# COUNCIL – LAST CHANCE TO APPLY

The Parish Council reviews grant requests annually during its November meeting. If there is a deserving organisation that benefits Marcham residents and is considering applying for a grant, please use the application form available in the publications section on the Council's website: www.marchamparishcouncil. gov.uk. Be sure to include a copy of your organisation's accounts. The Council's grant policy is also available on the website. The deadline for submissions is 15th October, 2025. Applications received after this date or not submitted on the application form will not be considered.

#### **MARCHAM CEMETERY**

The Parish Council has formed a small working group to investigate and plan for a new burial area. If you are interested in helping in the village plans for the future, and would like to join the group, then please contact the clerk to the Council whose details are below.

#### **OVERHANGING SHRUBS**

The Parish Council has had reports of footways and pavements being affected by shrubs and hedges that are overhanging. It is appreciated that occupiers may not necessarily be aware of the difficulties. Where growth overhangs a public path or highway, it is the landowner's responsibility to cut it back. The Council would ask for assistance from landowners, to cut any overgrowth back, if you find your property is one of those causing problems.

#### **ALLOTMENT RENT COLLECTION**

The Clerk will soon be collecting allotment rents for the year 25/26. It would be helpful in due course, if tenants could arrange to transfer the rent amount due straight into the Council's account via online transfer. Details of the amount payable will be available shortly. Any tenant not having on line banking can still send a cheque payable to Marcham Parish Council for the amount due to the Clerk's address at 90 Howard Cornish Road, Marcham.

# APPEAL TO BE CONSIDERATE TO NEIGHBOURS

As Halloween approaches, children may be eager to go out trick or treating. While this is usually a fun activity, it can be unsettling for some residents who receive unexpected visitors. If you plan to go out, please respect those who do not wish to participate. For those who receive unexpected callers, ensure your door chain or bar is secured before opening the door. Only allow entry to individuals whose identity you are comfortable with. For police assistance, call 101 or dial 999 in an emergency.

# **ELECTRIC BLANKET TESTING**

With autumn and winter approaching, now

is the perfect time to make sure you're ready for the colder nights ahead. Oxfordshire County Council is reminding residents about free electric blanket testing happening across the county this month.

Last year, over 30% of blankets tested by the Council did not pass the safety check – so it's really important to have yours tested before winter. You can book your free electric blanket test today to stay safe and warm this winter on the Oxfordshire County Council website, or by calling 01865 519 800 (and selecting option 4). Dates in October are:

# **PLANNING APPLICATIONS**

The Parish Council has considered the following applications.

P25/V1709/LB and P1745/HH Proposed alterations to first floor windows on north elevation at Marcham Park (formerly Denman College). The Council had no comment.

**P25/V1846/AG** Prior notification of new agricultural track and removal of single bay from existing agricultural building at Manor Farm, Mill Road. The Council had no comment.

P25/V1550/FUL Demolition of existing dwelling and garage and erection of replacement self-build dwelling, separate annexe and garage at Snowdrop Cottage, (formerly Hitchcopse) Cothill Road. The Council was concerned about adequate screening, and it did not wish the annexe to become a separate independent dwelling. The site is very close to Cothill Fen, so the Council sought assurances that drainage from the site would not affect the fen in any way

#### MRS HUTCHINSON SAYS GOODBYE ....

How time flies! It is hard to believe that I have been head at Marcham School for 18 years. It doesn't seem that long ago that I walked into the small, 4 class school with 4 teachers looking at me, expectantly, on the first INSET day. Since then, we have become one-form entry, with a class allocation for each year group, an extension for our reception classroom and an additional classroom block built. When I arrived, I was the only visible minority in school but now we have a board celebrating the heritage and identity of our many pupils whose roots are from all around the world. It is a beautiful and enriching thing. Part of our vision statement talks about our children "contributing positively to a fast-changing, vibrant society" and it is hoped that we are beginning to do so and reflect that.

Since 2007, we have been through 6 OFSTED inspections, 4 SIAMS inspections and come out of each of them unscathed and often smiling. But that is not what marks us out or even what drives us. Our vision at Marcham Primary School has evolved over the years but it is embraced by the whole school community and underpins all that we do. It is rooted in our school story – that of Noah's Ark – and our tag-line is *Living and learning with Faith, Community and Hope*. There are many things, as school leader, that have brought me much joy but I have been proudest when I've seen our children giving their learning their best shot (faith), serving those around them (community) and seeing them do things that will make the world a better place (hope). It's what we are about, and I have been delighted when it is seen in action. It is the Marcham way...

