CHRISTMAS TREE – VILLAGE GREEN

A very big thank you goes again to Andrew MacLean, of AD MacLean Tree Management Ltd of Kingston Road, Frilford www. admtrees.co.uk for the very kind donation of the Christmas tree on the village green. It looked very splendid over the festive season and brought cheer to the parish.

CHRISTMAS TREE RECYCLING

A reminder that you can put out your real Christmas tree for recycling when you no longer need it. It can go out with your brown garden waste bin, provided it is less than 1.8m or 6 feet tall. Please cut it into sections if it is very big. It can also be left at the hardstanding area by the Textile bank in Howard Cornish Road. The last day for depositing your tree adjacent to the textile bank will be Tuesday 13th January, 2026. If you prefer, and happen to be visiting Millets Farm, you can leave it there by Saturday 10th January at the latest.

COUNCIL TAX 2026/27

The Parish Council has been preparing its budget for the next financial year, and will be discussing the council tax figures at its next meeting on Monday 12th January.

Sheepstead Road/Faringdon Road proposed speed reduction to 40 mph

Residents will remember back in April, the Parish Council advising that it had started the process to try and persuade Oxfordshire County Council to reduce the speed limit along the Faringdon Road and Sheepstead Road. An assessment of speed followed, with the result that the County Council, in July, indicated that a speed limit of 40 mph could in principle, be introduced.

The County Council has a limited budget and it could not immediately fund the project itself. There were numerous other projects around Oxfordshire, all of which required support from the County Council. The Parish Council has been wondering how best to progress and fund this speed reduction. Bloor Homes, who are constructing the new development south of the A415, has handed some funds to the Vale of White Horse District Council as part of the planning process, for the benefit of the parish. They have approved the release of £15,000 to cover the costs of these improvements to road safety, which will significantly help not only Sheepstead Road and Faringdon Road, but St. Peter's cross roads where there have been two accidents in recent months. Discussions continue with the County Council to progress this project. If anyone would like to know more about community infrastructure funding and its use, then please contact the Parish Council.

VILLAGE VACANCIES

Vacancies exist on the Parish Council. The Council is a busy tier of government working hard for the village and wider parish. Councillors are the first contact point for anyone with concerns or ideas. Over the past year or so, they have been busy planning and providing a new play area. More recently they have been involved with two new bench seats designed by Suzanne O'Driscoll, (artist who prepared the Marcham Centre artwork) and

a new noticeboard outside Marcham Centre which are just about to be installed.

The current projects are the relocation of the Morland Road footpath at the entrance into Barrow Close to help with safety. Oxfordshire County Council is working on a design for that, and hopefully the works will be done by the end of March 2026. Also, Councillors have been working on a project to resurface and improve the footpath from the Churchyard to the cemetery, and alongside the Anson field. An application for funding for the paths is currently under consideration by the Vale of White Horse District Council, and it is hoped that the resurfacing can take place in the better weather next year.

Future ideas, are a bus shelter at the Duffield Place eastbound (Abingdon) bus stop, possible lighting on the Harding Way path, and possible improvements to the war memorial area. Help is needed on all village projects, so if you have a little time to spare, please speak to a local councillor or attend a Council meeting to find out more about what is involved.

SCHOOL ADMISSIONS – ENTRY TO PRIMARY OR INFANT SCHOOL SEPTEMBER 2026

If you are a parent or carer of a child 3 or 4 years old then you need to apply for a primary school place now. This is for children born between 1st September 2021 and 31st August 2022 (inclusive). You still have to apply even if your child already attends a nursery attached to your preferred school. 
Cut 8 thick slices of bread into triangles and butter on one side.

Layer in a dish, butter-side up and sprinkle with sultanas and cimmamon, finishing with layer of bread.

Make a custard by warming 350 ml milk and 50 ml of cream until small bubbles forming around the edge of the pan. Pour onto two beaten eggs whisked with 18 g of sugar.

Pour the strained custard over the bread, sprinkle with nutmeg and more sugar, and leave for 30 minutes.

Bake for 30-40 mins or until the custard has set and the top is golden brown.



SPORT REPORT

MARCHAM FOOTBALL

Marcham Football is mostly continuing its good fortune. At the time of writing (2 weeks before Christmas) Marcham Reserves have won their last two games in the North Berks War Memorial Cup, and Marcham First are currently top of the table having won 6, drawn 1 and lost 1. Sadly the Vets have not won a match since the beginning of November and have one more game scheduled before Christmas - come on Marcham!

WORLD FOOTBALL

Some will be excited by the news that the Jules Rimet Trophy (1930 - 1970) as was, and now the FIFA World Cup Trophy (1974 - present) will be contested this year (2026) in the United States of America, Mexico and Canada. The most northerly venue is in Vancouver (with Toronto only the second one in Canada) and the most southerly being Mexico City (3 venues in Mexico). The USA boasts 11 host cities.

