents informed about developments in our area as they happen. Over the summer, we saw some good — if occasionally slow — progress on several local issues:

Following the completion of works near the A34 interchange, the newly improved section of footpath remained closed for an extended period due to a failed safety



inspection. This caused significant inconvenience for residents trying to travel into Abingdon. After a back-and-forth between myself, County Council officers, and the developer, I'm pleased to report that the path has now reopened, albeit with temporary safety measures in place until full remedial works are completed. We don't yet have a confirmed timeframe for these works, but I'll keep residents updated.

In Marcham, several residents raised concerns about unsafe parking near the junction of North Street, Mill Road, and the A415. In response, I've arranged for white junction protection markings to

be installed on both sides of the junction. These markings, which extend 10 metres from the junction, are designed to improve visibility and discourage parking in unsafe spots. We'll need to monitor how effective they are, but I hope they help alleviate the issue. If not, I'll continue to push for further improvements.

By the time you read this, the A420 between Kingston Bagpuize and Besselsleigh will have been resurfaced, but as we head into autumn, my focus will shift to the A415 and ongoing concerns around road safety, traffic, and conditions in both Frilford and Marcham. I plan to request an update on the A415 safety review — part of the County Council's 'Vision Zero' initiative — at the September full council meeting and will share any developments with residents. I'm also awaiting further details on the Frilford Lights Scheme and will be pressing the relevant Cabinet member for an update.

MP'S REPORT

RESERVOIR JUDICIAL REVIEW

This dismissal of the request for a judicial review of the SESRO project is disappointing given the serious and as yet unaddressed concerns about this scheme. We understand CPRE and SAFERWaterS intend to appeal this decision. Whatever the outcome of this appeal, the Secretary of State still has the power to hold a Public Inquiry should he wish, and Oxfordshire Lib Dems continue to call for full public scrutiny of this plan for the second largest reservoir in the UK.

CONGESTION CHARGE

We welcome action to reduce the traffic in Oxford, reducing journey times and improving the efficiency of public buses. However, we also want to make sure that Marcham residents can still access vital services and amenities. We are pushing for rural bus routes to be subsidised with revenues from the congestion charge scheme. Parents also frequently tell us of struggles with school buses. Routes currently don't always operate at convenient times, and the cost of school buses for post-GCSE students is high. We would like to see congestion charge revenue used to invest in school buses to help families across the constituency cope with the ongoing cost of living crisis.

NDA CAMPAIGN WIN

Layla has been the lead voice in parliament pushing for nondisclosure agreements (NDAs), to be banned in cases of sexual abuse, harassment and bullying, ever since Oxford students first raised the issue in 2021.

She has promoted the voices of victims in parliament and the press, engaged with ministers of the previous government, and this one, to take action and develop workable legislation. Layla has brought together a cross-party campaign to ensure the government could not ignore this. The practice will now finally be banned.

A34 SAFETY

We have joined other MPs in raising concerns around road safety on the A34, writing to the Roads Minister on the issue. Short slip roads, no hard shoulder, and poor quality of road surface means that the A34 is a particularly dangerous road. Undertaking National Highways' proposed A34 North and South of Oxford study will be

fundamental to the lasting improvement of this key transport route. We are strongly pushing for this study to be completed, and to ensure that the A34 is included in the upcoming Road Safety Strategy.