It has been an honour to serve as headteacher at Marcham School and doing so has been an enormous part of my life. However, I haven't led alone and I'd like to give a virtual hug to so many of you. Thank you to those who have served as governors or on the PTFA committee, and have given freely and generously of your time and efforts to help the school be the best that it can be. Many of you as parents or members of the community have volunteered and offered time and given help and general assistance, heard children read, run after-school clubs and helped out on school trips and visits. There are also many of you who have contributed to the school's success through simple kind words, deeds or supporting financially by coming to our fayres and fêtes. There are so many people to thank - and I am avoiding mentioning names - but a special mention has to go to Jill Rowe and Nick Weldon for all their dedication, generosity of spirit and willingness to serve. They have helped to maintain the special relationship that exists between the church and the school, which is also a beautiful thing. Lastly, enormous gratitude goes to our school staff for their passion, commitment and fortitude. Day after day, they come with new and renewed enthusiasm to lead, direct and guide the children academically, socially, physically and emotionally. Thank you. There is that saying: "It takes a village to raise a child" and I do believe that it has been us all working together that has made Marcham CE Primary School the special place it is.

I have to admit that I'm still in a bit of denial that I am actually leaving: it is strange for me to think that I won't be at Marcham at the start of this academic year. But I have been given the most wonderful send-offs at school: children, ex-pupils, parents, friends of the school and colleagues have said things that have made me feel both humble and special. Your gifts have left me staggered by your generosity and I thank you from the bottom of my heart. I have loved my time and work at Marcham and I too have benefited by seeing my own personal growth and development as I have aimed to promote the growth and development of the school community. I also know that I have made friends for life.

After 18 years, however, it's time for a change - both for the school and for me. The school could not be in safer hands as Lindsay Priddle takes the helm, supported by Emma Callahan, and I am genuinely excited about its future. All the very best is wished for you as parents, friends and supporters; for our dedicated staff and, of course, for our wonderful children who, I pray, will fill the world with light.

# **COMMUNITY GRANTS**

A reminder that Marcham Community Group (MCG) provides grants to community groups within the village. These grants are totally funded from bar profits generated from the village hall bar. Marcham Community Trading Limited (MCT) manages the bar, with all its staff, including Geoff Dix and Trevor Hill as its Directors, being volunteers. MCT's profits at the end of the year are donated via a Gift Aid arrangement to MCG for the purpose of grant giving.

A total of over £27,000 has been paid out in grants since the awarding of grants commenced in January 2023. These have included grants

to the cricket club for about £15,000, including a recent £5,000 towards the purchase of a brand new square roller, replacing the historic Big Bertha', which has amazingly performed this task 'year in, year out', despite its decades of work, the survival of every winter, and of course the enjoyment of youngsters who dreamt of one day sitting on her when moving!



Other grants have included £4050 to Marcham School; £3800 to Marcham Football Club;£1450 to Marcham Community Mini-Bus; £1250 to the Church's Children's 'Friday Club'in lieu of room hire at the 'Centre'; £500 to Sweet Briars Resident Association; £300 to the Church's Flower Festival and £250 to the Harmony Inspires choir.

MCG and MCT are keen to receive new grant applications from any groups. As the above shows, the grant applied for can be as little or as much as needed. The fund has a considerable sum set aside, including further profits from the bar for the 2024-25 financial year. These profits are to a large extent generated by you, so it's only right and proper that these are used by community groups to support activities within the village.



# The Autumnal Gossip of the Wasp Nest By a nosy garden gnome with excellent hearing



As September tiptoes in wearing a scarf and sipping pumpkin-spiced everything, the wildlife garden begins its annual transformation. Flowers fade into dramatic seed heads like ageing rock stars, leaves burst into autumn colours as if auditioning for a foliage fashion show, and the days grow shorter — because even the sun needs

But while humans are busy Instagramming coloured leaves and debating whether it's

too early for mulled wine, something far more scandalous is happening in the wasp nest.

Yes, that papery penthouse tucked under your shed roof is not just a buzzing nuisance—it's a hotbed of autumnal secrets.

Secret #1: The Queen's Retirement Plan. By October, the reigning queen has stopped laying eggs and is sipping fermented fruit like a tipsy monarch at a harvest festival. She's done her bit. Her legacy? A battalion of grumpy worker wasps with no job security and a sugar addiction. They now spend their days gate-crashing picnics and interrogating your jam sandwich.

Secret #2: Indian Summer Shenanigans. A warm spell in late September – classic Indian summer – confuses everyone. Wasps think it's spring again and start redecorating the nest. "Let's expand the nursery!" they buzz, ignoring the fact that winter is basically peeking through the curtains. Meanwhile, the garden's confused daffodils pop up like, "Did we miss something?"