Those with long memories will recall that the original (Jules Rimet) trophy was stolen in 1966 just before the world cup started (when England hosted and won the trophy) and was found a week or so later wrapped in newspaper in a hedge by a dog called Pickles. When Brazil won the trophy for the third time in 1970, they were allowed to keep it. However, just before Christmas 1983, it was stolen again and has never been recovered. This is the new trophy. It is 13.5 pounds of 18 carat gold worth about £183,000



Forty-eight countries will contest the trophy, divided into 12 pools of 4 countries each. Of the home nations, England are in Pool L, Scotland in Pool C. At the time of writing, Wales and Northern Ireland each have a play-off match, and if they win those they will have to play each other, so there is a possibility that one other home nation may play in the World Cup.

The price of tickets recently revealed by FIFA has caused much controversy as it is many times higher than the previous world cup and more than they had originally quoted. Furthermore, FIFA have not categorically ruled out dynamic pricing.

For those who do not find football enthralling, you might consider having a holiday somewhere with no electronic signal between 11th June and 19th July.

CLOSER TO HOME

Those who regularly walk the playing field may have noticed that Big Bertha – the roller for the cricket square – has a smaller sibling sitting alongside her. Big Bertha has been retired after 35 years of faithful and reliable service to the cricket club. Big Bertha was built at Green's works in Leeds in 1968. The records for most of the motors produced there have been lost and its early life is a mystery. It came to Marcham from a second-hand company in Gloucester and now sits looking towards Marcham Primary School through their hedge.




Dr Lois Oliver is Professor in History of Art at the University of Notre Dame in London, and a Visiting Lecturer at the Courtauld Institute.

Snowflakes, Sass, and Suburbs: Life in the Winter Urban Wildlife Garden

When most humans retreat indoors for winter, the urban wildlife garden kicks into its real prime-time programming an ice-cold reality show starring the city's scruffiest, furriest, and most feathered personalities.

The Squirrels: Acrobatics, but Petty

The squirrels, who spent autumn stuffing acorns into every conceivable crevice (including the electric meter box, which the landlord still insists was "vandals"), now devote winter to competitive bird-feeder heists. They approach it with the intensity of Olympic athletes and the moral compass of career criminals. The Fox: Elegant, Aloof, Definitely Judging You

At twilight, a sleek red fox slips through the blanketed shrubs like it's auditioning for a luxury cologne commercial you see on tv around Christmas. It pauses only to stare disdainfully at the mess the pigeons have made of the mulch. The fox does nothing to fix the problem, of course - lead actors don't do cleanup – but its silent judgment encourages everyone to pretend they're tidier than they are.

The Mice: Winter's Tiny Real-Estate Tycoons

Under the shed lives a clan of mice engaged in nonstop home renovation. Every night, they drag in new "furnishings" – a lost mitten pom-pom, a stray Cheerio, and once, an entire dog toy they somehow rolled across the patio. Their winter lifestyle philosophy is simple: if it fits, it's décor. If it doesn't fit, you chew it until it does.

The Long Tailed Tits: The Garden's Hype Squad

They bounce through the snowy branches shouting like caffeinated motivational speakers. Their energy alone melts frost. If squirrels and pigeons ran the place, chaos would reign; Long Tailed Tits keep morale high, even when the windchill is personally insulting.

Final Verdict

While humans grumble through winter, the urban garden throws its liveliest seasonal party. Just remember: you're not sweeping the patio – you're clearing the dance floor for the wildest neighbours you'll ever have.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT RESERVOIR NEWS

A Happy New Year to all residents!

JOINT LOCAL PLAN (JLP)

Residents may remember from previous months' reports that the Vale's JLP (together with South Oxfordshire) was in jeopardy due to a request for withdrawal by the Planning Inspectors over a perceived failure to cooperate with Oxford City Council. Getting the JLP approved is a key ambition for us,



since it would spread the huge amount of housing growth that the 2015-19 administration locked us into over an extra ten years, thereby giving the area time for infrastructure to catch up. The Government has recently announced that the 'Duty to Cooperate' will soon be scrapped and so this major blocker should be removed... we're not counting our chickens yet, but it certainly is welcome news!

RESERVOIR

In last month's MAD News, I urged everyone to respond to Thames Water's consultation on SESRO, the huge reservoir proposed for the south of Marcham. I know there is a diversity of feelings around the need for the reservoir but, whatever your views, now really is the time to respond. There are positive proposals in the plans, including leisure and biodiversity provisions, but without evidence of strong local feeling on specifics there's a risk these may be dropped later on. The consultation is open until Tuesday 13th January; documents are available from the Marcham Centre or online at https://thames-sro.co.uk/projects/sesro/

PERSONAL NEWS

And lastly, the announcement that from early January until at least May, I will be "moving up" to the Vale's Cabinet as the Cabinet Member for Environmental Services, Climate Action, and Nature Recovery. The current Cabinet Member is expecting to go onto maternity leave from early January, and so I will be covering for her until at least May (when there are annual internal elections for posts within the council). The Environmental Services aspect of the portfolio includes matters such as residential waste collection and street cleaning, and the other two are natural extensions of my (outgoing) role as Chair of the Climate Emergency Advisory Committee (CEAC).