Secret #3: The Great Leaf Conspiracy. Coloured leaves aren't just pretty-they're nature's way of distracting you from the fact that your lawn is now currently 80% of the compost heap. The wasps, however, see them as camouflage. They hold secret meetings beneath maple leaves, plotting their final sugar raids before November turns them into frozen garden confetti.

Secret #4: Seed Head Surveillance. As flowers fade, seed heads become the new hangout spots. Wasps perch on them like tiny bouncers, watching the seasonal cycles unfold. "Oi, that squirrel's back," one mutters. "He's burying acorns again. Classic." The seed heads, meanwhile, whisper among themselves about which plants will make it to spring and which are just pretending.

Secret #5: The Harvest Festival Heist. Every year, the local wildlife garden hosts a harvest festival. There are apples, cider, and enough baked goods to feed a small village. Wasps treat it like Ocean's Eleven. They coordinate aerial manoeuvres, distract toddlers with decoy buzzing, and make off with half a pear tart before anyone notices.

**The Final Buzz**. By November, the nest is quiet. The workers have succumbed to cold nights and existential dread. The new queens have flown off to hibernate in your attic insulation. The cycle resets. And while you rake leaves to add more variety to the compost heap, and sip tea, the secrets of the wasp nest remain tucked away – until next year, when the gossip begins anew.

So next time you admire the autumn colours or marvel at the seed heads in your wildlife garden, remember: somewhere nearby, a wasp is judging your snack choices and planning its next move.

And honestly? It's probably winning.

# **ALL SAINTS' & ST LUKE'S CHURCHES**

The annual season of remembrance is approaching. There will be a Service of Light for Loved Ones at St Luke's Garford at 6pm on Sunday 2nd November with Revd Prebendary Jane Haslam. This will be a time of quiet reflection and prayer for the bereaved. A week later there will be services on Remembrance Sunday (9th November), starting at 10am at All Saints Church Marcham, concluding at the wayside cross at 11am, and in Garford at the village war memorial at 12 noon. All welcome.

But additionally this autumn, we will be commemorating an event that happened 1700 years ago at Nicaea, an ancient city in present day Turkey. In 325AD, about 250 church leaders from across the world came together for the First Ecumenical Council. They sought to resolve disputes about the identity and ministry of Jesus, who had become, and remains to this day, the most influential person in history. They studied the Scriptures, prayed and debated for nearly three months, after which the Nicene Creed was written, one of the foundational statements of Christian belief. It is still shared across most Christian traditions, and is repeated in Christian gatherings all over the world to this day. Not many things have stood the test of time quite like that. On Wednesday 12th November Revd Dr Justyn Terry from Wycliffe Hall Oxford will give a talk at All Saints Church on The Nicene Creed – historical and theological importance for today. # DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

# **DALTON BARRACKS REDEVELOPMENT**

I expect most residents are aware that the land at Dalton Barracks is due for redevelopment into a "Garden Village" once the military vacate the site in a few years' time; public engagement events were held, including at the Marcham Centre, in November last year. With the outputs of the engagement now largely complete, the Defence Infrastructure Organisation (DIO) and their partners are preparing for the next steps:



1) An Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) Scoping report is expected soon, which is a precursor to the actual EIA report. The purpose of EIA Scoping is to identify key issues to be assessed in detail, which could include impacts on biodiversity, local flood risk, and visual appearance. It's worth noting that the EIA Scoping will be written in the context of the "worst case scenario", and not necessarily what is planned, so please don't panic when this is eventually published!

2) The key themes that emerged from the public engagement were around land use (amenities & open spaces) and movement (road traffic & active travel). The DIO are organising workshops to explore these topics in more detail; these won't be open to the public but rather will be attended by a small group of representatives, including me. If you have any particular questions or opinions you'd like me to raise during these workshops then please contact me, preferably via email.

# **A415 AIR POLLUTION**

Residents living around the A415 through Marcham are likely aware that the area is designated as an Air Quality Management Area (AQMA), due to the volumes of traffic travelling through a relatively enclosed space. Sensors have been in place for several years and show a steady decrease in pollution levels, but I know from many residents that this trend does not reflect their lived experience, especially around the tight bend on Packhorse Lane. The national legislation around AQMAs is clear that they must be formally revoked after a certain time of such decreases, but this does not necessarily mean that the sensors must be removed: I have managed to secure an agreement from the Vale's Environmental Services team that they will remain in place and be monitored for the foreseeable future, regardless of the status of the AQMA.

# **COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT**

Starting with an issue outside of the division but one that will no doubt have a significant impact on local residents. At a meeting of the Oxfordshire County Council Cabinet on Wednesday 10th the Liberal September, Democrat approved administration plans to introduce a temporary Congestion Charge in Oxford. This was despite a recent consultation on the subject, to which more than 7,000 people responded, indicating that two-thirds of residents opposed such a scheme. Even



more frustrating was the fact that as local councillors – elected to represent our communities – we were not even given a vote on such a controversial scheme. Under the plans, which will come into effect by early November, users will be charged £5 for driving through a number of zones in and around the city centre. There are various exemptions to the scheme and a number of permits available for local residents, so do be sure to check how it will impact you by visiting the County Council's website www.oxfordshire.gov.uk. Turning to local issues, at the meeting of full council in September

I questioned the Cabinet Member for Transport Management on two road issues facing the local area: the delayed A338 Frilford Lights Scheme and the planned safety review of the A415 through Frilford and Marcham. On the former, it was confirmed that a report detailing options for the scheme should (finally) be completed by the end of September, so I will provide a further update once this has been finalised.

On the safety review of the A415, I was told this should be finalised towards the end of the year with proposals being brought forward for consultation shortly thereafter. I also pressed on the possibility of introducing a weight limit for HGVs along the A415 and was able to get the Cabinet Member to agree to meet with me to discuss the feasibility of conducting a study into this, which I will keep residents updated on.

#### MP'S REPORT

# **BOTLEY WEST SOLAR PROPOSAL**

Many residents have written in about this proposal and we continue to raise serious concerns about the size and scale of this proposed solar farm, which would see large areas of Green Belt and agricultural land impacted in Cumnor parish.

The Planning Inspectorate, rightly asking the developer a significant number of questions about the proposal, particularly in relation to the Southern Site in the parish. We were disappointed that the Planning Inspectorate rejected requests for a full site visit to the Southern Site at Farmoor Valley, but we welcome their decision to visit Hill End Outdoor Education Centre, which provides valuable learning and outdoor education activities for children across Cumnor and more widely across Oxfordshire. There will be Open Hearings for anyone who wishes to attend or follow these on Wednesday 8 to Friday 10th October 2025. # **ABINGDON SEWAGE WORKS VISIT**

Thames Water continues to cause much concern to many residents – both for their track record in keeping our rivers clean but also the alarming increases in bills. In July, Layla visited Abingdon Water Treatment Works with local councillors and Thames Water representatives to see how sewage should be managed when systems are properly resourced. Rubbish is filtered out, water is carefully treated through a series of tanks, and microbes are used to safely clean the water before it is released back into local watercourses. However, heavy rainfall can overwhelm facilities like this, leading to sewage spills. It's clear that we need to invest more in our water treatment infrastructure and press our water providers to focus on fixing the leaks and stopping the sewage discharges. On the visit, Thames Water explained the practical steps we can all take- primarily, making sure we only flush the '3 Ps' down our toilets (pee, poo, and paper).

# **OUR LADY'S ABINGDON CLOSURE**

Like many local families, we were shocked at the suddenness of the closure of Our Lady's Abingdon, and appreciate just how worrying it is for families trying to secure school places at short notice during the summer holidays. Oxfordshire County Council were quick to respond, and the schools admissions teams have been working hard to help secure new school places. We have written to the Secretary of State at the Department for Education raising concerns about how this situation was handled, and calling for stronger regulation around independent school closures, to ensure that families are better protected in future.

# LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION

There are currently three proposals being developed for how local

government in Oxfordshire could be reorganised.

One would create a single countywide unitary, replacing all six councils with a single authority. This is being promoted by Oxfordshire County Council.

A second option would create two unitaries- a North Oxfordshire Council (Cherwell, Oxford City and West Oxfordshire) and a Ridgeway Council (South Oxfordshire, Vale of White Horse, and West Berkshire). This is being promoted by the Vale of White Horse District Council.

The third would create three unitaries, with Oxford City on expanded boundaries and separate northern and southern councils (including West Berkshire). This is being promoted by Oxford City Council, though it doesn't appear to be a very good fit with the Government's criteria. The councils have each carried out informal public consultations and will be submitting their detailed cases to the Government later this year. There will then be formal consultation with the public before a final decision is made next year.

#### HALVING YOUR ENERGY BILLS

Energy bills remain a huge challenge for households. The Liberal

Democrats are campaigning nationally to halve bills by 2035, focusing on making homes cheaper to heat and fixing the way energy prices are set so consumers benefit fairly.