I hope everyone managed to enjoy some well-deserved downtime with friends and family over the recent Christmas period. At the December meeting of full council, I was pleased to vote in support of a motion raising serious concerns about the emergency discharge risks associated with Thames Water's proposed reservoir (SESRO) to the south of Marcham. The motion highlighted that, under current rules, Thames Water would not need an emergency plan in place until after the reservoir was built, despite being



required to install equipment capable of releasing huge volumes of water into the River Thames at short notice. Such an emergency discharge – around three times the river's normal flow – could have major consequences for communities, wildlife and the environment along the Thames. The motion passed and the County Council agreed to write to the Secretary of State seeking clarity on how such an emergency would be managed, and a commitment that the resources needed to protect communities would be in place before a Development Consent Order is considered. During the debate, I spoke on the local implications for our area and the need for proper safeguards to be in place.

Turning to roads now and an update on the long-awaited improvements to the A415/A338 Frilford Lights. I'm pleased to

report that the optioneering study for the scheme has now been completed and officers at the County Council are reviewing its findings. Once a preferred way forward has been identified, officers have agreed to meet with me to discuss this further. I'm hoping this meeting will take place in January, so I should have more to share in my February update.

Finally, on everyone's biggest bugbear — **potholes**! As with every winter, the poor weather has seen a deterioration in roads across the county. There is a broader discussion to be had about whether enough funding is directed towards highways maintenance, but that is a conversation for another time. In the meantime, my priority is ensuring that potholes across the division are repaired as quickly as possible. If you spot a pothole, please do report it via **FixMyStreet** (**www.fixmystreet.com**)in the first instance but if you notice one that has remained unrepaired for a period of time, or one that appears quite serious, please let me know and I will do my best to escalate a repair.

MP'S REPORT

TAKING THE PRIME MINISTER TO TASK ON SERVICE CHARGE RIP-OFFS

In December, I raised the experiences of constituents facing unfair and extortionate service charges directly with the Prime Minister. These included charges for cleaning communal areas that do not exist, hedge-cutting residents had carried out themselves for over twenty years, and increases of more than 160% in just three years. I am pushing for a cap on unreasonable service and estate management charges, the creation of a new regulator (as recommended by the Lord Best



review), and stronger powers for local authorities to crack down on abuses by property management companies. Residents deserve transparency and fairness, not rip-offs hidden in small print.

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

As Chair of the Health and Social Care Committee, I recently oversaw the publication of a major report into community mental health services. We found a system that is overstretched, underresourced and poorly designed for the people who rely on it.

The Health and Social Care Committee's report calls for 24/7 neighbourhood mental health services to be rolled out nationwide, genuine parity of esteem for mental health in NHS funding, and urgent action to tackle workforce shortages. I was particularly proud that one of the voices informing our inquiry was local resident Dianne Martin, who has campaigned tirelessly to improve support for people discharged back into the community.

THE BUDGET

The Chancellor's Budget was a missed opportunity to kick-start growth, particularly given the continued refusal to pursue a closer trading relationship with the EU. Our economy continues to take a significant hit, while families face rising costs and high taxes.

That said, there were some important wins. Scrapping the two-child benefit cap will lift hundreds of thousands of children out of poverty. The Government has also agreed to take on the funding deficits in SEND provision, and the increase in Remote Gaming Duty is a welcome step to limit the harmful impacts of online gambling.

HIGHLIGHTS OF 2025

2025 has been personally and politically significant. Welcoming our baby into the world was a joyful highlight, and I'm grateful for the kindness shown by so many across our communities.

After years of campaigning, the Government committed to

scrapping the Vagrancy Act, finally ending the criminalisation of rough sleeping. I was also proud to secure a ban on the use of non-disclosure agreements in cases of workplace abuse and

The UK's recognition of the State of Palestine was another important milestone - a long-overdue step towards a two-state solution and lasting peace.

Closer to home, winning a Liberal Democrat majority on Oxfordshire County Council will help deliver improvements in infrastructure, education and SEND services. Progress has also been made at Lodge Hill junction, and goodwill payments were finally secured for businesses affected by the Botley Road closure.

I want to thank everyone across our communities for their resilience, kindness and engagement over the past year. I wish you a hopeful start to the New Year.

Soha Housing is an Oxfordshire housing association actively assisting communities to develop small pockets of land for affordable housing in perpetuity.

Community-led housing is about local people finding solutions to local housing need. In very simple terms, a community identifies the need for housing and the land to put it on. It forms a Community Land Trust (CLT), a democratic organisation owned by the community. The trust purchasing the land effectively removes it from the market as it must always be held for the community to use. The CLT designs and builds the homes and acts as long-term steward of the housing, so that it always remains affordable. CLTs don't build in order to sell on - it's all about keeping the interest in the land in the community for ever.

CLTs that Soha is involved with often require different partnership arrangements: this may be expertise and guidance to progress the project, acting as the developer or accessing grants through Homes England or Council subsidy. In return, Soha adds to the stock of homes it manages for rent or shared ownership.
